

I BOSS

Good afternoon and welcome to today's important Championship game with Bristol City. I'd like to start by wishing a very Happy Easter to all of you and your families. I hope you've had the chance to enjoy some time together over the weekend.

I'm writing these notes before our Good Friday trip to Derby but I know we had sold 3,000 tickets in advance for this fixture. What a superb show of loyalty and passion – it gives us all a lift. Your support home and away means the world to everyone here and I hope we're able to reward your loyalty with positive results in the final three games.

We've had some really strong home performances recently, particularly against Middlesbrough and Leeds, where we came out with real intensity and purpose from the first whistle. That early energy has been key for us, setting the tone and giving us something to build from. However, against Blackburn we didn't hit those same levels which was frustrating on a day to forget.

I felt we showed real quality at Stoke beforehand, playing some fantastic football so naturally we're disappointed not to have replicated that performance. That said, there were still moments where we got into good positions but the final ball, or the decision in the final third, was just missing that bit of composure that we've seen in recent weeks.

Ultimately, I'm really disappointed – not just with the result, but because we didn't hit the levels we've set for ourselves. We've been on a good run and had been building real momentum, so it was a frustrating one to take. But I've said it before, I believe in this group of players and the work we're doing together.

Importantly, we've responded well to setbacks already this season. After the Burnley result, we went to Cardiff and got the victory and that kind of response is exactly what we're aiming for again now.

Today we face a Bristol City side who need the points for different reasons. They are enjoying an excellent season and are aiming to continue that with a place in the play-offs. However, these kinds of tests have brought the best out of the lads so I have faith we can rise to the challenge once more this afternoon.

I have spoken at length in these notes and in

the media about the togetherness required for us to achieve what we set out to do when I arrived in the building. I have been heartened by the positivity from the lads, the staff, the people behind the scenes and you, the fans, over the past few months, in particular in times of adversity.

So, with three games to go, it's important we stick together. This club has endured some rollercoaster emotions in its time and I'm sure there will be plenty more twists and turns between now and the time we step out at West Brom a week on Saturday.

Thank you for your unbelievable support – keep it up! – and please get behind us as you always do.

shoutout to the 3,000 of you who packed the away end at Pride Park on Good Friday.

Hopefully, we have returned with a positive result as we aim to get ourselves away from danger. However, regardless of that outcome, we know that game has gone and focus will now turn to today. Win, lose or draw against Derby, this afternoon is big – and we need your support to spur us on.

Time is running out and there's no room for error. Bristol City will be thinking the same – they need the points just as much as we do. That will probably make for a nervy 90 minutes so we will need you to get behind us and create an incredible atmosphere.

Stick with us, bring the noise, that Luton energy, and let's give everything we've got – on and off the pitch.

We all know we don't like to do things the easy way and this season has been no exception.

While it's been a challenging season on the pitch it has been accompanied by incredible progress off it. Power Court is now within touching distance. and the extensive work undertaken behind the scenes has been immense. We're working on building something historic and something that will most certainly shape not just the future of our club, but the wider town and its people - and it is an honour to be a part of.

The end of a football season can often feel like the end of a calendar year, a chance to reflect on the achievements, the challenges, and the lessons learnt over the past nine months perhaps even a chance to make some new season resolutions. much as performances on the pitch. Over the last 10 years, this commitment has made a tangible difference to countless employees and their families. A fair wage means more than just financial security, it represents dignity and respect - it's a philosophy that extends beyond the club's walls and into the wider Luton community, setting a precedent that others have followed.

While many clubs have since joined the movement, we remain proud pioneers in not only the footballing world, but locally within Luton. Our decision to lead by example has not only benefited our staff but has also contributed to a broader shift in encouraging fairness, sustainability and responsibility across the industry and wider town.

On the topic of sustainability, we have worked hard on driving forward sustainability initiatives across the club and were recently awarded EFL Green Club Bronze status – one of just seven clubs to do so.

The hard work across many club departments has also seen us shortlisted in the category of 'Overall Club of the Year' at this year's Football Business Awards. We'll find out later in May if we've taken home the prize, but to be shortlisted speaks volumes about the work that goes on across the club.

Looking ahead to next season, we will welcome a refreshed, closer partnership with Luton Town FC Community Trust. This will see us unveil a new head of the Trust, and see their staff relocate to join club staff at Luton HQ. This closer relationship means we can continue to deliver vital community work to those within our town and the surrounding areas.

