

I'd like to welcome my good friend Chris Mepham, who I know from my time in the Wales squad, although any pleasantries will be on hold for 90 minutes this evening.



Come the end of this one-sided derby, the Town players and staff took in the deserved acclaim of their 10,000 supporters as Kenilworth Road bounced to a fine tune of three points and three goals against their old enemies.

It showed unity and togetherness after a 90 minutes in which the Hatters thoroughly earned to make it three home wins in a row in this fixture and seal their biggest win in this derby since two goals apiece from Brian Stein and David Moss secured a 4-1 victory here back in 1981.

The Town led after just 11 minutes. Alfie Doughty's left-wing corner was half-cleared by the visitors and Tom Holmes hammered the ball back goalwards. Jordan Clark stuck out a leg inside the six-yard box to divert the ball beyond Daniel Bachmann and Kenilworth Road erupted.

With Carlton Morris and Adebayo tormenting the Watford defence at almost every opportunity, the pair combined seven minutes before the break with Ryan Porteous on hand to clear the danger with Adebayo lurking, inches away from making it 2-0.

But the Hatters needn't have worried. Less than two minutes into the second period it was two. Doughty's corner did the damage, curling invitingly from the right to the back post where captain Morris was free to power a downward header past an exposed Bachmann.

Up until this point in the contest, Thomas Kaminski had largely been a spectator but the Belgian was needed on 55 minutes to deny the visitors, flying to his left to keep out Tom Dele-Bashiru's low goal-bound effort from the edge of the penalty area. It was a crucial save at a vital time with the Town rearranging things at the back.

With the Hatters in control, it was almost 3-0 with 21 minutes left when Doughty – now operating in central defence – drove forward and fed Adebayo and his lay off for Jacob Brown saw Bachmann save.

Bachmann then denied Adebayo what would have been a deserved goal with six minutes left but the visiting keeper was beaten for a third time in injury time when Brown raced clear and cooly slotted home.

At that point it was done – with no way back for the Hornets and the Town could toast a famous victory in front of their supporters as the old ground shook in celebration of a 58th win in the history of this derby.

Hatters forward Jacob Brown described scoring his first goal of the season and wrapping up the 3-0 derby win over Watford as one of the best moments of his career.

The 26-year-old Scotland international has had a horrible 2024 after a knee injury ruled him out of most of the second half of the Premier League campaign, and subsequently the summer's European Championships for his country.

Having made his return to action in the defeat at Plymouth last month, Brown went on as a substitute for his fourth appearance of the current season against the visitors from down the road – and produced a finishing touch to them back on a miserable bus journey down the M1.

"I don't think I can explain it, it was probably one of the best moments I've had in my career, just with the magnitude of the game and how long I've been out for, it's been a mad journey," Jacob said. "To come on, score and kind of kill the game in front of the home fans against Watford, it was perfect."

On his injury-time goal, he went on: "When I saw it went over, I thought the defender was going to get

there, but when I got there, I just thought, just calm myself, hit the target. It went in the back of the net, and then the rest was just a bit of a madness."


The former Barnsley and Stoke man was full of praise for the Kenilworth Road faithful, saying: "Literally from the first minute, the atmosphere was crazy – one of the best atmospheres that I've been a part of, and you could see how much difference it made.

"The boys were at it, the fans were at it. They just couldn't handle us and it was just like that for the whole game, and you could see how much difference it makes. So for us to pay them back and see the smiles on the faces at the end, it was top."


Asked about the importance of the result, Brown replied: "To be fair, the gaffer didn't have to say too much. We know how much it means to the fans. It means the same to us.

"We knew it was the biggest game of our season so far and we had to win it, and we went out there and did that. But I think the message is now that that's where we're at, we need to play like that every week, and we're going to try our best to do that."

On Sunday, Sunderland picked up an important away win against Hull City. A second half Wilson Isidor winner sealed the deal for the team as they returned to the top of the table.

Prior to this, the Black Cats drew 2-2 against Leeds United in remarkable fashion. A stoppage time equaliser after a goalkeeping howler from Illan Meslier gifted the home side a point.

Sunderland have only lost two league games so far this season and have got an impressive seven wins under their belt already. Those defeats both came on the road – away to Watford and Plymouth.

Sunderland haven't visited Kenilworth Road since the 2023 Championship play-off semi-final second leg which the Hatters famously won 2-0 that sent the Town to Wembley.

# **MICK HARFORD**

That had come after two legendary spells with the Hatters that saw him score 92 goals in 217 games.

