



It has taken a while for our academy to catch up, given the first team's climb up the leagues so quickly over the past decade. As a result, our best players were often picked up cheaply under EPPP rules. We still face a battle to keep hold of players, but the higher quality of our staff and facilities - and a clearly visible pathway to the first team - can hopefully persuade more of our youngsters to stay with us. It's also wonderful to have so many former players on our coaching staff. They know what we are about and what matters to us.

It is also important that the boys feel wanted by the club and our fans. Supporters of Luton Youth Development (SOLYD) have been unbelievable in their support for the academy since we were relegated to the Conference in

2009 – but you can also play your part. Why not sponsor one of our academy players? You can see availability on the sponsor pages elsewhere in this programme and I would encourage you to support them if you can. I know the players truly appreciate it.

You may have noted that our accounts have been submitted to Companies House for the year ended 30th June 2024. They show record turnover and profits thanks to our brief stay in the Premier League.

They show the huge divide in revenue and costs between the Premier League and the rest, which is clearly unhealthy. If you take the costs of getting to the Premier League with the costs of being in it, including wage costs and bonuses, the results are not all they seem.

In fact, if it wasn't for parachute payments providing a somewhat softer landing, it could be quite a challenge. When we were at Premier League meetings it was pretty clear that clubs who had been in the division for a while and had built a Premier League quality squad would be very hard-pressed to cope if they were relegated.

In that respect, we were fortunate that we hadn't 'bet the farm'. All three clubs that were promoted this season have invested quite heavily in their squads and it hasn't worked. Is there a lesson? It's hard to say, but despite the fact that clubs are struggling financially, the latest rules encourage losses and more risk and there is little sign of the gap narrowing.

At Luton Town, our remit has been to rebuild and ensure a stable future >>

you need reminding – get behind the team from the first minute and make this afternoon another special one.


Finally, following the end of Ramadan, may I wish members of our Muslim community Eid Mubarak. Especially those employed at the

The Hatters spurned several fantastic chances as they were held to a goalless draw with play-off-chasing Middlesbrough in our last game at Kenilworth Road.

Showing an unchanged side that beat Cardiff, the Hatters started like a train and should have led inside seven minutes. Elijah Adebayo's cut-back was deflected into the path of Thelo Aasgaard who somehow lifted the ball over the bar from five yards out on the stretch.

Alfie Doughty's low drive was blocked two minutes later and on 16 minutes, as the Town continued to press, the left-wing-back created a superb opening for Aasgaard who volleyed straight at Mark Travers from 10 yards.

It was chance-a-minute stuff for the Hatters as, moments after Liam Walsh dragged a shot wide, Adebayo missed a huge chance to break the deadlock on 20 minutes when racing through on goal after a wayward Boro back-pass to shoot straight at Travers.

On 35 minutes the Hatters came even closer to finally getting the ball over the line when, after Carlton Morris' shot was saved by Travers, the Town skipper edged the ball into Adebayo's path but from a matter of yards the striker could not get the decisive touch with the goal gaping.

You felt the Town needed to continue where they left off in the second half but chances were few and far between after the break.

Indeed it wasn't until the hour mark that either side came close – and that was when Finn Azaz curled a well-hit effort just wide from the edge of the box for the visitors.

With 20 minutes left Matt Bloomfield introduced Lamine Fanne, Lasse Nordås and Milli Alli and five minutes later the Hatters came close when Mark McGuinness' towering header bounced agonisingly the wrong side of the post.

As time ticked down the game became a scrappy affair and with three minutes remaining Nordås shot wide after being teed up by Fanne as the Town tried in vain to find a late winner.


With the game swinging quickly from end to end as both sides hunted all three points, Boro came closest in the second minute of added time when Delano Burgzorg flashed a shot goalwards that kissed the top of the crossbar.

But the Town could not find a way through in the final moments and, with results going against them in the games elsewhere, they slipped four points from safety in the Championship table.

A bizarre and crucial own goal 12 seconds into the second half earned the Hatters yet another valuable win away from home to keep their Championship survival hopes alive.

The Town started brightly and Elijah Adebayo struck the post as early as the seventh minute after taking Jordan Clark's clever pass, drilling a low shot across goal that rebounded away to safety.

