Characteristically and psychologically, I'm really proud as we took a knock when they equalised. However, we went again and, while the result was crucial, it was the manner in which we did it that was extremely pleasing.

So this afternoon it's important we take the good things and all the confidence gained from our last two results as we welcome Frank Lampard and his Coventry team to Kenilworth Road.

Frank has turned around their season and they arrive here in the top six. Coventry, like Bristol City on Monday, have a chance of playing in the Premier League next season. Just as it was against Bristol City, today is a game where both

teams need the points and that should make for a proper game of football.

As I've already mentioned, your backing against Bristol City carried us through, and we'll need that support again this afternoon. I can't promise it's going to be straightforward today - this is the Championship after all - but what I can guarantee is that the lads will give you absolutely everything. All I ask is that the lads continue to work hard and that you maintain your levels of passion and noise from the stands.

We're in this together. This afternoon and then at the Hawthorns next Saturday.


















That day in May 1990, the Hatters pulled off the great escape, retaining their top-flight status on the final day of the First Division season with a victory that has gone down in Kenilworth Road folklore.

Fast forward to the present day and the Town team of 2025 resurrected their hopes of Championship survival with a brave and gutsy 1-0 win to move level on points with the Rams in the battle to beat to drop.

It might not match the level of that day of Tim Breacker and Kingsley Black, but how the Hatters held onto their 10th-minute lead – given to them by Millenic Alli's second goal in three games – will live long in the memory should the Town stay in the second tier come the end of this season.

A defensive masterclass followed after the goal – led by the magnificent Mark McGuinness, who denied the Rams on three occasions – and Hatters were left to celebrate a seismic victory in their quest for survival.

The goal came when Jordan Clark floated in a corner into the Derby penalty area and Alli was quickest to the loose ball in the box despite the attentions of three Derby defenders.

Ahead, it could have been 2-0 on 26 minutes when Lamine Fanne rifled a first-time shot over the crossbar from 10 yards after the hosts had failed to clear a long free-kick from Thomas Kaminski.

With the home side and their crowd frustrated as half-time approached, the Town had McGuinness to thank for the first of his crucial acts of defending in the second minute of first-half injury time when diverting the ball behind following Jerry Yates' deflected on-target effort.

After enjoying a first half of comparative ease, the Town would experience a much different second as the Rams turned the screw.

Six minutes after the restart McGuinness threw himself in harm's way again, blocking Marcus Harness' close range shot. On 58 minutes County came even closer. Yates found space in the box but could not beat Kaminski with the Town stopper spreading himself to parry. The ball was still not safe, however, and McGuinness was on hand to keep it 1-0 as his goal-line clearance prevented Kayden Jackson's follow-up.

It was all the Rams, and you felt it was only a matter of time before another chance would fall the home side's way yet the Town stood tall.

With 10 minutes left, there were hearts in mouths when Jackson pulled the trigger from close range – but Kaminski stuck out a boot to divert the ball to safety.

Kaminski came to the Town's rescue with five to play, bravely pouncing on the loose ball from six yards with Harness lurking for a late leveller but that was the closest the Rams came to an equaliser and the sound of the final whistle was met with jubilation, relief and pride.

It was a happy Easter for the Hatters as they followed up their vital Good Friday win at Derby by recording their first back-to-back victories since September to strengthen their chances of Championship survival.

It came after an even first half in which both sides had opportunities to open the scoring. Liam Walsh, who orchestrated proceedings throughout, danced into the box to warm the palms of Robins goalkeeper Max O'Leary on 10 minutes.

Eight minutes later, Thelo Aasgaard came close – not that the Norwegian international knew much about it. City's Cameron Pring's clearance struck Aasgaard six yards out but, with the ball flying goalwards, O'Leary clawed the ball away brilliantly to keep it goalless.

The visitors, arriving in fifth place in the table, came close when Nahki Wells rolled a shot wide on 29 minutes but in truth it was the Town enjoying the better of the play.

