

Each week, we take a look back at a memorable month from the Magpies' past...

A hectic four-week period saw United involved in nine different games – six of them in cup competitions – but in the end, all of their efforts were certainly worthwhile.

Progress to the last 16 of the FA Cup was sealed with victories over Queens Park Rangers and Coventry City. The Magpies drew 0-0 at Loftus Road before beating the Hoops 2-1 on Tyneside (turn to page 53 for more on the latter clash), while a replay was also required to see off Gordon Milne's Coventry.

United enjoyed an unbeaten spell in the First Division, thumping Everton 5-0 before picking up useful points from trips to Aston Villa and Middlesbrough. They were 3-1



down against the Teessiders with two minutes to go, but goals from Alan Kennedy and Irving Nattrass salvaged an unlikely draw.

The highlight of the month, though, came on an unforgettable Wednesday night against Tottenham Hotspur, when Newcastle progressed to their maiden League Cup final thanks to a 3-1 win at a raucous St. James' Park. They had lost 1-0 at White Hart Lane the previous week, but efforts from Alan Gowling, Glenn Keeley and Geoff Nulty turned the tie in their favour and sent the Toon Army back to Wembley.



Enjoy the game.



ood afternoon everyone, and welcome back to St. James' Park for today's FA Cup Third Round tie against Luton Town.

Firstly, I'd like to wish all of you a Happy New Year. We've had to be patient for our result on Monday. The football we've been playing in the last four or five games has been really good, and I thought we fully deserved to win against Stoke. We pretty much dictated the game throughout. We were strong at the back and created a lot of chances, as well. Credit to the boys – they were spot-on in the way they conducted themselves.

That was our third away win of the season, but we will only look to add to that in the months to come. We still have a long way to go. I want to start putting a gap between us and the bottom three because it is so tight. Other teams will pick up points, so we need to make sure we're doing our job.

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

uton Town will be backed by over 6,000 away fans for today's FA Cup Third Round clash against Rafa Benítez's Newcastle United after the Hatters sold out their initial allocation and were handed extra tickets by the Premier League side.

Luton – who knocked Newcastle out of the FA Cup in the 1993/94 season after a replay – have enjoyed their 2017/18 campaign so far and sit at the top of the League Two table, four points clear of Kevin Nolan's Notts County. Nathan Jones' side are one of the top-scoring teams in the country and had found the net a whopping 58 times before the turn of the year – adding four more on New Year's Day against Lincoln City – greatly helped by two merciless 7-0 and 7-1 league victories over

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Stevenage and Cambridge United. They also thrashed Gateshead 5-0 in the previous round of the FA Cup at the beginning of December and have a history of causing problems for Premier League teams, having famously knocked out Norwich City as a non-league side in 2013.

Luton's recent goalscoring success has been spearheaded by their No. 9, Danny Hylton, who has netted 16 times in all competitions and grabbed two assists. The former Oxford United striker, who joined the Hatters in the summer of 2016, has scored 35 goals in 62 appearances since arriving at Kenilworth Road and currently averages a goal every 122 minutes. Unsurprisingly, he is League Two's top goalscorer, ahead of County's Jorge Grant. Hylton's strike partner, James Collins – who arrived at Kenilworth Road at the beginning of the season


- has also moved into double figures after scoring the first of five in Luton's 5-0 thrashing of Swindon


Town on Boxing Day. The Bedfordshire club will be hoping that their return to the North East is as plain sailing as their trip to the International Stadium last month, but Benítez will be anxious to stop today's in-form visitors adding a giant-killing to the Magpies' disappointing FA Cup record, which has seen them knocked out at the Third Round

stage in five of the last seven seasons. Today's fixture will also see Toon legend Rob Lee's two sons, Olly and Elliot, line up at St. James' Park, in what will be a proud moment for the former















































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COOKING ON GAS

It took Jacob Murphy a little time to get into his stride after his summer switch to Newcastle United, but now, with his first Premier League assist under his belt, the 22-year-old is up and running. The boyhood Magpies fan went for a walk in Jesmond Dene with start to life at St. James' Park, growing up with his twin brother at Norwich City and his relationship with social media...

n his first interview after realising a childhood dream, Jacob Murphy was visibly enthused at the prospect of walking out at St. James' Park in black and white. "I've already started thinking about that day," he smiled. "It's going to be special for myself and my family. Wearing the Newcastle badge on my chest – I couldn't think of anything better."