We also proudly continue to support EFL projects – most recently completing a cycle relay in support of the British Heart Foundation, reminding those of the importance of learning CPR, a campaign heavily supported by Tom Lockyer.

Diversity and inclusion remain a core pillar of our identity. Through our We're All Luton campaign, we've continued to push forward on education and creating opportunities – and we can't wait to see how much further we can grow this in the coming years.

We've also focused on making Luton not just a great club to support, but one to work for too – and, as these will be my last notes of the season, I would like to thank the staff, who dig in, help out and make Luton what it is – a family. Like any family, it maybe isn't said enough – but I am incredibly proud to work with you all, and hope you know how much your hard work is appreciated.

Truth be told, I haven't always considered myself a Luton fan, despite being born in the town and still living here! However, it took me working at the club, understanding its history and its values to really know what it felt like to be a 'football fan' Now, I get to share that with my family and children, and I know many of you do the same. That's what makes it special. It's about so much more than results. >>

The Hatters' Championship survival hopes suffered a huge blow after Yuki Oshahi's second-half goal earned Blackburn victory at Kenilworth Road.

After the last-gasp point won at Stoke, hopes were high against a Rovers side who had not won in their past eight games – losing to Cardiff, Stoke, Portsmouth and Derby in the process.

With Tuesday night's goal hero in the Potteries, Millenic Alli, making his first home start, the forward almost snuck a goal inside the first minute only to be off target in the six-yard box.

The Town had to wait until the 24th minute for their next chance when Thelo Aasgaard's low first-time shot was blocked by the Blackburn defence.

As the Hatters pushed for the opener, Mark McGuinness sent a bullet header over the crossbar following Jordan Clark's free-kick just before half-time.

After the break opportunities continued to be hard to come by for the Town and, seven minutes into the second period, their task got tougher when Rovers took the lead. The

Hatters appealed for offside as Yuki Ohashi latched onto Ryan Hedges' slide-rule pass but the striker ran through and slotted past Thomas Kaminski. Matt Bloomfield immediately threw the dice, making a triple change with Teden Mengi, Reece Burke and Josh Bowler introduced.

The Town, however, received a lifeline with 32 minutes left on the clock when young Rovers full-back Kristi Montgomery was red-carded for a second bookable offence on his full league debut when hauling back Alli.

With a man extra for over half-an-hour, the Hatters pushed in a bid for leveller – but try as they might, an equaliser proved elusive.

On 76 minutes, they came mighty close to finding one when Aasgaard slalomed beautifully past several Rovers players before crashing a shot off the underside of the crossbar.

It was an effort that deserved better but as time began to tick down, the visitors dropped deeper and the Town could not find a way through a sea of bodies.

Off target efforts flew frustratingly wide as nine minutes were added. McGuinness' header dropped wide in the 94th minute before Alli saw a deflected effort come back off the face of the crossbar in the 99th minute.

Play continued for two more minutes but Mengi's low shot was the final chance of the afternoon, and the Town were left to reflect on a disappointing afternoon.

Jordan Clark immediately turned his attention to the Good Friday trip to Derby as soon as Saturday's 1-0 home defeat to Blackburn was over and done with.

The midfielder had hoped to end a week in which he had been nominated for both Sky Bet Championship Player of the Month and Goal of the Month awards on a real high, continuing the "feel-good factor around the club" created by a five-game unbeaten run.

Instead, Blackburn held on with 10 men to protect Yuki Oshahi's goal from early in the second half, and take all three points back to Lancashire.

The result left the Hatters three points adrift of Derby, who sit one place above the relegation zone going into Friday's clash at Pride Park, but Clark is looking forward to getting the momentum moving again.

Speaking to LTFC+ after the game, the 31-year-old said: "It's disappointing today to lose because the games are running out and we know important every game is, especially when you're in the bottom three.

"It's disappointing because even a point, going into the Derby game, we beat them and then you probably jump put the relegation zone.

"We've got to reflect on it tonight, tomorrow and then come Monday, when we are back in, we'll be analysing the game like we always do, where we need to improve.

"There's been a real feel-good factor around the club, with the crowd and the fans, especially away from home, and we've just got to pick ourselves up and go again because Friday is a massive game now.

"It'll be a great atmosphere and it's one game we definitely need to win."

