

BOARDROOM DAVID WILKINSON



Good afternoon, everyone, and a very warm welcome to Kenilworth Road for another huge occasion in which we are going to need every single Luton Town voice to be heard, loud and proud.

We welcome our visitors from Middlesbrough, who have become regular opponents in recent years since our first game back in the Championship on that balmy early August evening here in 2019.

The noise generated when Sonny Bradley crashed home that emphatic volley for our first second tier goal in 12 years literally made the Main Stand shake – and we want this current squad and our opponents to have "the full Kenny experience", as Jordan Clark so brilliantly put it in his post-match interview on Tuesday night.

Jordan was speaking with the passion and the character we have come to expect from a man who had just scored a stunning volley of his own at Cardiff, adding to his collection of iconic goals in a Luton Town shirt. He knows from first-hand experience on so many occasions exactly how good it feels to have more than 10,000 of us Lutonians roaring the team on at home, and what an impact we all can have on their performance.

It is a real pleasure to be able to write these notes after a well-deserved and rare away win. Huge credit must go to the squad for the way they fought back from going behind, with Thelo Aasgaard netting the winner to cap a wonderful day for him personally having been called up to the senior Norway squad for the first time. Congratulations, Thelo.

That's two wins in the last three games, six points from nine on offer, and it could well have been more if vital decisions hadn't gone against us at crucial

times in both the Watford and Burnley games.

Matt's game plans are definitely coming to fruition and we have been able to establish more control, even in the Sheffield United and Plymouth games when we didn't get our rewards, but have been disrupted by frustratingly harsh or plain wrong decisions by officials.

The penalty for Watford was given in the 11th minute and changed the game completely. It is hardly surprising that when a team is on

In the Burnley game, Kal Naismith's red card was in the 19th minute. We thought at the time that it was harsh, and it probably contributed to their first goal. There were other questionable decisions, which may or may not have affected the result, but would almost certainly have affected the final score. Goals matter if you're in a dogfight at the bottom of the table.

If we in the stands are aghast by certain

decisions, how must that affect those on the pitch? My brother, who was an international rugby player, would have seen some of the tackles and holding that takes place in the penalty area at Twickenham. I remember a time when it used to be "if in doubt favour the attacker". When did that change?

These instances demonstrate how important it is for us to be loud and proud for our team. Those of you who went all the way to south Wales on a chilly Tuesday night were magnificent and were able to be heard by the players on the pitch and us from the other side of the ground. The connection from the

400-plus Hatters in the stand to the players and staff on the pitch was tangible, and we want to feel that again.

Currently, and in this position, it is so important that we be the 12th man. We generated an electric atmosphere here when we beat Sunderland in the second lea of the Championship play-off semi-final. It was that support that helped us to win a game that Sunderland already thought was done and dusted. We know that we have a squad capable of beating anyone in this division when they are at it, so let's make it easier for them to be at their best for the next nine games.

When we are all nervous, we can feel it. The last 15 minutes on Tuesday felt like a lifetime to me and the relief was palpable. You are the best supporters there are, and we know you are disappointed that we are in this position, but we can do this with your help. We owe Middlesbrough one for earlier in the season, so let's make this afternoon ours.

Elsewhere on the football side we continue to be encouraged by the performances of our academy teams and players on loan at other clubs.

Our Under-21s made it through to the knockout stage of the Premier League Cup for the first >>

On Tuesday our Under-17s reached the final of the PDL Cup after beating Bolton Wanderers 5-0. Our academy has had trouble keeping up with our progress at senior level, and of course in our Conference years we lost most of our talented players to bigger clubs for little or no reward. Jordan Clark's first-half goal against Portsmouth secured Matt Bloomfield his first win in charge in our last fixture at Kenilworth Road.

Having gone 12 games in the Championship without a victory and eight under the new boss, the midfielder's close-range strike was the difference on an afternoon of high tension and anxiety.

It was a priceless victory, as the Town lifted themselves off the bottom of the table in a game that was feisty from the off – an early booking for Andre Dozzell for a late challenge on Liam Walsh set the tone.

While the Town enjoyed the majority of the ball, chances in both boxes were few and far between with the nearest the Hatters came to threatening came on 20 minutes when Regan Poole's back-pass rolled past goalkeeper Nicolas Schmid.

