

III-BOSS

Good afternoon and welcome back to Kenilworth Road for today's meeting with Millwall.

A warm welcome to our visitors from the Den, including my opposite number Alex Neil and his players and staff plus the supporters of the Lions.

They are a streetwise Championship side who have recorded some excellent results this season so we are under no illusions of how tough this afternoon's game will be for us.

We come into today off the back of two games since my staff and I came into the football club just over a week ago.

May I just say a massive thank you to everyone who has welcomed us to Luton Town. As I said at the time of my appointment, it is a huge honour and privilege to be leading this club forward from the dugout. The support from the stands in the past two games has been absolutely brilliant – it is just a shame that we have not been able to give you three points to shout about.

Our performances against Preston and Oxford have shown me a lot. Obviously there are things to work on and improve, but I have been heartened by elements in both games.

Against Preston we were solid defensively and carried a threat going forward. It was a step in the right direction coming off the back of the results previously and, although we would have liked to have scored, it was a point and a good foundation to build on.

So while we didn't build on that at Oxford, there were still some really good things to be encouraged by, especially in the first half. But we dropped a little bit too deep for my liking in the second half which invited pressure on us. So for all the positive things, we failed to be clinical in both boxes. It's a cliché but that's where you need to be at your best if you're going to get results. Defending with your life to keep the ball out at one end and then sticking the ball in at the other.

We scored two good goals on Tuesday, which was pleasing, but we didn't defend our own box well enough and even if you're doing things right at one end, if you don't at the other then you're not going to win games.

It's an area we need to work on in training – it's the only way. We've got to keep on working and keep doing the basics. For as long as football has been played, any successful team does the basics well.

This afternoon gives us an opportunity to put things right after the frustration of Tuesday. Not just to help our position in the table and our quest to climb the table, but also to give the players confidence and put smiles on your faces.



Good afternoon and welcome, everyone, to Kenilworth Road for this important Championship meeting with our friends from Millwall.

The Lions have themselves had a change in the dugout this season, and we go into today's fixture just five points behind them as we aim to improve our position in the world's most competitive and exciting division.

We attack today's game in a positive mindset whilst in the midst of one of the busiest periods in recent memory since our custodianship of the club kicked off in 2008.

From the appointment of Matt Bloomfield to the January transfer window to important Power Court decisionmaking, it is fair to say life has been non-stop across all departments so far this year.

First things first, we can't avoid acknowledging that Tuesday's performance contained some old bad habits which ultimately resulted in the loss, but we can also recognise that this is work in progress and the magic ingredient of time is required before the dark cloud is cleared.

However, as has been evident in his first two matches at the helm, Matt has brought a revitalised energy and some organisation and structure to our game, which bodes well.

The integration of Matt and his new staff - a warm welcome to Richard, Lee and Ben - has been almost seamless as tweaks to the operational structure are made, so a big thanks to those who have welcomed Matt & Co and embraced their leadership. They've been busy getting to know all about the traits of our squad, building the mutual trust, establishing their methodologies and laying down their principles.

Of course, having only met the squad a week

ago and having spent limited time on the grass at The Brache with three games to prepare for, there has not been much time to work with the squad technically, but the early signs have been incredibly encouraging.

Even with such restricted time we have already looked better out of possession against Preston and much better in possession – in the first half at least – at Oxford. The early signs are there so we are excited to see the continued growth and improvement going forward.

Importantly, Matt and his staff have also arrived in the building with absolute clarity on what processes they believe need to be instilled to fix our current predicament, and witnessing this unfold personally gives me good reason to be optimistic for immediate and longer-term future.

At Oxford it was promising to see the return of Alfie Doughty from the bench, and his availability should be seen as a massive boost for everyone, not least his fellow team-mates.

Plus, as our treatment room becomes less busy between now and the end of the season, we can look forward to the return of a number of experienced players, plus enjoy our new faces – Lamine Fanne, Christ Makosso and Isaiah Jones – again, welcome to Luton, boys! – watching them flourish in their new surroundings.