ADECADE OF Living Wage Foundation LEADING THE WAY

Last month marked a significant milestone for Luton Town Football Club - 10 years of being committed to paying our staff the Real Living Wage.

A full decade has passed since we became the first football club in the UK to commit to being a Living Wage employer. It was a bold step at the time, but one that has since cemented our reputation as a club that values its people as much as its performance on the pitch.

The Real Living Wage is a voluntary rate that is independently calculated, 'Unlike the government's wage rate, the real Living Wage is calculated based on the cost of living to account for essentials like housing, food, travel but also small discretionary

expenses that allow for a decent standard of living, for example a meal out for a child's birthday or school uniform at the start of term' (Living Wage, 2025).

In 2015, when Luton Town made the pledge to pay all staff the real Living Wage, the conversation was only just beginning around fair pay in football. While top-flight players were earning astronomical salaries, many of the unsung heroes behind the scenes such as stewards. cleaners, hospitality staff were struggling to make ends meet. Recognising this imbalance, Luton Town FC led the way in ensuring that every member of our team receives a fair. liveable wage.

Over the last ten years, this commitment has made a tangible difference to countless employees and their families. A fair wage means more than just financial security, it represents dignity and respect - it's a philosophy that extends beyond the club's walls and into the wider Luton community, setting a precedent that others have followed.

While many clubs have since joined the movement, we remain proud pioneers in not only the footballing world, but locally within Luton. Our decision to lead by example has not only benefited our staff but has also contributed to a broader shift in encouraging fairness, sustainability, and responsibility across the industry and wider town.

With football having the power to inspire change both on and off the pitch we stand by our belief that success should be built on a foundation of integrity. That's why, as we celebrate ten years of being a Living Wage employer, we reaffirm our commitment to fair pay and to creating a workplace where everyone feels valued.

As Luton Town continues its journey, whether battling in the Championship, pushing forwards with Power Court, or making memories in the top flight, our Club values remain the same. We will always strive to do the right thing for our people, our supporters, and our community.

Before and after the session the players and management signed autographs and posed for selfies as a big crowd turned out during half-term.








First team manager Matt Bloomfield and CEO Gary Sweet were also in attendance and, along with Yousuf, who shared a video diary of one of his matchdays while fasting during Ramadan.

Yousuf, who joined the Hatters in September after previously working as head of emerging talent at Arsenal and technical director of Dutch club Den Bosch, said: "For me it was basically to give an insight into my day, where during Ramadan it shouldn't actually change too much of your habits and what you are doing on a day to day basis.

"You embrace religion and you embrace the faith, but also at the same time you still want to show that you are capable of doing what you would do on a normal day, even without eating food and drinking, but also practising your faith at the highest possible level that you can."

On sharing the Iftar with the football club and local community in Bury Park, he added: "I've not actually seen it before. This is my first experience of seeing it at any club really, to be honest, so I think it is so important that you actually have

conversations with people on how close they are linked to Luton and how it's part of their daily lives as well.

"So for us to be here and be present, and share really special moments of this month as well with people in the community, I think is huge.

"It's incredible. It's something I've not really seen before. You're interacting with your community, but also people like you, and it's really refreshing."

After a whirlwind first few weeks to life as Hatters manager, this was Matt's first experience of a community event at Kenilworth Road.

"It's been a real honour to be invited this evening to the Iftar event," he said. "I've only been here a short while, but to be able to play a part is fantastic, and it's just really heartwarming to see how Luton's community plays such a big part in the football club."

He also saw the evening as a learning experience in how to deal with players and staff who may be fasting during Ramadan.

"Our game is so diverse in ethnicity, background, faith and religion, and I think it is important for us as managers and chairmen to understand different faiths and religions, because our players are a huge part of what we do.

"We have to look after them and be respectful of everything that they stand for. I think gathering in events like tonight allows me to open my education even further."

It's been a great season for the Robins who find themselves well in the hunt for a play-off spot and, before Good Friday's game, sat fifth in the Championship table.

However, City didn't have the best start to the season and didn't get properly into their stride until the turn of the year.

The Robins are on a top run of form at the moment which has seen them lose just once in their last 11 games – and that was a narrow 1-0 defeat at Burnley.

Because of this run of form, the Reds have rocketed from midtable into the top six and are in a prime position to finish in the play-offs this season.

A recent 2-1 victory over West Brom was an statement to the teams around them as a 96thminute winner from Haydon Roberts was enough for City to pick up a vital three points.