However, five minutes later, the Town had the lead. Clark came away with the ball as a Pompey free-kick failed to breach the Hatters penalty area and the midfielder carried the ball 70 yards before laying off to Jacob Brown. His cross into the box was diverted onto the post by Marlon Pack but Clark was on hand to smash home the rebound.

Ahead the Hatters came close to doubling their lead on 32 minutes when Alfie Doughty's low shot was cleared off the line by Poole before Clark, searching a second, curled into the arms of Schmid just before the break.

After the restart, Portsmouth came out the brighter of the two sides but despite their dominance, they failed to seriously test Thomas Kaminski.

The Town were holding firm defensively with Christ Makosso impressing on his full Luton debut and the defender headed clear brilliantly on 64 minutes to deny Colby Bishop from close range.

Clark shot wide after a flowing Hatters move at the other end on 69 minutes as the Hatters sought a second to put the game to bed.

However, as time ticked down the Town desperately held onto their lead as Pompey pushed for a leveller.

And hearts were in mouths with four minutes left when Connor Oglevie headed over from six yards with the goal at his mercy. It was a huge let-off.

Back came the Town – Clark was denied what he felt should have been a penalty with two minutes left after going down under pressure from Pack.

Portsmouth then had their own claims waved away after Kal Naismith appeared to handle in the box in the second minute of added time.

That would prove to be the final dramatic moment with the relief of a welcome three points palpable around Kenilworth Road at the final whistle. 15 |

The Town slipped to a heavy defeat on the road against promotion-chasing Burnley after playing three-quarters of the game with 10 men.

After an even start to a game that all changed in the 22nd minute when Kal Naismith was shown a second yellow card – his second booking in seven minutes.

And the Clarets wasted no time in making the most of their man advantage. Connor Roberts shot over on 23 minutes and Mark McGuinness was straight into the action to divert a dangerous cross from the right away from Kyle Foster in the box moments later.

But a nightmare spell for the Town was compounded on the half-hour when McGuinness – who had only been on the pitch five minutes after replacing Liam Walsh – steered Roberts' cross beyond Thomas Kaminski to give the hosts the lead.

You felt the Hatters needed to get to half-time trailing by just one in order to reassess their options but, six minutes before the break, Burnley doubled their lead when Marcus Edwards' right-wing cross was side-footed home by Foster from six yards with the Hatters believing the referee had impeded Zack Nelson in his attempt to clear the initial danger.

The Town were frustrated once more eight minutes after the restart when the home side made it 3-0. Edwards was again the creator, darting down the right. However, the Hatters seemed certain that the winger had carried the ball out of play before crossing for Josh Brownhill to fire home from close range.

Brownhill fired wide with a first-time shot from the edge of the penalty area moments later before Matt Bloomfield made a triple change, introducing Millenic Alli, Lamine Fanne and Jacob Brown.

It was Brown who had the Hatters' first chance of the afternoon on 65 minutes, nipping into the box after two home defenders collided with one another to force James Trafford into a smart save.


Burnley had taken their foot off the gas since the third but still chased a fourth goal – substitute Manuel Benson curling a shot from distance on 77 minutes.


Back came the Town and Brown - who looked lively in attack - volleyed an instinctive volley wide moments later.

Burnley should have made it 4-0 with five to play when Josh Laurent somehow skied an effort over the bar from 10 yards with time on his side.

As time ticked down Chris Makosso thought he should have had a penalty after receiving a kick to the face in the final moments as the Town chased a consolation but it was the hosts who had the final word when Ashley Barnes crashed home a fourth goal with the last kick of the game to rubber-stamp another defeat on the road for the Hatters.

The Hatters fought back from a goal down to move to within two points of safety in the Championship as goals from Jordan Clark and Thelo Aasgaard earned their first win away from Kenilworth Road since September.

Defender Christ Makosso headed a presentable chance over following Isaiah Jones' right-wing cross before Cardiff, who came into the game five points above the Town in the table, had their first opportunity on 24 minutes when Yousef Salech curled a shot over the bar.

But the Hatters came close to breaking the deadlock shortly after the half-hour mark when Liam Walsh's brilliant low, swerving volley from 20 yards was parried to safety by ex-Hatter Ethan Horvath.

Five minutes after the restart, however, the hosts took the lead. Mark McGuinness headed clear the danger from a Cardiff free-kick but the ball fell to Calum Chambers on the edge of the box and his mis-hit strike bounced into the corner of the net.