Aasgaard wasn't a million miles away from perfecting a 22-yard free-kick when his effort curled inches over the crossbar three minutes before half-time as the Hatters continued to push for the breakthrough.

However, the midfielder didn't have to wait long to break the deadlock when he fired the Town in front four minutes after the restart. The Hatters appealed for a foul on Millenic Alli after he was clattered in the box by O'Leary, but the ball fell to Aasgaard on the edge of the box and he fizzed a low shot that skimmed off the wet turf and under O'Leary.

Ahead, the lead did not last. City responded three minutes later with a fine strike of their own. Teden Mengi's headed clearance found George Tanner on the edge of the box, and the Robins' defender arrowed a beautiful volley into the bottom corner of the net to make it 1-1.

The lead was restored seven minutes later when Walsh hung a right-wing corner into the box, Mengi and Christ Makosso nudged the ball into the path of Morris and the captain was on hand to finish well from close range.



With heart-rates raised every time the visitors attacked, the home crowd's nerves were settled on 72 minutes when Isaiah Jones made it 3-1. The ball broke loose for the wing-back after it had run behind Alli and the former Middlesbrough man fired a wonderful finish past O'Leary.

As time ticked down the Hatters had the luxury of a twogoal cushion and Kaminski was only tested once more when substitute George Earthy stung the palms of the goalkeeper in the final minute.

Four added minutes came and went without incident before the Town were able to celebrate a massive three points in their quest for another season in the Championship. 19



As it stands, City are currently battling Bristol City, Middlesbrough, Millwall, Blackburn and West Brom for two remaining play-off spots.



They blessed the top-flight in this Le Coq Sportif number that featured a big, firm collar, chequered trim and a massive version of their crest slap-bang in the middle.

A FOOT IN BOTH



TREVOR PEAKE

Defender Trevor holds the record as the oldest player in the Hatters history when turning out against Wrexham in 1997 at the age of 40 years 222 days. He started at Lincoln before moving to Coventry in 1983 where his displays at centre-half earned him legendary status plus an FA Cup winners medal in 1987. When Town manager David Pleat was looking for an experienced head in his young side, he turned to Trevor, who went on to play 179 league games for the Town, picking up several Player of the Year awards along the way.

COVENTRY CULT HERO

Steve Ogrizovic, known lovingly as 'Oggy' to generations of City fans, is the Sky Blues' definitive cult hero.

Joining from Shrewsbury Town in 1984, the goalkeeper went on to become a Sky Blues icon over an incredible 16-year spell, amassing over 600 appearances – more than any other player in Coventry's history.

Standing tall between the posts with a calm presence, his crowning moment came in the 1987 FA Cup Final, where his performance helped City secure a historic 3-2 win over Tottenham – still the club's only major trophy.

But it wasn't just about trophies. 'Oggy' stayed loyal through the Premier League years and beyond, often resisting moves away to stay with the club he had come to embody.

His humility, connection with fans and ability to deliver when it mattered made him more than just a great goalkeeper.

Even after retiring as a player, he stayed on

as coach and mentor, underlining a lifelong commitment to the club. For many Sky Blues fans, he is Coventry City.



FIXTURE FLASHBACK

COVENTRY 1-1 TOWN (5-6 on pens) 27th MAY 2023

It would be remiss of us not to look back on one of our greatest ever days when, under the Wembley arch, we saw off Coventry on penalties to win promotion to the Premier League.

Having seen off Sunderland in the semifinal the Hatters met a Coventry side who had beaten Middlesbrough at the Riverside.

After suffering the shock of losing captain Tom Lockyer in the opening minutes, the Hatters took the lead in the first half through Jordan Clark, who finished well after taking Elijah Adebayo's pass.

But City grew into the game and equalised in the second half through Gustavo Hamer, who placed a low shot past Ethan Horvath.