# **MACKEMS HERO**

There have been plenty of candidates but one unsung cult hero to have been loved by the Sunderland faithful was Nyron Nosworthy, whose arrival at Sunderland in 2005 was hardly met with fanfare.

Signed by Mick McCarthy on a limited budget, Nosworthy joined from Gillingham after impressing against Sunderland the previous season. His debut against Charlton highlighted the team's struggles, as they were eventually relegated with 15 points. Early on, Nosworthy appeared out of his depth, plagued by errors.

However, Roy Keane's appointment as Mackem boss proved pivotal for Nosworthy with the manager seeing potential in him as a central defender, and his partnership with Jonny Evans helped Sunderland secure promotion. Nosworthy's commanding

performances and risktaking endeared him to fans, making him a cult hero on Wearside.

Though his opportunities diminished after Keane's departure, Nosworthy played over 100 games for Sunderland and left a lasting legacy. His efforts during that era were vital to the club's success.

# Holly's special day at The Brache



Ahead of World Mental Health Day earlier this month, lifelong Luton Town supporter Holly Hamill was invited by manager Rob Edwards to come along to The Brache to watch training, have lunch and meet the Hatters squad.

Holly is 20 and has suffered with mental health disabilities since she was six years old and was diagnosed with acute anxiety at 12.

Having faced family bereavements and illness as a child and a tic disorder which means she suffers constant shoulder dislocations, she left school and started working in the NHS, but recently had to stop her nursing degree due to her mental health.

Determined to continue to help others, however, Holly set up her Instagram account – Mental Health & Me – to be an advocate for those suffering with a mental disability, and to provide advice and support for individuals and their carers, friends and relatives.

To help herself as part of her healing, this summer Holly started making LTFC keychains, bracelets and anklets – which she brought along to the training ground to share with the lads.

"I started making them when I was signed off from work and I was in quite a low place. I had nothing, so I started making jewellery and it really helped me to feel happy, and have a hobby so I was distracted from my thoughts, otherwise I was just alone with my thoughts, which was really difficult," says Holly.

On her experiences, she says: "I was at a really low point, I didn't expect to be here right now. It's something I battled with. Looking back it was horrible, but it's made me realise how strong I am. Even just being here today, I've never felt acknowledged or important – and I feel those things."

After speaking to her heroes, including favourite player Alfie Doughty, Luton legend Mick Harford and our manager, Rob, she said: "It was overwhelming at first, but in a good way. I'm speechless. It's probably the best thing that has ever happened to me to be honest."

And to anyone else living with mental health issues, Holly has this advice: "Make sure you talk about it. There is so much stigma around mental health, and that's what I'm trying to prevent.

"Just because you're a man, you're older or you're famous, you need to talk about it to someone. Anyone. A friend, a colleague, a family member. It's really important to talk about it and just remember it will stop, and there is light at the end of the tunnel.

"It's really difficult to see that when you're going through it, but I promise there is."

# Jacob and Mads support Together Against Racism campaign

Duo visit Ferrars Junior School to spread anti-discrimination message

in Luton last week
to take part in an
anti-discrimination
workshop put on by the
Luton Town Community
Trust as part of the
Together Against
Racism campaign.

Jacob and Mads answered questions from a group of house captains, ranging from their favourite player growing up (Ronaldinho for Mads and Thierry Henry for Browny) to who has been the biggest influence on their lives and career.

Scotland international Jacob was also asked if he had a special antidiscrimination message to share with the pupils.

"Growing up, some people might have said things about the colour of my skin, trying to put me off my game or whatever. But no matter what the colour of your skin, we're all the same on the inside. Treat everyone with

respect and care for each other no matter what they look like."

At Luton Town, like our forward says, we believe that football is a game for everyone, everywhere, and we are proud of the welcoming atmosphere that you create at Kenilworth Road every matchday. However, every season, there are hundreds of reports of discrimination across the game, and likely more that go unrecorded.

Whether you're a player, manager, watching in the stands or at home – your voices are a powerful tool for change – when we speak up, come together and use our voices we can drive change.

On speaking to the kids at the school, 26-year-old Brown said: "When you see hundreds of kids there staring at you, it's quite daunting. But it's a good experience and it's one I enjoy doing, coming in and you see the faces of the kids

when you come in, they are so excited. To be able to raise awareness and spread an important message about antidiscrimination is good.

"It is super important (for the younger generation to get that message), obviously with it being the next generation growing up.