It was harsh on the Hatters but their reaction to going behind was first class. Carlton Morris came close to levelling the score almost immediately, only to shoot at Horvath from eight yards after being found by Elijah Adebayo. But the Town were only behind for seven minutes when they equalised in sensational style. There seemed little else on for Jordan Clark when the ball dropped his way 25 yards from goal but after taking the ball on his chest he thumped an unstoppable volley into the top corner past the helpless Horvath.

The home side came close to retaking the lead when home substitute Sivert Mannsverk curled a shot over with a shot from 15 yards before substitute Millenic Alli shot into the side netting as the Town began to find their attacking verve.


Kaminski then needed to be alert to keep out a low drive from Perry Ng on 74 minutes but then could only look on 79 minutes when Chambers came mighty close to putting the Bluebirds back in front with a stunning volley that rattled the crossbar.

It would prove to be a vital moment as 60 seconds later Josh Bowler, on as a substitute just four minutes earlier, saw his shot deflect into the path of Thelo Aasgaard and the midfielder made no mistake to drill home his first goal for the club from close range.

Ahead on their travels for the first time since the sunny days of September, the Town saw out the final 10 minutes in the cold South Wales air to hold on to three priceless points to edge them closer to safety in the fight for survival.

The Hatters welcome Middlesbrough who have made the trek from Teesside for today's match at Kenilworth Road.

Michael Carrick's side have hit a rocky patch of form recently and come to Bedfordshire desperate for all three points.

Boro had a great start to the season and were right up at the top of the table for a while. However, since the turn of the year the form has taken a turn too.

A run of seven losses in eight games saw Boro tumble down the table and put their play-off hopes in jeopardy.

Wins against Stoke and Derby ended this poor run but a recent loss against Swansea has set Boro back once more.

Striker Tom Craddock arrived at Kenilworth Road on loan from Boro in 2008 and such was his impact for the Hatters the move was made permanent, Craddock scored the second goal in our 3-2 Johnstone's Paint Trophy win in 2009 and in our first season in the Conference he hit 23 goals in 44 league games before moving to Oxford at the start of the next campaign.

RIVERSIDE CULT HERO



The words 'Juninho' and 'cult hero' just go hand in hand. The Brazilian was an instant hit on Teesside when the diminutive playmaker rocked up at the Riverside in 1995.

In the days when any new South American arrival meant fans would flock to the stadium to witness them doing some keepy-uppys, Juninho instantly won the hearts of Boro fans following his arrival from Sao Paulo as a 22-year-old.

While small in stature what he lacked in height he made up for in technique as his goals and assists propelled Boro to the League Cup and FA Cup finals in 1996/97.

What he couldn't do, however, was prevent Boro from being relegated from the top-flight that season despite his 12 goals in 35 Premier League.

He didn't hang around for a season in the Championship so he left for £13m for Atletico Madrid but the winger was soon back at the Riverside, rejoining on loan in 1999/00 scoring four times in 24 games.

A third spell then came a couple of years later when £6m took him back to Teesside, scoring eight times in 31 games in 2003/04, helping them win the League Cup that season.

FIXTURE FLASHBACK

TOWN 3-3 MIDDLESBROUGH 2nd AUGUST 2019

The Hatters' return to the second tier began with a memorable draw in a sixgoal thriller against Boro.

Four goals were shared in And it looked as though the first half with Ashley Fletcher heading the visitors in front before Sonny Bradley's equaliser brought the house down with a stunning 30-yard volley - his first goal in Town colours.

The Town then led when Martin Cranie nodded home from a corner but the lead was short lived when Britt Assombalonga shot squirmed past Simon Sluga.

After the break, Boro regained the lead when Lewis Wing sent a swerving shot from the edge of the box into the top corner.


the visitors would claim a first win at Kenilworth Road since 1974 when they were awarded a penalty - only for Assombalonga to blaze over the bar from the spot.

Thelo Aasgaard celebrated his first call-up to the senior Norway squad with his maiden goal in a Luton Town shirt on a day to remember in Cardiff.

The 22-year-old attacking midfielder discovered he had been selected by Ståle Solbakken on Tuesday morning while at the team hotel in the Welsh capital.

He rounded off a wonderful day on a personal level by grabbing the winner 10 minutes from time at Cardiff City Stadium after Jordan Clark's stunning volley had cancelled out Calum Chambers' opener for the Bluebirds.