This leads me nicely into the January transfer window – for as long as I remember a window in which business is traditionally conducted at the start and end of the month. We have already welcomed three new faces into the building, taking into account Lamine's arrival, and we are confident that by our

next home match, we will be welcoming more new faces to Kenilworth Road.

Since Matt's appointment, he and his staff have been busy aligning on targets with the recruitment team and, without wishing to divulge too much, we go into this weekend with sizeable bids on the table for new players to strengthen us going forward, not just this season but beyond.

Whether these bids progress to the point that we're able to welcome new players into the dressing room remains to be seen. However, as is, and always has been the case, we will remain true to our core values as taking a measured,

considered approach to recruitment has always been at the forefront of our strategy.

That's not to say we haven't evolved over the last decade. We have always been financially prudent and always will, but our rise has enabled us to express a greater degree of ambition with our recruitment as our financial resources have grown.

We're also conscious that the team needs a blend of youth and experience – not just for this season, or next. Our long-term vision has always been our main priority and that will not change until we're sitting in our seats and roaring on our team at Power Court.

CELEBRATING THE LIFE OF TOMMY HOGDSON

Hatters hero's accomplishments remembered this afternoon



This afternoon we welcome the family of Tommy Hogdson, who served us as player, captain, director, chairman and president during his career.

Born in Hetton-Le-Hole, in County Durham in 1903, Tommy was brought south by West Ham in 1921.

A full-back, who could play on either side, he was, as befitted a former coal miner, tough tackling but also added poise and leadership to the Hammers rearguard although a succession of injuries cut back his appearances. His former teammate, George Kay, who was by now manager of Luton brought him to Kenilworth Road in 1930 where he was soon made captain, but after only 74 starts, a knee injury brought an end to his career.

Becoming a successful licensee, Tommy was invited onto the Luton board of directors in 1954 and led the managerless Town out at the 1959 FA Cup final against Nottingham Forest. Made chairman in 1964, he eventually relinquished the position to Tony Hunt who immediately made him president.

Tommy who was therefore player, captain, director, chairman and president at one club must surely hold a unique position in English football!


Retiring to the south coast in 1984, Tommy passed away in the New Forest in 1989 but his family have never forgotten his ties at Kenilworth Road. Andy Muskett, Tommy's grandson, is here today together with members of the Hodgson family as match sponsors.

Andy told us: "As a young boy I was a regular at Kenilworth Road with Tommy. While there is no significance of the Millwall game, we are here simply to get several members of the family together to experience the matchday emotions of what must be one of the oldest grounds in the country before it's lost forever.

"Because of Tommy's unique achievements, it will be fantastic to once again see the old ground and recapture some great memories.

"I am in possession of a lot of Tommy's memorabilia, and when the museum is built at Power Court, I have promised Roger Wash that he can have Tommy's old boots to put on display along with anything else that may be of interest to the supporters."

But in truth clear-cut opportunities were at a premium at either end.

The Hatters had a sniff of an opener two minutes into the second half when Clark's teasing cross from the left almost found Carlton Morris before Morris's shot on the turn from the edge of the box on 66 minutes was held by Woodman.

With 15 minutes left on the clock, Bloomfield made a triple change, introducing Elijah Adebayo, Victor Moses and Nelson.

However, the Hatters could not break the deadlock. Clark curled a free-kick on target that was saved by Woodman with six minutes left and Adebayo's shot from 18 yards was also stopped by the visiting keeper.

Five added minutes were shown but neither side could find a goal and the points were shared.

For the Town, there was promise – especially in the first half – and heart can be taken from a first clean sheet in 12 matches that helped stop the rot of five straight defeats in all competitions.

Matt Bloomfield's first game in charge ended in stalemate as the Town couldn't find a way past a stubborn Preston North End at Kenilworth Road.

Both sides were restricted to half-chances on a freezing afternoon with a point for the Hatters ending a run of four successive Championship defeats.

New Hatters manager Bloomfield made four changes to the side that were in action last time out at Nottingham Forest with Daiki Hashioka in at right-back and Tom Krauß and Jordan Clark starting in midfield.