City fans in the away end this afternoon will be hoping to witness a rare occurrence – a victory at Kenilworth Road.

The Robins have lost their last seven visits to Bedfordshire
– and it's been 25 years since they tasted success here. In November 2000, City ran out 3-0 winners thanks to goals from Scott Murray, Lee Peacock and Mickey Bell.

A warm welcome to Kenilworth Road to all those associated with Bristol City.

Experienced Championship goalscorer who has played for Huddersfield, Burnley and OPR. Now in his sixth season at Ashton Gate, he has scored 48 goals in this time.

ANIS MEHMETI

Albanian playmaker who signed from Wycombe in 2023. Has bagged an impressive 12 goals so far this season and is City's top scorer this season.

SCOTT TWINE

Former Newport, Swindon, Milton Keynes, Burnley and Hull man who has found a permanent home at Ashton Gate now. Scored the winner in the reverse fixture on Boxing Day.

SINCLAIR ARMSTRONG

Irish international who has played over 30 times for City since signing from QPR last summer.

SAM BELL

Academy graduate who made just shy of 100 appearances for the club. Has primarily been used as an impact sub this season.

We have no idea of the origin, but City's cult purple and lime away colours have long been iconic to Robins fans. Its most famous outing was an FA Cup victory at Anfield over Liverpool in 1994. A cider sponsor, a badge with the Clifton Suspension Bridge and one helluva collar. Good times.

A FOOT IN BOTH



TONY THORPE

Thorpe burst onto the scene scoring a 30-yard goal on his full debut at Newcastle. Transformed into a striker, he hit 30 goals in one season for the Town before moving to Fulham in 1998. He then moved to Bristol City, where he scored 51 times in 128 league games at Ashton Gate before returning for a second spell at Kenilworth Road in 2003. He then moved on to OPR. Swindon and Colchester before spells in non-league. In total, Thorpe scored 84 goals in 192 games for the Town.

CITY CULT HERO

We were stumped for this, but googling "bristol city cult hero" brought up Matt Smith. At first we were like "which Matt Smith, the one who played for Leeds, QPR, Millwall and Salford?" Turns out it was this Matt Smith. and the striker - who hung up his boots after scoring 25 goals last season - spent a three-month loan spell at Ashton Gate at the back end of the 2014/15 season. His impact was significant - he scored 13 goals in 20 games (including four in a Football League Trophy semi-final at Gillingham) with his goals helping City to the top of League One in the process. Although his loan from Fulham had ended, he was invited back to be a part of the squad for the Trophy final which the Robins won, beating Crewe at Wembley.



FIXTURE FLASHBACK

TOWN 3-0 BRISTOL CITY 19th OCTOBER 2019

Pelly-Ruddock Mpanzu scored for the Town in the fourth different division as the Hatters produced a brilliant performance at Kenilworth Road.

After a close and competitive first half, the second half started with much the same intensity, and the Hatters' pressure finally paid off as Mpanzu opened the scoring in the 56th minute when unleashing a superb curling effort which flew into the top corner.

It was his first goal in the Championship, meaning he had scored for the club in four different divisions since arriving in the Conference titlewinning season from West Ham.


In the 62nd minute, the crowd were on their feet again as Harry Cornick doubled the Town's lead. Izzy Brown played a perfectly timed ball in-behind for the forward to run on to and Cornick produced a calm finish to make it 2-0.

City were pushing to get back into the game but James Shea - who was making his first league appearance of the season - was on hand to keep the clean sheet intact with several good stops.

After James Collins was denied a third by Dan Bentley in the Robins goal, the Town sealed all three points with the last attack of the game when Ryan Tunnicliffe's cross was put into the back of the net by the visitors' Ashley Williams.





Preserving and appreciating the heritage and history of Luton Town Football Club

BIG NAME SIGNING

For 69 years **Christopher Slennett** could lay claim to the longest name of any first-team Luton player.

Then, on 31st March 1979, a loan signing made his debut in a 1-0 defeat at Sunderland. At a whopping 24 characters, Forbes Phillipson-Masters changed that and still holds the record to this day.

Philipson-Masters began his career as a goalkeeper for Southampton's reserves before his conversion to centre-half by Saints youth coach John McGrath, with manager Lawrie McMenemy joking that he sounded like an entire half-back line.