Four minutes later the Hatters came close once more, this time captain Carlton Morris volleying wide at the back-post after being found unmarked by a beautiful Liam Walsh free-kick.

After missing those opportunities, the Town then needed to dig in defensively as the hosts pushed for an opener.

However, it wasn't until the final minute of the half that the Tigers threatened when Kasey Palmer's goal-bound shot was cleared by Mark McGuinness.

At half-time Reece Burke – making his first start since November – was withdrawn and replaced by Tahith Chong and within seconds of his introduction the Hatters led thanks to one of the strangest own goals of the season.

Morris and Adebayo forced a chance for Thelo Aasgaard but, with the Hull defence sensing danger, Lewis Coyle's clearance hit teammate Alfie Jones and bounced gloriously past Ivor Pandur in the Tigers' goal.

The MKM Stadium has been a happy hunting ground for the Hatters – prior to kick-off the Town had won on their last three visits – and, ahead, it was time for Matt Bloomfield's side to hold on.

Clark and Amari'i Bell – the latter making his 150th appearance in Luton colours – did well to force out Kyle Joseph as the home forward raced in on goal on the hour.


As time ticked down the hosts became more frantic but the Town kept their heads and held firm in defence with Thomas Kaminski gathering Abu Kamara's shot comfortably with 16 minutes left.




The hosts could not muster another chance in the moments that remained and the Hatters were left to celebrate a huge three points away from Kenilworth Road for the second game in a row.

Hatters defender Mark McGuinness hailed a solid away performance after helping his side come away from Hull with all three points on Saturday.

The Republic of Ireland international put in an outstanding shift at the heart of the Town back three, with Alfie Jones' own goal 13 seconds into the second half enough to secure a second successive away win.

Speaking to LTFC+ after the game, the 24-yearold said: "That felt good. We picked up where we left off just before the international break with another clean sheet, which is always positive.

"We were probably lacking that previously,

so I think there was a real solid performance and obviously a bit of luck, and I think we've been missing that, so it's about time we get that bit of luck."

The shut-out was a third clean sheet in the last five games, and our August signing from Cardiff went on: "Don't get me wrong, we were solid. I felt solid. I think everyone chipped in from the front to the back.

"There was obviously a few moments, but I thought overall were really strong and It's fantastic leading into the game on Saturday. I think it's a good test for us and everyone's feeling good."

The victory lifted the Hatters to within two points of safety, building on the good results shown before the international break with wins over Portsmouth and Cardiff, along with an excellent performance in the goalless draw with Middlesbrough.

"As I said before, it felt like that. I think that's because of training and what the boys and everyone at training ground is doing, setting standards. We're working hard there, so it's easy to carry into the games now. We go back in on Monday morning and we do the same thing."

The former Arsenal youngster also spoke of the belief now running through Matt Bloomfield's squad after the recent run put the Town joint third in the Championship form table over the last five matches.

"You know what this league's like, it's all about momentum and that winning feeling. If we can replicate that and we feel that and we embrace that, then it puts us in good stead going moving."

And on keeping successive clean sheets for the first time this season, he smiled: "Look, that's my job, so I'm always happy when we come away with a clean sheet."

After five years at Kenilworth Road he moved to Leeds in 2006 where injuries kept him sidelined during his only season at Elland Road, playing just 15 times for the Whites. After a move to Preston he returned to Kenilworth Road, winning the Johnstone's Paint Trophy in 2009.

UNITED CULT HERO



If there's one player in recent history that rivals the heroes from Leeds' halcyon days it's **Pablo Hernández**.

For reasons why, let's look no further than the Spanish playmaker's pivotal role in their return to the Premier League after a 16-year absence.

Joining in 2016, he became a key figure under Marcelo Bielsa, known for his creativity, vision, and matchwinning performances. His technical brilliance and leadership made him a fan favourite, but it was his decisive moments that cemented his legendary status among the Elland Road faithful.

The most iconic was his late winner against Swansea in July 2020, a goal that all-but sealed promotion back to the top-flight.

His passion, work ethic and connection with the club endeared him to supporters and even after leaving in 2021, Pablo's impact remains cherished by those who witnessed his wizardry.