Jacob Brown started in attack with Reuell Walters, Liam Walsh and Zack Nelson dropping to the bench. Lamine Fanne missed out altogether with an ankle knock.

The first half saw the Town begin on the front foot with Mark McGuinness poking a shot wide following pinball in the penalty area after three minutes.

As the Hatters enjoyed plenty of the ball Jordan Clark tested Freddie Woodman in the Preston goal with a left-foot effort on 12 minutes.

The Town continued to press, and on 23 minutes Krauß's cross fizzed across goal but no man in orange was there to convert.

Izzy Jones says that there is more to come after an impressive home debut for the Hatters in last Saturday's goalless draw with Preston.

The recent signing from Middlesbrough showed some promising touches and darting runs on his first Championship start for the club, but couldn't quite find the killer ball in the final third.

Asked how he felt after lasting 75 minutes of the draw, he said: "Pretty good. It was a good performance, we know we should have won the game, we had the better chances and more possession, it just wasn't meant to be.

"But overall I felt it was a good debut and hopefully I gave the crowd something to look forward to."

The 25-year-old went on: "[I want to provide] a bit excitement and more goals and assists. I should have had a couple of shots, but maybe it's just me getting used to the ground, the pitch and just trying to get a little

connections with my team-mates and the new gaffer's style.

"It's been a different week, but from this performance, you can only take positives and move on to the next game."

On how he has settled into the squad, the former Tooting & Mitcham United winger said: "Great, and I feel great.

"The boys made me feel more welcome when I walked in the door, especially playing against some of them in the past. It's a good group and hopefully we can achieve our goals this season."



The Hatters twice led but were left to reflect on yet another defeat away from home as Oxford came out on top at the Kassam Stadium.

Matt Bloomfield's side were good value for a 2-1 lead at halftime thanks to goals from Tom Krauß and Mark McGuinness.

However, the Town conceded twice in a 10-minute spell in the second half to swing the game in the home side's favour.

Despite threatening to pull the score back to 3-3 the Hatters couldn't find a leveller and avoid their 11th successive away defeat in the Championship to keep them in the relegation zone.

It was a rollercoaster of emotions on a night that started so well when Krauß fired the Town in front after 11 minutes.

McGuinness was the creator of the opener, poking the ball into the German's path and he took one touch before blasting a well-struck shot into the top corner.

Back came Oxford and the home side were level 12 minutes later. The Hatters failed to clear a cross from the left and Michal Helik was first to the ball to poke a shot beyond Thomas Kaminski.

But the Hatters soon restored their lead. Three minutes after the equaliser, Jordan Clark's fine free-kick was floated to the back-post towards McGuinness and the centre-half craned his neck to brilliantly power a header past Jamie Cumming in the U's goal.

The Town then had Kaminski to thank on 30 minutes to deny a deflected effort from Siriki Dembele on 30 minutes and again moments later from a low shot from 20 yards.

As half-time approached the Hatters upped the ante and a series of eye-catching passing moves brought applause from the away end. Once such passage saw Elijah Adebayo go close on 40 minutes.

After the restart Zack Nelson fired over on 55 minutes and Krauß saw a shot blocked from the edge of the box three minutes later as the Town went in search of a third goal.

However, on 59 minutes, the home side were level when a right-wing corner was met by Ciaron Brown.

Bloomfield made a quadruple change shortly after the goal with Carlton Morris, Pelly Ruddock Mpanzu, Jacob Brown and Alfie Doughty introduced.


But while the Town's reaction to being pegged back was good they couldn't make their possession count and on 69 minutes Oxford led for the first time. A right-wing cross found its way to Greg Leigh who had the freedom of the Hatters penalty to nod past an exposed Kaminski.

Behind, the Town rallied but as time ticked down chances were at a premium as the hosts protected their lead.

Six minutes were added at the end of the 90 but the Hatters couldn't find an equaliser and were left to reflect on what might have been.

Town led twice through first-half goals from Tom Krauß and McGuinness, whose far post header was adjudged by Hawk-Eye technology to have gone over the line to put us 2-1 up, after Michal Helik's first equaliser.