"I think to have them educated from such a young age is a really good thing and it's important, because you are putting positive messages into them from a young age, and hopefully can help them as they get older to spread that message as well."

The former Barnsley and Stoke forward believes it is an important part of a footballer's job to go into schools and act as a role model on topics such as anti-racism.

"It's one of my favourite things about being a footballer, being able to come to places like this and actually make "YOU ARE

an impact," he said. "I think as a footballer it's your duty to do that, because you are in such a privileged position that you can go in and have a positive impact on young kids' lives, which is a great feeling and not everyone can do that."

Another man who used his voice to champion equality and inclusion in football and beyond, was the founder of antidiscrimination charity. Kick It Out, Lord Ouseley, who sadly passed away earlier this month. He dedicated his life to fighting racism and promoting diversity and significant strides have been made in tackling discrimination, thanks to his work.

The EFL stands side by side with clubs, players, managers and supporters and take a zero-tolerance approach to tackling racism in our game. If you witness racist or discriminatory abuse, you can report it directly through Kick It Out, the Club's reporting mechanisms – by emailing myvoice@ lutontown.co.uk – or by alerting a steward.

Together with the other footballing bodies, we will continue to make football a safer, more welcoming and enjoyable space for everyone. Luton Town and all of football stands Together Against Racism and all forms of discrimination.

During Black History Month, we at Hatters' Heritage will be recounting some of the iconic black players who have turned out for Luton Town.

This week we will be taking a look at when Luton Town themselves were trailblazers due to the number of black players in the team who wrote themselves into the hearts and minds of Hatters fans, not because of the colour of their skin, but because they are amongst the greatest to have worn the shirt.

During the 1970s more black footballers were appearing in the game and one in particular would go on to shine at Kenilworth Road in 1976. A Hammersmith-born and Wembley-raised 17-year-old, came on as a substitute, scoring in a 3-1 win over Bristol Rovers at Kenilworth Road. Ricky Hill, the son of a Jamaican mother and a Jamaican father with Indian heritage, is

still to this day debated as the greatest to have worn the Luton shirt and quickly became a first team regular for the Hatters, turning out 508 times and also briefly managing the club.

Just over a year later,
Ricky would be joined by
another sensation. Brian
Stein, the Cape Townborn son of a politician
whose family had to
flee South Africa due to
Apartheid, signed from
Edgware Town. Stein
made the first of his 488
appearances for the
Town in a League Cup
tie against Manchester

City on 9th November 1977. To this day he is one of the most prolific strikers to have played for the Hatters, with his iconic status secured by his Wembley double capturing the Littlewoods Cup in 1988 during the late turnaround against Arsenal.

The next decade would see Luton set setting their own trailblazer status for black athletes, culminating in our League Cup tie at Orient on the 25th September 1984 where the Town lined up with six black players in their starting

lineup: Mitchell Thomas, Paul Elliott, Hill, Stein, Vince Hilaire and Emeka Nwajiobi. This was unheard of at the time, and much was made of it leaving manager David Pleat to brush away all the comments by saying, "The only criteria is, are they better players?"



Preserving and appreciating the heritage and history of Luton Town Football Club

There was a raucous atmosphere at the Grand Theatre on 1st February 1907 for a performance of Aladdin with the Luton side in attendance.

Miss Blanche Marion, in the lead role, picked out Sandy Brown, Town's 'Glenbuck Goalgetter', and gave her advice on how the men could win their big game tomorrow. The audience roared its approval.

The match in question was a second round FA Cup tie against the mighty Sunderland, a first meeting between the two sides. The Black Cats had offered £150 and half the gate receipts to switch the game to Roker Park but Town's directors had stood firm, therefore serving as the first real test of Kenilworth Road's capacity.

The Sunderland players travelled down on the Thursday and stayed in Hitchin, attending a smoking concert at the football club the night before the game while the Town players took the adulation of the Grand Theatre crowd. A team full of internationals, they were not expected to have too much trouble seeing

off Southern League Luton, though secretary Bob Kyle played down expectations, saying "we do not believe in blowing our own trumpet".

Eventually, around 10,500 would cram into the ground. Such a large attendance brought problems with 'Beware of Pickpockets' signs erected in the area and 20 special constables employed. Mostly though the crowd was in a frenzy, helped by a large blue and white plait being placed in front of the Main Stand with the words, 'Play Up Luton', emblazoned on it.

The game was played at a fierce pace in the first half.

The best chance for the Town came early on when a Bill McCurdy free-kick landed at the feet of Billy Barnes, who somehow managed to miss the target. The visitors created chances too, with the best falling to usually deadly George Holley, who shot just over the bar.