"It's hard to put into words," said our January signing from Wigan, when asked about his perfect day. "I'm really happy, but I'm really happy that the team effort came off today and we got a massive three points."

The win took Town to within two points of the hosts in the fight for survival at the foot of the Championship table, but also brought an end to the 15-match winless sequence on the road in the league.

On whether it felt more than just a result for the 400-plus Hatters in south Wales, he replied: "Yes, it does. I think you could see with the away support, they backed us all game and they helped us when we went 2-1 up. They were behind us, so I'm really happy for them and you could see what it meant to them at the end.

"We've just got to try and keep that momentum going into the next game now."

Thelo's first goal for the club brought his tally for the season to 13, after a prolific first half of the campaign in League One with Wigan.

It came after he followed Josh Bowler's low shot into the box was blocked by Cardiff defender Dimitrious Goutas with the ball ricocheting into his path to present the chance to fire past former Town keeper Ethan Horvath from close range.

Thelo said: "I think it's just persistence. It's a case of even if things aren't falling for you at the start of a game, always being persistent

and just arriving in the areas. If you're there enough, the ball comes to you, so I'm just really happy that I was on the end of that one."

The victory made it two wins in three matches following the home success against Portsmouth prior to last Saturday's loss at Burnley.

Asked whether he feels that momentum is building ahead of the home clash with Middlesbrough, he said: "Yes, it's six points out of a possible nine in the last three games and if we can get a win against Middlesbrough, there is some real momentum that we can take into the international break, and then we can reset and go again.





Preserving and appreciating the heritage and history of Luton Town Football Club

Good things come to those who wait

Those heading to Kenilworth Road on 15th October 1994 could be forgiven for feeling pessimistic.

Not only were the Hatters searching for a first league win at home at the sixth attempt, but the visitors were joint-top of the table Middlesbrough, led by Bryan Robson.

By contrast, Town's form had been very good away from home. After a defeat at Tranmere in August they were four unbeaten on their travels, including wins at Port Vale, Watford and, on the previous Sunday, Stoke.

David Pleat, always a man to consider the bigger picture, had a theory that away sides were working ever harder to get behind the ball, making it more difficult for the home team to break their opponents down.

So perhaps even he was surprised as he watched Town demolish their visitors from start to

finish. The opening goal came after 21 minutes when the unfortunate Paul Wilkinson headed into his own net, and it was 2-0 15 minutes later when Dwight Marshall drove home a John Hartson lay-off.

Wilkinson, who'd appear for the Hatters in a handful of games in the 1995/96 season, was involved again in the third, deflecting David Preece's 18-yard volley into the net five minutes before half-time. The only surprise was that Town had only managed three. That soon changed just before the hour when Marshall scored at the second attempt after Steve Pears, in the last of his 339 games for Middlesbrough, had saved the initial shot.

Five minutes later Hartson added the fifth with an angled drive. It was no more than the young Welshman deserved for an electrifying display, made even more remarkable because he'd just suffered an awful week away with the Wales Under-21 side, leaving Pleat wondering whether to give the forward a rest.

The visitors pulled one back late on through Derek Whyte but the damage was done. Robson was magnanimous in defeat. "Luton out-ran us, outfought us and out-passed us," he said.

It would prove a rare blip in a tremendous season for Robson's team. Indeed, when the return fixture was played in April, the last game at Boro's Ayresome Park, their 2-1 win left them on the brink of promotion, finally secured when Bolton failed to beat Stoke three days later.

For the Town, the topsyturvy season would continue. Sheffield United were beaten 3-1 away in the next game, before Barnsley ran out 1-0 winners at Kenilworth Road the week after. Perhaps David Pleat had been right all along.

ON THIS DAY

We go back in time on this day in the Hatters' history books

It's been a mixed bag for the Town on this day in history with just five wins from 16 games.

The Hatters have lost just four though with seven of the 16 ending all square since the first game back in 1909 – a 4-0 defeat at Queens Park Rangers.

On the last time we played on this day a solitary goal from Carlton Morris earned us a 1-0 win over Bristol City in the Championship in 2023.

12 years before that we drew 0-0 at Cambridge in the Conference but the Town's rollercoaster history also shows a 2-1 win at Carlisle in the top-flight back in 1975. On that afternoon goals from John Aston and Ron Futcher secured the points for the Town.

The Hatters also tasted success in front of almost 38,000 fans at Goodison Park with a 3-1 win over Everton in 1952.