After Hamer went off injured, the Town regained the ascendancy and had chances to win the game in extra-time and were denied a winner when Joe Taylor's goal was ruled out by VAR for handball.

That led to penalties.
Carlton Morris, Taylor,
Marvelous Nakamba,
Clark, Luke Berry and
Dan Potts all scored for
the Town to put them
6-5 in front as the nerves
jangled around Wembley.

The crucial moment came when Fankaty Dabo blazed his penalty over the crossbar and with that one kick of the football the Hatters were celebrating promotion to the Premier League.








BILLY WAUGH - A SPORTING LIFE

On 26th March 1949
Billy Waugh lined up
to play West Ham
United at Kenilworth
Road. He could have
been forgiven for being
somewhat distracted.

He had married his sweetheart Eileen that morning and, with his new bride watching from the stand, the pair would have to rush off at the game's end for the wedding reception which was to be held above a music shop on Upper George Street.

Billy was born near Edinburgh in 1921 and played for various junior teams in Scotland in the 1930s. He came to the attention of Town's scouts while in the RAF and stationed at Bicester, initially guesting in wartime football and then joining permanently at the end of hostilities. He made his competitive debut in the two-legged FA Cup tie against Derby in January 1946.

They would prove to be the first of his 147 appearances, with no one appearing more often for the Town in the 1940s and with the winger becoming the



first player to reach 100 games in a Luton shirt post-war. He appeared in one of Kenilworth Road's most famous games in November 1946, his header starting the comeback in the remarkable 4-3 win against Newcastle after the Hatters had trailed 3-0 at half-time.

Anyone who saw him would likely comment on his immense pace. It led to him being nicknamed 'The Rabbit', 'Twinkletoes' and 'Wolfie', and while not a regular goalscorer, he was a creator of chances, most notably for Town's prolific forward Hugh Billington.

However, a falling out with manager Dally Duncan saw him leave against his will for QPR in 1950, where he would make 76 league appearances over three seasons before moving onto Bournemouth and then a host of non-league sides, including Bedford Town.

He had lived with Eileen in Biscot Road after they'd married and returned to Luton when he retired from the game, buying a house in Humberstone Road and working at Electrolux for 30 years. His passion for sport continued throughout his life, and in his role as sporting

secretary, it was said that any new recruit to the firm with rumoured footballing ability could expect to meet Billy on their first day, along with an offer to appear for the company's team!

Billy was a guest at Kenilworth Road for the ground's centenary in 2005. In later life he moved to Felixstowe to be closer to family, and it was there that Billy passed away in 2009 on his 60th wedding anniversary, with Eileen, who had watched him from the stands all those years ago, by his side.



ON THIS DAY

We go back in time on this day in the Hatters' history books

Mick Harford hit a hat-trick as the Hatters ended the 1985/86 on a high as they beat local rivals Watford 3-2 in a ding-doing topflight clash on this day 39 years ago.



The striker took his tally for the season to 25 for the season with a chip, a tapin and a volley as the Town secured a fine victory over the Hornets.

After David Preece shot narrowly over the bar in the second minute, Harford had the Town in front eight minutes later. Brian Stein sent his strike partner through and the centreforward sent a delightful chip over Tony Coton from 15 yards.

On the half-hour the Town doubled their lead. Emeka Nwajiobi was the architect, wriggling through the Watford backline to cross for Big Mick to tap home unmarked at the back post.

The Hatters spurned chances to go further ahead, Steve Foster, Stein and Nwajiobi all going close to making it 3-0 before half-time.


After the break the Town continued to press but the visitors pulled a goal back when Mitchell Thomas handled in the box and Kenny Jackett converted from the spot.

But any hopes of a Hornets comeback were well and truly extinguished in emphatic style when Harford completed his hat-trick with 15 minutes left with a stunning volley.

The Hornets pulled a second goal back shortly after but the Town hung on well to end the First Division season in ninth place, seven points and three places above their rivals in the table.