However, second-half goals from Ciaron Brown and Greg Leigh, both unmarked inside the six-yard box, earned the hosts the points to make it seven games unbeaten for the U's and 11 successive defeats in away league games for the Hatters.

"It's a tough one for us, we're in a difficult spot at a minute," said Republic of Ireland international McGuinness. "You concede goals like that and you're not going to win games.

"We realise that, and it's an area that we really need to go and work on, away from home especially. We know it's not good enough, but unfortunately these are the moments where we've put in a fairly good performance and not got anything.

"We realise that and we are hurting. The fans are hurting. People are travelling to come and watch us and we're not getting the results. We've got to go and get in training and get on to the next game."

The 24-year-old former Arsenal and Cardiff man continued: "We've got to learn from the mistakes. If you're not learning from mistakes, you'll make the same mistakes again.

"We'll go into the analysis room and we'll look through things and we'll get to the bottom of what's happening.

"It's about getting back on the training ground and working with the new gaffer. It's his second game so we've still got things that he wants to work on and he'll look at, so we need to get in and get to work again." McGuinness did see positives in how the Town's play has developed in a short space of time with new manager Matt Bloomfield, who has continued with a back four used in the two games before he came in from Wycombe.

"I enjoy a back four and I think the team flows well and plays nicely with a back four," he added. "You can see that with some of the football we're playing, we're getting into nice positions, some nice bits of play, but we've got to be consistent with that now.

"Again, it'll come with time with the gaffer, but we need to pick up results in between that and start building." **25**

Since then, five of the past seven meetings between the two sides at Kenilworth Road have ended in a draw, with the past four Championship meetings all ending all square.

The last time Millwall were in town the Hatters fought back from two goals down to earn a point in a 2-2 draw with Elijah Adebayo and Luke Berry on target.

He made 68 appearances - scoring once, the winner at Middlesbrough - before heading to Portsmouth. He is now playing his football in Australia.

LIONS CULT HERO

Remembered for his passion, tenacity and knack for scoring crucial goals - especially with his head - Tim Cahill ioined the Lions in 1998 as a relatively unknown teenager. The Australian midfielder was instrumental in Millwall's success during his time at the Den, most notably helping the Lions reach the 2004 FA Cup final with his decisive goal in the semi-final against Sunderland, After making his debut in 1997/98. Cahill went onto be a regular in the Lions' midfield for six seasons. scoring 56 times in

249 appearances, His performances alerted the attention of several topflight clubs and in 2004 he made the switch to

Everton, where he went onto become a mainstav for the Toffees, scoring 68 times in 278 matches.

The Hatters had halfchances to reduce the deficit but a third did arrive for the visitors with time ticking down as Dany N'Guessan converted from close range to seal victory.


Millwall went on to beat Blackburn after a replay in the quarterfinals but went down in the semi-final to eventual winners Wigan.

The items will be initially displayed in the Eric Morecambe lounge at Kenilworth Road, before moving onto the Hatters' Heritage museum at Power Court.







Preserving and appreciating the heritage and history of Luton Town Football Club

BEWARE THE BOOT OF JIMMY YARDLEY

The supporter who wrote into the Luton News had a story to tell of being hit 'full in the clock' by a powerful shot.

"When I came to, it was to find...my forehead skinned and my hair laid back two inches."

He mused the danger was enough to persuade any fan to pay the extra bob and take a seat in the stand, where the danger of flying footballs would be lessened.

The ball had left the foot of Town's Jimmy Yardley. The Wishaw-born forward spent six productive seasons at Kenilworth Road, with his final goal tally of 94 bettered only by Gordon Turner, Andy Rennie, Brian Stein, Ernie Simms, Herbert Moody and Steve Howard.

He'd moved south to Clapton Orient in 1924 but had struggled for matches in London, playing only 29 times in three years.

As luck would have it, that meant appearing for the reserves against Luton, where a devastating performance would bring him firmly onto Town's radar. A transfer was arranged in January of 1927, with Norman Thomson moving the other way.