Appearances were hard to come by on the south coast and Forbes was sent on loan spells to Exeter and Bournemouth before finding his way to Luton as the Hatters flirted dangerously with relegation to the old Third Division (now League 1).

His arrival came on deadline day, with Town in desperate need of reinforcement at centrehalf after the loss of Chris



Turner to the USA. The first game at Sunderland provided a stern test with the home side fourth in the table and having won their two previous games. Phillipson-Masters drew praise for his part in a battling performance, with Pleat calling it a "first-class debut", but a goal from familiar foe Wilf Rostron saw the Hatters defeated 1-0.

He would taste victory soon enough as Burnley were beaten 4-1 at Kenilworth Road a week later. Despite a string of good performances, that would be the only one of two times he appeared on a winning side in his 10 games in Bedfordshire as Town slipped towards the relegation zone, eventually only staying up by two points.

The loan spell caught the attention of Third Division Plymouth and Forbes spent the next three

seasons at Home Park before he dropped down another level to join Bristol City in November 1982.

It didn't represent the most enticing of opportunities. The Robins had been in the top flight as recently as 1979/80 but three successive relegations had seen them tumble into the bottom tier for the first time in their history, and it seemed even worse might follow as they laboured to a 14th place finish.

The green shoots of recovery started the next season however, and Forbes played a big part in the team that finished fourth and gained promotion, appearing 44 times in the league and scoring once. A move back to Exeter followed, before he ended his playing career with nonleague Yeovil.

Forbes began a painting and decorating business while at Huish Park and would eventually run a successful building firm in Verwood, Dorset, as well as doing some coaching for the county side. He remains a record breaker at Kenilworth Road.



However, it did not all go to plan straight away as Forest Green led from the penalty spot when Steve McNulty was harshly adjudged to have handled in the box and Yan Klukowski beat Mark Tyler from the spot.

With the Town struggling to find a rhythm they need a penalty themselves to make it 1-1. Gray was fouled by the Rovers keeper and then dusted himself down to score from the spot.

After the break, the Hatters' greater tempo was rewarded on 55 minutes when Mark Cullen won the ball back and Cameron McGeehan drove forward. His first shot was parried but the on-loan Norwich man was first to the rebound and although the keeper got a hand to it, there was just enough power to dribble over the line.

Two soon became three as Gray made it 30 for the season in his pursuit of the golden boot – although it owed to some great work by Cullen. The striker burst down the flank and stood up a looping cross that Gray saw hang in the air and angle a header into the corner.

The icing on cake came with virtually the last kick of the game as Cullen skirted along the by-line unchallenged and fired low into the corner of the net.

Supporters invaded the pitch on the full-time whistle, but they were quickly dispersed as Town came out to lift the Conference trophy in front of their adoring followers.

One by one the players were introduced to the baying public as captain Ronnie Henry hoisted the silverware into the sky to finally end five years of hurt.

Champions!

Over the course of the season we'll be looking back 20 years to the glorious League One championship winning season of 2004/05.

So many club league records were tumbled during a momentous campaign which was even more remarkable considering that the summer of 2003 saw the arrival of new 'owner' John Gurney and his crackpot ideas, which ultimately led to the Hatters needing to enter administrative receivership, with all its problems, to get rid of him. Club historian Roger Wash tells the story of a season to remember.

2004/05 **history**

With promotion now secured the Town still had two targets to achieve. Firstly, they needed to clinch the championship which would happen if they won at Wrexham and Hull dropped points in their away fixture at Walsall and secondly, they wanted to hit 100 points for the first time in their history.

Opponents Wrexham seemed destined for the drop. Hit with a 10-point deduction the previous December for entering administration, their season had nose-dived since then with the only silver lining being a victory in the LDV Vans Trophy final played at the Millenium Stadium a couple of weeks before.

The Racecourse Ground had never been a happy hunting ground for the Hatters. Only one win had been recorded there in the league before – and that was back in 1981!

Despite this, over 2,000 Town fans made the trip to sunny North Wales to make it a carnival atmosphere with many straw boaters dusted off for the second week running.

With Paul Underwood missing through injury, striker Enoch Showunmi was asked to play in an unaccustomed position on the left and, for the opening half hour, was given the complete runaround by speedy

Wrexham winger Carlos Edwards (no wonder we signed him a couple of months later).

It was Edwards who laid on the opening goal on 31 minutes when his long cross was headed home at the far post by Andy Holt. The Town continued to huff and puff and were frustratingly caught in offside positions every time they tried to mount an attack.