Almost six months on, the 22-yearold reflects on that interview and what he really felt, deep down. "It was excitement," he insists, "and then a bit of pressure, coming in to such a big club. But I was mainly just excited to get involved and play."

There have been a few hurdles for Murphy to clear since his arrival at St. James' Park. He found a starting berth hard to come by at first, but an injury to Christian Atsu afforded him an opportunity and a first real taste of the Premier League. "Well, now I can say I've found my feet," says November's FUN88 player of the month. "To start with, it was difficult. I was eager to just get in, play games and be a regular starter straight away. That didn't go quite to plan, so it was a case of biding my time and working hard until the chance came.

"It's difficult playing eight minutes, ten minutes or 12 minutes here and there, especially at this tempo when I wasn't used to it. It was like, 'wow'. But then it's a lot different when you start a game – you can get into it, and I'm finding my rhythm now."

> The former Norwich City winger, whose parents both hail from the North East, felt a need to impress in those early cameos. "I was just dying to play. And then when I was coming on, I was putting pressure on myself, trying to do things that I don't normally do because I was trying to catch the eye, get the fans off their seats and stuff," he says. "Then I just thought, 'wait - stick to what you know, and it'll come good in time'.

"Once I started the games, from the Manchester United game, it took me ten or 15 minutes to settle into the match, but then things were coming off for me and I started finding more confidence. As each game's gone on and I've played more minutes. I've relaxed into it.

"I like to think I'm a confident boy. But when I was coming on and not doing well, people weren't really taking to me straight away, it was quite frustrating. It was a bit like, 'am I ever going to play well?' But I knew that in time it would come good. All I needed was a run of games to find my feet, and then I'd be cooking on gas."

As 2018 begins England Under-21 international Murphy, quiet and polite, is relishing the benefits of moving him to a city with which he was familiar. Born in Wembley, he lived in London for 11 years, visiting family in Newcastle on school holidays. His aunts, uncles and cousins all live in Gateshead, and being "round the corner" is comforting. "I love being

around my family," he says. "Family is what keeps me going, and I've needed a lot of their support since coming up here, being by myself quite a lot. Now is a good time to build better relationships with them, get to see them more often and speak to them more often. It's been good in that aspect. But it's just mainly missing my brother."

Murphy's twin, Josh, is excelling on the wing back at Carrow Road, scoring eight in 25 appearances so far this term. It's the first time they have been separated by such distance. "We speak most days. The thing he'll say the most is – he'll just say it randomly and come out with it – 'Jake, I can't believe it – you play in the Premier League mate'" Jacob laughs. "He says that all the time. He's so happy for me. I think this is spurring him on to get to the level he knows he's capable of.

"Growing up, people used to talk about twin telepathy. When we started playing in the first team at Norwich, all the older boys would be shouting 'stop passing it to each other!' But it always used to work – Josh would cut in, I'd start making runs inside then he'd pass it to me, and then I'd do the same. We're quite similar – I knew his runs, he knew my runs and we'd know where each other were. It was a natural thing – dead easy.

"A good part of my move was giving him the freedom to spread his wings a bit more at Norwich. He needed game time, he's got it and he's doing what I was doing last season."

The winger's move to Tyneside in July separated him from the area where he had become a man. An advocate of the loan system, he spent six separate temporary spells away from Norfolk. Each added something to his make-up, but having a base at Norwich brought its own comforts. "I've been with all my pals, so I could get away with being as childish as I want. But here, I've had to be a little bit more mature. The lads still see the silly side and quite a lot of the staff see the silly side to the things that I do, but I'm getting older now, so I need to be more mature and professional. But I miss it, I miss the mischievous side of it," he says, with a grin.