The deal caused some consternation amongst fans given Thomson's solid performances for the last two seasons.

These fears were not helped by a slow start from Town's new forward, who arrived nursing an ankle injury and failed to score for the rest of the season.

All this would change the next year when Andy Rennie's redeployment to centre-forward allowed the two Scots to form a partnership that still stands as one of the most successful Kenilworth Road has ever seen.

An early turning point was a hat-trick in William McCartney's first game as manager, a 5-2 win over Brentford. It was quickly followed by four against Clapton FC in the FA Cup, part of his 16 in the competition for Luton, a

number bettered only by Gordon Turner (18).

Town's trainer Horace Pakes said of Yardley, "there was never a player more eager to train and to keep himself fit".

He was otherwise noted as "quick on the turn... able to shoot powerfully in one movement with either foot".

Unhappy with being asked to play as a target man, Yardley would move to Charlton in 1931 and then onto Millwall, maintaining a good scoring record at both clubs.

At the end of his career he returned home to Scotland where he died in 1959, though family links to the club were maintained for many years by his granddaughter, and longserving club employee, Cherry Newbery.



We go back in time on this day in the Hatters' history books

A second-half hat-trick from Andre Gray saw the Hatters storm to victory against Nuneaton Town to go three points clear at the top TALKOF TOWN

of Conference on this day in 2014.

After a goalless first half, the second period began with claps of thunder and lightning in the distance as Kenilworth Road became shrouded in darkness.

The half was only five minutes old when Paul Benson flicked on a Ronnie Henry throw to release Gray in the box and the striker did the rest to arrow a low shot through the legs of the Nuneaton keeper to open the scoring.

Almost immediately the heavens well and truly opened with the players quickly ushered off the pitch by the referee. Within 10 minutes of the restart the Town doubled their lead when, moments after a Ryan Inniss header was hacked off the line, Scott Griffiths teed up Gray to side-foot home his and the Hatters' second and his 16th of the season.

Benson headed over a Matt Robinson cross inside the six-yard box with 15 minutes to go but, two minutes later, Gray grabbed his second matchball of the season when he raced onto Steve McNulty's defensive header and confidently dispatched past the advancing goalkeeper.

The victory saw the Town create a new club record of 20 games without defeat in the league and moved three points clear of Cambridge.

2004/05 history

Following the lacklustre 0-0 draw at Colchester, manager Mike Newell put a positive spin on the team's current situation.


"If you want to achieve anything in this league you have to go to places like Colchester and make sure you don't lose," he said. "Of course it would be nice to win every week, but the league would be over by now if that were the case and things just don't happen like that.

"We've drawn a few games, but we've now taken 26 points from our last 13 games. That's still two points a game and that's promotion form in anyone's book."

Next up on the road to promotion was third-placed Tranmere and a Kenilworth Road crowd of 8,594 saw the Town get off to a bright start with both Steve Robinson and Steve Howard testing the goalkeeper before a sudden break up the other end led to a shock opening goal for the away side in the fifth minute.

A long pass to the edge of the area was headed down by lain Hume to the onrushing Eugene Dadi who managed to prod the ball under Marlon Beresford.

Stung by this the Town attacked with a passion and despite many goalmouth scrambles could not fashion a clear sight at goal. This all changed on 53 minutes



when Howard, on his own and moving away from goal with no-one in support, was bundled over by Tranmere's lan Goodison for a nailed on penalty.

Skipper Kevin Nicholls, who had received a pain-killing injection in his toe before kick-off, proved deadly from the spot once more leaving the game wide open again.

To their credit, Tranmere gave as good as they got but it was the Hatters who had the better chances as the game drifted to a stalemate.

"I'm not too disappointed with the result as Tranmere are a team we need to keep at arm's length," said Newell afterwards. "We're still three points ahead of them with a game in hand,"

Tranmere boss Brian Little admitted he would have settled for a point before the game so was well pleased. Despite all the positive messages by Mike Newell, deep down he felt that the squad could do with a couple of fresh faces.