Whatever manager Mike Newell said to the players at half-time certainly worked as the Town attacked with purpose in the second period inspired by a captain's performance from Kevin Nicholls. A flighted freekick from the skipper hit the bar with Wrexham keeper Ben Foster well beaten and the fans could sense a goal coming as the Red Dragons defence was pushed back.

The equaliser the Hatters deserved came on 53 minutes when central defender Curtis Davies got his head to a whipped cross from Peter Holmes. This meant that all the outfield players had now got on the scoresheet during the course of the season.

The second goal arrived six minutes later when big Australian defender Chris Coyne rose highest to head in a cleverly chipped in free kick from Nicholls.

Wrexham were now a spent force and when


news started to filter through that Hull were behind at Walsall the party really started.

The Hatters comfortably contained the home side apart from a brave last-ditch tackle from Nicholls on Hector Sam after the Wrexham forward got on the end of a smart through ball from Chris Armstrong. The Hatters finished the game with

Steve Howard missing two sitters in as many minutes, but it did not matter in the end.

The final whistle sounded and, with Hull losing 3-0 at Walsall, confirmation came that the Town were champions.

The players jigged around the pitch for what seemed like hours afterwards before

"We weren't happy at half-time because we felt we weren't on our game at all. We knew they had it in them, it was just a case of getting it out of them. But the way the lads came out in the second half showed they were going to take the game by the scruff of the neck.

"It's been a magnificent season and it has ended in a great way – everyone at the club should be extremely proud of what's been done here."

Town players now had a week to prepare for the visit of Brentford, who had beaten the Hatters twice over the campaign, and who still held out hope of getting into the play-offs. A great deal of partying was to take place in the intervening seven days though.

Puma were the manufacturers, and they did a solid job. White sleeves with a big, bold blue cuff, with our traditional orange making up the body of the shirt with subtle lines, akin to a wave pattern which added a unique pattern to the shirt.

And so to the Great Escape: Nathan Jones and big Mick keeping us up, James Collins scoring against Blackburn to kick-off that final day drama to keep us in the league, Callum McManaman scoring a late equaliser against Preston and a wonderful 3-2 over Derby County with a certain Wayne Rooney playing in midfield...

This shirt also evokes memories of Sonny Bradley's screamer against Middlesborough, watching on iFollow listening to the Simon Pitts, seeing the 'Thank you NHS' patch adorn the front of the shirt and witnessing new signings like Cameron Carter-Vickers and Donervon Daniels doing all they could to keep us up.

The NHS patch was implemented during the resumption of football in June 2020. It really stood out on the shirt too, with the rainbow and associated colours

complimenting the orange backdrop of our shirt. Not only did it mean a lot and show our support for our keyworkers, but it also improved the look of the shirt!

JAMES JUSTIN

One of our academy's most recent success stories, hometown boy James joined the Hatters as a seven-year-old in 2005.

He was part of the all-conquering under-11s side who won the Aarau Masters in Switzerland in 2009, beating Bayern Munich in the final and paraded the trophy around the Wembley pitch during the Johnstone's Paint Trophy final.

His success continued as, after earning a scholarship, he helped the Hatters under-18s win the Youth Alliance Cup before Nathan Jones gave him his senior debut in the final home game of the 2015/16 season against Exeter.

James made his full debut for the Town at the start of the following campaign in the excellent 3-1 League Cup victory over Aston Villa and scored his first senior goal in the 4-1 win at Accrington in April.

He helped the Hatters reach the League Two play-offs, appearing in the 3-3 draw with Blackpool, and then made 17 appearances in the following campaign as the Town won promotion as runners-up.

However, it was the following season that saw 'JJ' flourish as the Hatters swept all before them, winning the League One title and back-to-back promotions, missing just three games and becoming only the 15th Luton-born player to reach 100 competitive appearances.

His performances had not gone unnoticed, and Premier League Leicester came calling in the summer of 2019, prizing him away from his boyhood club for a record fee following a campaign that saw him named in the EFL and PFA teams of the year.

Justin maintained his levels of performance in the top-flight picking up an FA Cup winners medal in 2021 before earning a first England cap in a Nations League match against Hungary.

The versatile full-back has remained a mainstay in the Foxes side, helping them to the Championship title last term and has been a regular once more this season in the Premier League.