Our biggest margin of victory has been by three goals. A 3-0 triumph over Oldham in League One came as recently as 2008 while back in 1930 Plymouth were seen off 5-2 at Kenilworth Road in Division Three (South).

Interestingly, the Hatters have only conceded one goal in their past five matches played on this day – in a 1-1 draw at Wigan in 2003 (Steve Howard on target).

Champions!

Over the course of the season we'll be looking back 20 years to the glorious League One championship winning season of 2004/05.

So many club league records were tumbled during a momentous campaign which was even more remarkable considering that the summer of 2003 saw the arrival of new 'owner' John Gurney and his crackpot ideas, which ultimately led to the Hatters needing to enter administrative receivership, with all its problems, to get rid of him. Club historian Roger Wash tells the story of a season to remember.



2004/05 history

Next up on the road to promotion was a visit from a Swindon side who sat just outside the play-offs. Managed by former Hatters favourite Andy King the Robins also boasted Mick Harford who was King's assistant.

Harford was interviewed before the game and said: "It'll be nice to come back and see some friends and I'm looking forward to the game.

"It'll be tough because Luton are going to win the league and end up as champions. I have no doubts about that, but Swindon won't go there in any fear. Hull are still close behind, but Luton have the best players and squad in the league and if they end up as champions it will be fully deserved."

Luton manager Mike
Newell and his assistant
Brian Stein were to face
King and Harford on the
golf course three days
before the game with
Harford maintaining
that talk about the
forthcoming clash at
Kenilworth Road was off
the agenda!

As well as enjoying himself on the golf course Newell agreed to put pen to paper on a new two-year deal. "There's never been any doubt in my mind about it. It's just been a case of waiting for the piece of paper to be put in front of me. I know that the board have been busy with



other things since they came in, but it was a bit frustrating that I wasn't a priority for them." It was also confirmed that Stein had also penned a similar length deal.

For the clash with the Robins, it soon became clear that King and Harford had done their homework and set out to attack the Town from the start which was not the tactic employed by most visitors to Kenilworth Road that season. The problem with this strategy was that the Town could get in behind the opposition and quickly found themselves two goals ahead.

Firstly, Swindon centrehalf Matt Heywood fouled Ahmet Brkovic in the area following an aerial challenge leaving skipper Kevin Nicholls to slam the ball home from the spot. Soon after, a shot from Sol Davis was deflected into the path of Brkovic who made no mistake from close range.

Swindon continued to attack and Michael Procter headed in a Grant Smith corner as half-time approached. The Robins then made it difficult for the Hatters in the second period although a free-kick from Nicholls, which fizzed narrowly wide, and an effort from Paul Underwood that hit the bar, did not allow the Town to put the game to bed.

The goal to allow breathing space came with six minutes to go when Peter Holmes took advantage of a fumble by Swindon goalkeeper Rhys Evans to walk the ball home.

It was Stein's turn to give the post-match interview, saying: "The lads are a bit disappointed that they could not put on a show like we did last week against Bristol City. But we had to remind them that you cannot play champagne football every week."

As a reward for their endeavours over the season, the whole squad set out for Marbella in Spain the day after the Swindon game for a short break for some rounds of golf and sunshine. While they were out there Chairman Bill Tomlins addressed a supporters meeting where he stated it was now full steam ahead



for agreeing a 'commercial deal' with the owners of land adjacent to junction 10 of the M1.

The agreement would lead to £19.5 million being spent on a 15,000-seater stadium to be built on 18.5 acres with the ability to increase capacity to 26,000 seats in the future. It was anticipated that the ground would be completed by August 2007!

Back from Spain and fully refreshed, the Town party set off for Oldham the following Saturday. In a tough encounter, the Town netted early on when Paul Underwood hit a perfect volley from the edge of the area over the head of Steve Mildenhall in the Latics goal.





The Hatters did not have it all their own way though as Oldham fought back and only alert defending kept out Luke Beckett and David Eyres. The goal the home side threatened eventually came on the stroke of half-time when Eyres beat the offside trap to slide the ball home.

Just after the break, Oldham took the lead when Beckett, who had scored a late leveller for Huddersfield against the Town the month before, took full advantage of a sloppy back pass from Chris Coyne to round Marlon Beresford in the Luton goal to score. The Town fought back though and pressed Oldham for the remainder of the game but just as it seemed that a rare defeat was on the cards top scorer Steve Howard rose high in stoppage time to head home a deep cross from Nicholls.