The first time the Town played on 26th April came in 1899 when they went down 2-1 at home to Kettering in the United League... The Town beat Watford in Division Three (South) in 1933... The biggest margin of success came in a 4-1 win over Charlton at Kenilworth Road in 1961... Champions!

So many club league records were tumbled during a momentous campaign which was even more remarkable considering that the summer of 2003 saw the arrival of new 'owner' John Gurney and his crackpot ideas, which ultimately led to the Hatters needing to enter administrative receivership, with all its problems, to get rid of him. Club historian Roger Wash tells the story of a season to remember.

2004/05 history

The first part of the Town's mission had now been achieved. The title had been secured following the 2-1 win at Wrexham and, with two games to go, the target was now to get to 100 points.

Next up was the visit of Brentford to Kenilworth Road. The Bees had beaten the Hatters twice during the season – a feisty 2-0 defeat at Griffin Park and a 2-0 reverse at Kenilworth Road in the FA Cup – so we owed them one!

In a carnival atmosphere, Brentford, who needed points themselves as they were just outside the play-offs, looked to spoil the party but it was the Town who set the ball rolling with a goal after only five minutes when Ahmet Brkovic stroked the ball home after being set up by Paul Underwood.

Back came a physical Brentford with a volley of high balls into the Luton area leading to a leveller on 20 minutes when Sam Sodje headed home at the far post after an aerial onslaught.

Five minutes later matters took another turn for the worse. Bees defender Michael Turner was allowed space to run forward with the ball unopposed until he got to the edge of the area where he squared it to Deon Burton who made no mistake.



From then on the Town battered the Brentford defence which was forced back and, although there were some close calls, the game was drifting towards a rare home defeat until, with ten minutes to go, a lifeline was offered.

Steve Howard, not for the first time, won a header in the area nodding it down to Steve Robinson who was hacked down by Turner for a stonewall penalty. Skipper Kevin Nicholls kept his cool and smacked the ball home from the spot to set up a frantic finale.

The game had entered the final minute when substitute Enoch Showunmi won a corner which was taken by Robinson who flighted it perfectly for the big forward to nod home from close range.

The icing on the cake came seconds later when a Rowan Vine cross was pulled back to Robinson who side footed the ball home and with it sealed a famous victory.

The final whistle signalled a crowd invasion which took some time to clear before the trophy could be presented. In the meantime, Brentford manager Martin Allen left the pitch to what became a famous song. He had to take it in good part even more so when his sons installed it on their phones as ringtones!

The final game of the season was at Doncaster who had just missed out on the play-offs after their first season back in League One. The Hatters swiftly sold their allocation of 3,500 tickets for the old Belle Vue ground to make it yet another party on the terraces. >>

2004/05 history

Doncaster had not read the script though and set about the Town from the off and took the lead in the first minute when James Coppinger crossed for Lewis Guy to fire past Dino Seremet, deputising in the Luton goal for Marlon Beresford who was now in hospital for a long-awaited operation.

The game then proceeded to become like a basketball match with the ball flying from end to end in extremely windy conditions. Former Hatter Michael McIndoe twice fired wide from good positions before Russell Perrett headed in for the Town from close range on 32 minutes.

Four minutes later the Hatters took the lead when Howard charged down a clearance from Doncaster goalkeeper lain Turner before rolling the ball into an empty net.

The open nature of the game continued with Doncaster equalising on 51 minutes when a clearance from Seremet blew back into the box to Leo Fortune-West whose cross was headed into his own net by Robinson.

The fun wasn't over though with Doncaster hitting the woodwork before Nicholls fired in a 30-yard shot against the wind that suddenly flew into the top corner. Doncaster drew level once more shortly

afterwards with Guy firing in his second goal of the game before the referee blew to signal the end of a breathless game and a momentous season.

The following day an open-top bus took the players and staff through the streets of the town to finish up at the Town Hall where thousands greeted the returning heroes before preparing for the Championship.