With this in mind he was given the goahead to spend a little money for the first time since he had been at the club and put in a bid for Stockport's Warren Feeney, a player who had caused the Town problems in the past when he was at Bournemouth. He also made an attempt



to bring back Gary McSheffrey on loan from Coventry. Both bids seemed to be destined to failure though.

A frustrated Newell said: "We've made several enquiries over the past couple of weeks and I'm embarrassed to make an offer because I know that clubs have had offers which we can't compete with. It looks like it's going to have to be a loan, which is a bit disappointing because I did feel that once we got to this stage there would be a bit of backing for us.

"The players have been magnificent all season but if we lose two or three through injury or suspension it might be stretching us just too much. Teams around us are bringing in players but that's not happening here and it is a bit frustrating."

The following Saturday, the Town travelled to Huddersfield to take on the mid-table Terriers. Chris Coyne was missing from defence with a yellow card received the previous week meaning a suspension under the totting up procedure. His place was taken by Russ Perrett.

As a spectacle, the game was spoiled by referee Mick Thorpe, who made some bizarre decisions affecting both sides with the result that the contest was never allowed to flow. The Hatters took the lead on 33 minutes when a cross from Kevin Foley was missed by Howard only for the ball to run to Ahmet Brkovic, who slid in at the far post past a hesitant Huddersfield defence.

The Town appeared to be comfortably holding

on to their lead without overly threatening the Huddersfield goal until the referee continued to allow play long after the allotted 90 minutes and in the 95th-minute Luke Beckett took advantage of a long ball hoisted into the Luton box and cleverly lobbed Marlon Beresford.

"Overall I'm pleased with our performance," said Newell afterwards, "We never felt we were under any real pressure. To get so close to winning then lose it was a sickener. I thought we'd done enough."

The 2014/15 season saw us return to the Football League for the first time since 2009. This also saw a continuation of our Fila-manufactured and EasyJet-sponsored based shirts, and this one, in my opinion, is criminally underrated!

I am talking about our third shirt for the season. This was our white shirt for the season and features a lovely collar with small touches of orange on the collar, sleeves and at the bottom on the hip. The big Fila logo is on the sleeves, with the big

orange and white easyJet sponsor on the front.

Our home and away shirt did not feature a collar, so this is one step away from the design template. It also has a very subtle horizontal pattern on the white of the shirt, which is a nice touch.

It is very simple, but as time has gone on, it feels classy and understated. In another era, this could easily have been a home shirt before we switched to orange.

Our first season back in the league was more

successful than we could have imagined; finishing a very respectable eighth place with 19 wins and 68 points. We also made the third round of the FA Cup, until we lost to Cambridge United – wearing this shirt.

The third shirt made its competitive 'debut' away at Accrington Stanley, a game we drew 2-2 in front of a crowd of 1,562. Luke Rooney and Jake Howells were the first goal scorers wearing this shirt.

Defeat at Shrewsbury and a draw at York City

followed in this shirt, before we got our first win away at Cambridge United with Mark Cullen the goalscorer.

This shirt was worn 10 times over the season, with only one win. It's final outing came on 14th April 2015 was a 0-0 draw at Dagenham and Redbridge.

Who comes to mind when you think about this shirt? I'll avoid the obvious, and go for Michael Harriman along with Nathan Doyle, Ryan Hall, Shaun Whalley and Lewis Kinsella.

ALAN SLOUGH

Luton born and bred, Alan had trials for Watford before the Hatters saw sense.

In his eight years as a professional at Kenilworth Road he was part of the Town side that rose from Division Four to knocking on the door of Division One.

He was known as a cultured but tough-tackling midfielder, who also scored his fair share of goals.

Alan made his Luton debut in a 1-1 draw at home to Brighton in the League Cup in September 1965 as a 17-year-old, three weeks before his 18th birthday.

He would go on to make a total of 312 appearances in the Town colours, scoring 32 goals. His final appearance for us came in a 2-2 draw with Lazio in the Anglo-Italian Cup in May 1973.

It was after the end of that season that Alan moved on to Fulham when Luton manager Harry Haslam made it clear he wanted his own players in the side.