The second half slowed somewhat. Bob Hawkes, who had played in an international trial match the week before, put his 'wandering' style of play to good use as he somehow found himself in a position to rob Sunderland forward Angus MacIntosh as he raced through on goal. It would prove to be the last

big moment of the match, the two sides shaking hands at 0-0.

The replay took place at Roker Park four days later. The Town gave a good account of themselves again but would fall to a 1-0 defeat, with MacIntosh scoring the winner.

We go back in time on this day in the Hatters' history books




Danny Hylton scored a hattrick as the Hatters climbed into the League One play-off places with a comfortable 4-1 victory over Accrington on this day in 2018.

The Hatters went ahead in the fifth minute when a fine counter-attacking saw James Justin cross for Hylton to volley home from close range.

Stanley levelled when Offrande Zanzala equalised after 27 minutes with a powerful header but the Hatters took control after the break when Andrew Shinnie found the bottom corner from 20 yards after 53 minutes.

Shinnie then turned provider for Hylton to sweep home less than a minute later and with 20 minutes left Hylton secured the match ball when nodding home from close range.

## Champions!

Over the course of the season we'll be looking back 20 years to the glorious League One championship winning season of 2004/05.

So many club league records were tumbled during a momentous campaign which was even more remarkable considering that the summer of 2003 saw the arrival of new 'owner' John Gurney and his crackpot ideas, which ultimately led to the Hatters needing to enter administrative receivership, with all its problems, to get rid of him. Club historian Roger Wash tells the story of a season to remember.



## **2004/05 history**

After 12 games the Town remained unbeaten, and with 32 points sat nine points ahead of second place. It was a remarkable start to the season.

Next to visit Kenilworth Road was Huddersfield, who sat just outside the play-off positions, with the crowd of 8,192 settling back to witness more of the same as the Hatters moved serenely towards promotion.

What happened next was certainly not in the script. The Terriers came out all guns blazing against a strangely subdued and lacklustre Luton side and took a deserved lead on 14 minutes when Junior Mendes cut inside fullback Kevin Foley and fired a blistering shot past Dino Seremet from 20 yards.

The Town almost levelled when Sol Davis headed a Michael Leary cross over the bar from 10 yards out but that was as good as it got in the first half as, two minutes later, a Huddersfield corner was cleverly dummied by Mendes with the ball flicking in off the unfortunate Davis.

In truth, Huddersfield could have been more than two goals to the good at the interval as the Town could not have played any worse. Things improved in the second period with Paul Underwood reducing the deficit just before the hour mark with a superb curling effort and Steve Howard hitting a post.

However, the Town had left themselves with too much to do especially as Huddersfield continued to be dangerous on the break.

Manager Mike Newell, reflecting after the game said: "We've lost a game, but I don't agree that it had to happen sooner or later. We put in a poor performance, particularly in the first half, and it could have been more than two at half-time.


"We weren't in the game at all and we got a bit desperate at times. We didn't show any patience or play the sort of football I know we're capable of." Due to the relentless nature of League One the Town players did not have much time to dwell on the defeat as, three days later, they were on the road for a trip to the Bescot Stadium, Walsall.

The Hatters made one change to the side that lost to Huddersfield with Steve Robinson returning after suspension in place of Michael Leary but the Town got off to the worst possible start when Saddlers player-manager Paul Merson put the home side ahead on seven minutes.

Walsall's Zigor Aranalde managed to get behind

Foley and from his cross Darren Wrack pulled the ball back for Merson to slide home. Former Arsenal and England regular Merson, now 36, rolled back the years with a virtuoso performance and pulled all the strings in the Walsall midfield as the Town came under increasing pressure.

Despite this the Town had their moments with Howard seeing a fierce shot tipped over by Saddlers goalkeeper Joe Day and the same player heading against an upright before Rowan Vine, put through on goal by Ahmet Brkovic, ran

out of pitch after trying to round the goalkeeper.

Walsall certainly had the lion's share of the play though with Merson dictating play and setting up several chances which were spurned by his teammates. With the Hatters chasing the game the scoreline was doubled in the 72nd minute when Merson set up Wrack to cross for substitute Matt Fryatt to net via a deflection off Foley.


As in the previous game, manager Mike Newell felt his players abandoned their passing game too easily. "At the end of the day we've tried to force



the game too much at 1-0 and ended up paying the price," said the manager. "We've got to believe in our ability and believe we've got enough to beat teams over 90 minutes and not have to chase it at 70 or 75 minutes.