A man who won three successive player of the year trophies will never be forgotten.

FIXTURE FLASHBACK

TOWN 5-1 LEEDS 21st OCTOBER 2006

The Hatters thrashed Leeds at Kenilworth Road to move up into the play-off positions in the Championship.

Carlos Edwards finished from a tight angle to put the Town ahead in the 12th minute but Hayden Foxe's header ensured it was level at half-time.

But the Hatters came out all guns blazing after the break and two goals in three minutes put Mike Newell's side in command.

A chested effort from Rowan Vine on 55 minutes was followed by a David Bell strike to have the Hatters 3-1 in front. A Markus Heikkinen header made it 4-1 on 73 minutes and Edwards turned in Vine's deflected cross to complete Leeds' misery in stoppage time to seal a superb victory.

"I imagine it will have been a long time since Luton beat a club like Leeds 5-1," said Newell afterwards.


However the joy for the Town would be shortlived. They joined Leeds in League One following relegation come the end of the season.







Preserving and appreciating the heritage and history of Luton Town Football Club

PETER PLATT - THE GOALSCORING GOALKEEPER

A Western League match between Luton and Leyton on Monday 9th November 1908 does not, at first, seem particularly noteworthy.

However, five minutes before half-time, a handball by Leyton's Ephraim Longworth, who would eventually play 300 times for Liverpool, saw the Town awarded a penalty.

The taker was an unlikely source. "Platt came out of his goal to score," reads the match report. It put the Hatters two goals ahead and, to this day, remains the only instance of a named goalkeeper scoring for Luton in a competitive game.

Platt was born in Rishton, Lancashire, in 1883 and it was with nearby Blackburn that he began his professional career, appearing once in a First Division game against West Bromwich before moving on to Liverpool, where he would replace a former Town goalkeeper, Bill Perkins. He was a success on Merseyside, becoming first choice for two seasons before heading to Bedfordshire in the summer of 1905 after losing his place in the Liverpool side to ex-Sunderland stopper Ned Doig.

It would prove to be quite the coup for the Town as Platt quickly established himself as one of the best goalkeepers in the Southern League. Good in the air with great positioning and a good organiser, Platt would appear 184 times over the next four seasons and was often noted as a rare bright spot in an otherwise poor Luton side.

An imposing figure for the time, standing at 6ft 1in and weighing nearly 14 stone, his physicality and temper could sometimes land him in trouble. A lover of animals, he was a pigeon fancier and a breeder of toy pomeranians, but in March 1909 he was charged with assault after an argument over the purchase of, of all things, a ferret, and led to a fight on Upper George Street. With some amount of mirth, the Luton recorder labelled him the "Pugilistic Goalkeeper" and decried the incident as "Ferrets and Fisticuffs".

Not long after, and wanting to settle down, Platt moved to Nuneaton and married a widow who was landlady of The White Swan Inn in Nuneaton's town centre. He would run the pub for many years and was a popular owner, being noted as always jovial and ever ready to consider the welfare of his customers, as well as to entertain them with a song. Fond of flowers, he was rarely seen without one in his coat.

Sadly though Platt spent much of his thirties in poor health, and a mini influenza outbreak in Nuneaton caused him to contract pneumonia and pass away in 1922. He was just 39 years old.



Having reached the final thanks to a penalty shootout win over Brighton in the area final, the Town were as good as relegated to the National League by the time they faced the Iron under the arch.

An amazing 42,000 tickets were sold which could have been more had the Hatters been granted a further allocation at Wembley.

Scunthorpe, going for promotion from League One, were obvious favourites and bossed the opening 20 minutes, taking the lead during that period when the clever front duo of Paul Hayes and Gary Hooper combined to good effect leaving the latter to slot the ball home.

Stung by this goal, the Town fought back and the game developed into an end-to-end thriller with several close shaves in both goalmouths. We did, however, level the tie on 32 minutes when Tom Craddock cleverly set up Chris Martin to roll the ball into the net.

Craddock then put the Hatters into the lead mid-way through the second half which left us needing to endure a Scunthorpe onslaught which we thought had been seen off until two minutes from time when Grant McCann hit home an unstoppable shot from 25 yards.