A relieved Newell said afterwards: "We had to work hard for the point, but overall if you look at the 90 minutes we deserved to take something from the game."

"The club shop will be open at halftime, selling our new third shirt in limited numbers," was the call from the PA system reverberating around Kenilworth Road in 2016.

Queue a mad dash at half-time to find this beauty! The 2016/17 third shirt was announced with our home and away shirt, but it wasn't immediately available.

As a shirt collector, that just added to the hype

and need to add it to the collection! Amazingly, this shirt was only available in long sleeves – you had to request to have it modified for short sleeves.

The shirt followed the same template as our home shirt – just with purple instead of orange. Made by Puma, the shirt is a lovely purple with white trim on the arms and cuffs.

The Puma logo and Ssaangyong sponsor are in white, which really stands out against the purple. On the player issued/match worn shirts, you also have the Sky Bet League Two patches, and the "Love Luton" sponsor on the back.

We are used to having purple goalkeeper kits, and this looks very similar to the 2017/18 Puma, purple goalkeeper jersey.

On the pitch, this shirt was worn in the away game versus Crewe Alexandra, with a lovely 2-1 win for the Hatters thanks to goals from Jack Marriott and Jake Gray. It was also used in the FA Cup third round defeat to Accrington.

UNDER-21S EXIT PL CUP TO FOREST

The Hatters' run in the Premier League Cup was ended after a last-16 defeat to Nottingham Forest at Loughborough University.

But the Town's hopes of a half-time advantage were dashed six minutes before the break when Forest took the lead with their first chance of the night. A high left-wing corner was headed goalwards by Ben Hammond and from close range Forest skipper McAdam stooped to nod past Liam Coyne.

Behind the Hatters almost fell 2-0 down two minutes later only for a superb last-ditch challenge from Walters denied Fletcher from six yards.

The Town started the second half on the front foot and twice came close to restoring parity in the early moments after the restart. Firstly Taylan Harris' shot was deflected wide and from the resultant corner, Dominic Martins flashed a shot over the bar at the near post.

Still the chances came and on 51 minutes Phillips cut inside from the left to send a dangerous curling shot goalwards from the edge of the box that Murray-Jones got down to stop.

However, just like in the first half, the Town were left to rue those missed chances as, on 52 minutes, Forest doubled their lead when Fletcher finished well with a well-hit shot from just inside the penalty area.

On 62 minutes the Hatters then had to thank an acrobatic save from Coyne to prevent Jack Nadin from giving Forest a three-goal lead after his fierce shot from 20 yards.

MITCHELL THOMAS

Local boy Mitchell joined Luton Town from school and made his League debut at 18 in a 3-2 win at West Ham United in December 1982.

After earning a regular place in the Hatters top-flight side during the following campaign the tall and elegant full-back was looked on as a future England international and his standing was enhanced further when Steve Foster joined the Town and bullied him into even greater efforts.

Mitchell left Kenilworth Road in 1986 to join ex-manager David Pleat at Tottenham with his last game a 1-1 draw at Manchester City at the end of the 1985/86 campaign.

After a spell at West Ham, Mitchell returned to the Hatters seven years later under Pleat once more, making his 'second debut' in a 2-1 defeat at Southend in November 1993.

At the end of the 1998/99 campaign Mitchell left the Town for Burnley where he played over 100 times, helping the Clarets to promotion in his first season at Turf Moor.

After hanging up his boots at Burnley he became an agent.







THE TRUST INTERVIEWS

This is the first of The Trust Interviews – a series which gives you in-depth insights from key figures behind the scenes at Luton Town.

DANNY MURPHY Head of Medical & Performance



Danny Murphy joined us as a consultant last March, bringing with him over 20 years of extensive experience in the Premier League, the EFL and with the FA.

In June, he was appointed head of Medical Services, and seven weeks ago, he took on the added responsibility of overseeing the Performance department.

A huge thank you to Danny for taking the time to speak with the Trust and answer some of the questions fans have raised.

Danny, how do your roles work together - and are 'performance' and 'sports science' the same thing?

Sports science is the study of how the human body responds to sport, and optimising this for each athlete is key to maximising performance. I studied sports science before physiotherapy, so for me,

they are both part of the same objective, avoiding injury while maximising each athlete's physical potential.