With Fulham, Alan played in the 1975 FA Cup final alongside Bobby Moore before transferring to Peterborough two years later where his main claim to fame was scoring a hat-trick of penalties in an away game at Chester - a Football League record.

Alan joined up with his old school pal Bruce Rioch as a coach at Torquay.

In March 2021, Alan sadly passed away after a long illness, aged 73.

The hometown boy sits 20th in our all-time appearance holders.



Rampant Ladies hit Wootton for 11

The Town Ladies progressed to the semifinal of the County Cup on Sunday following an emphatic 11-0 victory over sixth-tier Wootton Blue Cross Lionesses, which included hattricks from Gabriella Spillman and Shanice Lewis.

Spillman set off on a lightning-quick run via the right-hand channel. She drove into the box and set up Fensome for a tap in.

Any hope Wootton had of staging a comeback was damaged with 10 minutes of the first half to play, when a poorly timed challenge from the Wootton goalkeeper saw her wipe out Lewis as she was bearing down on goal and was shown the red card.

A minute before halftime saw the first of four goals within the space of three minutes for the Hatters. Leyah Maddix scored her first goal since returning from injury after she expertly slotted the ball past the makeshift goalkeeper.

Less than 30 seconds later, Fensome netted Luton's fourth after going around the keeper and finishing into an open net for her 49th goal for the club.

Spillman then netted her brace with a smart finish on her left foot and then McKay got in on the act after tapping home a rebound as the flurry of goals continued before the break and the Town went in at half-time 6-0 to the good.

It took the Hatters 10 minutes to get off and running in the second half. This time it was via Lewis whose cool finish with the outside of her boot nestled into the bottom corner. She

then scored her second five minutes later after taking the ball around the goalkeeper to make it eight.

Moments later, Tsianne Leander added her name to the scoresheet. Elizabeth Mulvaney laid the ball off for Leander to add the ninth of the afternoon.

With 20 minutes left Spillman claimed her hat-trick to bring up double figures, showing great composure when one-on-one with the keeper to slot the ball into the back of the net.

Finally, in the second minute of additional time, Lewis also secured her hat-trick when Leander unselfishly laid the ball off for Lewis to complete the scoring.



The Hatters, who had appointed Matt Bloomfield just seven days prior, were leading 2-1 against an Oxford side under Gary Rowett, the former Derby and Millwall boss having led his new charges to a six-game unbeaten in the Championship since taking over.

With Town's first half play a world apart from the kind of performances they had dished up on the road previously – with Bloomfield's efforts on the training ground were there for all to see – there was genuine hopes from those in attendance, and watching on at home, that this was the day the Hatters were going to end their miserable 11-game losing streak on the road.

However, around 20 minutes later those hopes and dreams had gone up in smoke, with Town's old wounds reopened, in quite dramatic fashion too, as the hosts were left free not once, but twice, to find the net and turn their interval deficit into a 3-2 advantage.

Even though there was time on their side, a Hatters team who remain bereft of confidence when venturing outside of Bedfordshire, never looked like fighting back, as their travel sickness appears to only be getting worse.

There were green shoots during a first half in which the fun appeared to have returned to watching Luton once more: two goals, one a terrific strike from Tom Krauß and some wonderful passing moves that on another day might have led to more goals.

With Bloomfield able to do that in just a few days of training, then it is quite exciting to see just what he can do with sessions at The Brache, and after today's game, plus the trip to Sheffield Wednesday, he will have a fortnight where he can do just that.

The one thing that is against him is time though is only having a week or so left in the transfer window to get the players in that the manager clearly needs to

boost the squad – even if it's just to alleviate that losing mentality which continues to linger.

With the Hatters in the bottom three ahead of kick-off today and just 17 matches to go after the Lions have hopefully slunk back to London, then Bloomfield also has his work cut out ensuring his new charges can bring his ideas to life on the field as well in time to prevent a second successive relegation.

Fingers crossed he can though, and there are more first halves rather than second halves from Tuesday night to watch, as there was enough on display in that opening 45 to suggest Championship football will remain at Kenilworth Road next season.