The Town fell short of the 100-point target but the 98 attained still represented a club record. Twenty-nine wins and only six defeats with a goal difference of plus 39 made it a season to remain forever lodged in the memory.

INSIDE A KIT COLLECTOR'S WARDROBE

Town shirt collector, David Foxen, aka @lutontownkits, goes through his selection of shirts in orange, white, blue – and all colours in between.

Cast your minds back to the wonderful 2017/18 season. We were in League Two, scoring goals for fun and tearing the league apart with a lovely style of attacking football under Nathan Jones.

The shirt followed a similar template to the home one, but with noticeable differences. We were in our second season with Puma for the 2017/18 season and boy did they deliver on this away shirt. Sponsored again by car

manufacturer SsangYong, this navy blue and purple combination looks fantastic.

With a subtle orange trim on the cuff of the sleeves, and a white pattern going from the main collar, nearly all the way down sleeves (only stopping for the EFL sleeve patches and Puma logo), it all works and is very underrated.

The material for this was very light, and quite tight-fitting compared to the home shirt. The sleeves felt short and the fit quite snug! We also had the opportunity to purchase this in long sleeves.

This shirt needed to wait until September of that season to make its debut – a 0-0 away draw with Lincoln City. Its next outing, in November 2017, against promotion rivals Accrington Stanley, resulted in a 2-0 win for the Hatters, with iconic strike force James Collins and Super Danny Hylton on target.

A 4-1 win away to Exeter was the next appearance for this beauty, and we also had the 5-0 win away at Swindon on Boxing Day and a 1-1 draw with neighbours Stevenage in this shirt.

Its final performance came away to Yeovil
Town in a 3-0 win in April
2018. Goals from Elliot
Lee, and two from Danny
Hylton saw us come
away from the long trip
with three points and
one step closer to
League One.

HE'S ONE OF

DAVID OLDFIELD

Although born in Australia, David moved to England as a youngster before being spotted by Luton's John Moore leading to his signing of professional forms for the Hatters in May 1986.

David came to the fore during the 1987/88 campaign, netting twice in a Simod Cup tie at Everton and then scoring the equaliser in a 1-1 draw at Anfield.

An unorthodox running style, deceptive pace and the ability to strike from deep led to big money bids being received, with a £600,000 offer from Manchester City in March 1989 too good to refuse for the England Under-21 international.

He only stayed a year at Maine Road before meeting up with his old mentor David Pleat at Leicester where he enjoyed five good years where he helped the Foxes win promotion to the Premier League in 1994.

However, in 1995 a £150,000 bid from Luton's Terry Westley which brought him back to Kenilworth Road where he would go on and play a further 140 league matches, scoring 24 times across three seasons.

He moved to Stoke in 1998 for two seasons and then Peterborough, where he was also a regular between 2000 and 2002.

Oldfield's final Football League appearances came for Oxford and was still turning out for Stafford Rangers as a 39-year-old before moving into coaching.

After caretaker spells in charge at Oxford and Peterborough, he managed further down the pyramid with spells as Brackley, Oxford City and Weymouth boss.

Having been in charge of Oxford United's youth team, Oldfield joined Exeter in January this year where he was appointed the Grecians' Under-18 lead coach.

Our Football Development Manager, Alex Wallace, shared his thoughts on the programme:



Five minutes before half-time, Jess McKay produced the best moment of the first-half for the Hatters. Her powerful strike from the edge of the area forced a good save from Reeves in the Stevenage goal.

The Town had another chance moments before the break when Ami Martins shifted the ball onto her right foot but could only drag her effort wide.



However, the Hatters fell behind 10 minutes into the second-half. Boro won the ball back just inside their own half, carved open the Hatters defence and it was Eva Delaney with the finish, netting her first senior Stevenage goal.