Rather than going straight to a penalty shoot-out as was the case in the previous rounds, the final catered for extra-time and, when Gnakpa failed to score two minutes in after being put through by skipper Kevin Nicholls, Town fans thought that the miss could come back and bite us.

However, three minutes later Gnakpa was played in by Keith Keane's pass and this time the Frenchman made no mistake cleverly lobbing the onrushing goalkeeper.

The Town managed to hold on to the lead until the end this time to cue mass celebrations with manager Mick Harford deservedly at the heart of them.

Champions!

Over the course of the season we'll be looking back 20 years to the glorious League One championship winning season of 2004/05.

So many club league records were tumbled during a momentous campaign which was even more remarkable considering that the summer of 2003 saw the arrival of new 'owner' John Gurney and his crackpot ideas, which ultimately led to the Hatters needing to enter administrative receivership, with all its problems, to get rid of him. Club historian Roger Wash tells the story of a season to remember.



2004/05 **history**

The Town now entered the busy Easter period still clinging on to top spot but boosted by the £150,000 signing of Stockport striker Warren Feeney who had been on the club's radar for some time.

Sadly, Feeney was not able to take his place in the squad for the Good Friday home clash with mid-table Barnsley as he had been called up by Northern Ireland for their games against England and Poland.

The Sky TV cameras were present at Kenilworth Road, obviously alerted to the free-scoring Hatters and mindful that goals had flown in at Oakwell earlier in the season with the Town winning 4-3.

A great time for the players to showcase their skills in front of an interested television audience turned into a nightmare with Barnsley playing like Brazil against a Town side which had a complete off day.

Barnsley were three goals to the good by the interval as a mixture of comic defending and smart finishing put the game to bed. Thoughts of a revival came when Enoch Showunmi pulled a goal back after the break, but any hopes disappeared when Chris Coyne was given a straight red for hauling down the impressive Michael Chopra who was through on goal. It could have been worse

as Chopra saw a late penalty saved by Marlon Beresford.

Manager Mike Newell remained philosophical afterwards. "You have to give Barnsley credit, but we contributed to our own downfall," he said. "I'm disappointed but I'm not going to start chastising the players at this stage of the season."

The Town had little time to dwell on the defeat as they then made the trip to Torquay on Easter Monday to take on the relegation-threatened Gulls.

The Town started as they left off from the Barnsley game, under severe pressure leading to a Torquay opener after only five minutes through Adebayo Akinfenwa.

Gradually, though, the Hatters fought back and levelled through skipper Kevin Nicholls on 22 minutes before taking the lead when Peter Holmes nodded in a Kevin Foley cross 10 minutes later.

The score was 3-1 soon after the break when Steve Howard hit the back of the net, quite literally, but took the ball with him. Torquay threatened their own comeback when a handball in the area by Paul Underwood saw a spot-kick awarded.

For the second time in three days, Beresford saved a penalty when he dived to keep out Akinfenwa's effort. The points were made safe when Rowan Vine stabbed home the fourth goal on 71 minutes.

"I'm not unhappy with the lads – you can't be unhappy when you win 4-1 away from home," said Newell afterwards, "But we got a bit carried away in the second half and could have been more professional."

With the Town losing top spot-on goal difference to Hull on Good Friday a three-point gap now appeared following the Tigers' defeat at Oldham.



Next up was the visit of Blackpool to Kenilworth Road.


This time it was the home side who were on the attack early on. Howard and Holmes went close before the former headed powerfully home from the latter's corner after 15 minutes.

Blackpool came more into the game as half-time approached which led to a nervy second period when Tangerines' midfielder Martin Bullock, as he so often did against the Town, pulled the strings. The nervousness spread into the stands but fortunately the Blackpool forwards were wasteful, and the Town clung on for a valuable three points

"We weren't at our best, especially in the second half but it's all about results at this stage in the season," said a relieved Newell. "We looked a bit tired and leggy and gave the ball away too often and didn't get it down and pass it around.

"If you don't take your chances and it stays at 1-0 it can leave you in a vulnerable position late on. The crowd were a bit nervous, and it spread to the players on the pitch. Blackpool put us under pressure in the second half but we held on. This time last year we would have conceded late in the game.