"Yes, we've just lost two on the bounce, but that happens to the best of them in football. We weren't getting too excited when we were unbeaten and when the lads won 10 out their first 12 and we certainly won't be getting too excited now we've lost two on the spin.

"The last couple of games we've had a few players who haven't performed as we know they can. When it's one or two you can get away with it, but not more than that. Maybe it's catching up with us a little bit. because a lot of our players have played in nearly all the games so far. But I'm not going to start moaning or focusing on individuals - they can be proud of a terrific start to the season."

### 54 ACADEMY UPDATE WITH DALE BRUNTON

Good evening everyone and welcome to Kenilworth Road for this Championship fixture!

Firstly, I just wanted to say what an amazing atmosphere you all made for the 3-0 thumping of the lot down on the road on Saturday. It's days like that which really remind you of what football is all about and to have an Academy graduate play a part in it for 35 minutes makes it even sweeter.

This week, I wanted to take you behind the scenes of an Under-21's fixture in the Premier League Cup. This is our second season in the competition which sees 36 teams from up and down the country

During the analysis session, some members of staff took the kit van to the stadium to set up the changing room so that when the players arrived, they could concentrate on the game at hand.

As expected, it was a tough fixture which turned out to be not only dramatic and historic for the boys.

The first half was an even affair with Josh Phillips having our best chance inside five minutes.

However, we took the lead just two minutes

### **LEON BARNETT**

A product of the Luton Town youth system, local boy Leon became the first person to represent the club at Under-17, Under-19, reserve and senior level within one season when coming on as a substitute in a LDV Vans Trophy game at Woking in October 2002.

After several appearances in the same competition and in the FA Cup against Thurrock, Leon made his senior league table in the 1-0 victory at Hull in the Championship in September 2005.

Although favouring the centre-half position, where due to his amazing spring and pace he was able to dominate forwards, he could play anywhere along the back line.

A regular in the Town defence, Leon scored his first goal in Luton colours in the 2-0 win on the opening day of the 2006/07 season against Leicester and followed up with a second later in August in a 2-2 draw against Stoke.

While the Hatters struggled, Barnett impressed and it came as no real surprise when the defender was transferred to West Brom for a large fee at the end of the season that saw the Town relegated from the Championship after 70 games for the club.

Leon appeared in the top-flight for the Baggies as well as Norwich who he went onto join in 2010. He subsequently turned out for Wigan, Bury and Northampton before being advised to quit the game due to a heart defect leaving Leon to concentrate on his locally based Soccer School.

Hello and welcome to a game which immediately revokes memories of the last time we hosted Sunderland under our famous floodlights, the night we set up our trip to Wembley and the Premier League!

Hopefully the amazing scenes of Saturday continue this evening and we get another result which will take us closer to replicating our promotion to the top flight.

### LTST – representing supporters' interests at the Union of European Clubs Forum

With football regulation, governance and sustainability under the spotlight, what's happening across Europe has a massive impact on the state of the game in England – and on us, the supporters who are supposed to be the heart of football, but whose interests are increasingly marginalised.

On 15th October, two of the Supporters' Trust board members went to the annual forum of the Union of European Clubs in Brussels. UEC is a rapidly-expanding body of over 140 small to medium sized clubs from 25 national associations across Europe, committed to reshaping a football eco-system that's seeing a group of wealthy and demanding clubs dictating how European football is run - the European Club Association, led by the Oatari President of PSG. Sound familiar? There are clear parallels with what's happening here, with the Premier League dictating terms to the rest of the English football pyramid.

An impressive range of speakers from European clubs, player and league organisations - including President of La Liga, Javier Tebas - discussed this unfair, uncompetitive and ultimately unsustainable scenario at the forum: it's a 'money and power grab' approach which will inevitably destroy football as we know it. Other topics included the football calendar overloaded but causing gaps domestically, and with matches switched and timed to suit TV and the big clubs - not us, the fans.

The Trust, along with Fair Game, the Football Supporters Association and UEC – who funded our trip – are a campaigning and extremely active voice in initiatives to protect and promote fans' rights and influence.

It's a vital aspect of the Trust's purpose and mission. We're fortunate that our club is run sustainably and with community-focused values throughout, but many other clubs are in dire straits through poor or greedy ownership, or as an effect of the financial imbalance within the game. Football is a community, and the health of that community and the broader communities clubs bring together and serve, is essential to its survival.