With 10 minutes to go, McKay, who had been heavily involved throughout the afternoon had another attempt on goal but once again Reeves was equal to her effort. As the Hatters pushed for an equaliser in the closing stages, a McKay corner was headed narrowly over the bar by Tsaianne Leander.

The full-time whistle signalled the Ladies' first league defeat since August 2024 but they remain on track to win the title. With four games to play the Hatters remain top of the table, a point clear of Royston in second with a game in hand.

Wednesday's local derby against Watford

was postponed due to a waterlogged pitch but the Town face Bowers and Pitsea at Barton Rovers tomorrow at Sharpenhoe Road, kick-off 2pm.

THE TRUST INTERVIEWS...

For this final interview of the season we talked to Chris Clark who, after nine memorable years as club secretary is moving on to a new role at Liverpool. We asked Chris to reflect on his time at Kenilworth Road.

CHRIS CLARK Club Secretary



First of all, Chris, please tell us something about yourself and how you came to Luton.

After graduating from Uni with my degree in management and French I wanted to do something I enjoyed, and combine my love of sport with my career.

My first job was in motorsport, but I'm a football fan, and as club secretary is the highest role in the administration side of a football club, I decided that's the level I would aim to get to.

I started at Charlton Athletic with an entrylevel role as a training ground administrator but had a fantastic insight into the football side of a club. Then, with the introduction of the Elite **Player Performance** Programme (EPPP) in 2011 and youth football being redefined through the Academy system, I saw a route to the club secretary role, by following the player pathway - and I moved into their academy

department as the academy administrator, working with Paul Hart and Nathan Jones.

I then joined QPR, where I also started a Master's Degree in Sports Law. A club secretary role came up quickly at Stevenage and I moved there, earlier than expected, where I had an excellent grounding at first-team level. However, when the Luton position became available in 2016, I believed in the club's potential to be at Championship-level, even though both clubs were in League Two at the time. Little did I know what an amazing and rewarding nine years were to follow!

Could you tell us a little bit about what your role as club secretary involves?

It has evolved over the years and up the leagues, bringing more complexities and new challenges, but I'm a football administrator and the core functions of the role are typically player registrations and fixture management and/ or operations.

It's very much on the football side of the club but often crosses over into other departments. The club secretary is responsible for compliance and a guardian of the club, and as we've seen, noncompliance can lead to points deductions and financial penalties, so getting that right is crucial. The club secretary is often the point of contact with the governing bodies - be that the EFL, the FA and FIFA - and they all have their own rule books so there's a bit of a matrix to abide by, on top of legislation. And their rules change from season to season, sometimes within seasons, so adaptability, creativity and attention to detail are paramount; and that's my job - to navigate the rulebooks and translate them into actions.

I enjoy finding the solution that will give the greatest benefit or advantage to the club: a certain Mr Hylton's disciplinary record provided some amusing moments and challenges around that – all 'off the record' of course!

My job brings a lot of variety and I've had a technical role in some of our project developments and operations – from pre-seasons to play-off logistics, to being Covidcompliant for the team to return to training and playing, and then fans

to return to Kenilworth Road; coordinating three-hour bus parades, preparing the stadium to be ready for Premier League football, the installation of safe standing in Oak Road and now with Power Court.

What has your time at Luton been like?

I love this club. It's a very special place. A true family club. Absolutely unique. I'd worked at a few clubs before but I'd never seen such a connection where the chief executive and the board and staff will be mixing with other fans often in the pub before games - which has become something of a regular tradition at Luton, because they're all fans too... and whether we were playing Accrington or Arsenal, that hasn't changed.

It's representative of an unparalleled connectivity, which, when I came into the club, I wasn't aware of – but it's absolutely captured me. I'm not Luton born and bred, I came here professionally, but Luton accepted me, welcomed me and made me feel part of the club and the town.

We still hold the traditions of football. Our owners are local people who have been successful and have been able to put back into the community through their team. The club is a real foundation of the community and we've seen when the club does well, the town does well.