I see these elements as forming the base of a triangle. On one side, you have medical/ physiotherapy; on the other side, sports science/strength and conditioning, with both departments supporting the point of the triangle, the manager. Balanced above all of them, like a seesaw, is performance. When all three points of the triangle are aligned and working at a high level, that's when you achieve the best outcomes, high availability, low injury burden, and optimising physical performance. Our job is to help the manager bring all of that together.

Where do the players fit into this?

The players are at the heart of the triangle, with all of us in those departments – medical, sports science and coaching – working together, led by the manager, to support the players both as a team and as individual athletes.

Within the team's overall plan, each player has aspects of their training that are tailored to them. These could be treatment, gym, or field based. We take into account key factors like age, previous injuries, biomechanics - how well they move - their ability to tolerate training (load), and their overall strength or power, including individual muscle groups. The science behind this is about balancing a player's capability, what their body can do at its peak, and the demand placed on them, which is what's being asked of them in training and games. When the demand exceeds capability, injuries occur. Our job is to prepare them for the demand, manage their response to it (with nutrition, recovery, etc.), whilst pushing them enough, but not beyond, their limits. That's the challenge for everyone in the industry, managing 25 to 30 players on a daily and a weekly basis throughout the season.

With the number of games in the English calendar and the everincreasing physical demands of modern football, that challenge is considerable. The more games and the higher the intensity, the harder it is on the body, and unfortunately, that can put players at greater risk of injury. You'll often hear managers and coaches talk about this.

So, we need to determine how much each player can handle and what we can do to keep them healthy and available. Our job is to help them move as efficiently as possible, build their strength and robustness, while making sure their workload stays within that sweet spot between demand and capability. Our goal is to keep all 25 to 30 players on the right side of that line. That's the job, and it's the challenge we face every day.

What is the club doing to address those injury and fitness challenges?

First and foremost, I have to say that the club is committed

to creating the best possible environment for the players and their physical development. I am aware there have been concerns from fans about injuries to key players, and I'll address that in a moment, as that's one of the reasons I was brought in.

Over the summer, we completely rebuilt and expanded the medical and treatment areas. We've also brought in new equipment and enhanced capabilities for fitness and rehabilitation, including pilates equipment, an isokinetic device specifically for hamstring testing - which is an industrywide concern - hypoxic training to improve athletic performance in injured players by increasing their tolerance to lower oxygen levels, and specific flooring for athletes with a history of joint issues, which can affect their ability to train on the pitch every day.

We've also developed our processes for managing each rehabilitation and enhanced the way we communicate about the fitness and injury status of players. Communication and transparency are crucial to keeping everyone on the same page, which ties back to the triangle structure I mentioned earlier. I'm fortunate to work with a fantastic medical and performance team including Head of Sports Science, Josh Hornby, who I've

worked with previously, and Chris Phillips who was promoted to Head Physiotherapist this season.

Everything here is set up to the highest industry standards, and some of the changes we made in February are already starting to show results. Aligning with the new manager's methodology, we've adapted our approach, creating an environment where the players, staff, coaches, and the club as a whole can thrive.

We're in a battle to survive. Can we do it?

We all know, staff, players and above all fans, that we're nowhere near where we hoped to be at this stage of the season. Yes, we're in a battle to survive in this division which is in contrast the club's vision. We also know fans will be looking for positives. so I'd like to share some figures from the medical and performance side.

Our average availability for the season is sitting at 87 per cent. 85 per cent is recognised as an industry standard for successful teams and actually ties in with previous successful Luton Town seasons.

Compared to last season. our 'days lost' - that's the important impact of injuries - is down by over a third, and return to play times post-injury are also down by 40 per cent. As an example, of the injuries we sustained in February, three were back training within an average of 11 days. Also last month, over half the squad were running faster than they had done for a number of weeks or months with one or two of them setting new bests for speed.

So we're getting players fitter, faster and with fewer absences - just in time for the key part of the season. We're making sure they're as sharp as possible and recover as quickly as they can.

The team spirit is amazing and heads haven't dropped despite some cruel setbacks and we believe the recent wins against Portsmouth and Cardiff will give us the platform to go on and

retain our Championship status, COYH.

Thank you Danny. That's a great message to end on. With all of our spirits boosted by Tuesday night's battling victory at Cardiff, let's get those vocal chords as fit and active as can be and sing the Town on to victory today and right to the end of the season.

Our support can make all the difference, so come on - let's do it!