"It's all about getting to the finish line rather than trying to impress people."

WITH JACK AINSWORTH FOUNDATION PHASE LEAD COACH

Within our schoolboy programme, the age groups are split into different phases. My role is to oversee the Foundation Phase, which is for players within the Under-9 to Under-12 age category.

While our players are some years away from potentially representing the Hatters in the first team, these years are of great importance in their development.

It's a key window of opportunity to develop the players in various areas; shaping and moulding their technical attributes, enhancing and challenging their social and psychological qualities whilst also aiming to develop their physical traits such as agility and acceleration. The upcoming months are very exciting.
There will be lots of tournaments, festivals and fixtures that will really challenge our players and provide them with valuable experiences that will hopefully, one day, give them the tools required to be a huge success at Power Court.

Our Under-9 and Under-10 age groups have the upcoming Category 2 and Category 3 Nationals, in which they defeated Milton Keynes, Northampton Town and Watford to qualify. Our Under-9s also reached the nationals of the EFL Futsal recently - their desire, application and quality couldn't be auestioned, but unfortunately we fell to a narrow defeat in the quarter-finals.

All our Under-9 to Under-12 age groups will be competing in tournaments which will feature against some of the best young clubs and players in Europe – Borussia Dortmund, AC Milan and PSG to name a few. The Under-12s will be aiming to go one better this year after falling at the final hurdle against a strong Liverpool side in the final last season.

I started the role in August last year after spending a decade at the Community Trust as well as working part-time within the Academy over the last four years. I'm one of a number of staff members over the years that have transitioned from Ely Way to The Brache which demonstrates an eagerness to develop staff as well as players.

It's important to highlight the fantastic work all our colleagues are doing at the Community Trust in terms of providing opportunities and experiences for players within the Luton Town Youth Development (LTYD) pathway.

There are a number of successful transitions over the years, and it's exciting to see the likes of Lucas Thomas and Kyron Roberts-Edema flourishing in the Under-18 group having initially begun within the LTYD. There are also a number of players within the Under-9 to Under-16 age groups that are excelling, all of which are from a similar pathway to Lucas and Kyron.

We work closely with those involved with the

LTYD to highlight players who are developing particularly well, supporting the upskilling of coaching staff, but to also collaborate in other areas such as nutrition and sport science.

Three points at the weekend always gives our Foundation Phase players and staff a buzz during the week so we'll be part of the 10,000 strong Hatters fans pushing the lads on!

Stuart is now a regular on TV, and is currently appearing with his sister Scarlette on The Great Celebrity Bake Off. The siblings also host the Property Unlocked podcast.

In the afternoon, all participants take part in football tournaments and matches, with the main emphasis on having fun rather than simply winning games.



The Hatters also have a League Cup final to look forward to against Stevenage Women at Bedford Town on Sunday 11th May.



THE TRUST INTERVIEWS...

Welcome to the second of our in-depth Trust interviews. This time up, we speak to Barney McGhee, the club's vastly experienced safety officer, about his role at Kenilworth Road – and at Power Court too, as preparations for our new home gain pace.

BARNEY McGHEE Safety Officer



Thanks for joining us Barney. Can you start please by telling us something about yourself, and what the role of safety officer involves?

I've always been a football fan, and first got involved in stewarding and safety in 1999 as an agency steward at places like QPR, Millwall, Leyton Orient, Brentford and Twickenham. I gained my qualifications at Brentford and became part of the senior crowd safety management

team at Wembley where I was a level manager of the players and pitch area. Eventually Brentford offered me a job as deputy safety officer, put me through my Level 4 qualifications and I became full-time safety officer, at both Griffin Park and the new ground. I did a total of 22 years at Brentford, then moved to a job nearer home with the Jockey Club at Newmarket, where I gained my **NEBOSH Health &** Safety Qualifications and then a move back

to football here at Luton. I've been here for around two years now, and I love it. I have a wideranging role where I am responsible for the safety and security of everyone in and around the stadium – all staff, visitors, contractors, guests and, of course, supporters. I'm also involved in planning for the future at Power Court, which is really exciting.