For many it will be their last tournament, so they went out and enjoyed the occasion and making new friends.


Having won the regionals in the last two years the Under-16 mixed group fell short and lost in the semi-finals. Disappointed as they were, they really enjoyed the day and football.

With 25 minutes on the clock, the Hatters doubled their lead and it was a second for Martins. Fensome was heavily involved again. She won her aerial dual against the goalkeeper, allowing the ball to drop to the feet of Martins, who netted her fifth goal in only her third appearance.



Jess McKay produced the moment of the game on the half-hour mark. She ran onto a loose ball on the left-hand side of the box and chopped back, wrong-footing an Enfield defender before shifting the ball onto her left foot and, from an almost impossible angle, curled it into the far-left corner.

In the second minute of additional time at the end of the first-half, Enfield had their first chance of the game but it was hit high over Sarah Hudson's goal and the Hatters took a 3-0 lead into half-time.

However, nine minutes into the second-half Enfield pulled a goal back. A well-worked corner routine was headed past Hudson.

After contributing to the opening two goals, Fensome got on the scoresheet herself with eight to play. Shianne Swarres floated a ball into the box towards the number seven whose bullet-header beat the Enfield keeper.

In the fifth minute of stoppage time, Fensome netted her brace to complete the scoring. Gabriella Spillman set off on a typical mazy run down the right flank and played the ball across the face of the goal for Fensome to tap in.

THE TRUST INTERVIEWS...

Ben Cirne arrived at Kenilworth Road from Wycombe Wanderers as part of Matt Bloomfield's staff along with coaches Richard Thomas and Lee Harrison. As senior first team analyst, Ben heads up a team responsible for delivering data and video analysis to the manager, with support from Simon Dunn and Chloe Golding. You'll see Ben on the bench during games, receiving video and data from Simon and Chloe and feeding it on to Matt, Richard and Lee.

BEN CIRNE Senior first team analyst



Ben, we'd like to hear what analysis is all about and why it's an important part of the modern game - but first, tell us a bit about yourself please.

I've worked in football analysis for around 10 years, and I also have a background and experience in coaching. While working towards my sports studies degree, I was also volunteering with Southend United as an academy analyst. Subsequently I've completed a Master's Degree in Performance Analysis and UEFA B coaching licence course. I worked with Millwall and Shrewsbury Town before linking up with Matt, firstly at Colchester, then with Wycombe. We've worked together for close on three years now.

What's it been like working with different clubs and managers?

It's given me a great range of experience as each manager has their own approach to how they want their team to play football and how they use analysis to support their aims and communicate to the players. At Southend, for instance, Phil Brown was very data driven, whereas his successor Chris Powell mainly used video.

Over the years my role has evolved from manually counting data to analysing the tactical elements of the game: looking at formations, watching the opposition and our own performance and training, through video and in-depth data analysis. My area of expertise is providing insights to the coaches and to the players in a way that is more video based but backed heavily by data.

The technology around video has gone through the roof in recent years. It has become a powerful and accessible learning tool, and with Matt

and the team we use a combination of data and video clips throughout a four part analysis process – which is a constant cycle of how we deliver our support.

Talk us through that process please - what does it consist of?

Pre-match analysis, training analysis, match day processes and postmatch analysis.

So a week in advance, we'll be looking at the opposition for not the coming game but the one after. We watch their last five or six games to identify patterns and weaknesses, focusing on games that are relevant in terms of formation and playing style, and their attacking strategies and defensive set ups. My team provide in depth 'data packs' that look at Key Performance Indicators across a wide range of elements in terms of teams and individuals: how often a player gets dispossessed, tackled, how many passes they complete under pressure, for instance.

We filter out key video clips to create a pre-

match presentation, backed up with data packs, which enables coaches to prepare our approach to the game. We like to highlight weaknesses in the opposition that match our strengths so our main focus during the pre-match prep is on ourselves and how we hurt them, as opposed to worrying about the opposition.

One of the great things about working with Matt, Richard and Lee is that we've formed a really strong bond. So I know what they're looking for in terms of insight and information and they trust and respect what we're providing.