The struggles before I came and what Luton has been through, what's happened in the town and these amazing last nine years are part of the history of the club and what's shaped it. It also forms part of its future as it informs and guides the thought processes going forward and the culture of the club. Decisions will not be made that could jeopardise its future, unlike the past at Luton and the present at many other clubs. LTFC is looking forward to longterm sustainability with Power Court. And doing things our way: we're all Luton, we'll do it our way and we'll do it with an edge. That's the club, the town and the supporters alike!

The club and the town are bound together by shared experience and values. There's a hardworking, industrial heritage with pillars of the community like the hat industry, Vauxhall, the airport - and the football club. The area's seen hard times and challenges, like the decline of Vauxhall, the 30 points. And whenever the club, and the town, has faced adversity like that it has stood up - and its strength, battling spirit, work ethic and character have come to the fore. I remember Gary shared the values in my job interview and I've seen them in action so many times since. The club embodies the town's resilience and will continue to do so. I believe that the adversities we've faced before and the unity of the Luton family will >>



show its strength again, in these last two games and in the longer term.

Does that club-fan connection make a difference to games?

Absolutely yes. As does that mutual defiant spirit. When our backs are to the wall and battling we see some of our best performances on and off the pitch.

That connection also runs from the fans to the players in a wonderful cycle and seeing that on a match day has generated some of my best experiences and atmospheres. The Kenny under the floodlights is like no other. Take that second leg Championship playoffs semi-final against Sunderland for instance. That was just electric. Unbelievable support and belief that we would overcome the deficit -

players and fans knowing what had to be done – I don't think Sunderland knew quite what they were stepping into. And I think that was informed by previous experience in those situations: the semi-final loss to Blackpool, in my first season here, and the loss to Huddersfield.

There's also that shared sense of being underdogs. Luton gets called all sorts by people and that makes us even more defiant: #teamslikeluton. When you share that unity, it's fantastic. The fans taking over the whole side of the ground at Notts County, then singing non-stop for, it seemed, forever after the match, at that promotion game, 7,000 fans at Newcastle in the FA Cup. And even behind closed doors we still felt that connection against Blackburn at home to stay up in 2020.

We see how and where the fans travel from and to, home and away, and that's amazing. With the club being the heartbeat of the community I think there's that draw to come back to Luton, wherever people are from or move to. Our support is fantastic, so resilient – just like the club and the town.

Have you been involved in planning for Power Court and what do you think it means for our future?

Very much so. I have been fortunate to work closely with the project team on compliance and technical matters, and have input where the design will integrate with the operation of the new stadium, to give it functionality and make sure it is our home. Power Court is so important.

It future proofs the club for generations to come, and it's bringing fundamental change and regeneration to the town centre. It's an incredible project and it's going to deliver such a difference: it symbolises the club's position within the town, at the heart of the community.

Put it this way: I could prepare the paperwork for the club to sign a player, and he can strengthen the team or impact a season, but Power Court is tangible and will make a real difference to people's lives, and for generations to come. The benefits it will bring to the community are so important. And it will be a stadium like no other.

In my time, the club has always been innovative, pushed boundaries and done things differently, and the stadium will do >>

Tell us about your new role

I will be joining Liverpool as head of player status and administration – it will streamline my role and focus purely on player registrations and administration across all levels of the club.

It was an incredibly hard decision to make because I absolutely love this club. But Gary and the board and staff have been very supportive. They understood what a fantastic opportunity it is for me and I will go there as a representative of Luton.

There are also real parallels between Liverpool and Luton. I think Liverpool, despite their global status, share Luton's humility and commitment to a community with an amazing spirit and collective unity.

Gary and David Wilkinson have been complimentary of the way Liverpool are run and treated us since our first Premier League meeting when they were sat next to them. I will dearly miss the Luton family - my colleagues, the fans, the players, the town - but I'm going to a place which shares some of the values that make Luton so very special.