How have crowds and challenges changed over the time you've been in football security?

If you look at the challenges, in my early years the focus was hooliganism. That has changed - it's not completely gone away, but if it happens it's mostly away from grounds now - so ordinary fans can attend games safely. There is still antisocial behaviour fuelled by drink and recreational drugs, however - a combination which seems to bring out the worst in some people. In recent years, we have also had to deal with a major new challenge - counter-terrorism. You won't see it, but

clubs and the police do enormous amounts of work at every ground to minimise the potential of attacks.

We've had changes in the way people attend football. Firstly allseated grounds and now safe standing for instance. We want to ensure that everyone can have a great match experience, sing and enjoy themselves and generally have a good day out supporting their team, home and away. But do it safely and considerately. We have to apply some rules, imposed by the football authorities, as part of the safety certificate upon which we operate, but our approach is always to be friendly, fair and firm when required.

We don't want to tell people what to do, but, for example, we do have to keep aisles and stairwells clear. That's not killjoy stuff, it's about making sure our ground is safe and legal. Our licence depends on that. We're monitored at nearly every game by various safety inspectors and observers, so we appeal to fans to just be sensible. We try and tolerate a little bit,

as long as they're not impacting anybody else. Our fans are pretty good, but some fan bases come with a track record of non-compliance: luckily through our pre match planning and risk assessment we know who they are, as clubs, police and the FSOA - Football Safety Officers Association share a huge amount of information. There's a vast resource of knowledge about fan behaviour and patterns which all clubs tap into

Some people say that football is becoming a bit sanitised. What are your thoughts on that?

I've not been here long, but one of the things I love about Luton is that it's such a passionate club. There's lots of noise. We all want that. And we don't want to ever stop the songs, they're part of our unique identity. But everybody

knows, I think, what's acceptable and what's not – anything of a racist, homophobic, misogynistic or offensive nature. We're not talking about football chants. We're not talking about the odd bit of banter. We're talking about the offensive stuff. We had some fairly hefty fines for that previously and it may be just a few people, but it causes real problems if it happens, and we really hope it won't again. So, if you do hear anything offensive please report it to a steward or use the My Concern QR code you'll find on most seats and dotted around the stadium - report it and we will take action if we can. Mostly our crowd self-polices and that's great - we don't have a big number of arrests and bans or refusals, ejections in home areas compared to other clubs, that's for sure.

How is the Kenilworth Road experience changing?

Obviously with its age and nature the ground is a challenge, but we're all constantly looking for ways we can make the experience better. For example, we know it gets very congested on the Kenilworth Road end concourse, so on match days when the TV trucks aren't there we've opened up an extra concourse on the apron outside to create more space pre-match and at half-time. We try and put on all sorts of activities on the apron, too, to create a minifan zone - music, kids' activities and so on. We've implemented a new customer flow system for the bar under the David Preece Stand, too, that's been really successful - it was a bit chaotic before! The Oak

Road home area has brand new sets of toilets, we've also put in little bars in the Bobbers... we're making the most of every nook and cranny in the ground. That comes from regular planning meetings and discussions with Gary Sweet, James Mooney, the operations head of catering, Lisa and Michelle from the fan engagement team and our commercial department. We speak regularly about what we can do around the stadium and what and how we can improve, how can we better serve people at the concessions and how we make turnstile queueing quicker or shorter. We're always looking to improve, from big changes to little tweaks that make things work more effectively and efficiently.

You were at Brentford when they moved to their new ground – how does that compare to preparations for Power Court?

At Brentford, the new ground design was pretty much done without input from the safety team. It was a separate design part of the club that got planning permission. But with Luton it's very different. I've been brought into the design stage very early on and was asked to help make what's known as a security needs assessment and a threat, vulnerability and risk assessment. They're quite technical terms, but they're very important for how we see the stadium operating. We also look at meeting stakeholder requirements such as planning what the counter-terrorism experts would want us to put in place and what the police call 'design out crime standards' that we'll consider putting in and around the stadium. That goes right down into such minutia as how much space you have in a doorway, for example, ensuring it's not too deep and people can't hide in it. It may be small details, but they are important. I've been involved in what lighting we'll need, CCTV coverage internally and externally, because there's retail and car parking areas, where the stewards' rooms will be, the medical rooms, police room, emergency evacuation routes and contingency planning

and so on. I've also been looking at zoning for accreditation, so who can go where and which will dictate how far accreditation gets you. Kenilworth Road doesn't really have this at the same level because it's unique in its design, and you can't get everywhere anyway, even if you wanted to! Although many try!