That translates into how we work during the match, too - Chloe is up on the gantry filming, to provide a high view of the game, and both her and Simon are feeding real-time information to me, including tracking data, to assess our own shape and where we have been efficient. I can then feed this to the coaches verbally - or on their iPads, which they also use to watch back and assess kev moments. We're able to highlight whether our game plan is working and identify any changes in the expected opposition tactics, which enables Matt to make tactical adjustments if required during the game. At half-time key clips are shown to the players to reinforce the game plan, implement anything the manager thinks needs changing for the second half and maintain focus - not just

for the players who start the game, but for those who finish it.

Post-match analysis consists of reviewing and 'coding' (translating stats into information) every aspect and nuance of the performance, and we prepare 55-60-minute game video footage for the coaches to review. Findings from our post-match analysis are presented to the players a day or two after the game, highlighting what was done well and areas that need to be better. It's part of a loop of continuous improvement. This has been a big part of our work since we came to the club.

It's essential that the players – as a team and as individuals know why, what, how, where and when we want to do things. Matt has a clear ethos and philosophy, and clarity of purpose is essential to fulfil it.

There are lots of ways we work on this. We decide how, as a coaching and analysis team, we help present information to the players. We use video to 'paint pictures' and highlight our messages, including on a screen in the canteen so the players see - and talk about - it while they're having breakfast and lunch. We also have an app that each player has with their own personal video, and we prepare short videos for the coaches to use to present postmatch analysis to the

players, using all the tech and techniques you'll see, for instance, on MOTD or Sky analysis. There's a lot to get across, and my job is to deliver that clarity which makes it easier for the coaches to convey the messages.

We've heard you have a new drone camera at the Brache?

Yes and it's great – it enables us to give the coaches and players a completely different viewpoint on training. We film and analyse every training session and the drone is a fantastic asset. We fly it slightly behind our defenders during practice matches, for instance, so when the players and coaches watch the footage they have a bird's eye view of where there might be space in front of or to the side of them. Getting an overview is great for that.

Finally, how are you finding life at Luton?

I'm loving it, and the challenges we're addressing – obviously we've come in at a difficult time, and change doesn't happen overnight. But Gary and the board are immensely supportive and Simon and Chloe, my colleagues, are absolute diamonds. They're brilliant at what they do, and they've enabled me to hit the ground running. Then there's the fans. I'd been to Kenilworth Road many times with opposing teams and let me tell you this is an incredibly passionate, noisy and intimidating place to come to as a visitor. So I'm very happy to be on the home side now!

Thanks for those fascinating insights, Ben - it's brilliant for us fans to get an idea of what football analytics are all about.

Ben also explained what xG is, as well as many other terms we increasingly hear, but there's not enough space to go into all that unfortunately.

Let's remember what Ben has said about passion and noise and do our bit for the lads today!

been on a rollercoaster of emotions in recent months – not just in football – and I make no excuse for the pun given what's coming in the north of the county courtesy of an American film company. The proposal for a new theme park just south of Bedford will have a massive effect on the local economy.

The government has pledged support in terms of sorting out the infrastructure. Now if you use public transport to attend matches here this could benefit you. Maybe there will even be trains on a Saturday!

Meanwhile, in this town, there are huge changes underway. When I first came to Luton in the mid-1980s, Vauxhall was probably employing around 30,000 people. Now the final 1,100 have seen the last vehicle roll off the production line. A new company has bought the land with plans for a business park, and driving through town last week I noticed the demolition of Griffin House.

Luton Airport by comparison was just somewhere a woman called Lorraine talked about in a commercial, and now we're talking about over 30 million people using it every year.

The town as we knew it is changing, and the football club will be at the heart of that. Not wondering whether it will be invited, but being a

driving force for change. And it can pay its way.

Gary Sweet detailed the latest Power Court update in these pages in the last home game, with the Premier League money having enabled going to a 25,000 capacity straightaway, which will save millions which would have been spent on a gradual increase. So, all good on that front.

Now I'm not going to insult your intelligence by pretending that everything in the garden is rosy. This season has been massively disappointing given the expectation following a brave Premier League debut, and the players left at our disposal, and the transfer funds available.

I am writing these notes ahead of the Good Friday trip to Derby, so we will either be closer to League One or thinking of an escape act of Jim Ryan proportions. But if it is to be the former there will be time aplenty to dissect the disappointment, and my colleagues and I will make every effort to do so.

Nearly two years on from the Wembley final it's hard to potentially be looking ahead to a League One start on the first weekend of August, not to mention the EFL Trophy and the first round of the FA Cup. But it's also worth remembering that today's opponents haven't been in the top flight since 1980.