With more minutes, Murphy has begun to show glimpses of his talent, most evident in the run and cross which allowed Avoze Pérez to snatch the winner at Stoke. His endeavours during a tricky spell for the team prior to Christmas rightly earned him plaudits, but he has a love-hate relationship with the platform on which many of those comments were sent his way. "I'm on and off Twitter - I delete it, re-download it and delete it again - but the majority are fantastic, they're really supportive. You get the odd egghead, but then there's people there to fight your corner and they're the people I've got a lot of love for."

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It is a very modern conundrum for footballers navigating the minefield of social media. "I learned from my experience at Coventry that you shouldn't read too much into what people say," he says. "Twitter is a dangerous place - you get the good and the bad. But the way I see it is that if you don't want to see all of the bad, then you can't take in the good as well. It has to be like that, because you can't just look through all the good comments and think, 'yeah, that's great' and then when the bad comments come in, it's like 'why's everyone coming at me?'

"There's times I'll have it, but most of the time I don't. I flick on and off to see what's going on. The negativity can eat you up. The way that the brain works is you notice all of the bad comments more than you notice the good comments. Why take in the hate when you don't need that kind of thing?"

He still appreciates, but does not dwell on, the kind words that are sent his way though he is also conscious that his style, the way he presents himself on the pitch and plays the game, can exasperate. "The type of player I am, not everyone's going to love me. I give the

some people and that's just the type of player I am, but I know that my playing style aets results. "I play off the cuff a lot, the element of surprise which catches most people off guard. If you're playing pretty safe then you're easy to play against. I like

> "That's what's helped me get to where I am now. I score goals and create goals, but in that there will be times I give the ball away or do a sloppy pass and stuff like that. But people have got to be patient with that, because the next chance could be a good effort on goal, or I might score."

That goal is yet to arrive, but there have been signs that it may not too far over the horizon for a player who feels there is plenty still to come from him. For Murphy, each time he looks down and sees the badge on his chest is a little pick-me-up, another moment of a dream fulfilled.

"It's just exciting. In the black and white strip every time you look down you see the crest on your chest. It's a proud feeling," he smiles.

"It's weird. I always used to do it with England. I'd look down and think 'yeah, I play for England'. It was always a great feeling. Now, I do that here."

FESTIVE PERIOD



A FINE BIT OF BUSINESS

It was from our visitors today that Malcolm Macdonald, one of the finest strikers in the Magpies' history, arrived at St. James' Park. Macdonald played more than 100 times for Luton, scoring 58 goals.



e may have grown up in the North East and turned out for both United and Sunderland, but it is perhaps with our visitors today that Mick Harford's name is most synonymous.

Now 58, Harford spent two spells with the Hatters as a player, and has since been deployed in a string of different roles at Kenilworth Road, including coach, director of football and manager. Today, he is the club's head of recruitment, working closely with the League Two pacesetters' talented young boss, Nathan Jones.

A trip to Tyneside in the Third Round of the FA Cup is the latest step in Luton's recent renaissance, something that Harford is understandably pleased to be playing his part in.

"I supported Sunderland as a kid, but I have a great affinity for Luton. I live in the area, my son was born here, and it's a great club – a fantastic club," he tells **UNITED**. "I've got the utmost respect for the club. To be a Luton Town fan, you have to be very thick-skinned – where they've come from, where they've been, and the problems they've had down the years. Being a Luton fan is like being on a massive rollercoaster. You're up one moment and you're down the next. That's part and parcel of football, but I think that Luton have had a rougher time than most clubs."

Prior to their return to the Football League in 2014, it is certainly hard to disagree. The Hatters were League Cup winners in 1988 and runners-up 12 months later, but then suffered three relegations in little more than ten years. They quickly climbed back to the second tier, only to plummet from the Championship to the Conference in successive seasons amid financial turmoil off the pitch. In the end,



their drop to the non-league game was all but inevitable, having been hit by a 30-point deduction ahead of the 2008/09 League Two campaign.