Then there are considerations like hostile vehicle mitigation. What we don't want at Power Court is to have huge bollards all over the place that just look like an eyesore. Mitigation measures are being considered such as planters that look quite attractive, and bike racks for those who cycle in and around the site during the week. If you crash into one, you won't go very far. Gary's brought me in very early to be part of it all which I'm massively pleased about. By getting the operational

teams involved at design stage, we'll avoid the sort of organisational problems that Brentford experienced after their new ground was built - here, it's all being planned, in detail, in advance.

I love Power Court and its design. It captures some of the things that make Kenilworth Road unique. For instance, we will have four stands that are all different. And we have four corner areas that overlook the pitch a bit like the David Preece Stand does, plus an offset tunnel. We're bringing a bit of Kenilworth Road with us - as much as we can - in a bigger, bolder modern environment. So I'm quite excited about that.

Sounds fantastic. To conclude, what's your message to the fans?

Everyone here is invested in making this club better. The board are investors literally as well as emotionally - everybody wants what's best for the club. The safety and security team are no different. We all want events to go smoothly, and with as much noise as possible in the stadium. As long as you do so safely, considerately, enjoy supporting the team 100 per cent and get behind the club then hopefully it's onwards and upwards together, because we all want Luton Town to do well and be successful. We're All Luton.

Barney shared lots more fascinating insights, including the need for bag searches (security), the closures of Beech Path and Oak Road (policing), ensuring that people sat in the right areas (to avoid overcrowding) and much more. A huge thank you to Barney...now let's heed his words and make as much noise as we can today!

"Impossible is not a fact. It's an opinion. Impossible is not a declaration. It's a dare. Impossible is potential. Impossible is temporary. Impossible is nothing."

Muhammad Ali's possibly apocryphal words may have been about boxing, but they could just as easily apply to Luton Town's current status. A month ago, staying in the Championship was a puncher's chance at best. The Hatters were adrift in the bottom, with confidence seemingly shattered. Yet, as April begins something has shifted.

Impossible is starting to look like a challenge rather than a certainty.

A month ago, Jordan Clark's decisive goal against Portsmouth not only ended a 12-match winless streak and provided Matt Bloomfield's first win as manager, but it signified a possible turning point in a tumultuous campaign.

It took longer than anyone had expected, but as you read this ahead of kick-off against Leeds, Luton are the form team in the bottom half of the division.

On a recent visit to The Brache, I saw firsthand how the manager is trying to breathe life back into the club. The atmosphere was one of renewed vigour in high-intensity drills but, crucially, in hamstringsaving small spaces, that somewhat mirrored the tight spot Town still find themselves in. Organisation and discipline were evident, while talk has been of vulnerability as a sign of strength off the pitch.

Football has changed, so too have players, but results recently – 10 points from five games and back-to-back away wins for the first time in more than two years – have spoken for themselves.

While Bloomfield's impact is showing on the pitch, the spirit off it might be just as important. Last month, former boss John Still returned to Kenilworth Road as the guest of honour at a Luton Town Supporters' Trust evening. The man who dragged the club out of non-league exile in 2014 delivered a stirring rallying cry, urging fans to summon the spirit of that era.

"Now the club need you," he said to fans before him in his unique and unifying way, adding of Town's great escape aspirations: "Support your team with everything you've got, even if they are shocking. Give them everything, because the supporters in this club have done it before. You can do it again."

His words resonate because you have seen your club defy the odds before. You have willed your team to glory in the darkest times. And you will be needed to do so again, starting at 12.30 against a Leeds side chasing a Premier League return that, eight months ago, we all hoped might be our race too.

Instead, a month ago, staying up seemed impossible. There may still be bumps in the road, but now, maybe, just maybe, Luton Town are primed to prove that impossible is nothing.