Harford was in charge that year, and had it not been for their hefty penalty, Luton would have secured a comfortable mid-table berth. Still, the season was not a complete write-off, as the Hatters lifted the Johnstone's Paint Trophy in front of more than 55,000 fans at Wembley following a dramatic extra-time victory over Scunthorpe United.

"There were mixed emotions," says Harford. "We were more or less relegated by then because of the 30-point deduction, but the players and the club showed great heart to win that day and it

You go to Wembley, play very well and beat a team that's in the league above you while you're bottom of the Football League – it just shows you the spirit and the courage that the players and the club have "

Harford was 25 when he first arrived at Kenilworth Road in December 1984, already the fifth major move of his career by that point. Born and bred on Wearside, he had emerged as a potent frontman on a local level, but none of the region's major clubs had been willing to take a punt.

"I had a trial at Sunderland when I was 16 - that was when Jimmy Adamson and Stan Ternent were in charge. I got rejected and I was disappointed. I never had a trial for Newcastle, I just played for a boys' club in Sunderland called Lambton Street Boys' Club," he recalls. "We had a very good team there. We used to have great games against Redheugh Boys' - I can remember playing against the late Nigel Walker, Peter Harrison and lads like that.

"The manager of the team was good friends with a player at Lincoln City. He mentioned my name and Graham Taylor came to watch us two or three times, and in the end he signed four of us."

Harford enjoyed a successful threeand-a-half-year spell at Sincil Bank, netting more than 40 goals in 115 appearances. Midway through the 1980/81 campaign, though, he returned to the North East, linking up with the Magpies for a fee of more than £200,000.

"I'VE GOT GREAT RESPECT FOR NEWCASTLE UNITED FOOTBALL CLUB. WHEN I CAME THERE, I WAS A YOUNG LAD. IT WAS A MASSIVE EXPERIENCE FOR ME AND A MASSIVE LEARNING CURVE." Despite being quick to open his account – against Luton, of all clubs, in a 1-0 win at Kenilworth Road – his stay was to prove a brief one. Still, he looks back at his time in a black and white shirt with fondness.

"Listen, I've got great respect for Newcastle United Football Club. When I came there, I was a young lad. It was a massive experience for me and a massive learning curve," he reflects.

"I'll be honest – I struggled. I don't think the fans took to me, in terms of me coming from Sunderland. I didn't perform particularly well, I think my confidence was affected a little bit, and it learnt me a lesson when I moved on in my future career – to never let anyone affect you, to just be your own person and be strong.


"Some clubs you go to, it works out for you. It didn't work out for me at Newcastle but it was a part of my career I'll never forget. I played with some fantastic players – I played with Chrissy Waddle and Kenny Wharton. We were the young lads there at the time, mixed with the experience of Stuart Boam, John Brownlie and John Trewick, to name but a few."

Despite that blend, the Magpies struggled to assert themselves in the second tier, ultimately ending the season midway down the table after 14 wins, 14 draws and 14 defeats. Ahead of the new campaign, boss Arthur Cox sold Harford to Bristol City.

In the years that followed, though, he did more than enough to prove himself as a proficient marksman, excelling with the Robins, Birmingham City and during his first spell at Luton before being re-signed by Cox – by then at Derby County – in 1990.

"I've got a hell of a lot of respect for Arthur. He signed me for Newcastle and then he signed me again, for Derby, so he must have seen something in me and he must also have thought that my experiences at Newcastle helped me in my career," says Harford.

"He's a top man, one of the best managers I ever worked under. I bumped



into him on holiday in Majorca about 18 months ago. It was great to see him and he is still the same. He still had the same enthusiasm and the same buzz for football that he always had."

Harford only spent a season and a half at Derby, returning to Luton the following year. After another productive stint, he represented four more clubs before calling time on his career in 1998. Among that quartet were Sunderland, a boyhood dream fulfilled.

He took up his latest post at Kenilworth Road in January 2016, the same month that Welshman Jones was handed the managerial reins. Harford is quick to pay tribute to the former Brighton & Hove Albion, Southend United and Yeovil Town defender's accomplishments in the time since.

"It was a no-brainer when I was asked to come back in, and Nathan has been great to me. He has been fantastic – he has basically turned the football club around in the two years he has been in charge," says Harford. "The club's on the up. There's a great positivity around here at the moment and we're in a good place. We're looking forward – the first hurdle is to get out of League Two. We're in a good position but we don't take anything for granted. We keep working day after day to try and get out of this league. There's a big effort going on here to get Luton back to where they were again."

Today, more than 7,000 Hatters fans will be reminded of those former glories – hopefully setting the tone for more of the same – when they arrive at a Premier League venue for the first time since their side clambered out of the non-league abyss.

"As a football club, we were absolutely delighted to draw Newcastle, either home or away," says Harford. "We'd have preferred it at home, but it's quite ironic that we played Gateshead in the Second Round and now we've got Newcastle in the Third.

"We're absolutely thrilled to be coming up against a big club, and Newcastle are a big club. It'll be a great experience for our players."

UNITED'S CUP FINAL REF

'm never surprised when new tales pop up regarding Newcastle United players. There are endless hidden stories to unearth over the years featuring United's great and good. When the doyen of the Northern Echo and Northern League, Mike Amos, chatted to top ex-referee Peter Willis when he turned 80 at the end of October, the story caught my eye. On Mike's excellent blog, Peter revealed he was once a reserve goalkeeper for Newcastle back during the Fifties.

That had passed me by and I immediately turned to the registration and reserve team ledgers to track him down. From County Durham, Peter was indeed on United's books. during season 1954/55. There were too many rivals at St. James' Park for him to progress, including Ronnie Simpson and Stewart Mitchell. He played once for the reserve side against Everton before heading for the non-league game and a



career as a policeman as well as referee.

Peter of course was famously the official in charge of the 1985 FA Cup final between Manchester United and Everton and sensationally sent off Kevin Moran. And that's another Newcastle United first.

HAT-TRICK KINGS

United have experienced many good days - and a few bad days - on Third Round weekend of the FA Cup since 1960. Three Newcastle players have registered hat-tricks at this stage of the competition. Duncan Neale hit a treble on Tyneside as United won 5-0 against Fulham in 1961 and the Welsh Flier, Wyn Davies, scored a memorable trio as Coventry City were narrowly beaten 4-3 at Highfield Road six years later. Much more recently, Peter Løvenkrands made the headlines when Plymouth Argyle were convincingly knocked out, the Dane hitting all three of United's goals in the 3-0 success in 2010.

The bad days? Yes, there have been a few, too many to relate. But for the sake of editorial balance, history includes United falling at this stage to Bedford Town (1963/64), Carlisle United (1967/68), Chester (1979/80) and latterly Stevenage (2010/11). And of course, say it quietly... the H-club...Hereford United in 1971/72.

RON'S FULL HOUSE

Burradonborn and bred and a United supporter as a lad, Ron Guthrie has the distinction

of appearing in every stage of the FA Cup - a full-house from the qualifying rounds to the final itself. The former Magpie full back's record is not unique, but there are not many footballers to have played from the humble start of the famous competition with nonleaguers to the glamour stage of Wembley.

Ron didn't do it for the same club of course, but achieved the feat appearing for United, Sunderland and Blyth Spartans. He took part in two famous cup runs, firstly when Second Division Sunderland lifted the trophy by defeating hot favourites Leeds United in 1972/73, then as the Spartans reached the quarter-final draw in

While Ron only appeared once in the competition for the Magpies, he played seven of the nine games for the Wearsiders and was an ever-present in Blyth's celebrated run. Included were four qualifying fixtures against Shildon, Consett, Crook Town and Bishop Auckland before reaching the First Round proper.

Living in Killingworth, Ron was on United's books for ten seasons and registered 66 games for the Magpies. His brother Chris Guthrie also turned out for United.

JACKIE MILBURN: MOST FA CUP GOALS

Being at the very heart of United's illustrious Fifties FA Cup side, Jackie Milburn has scored the most goals for the Magpies in the competition, netting 23 in his appearances between 1945 and 1957. Along the way he won three winners' medals which are now on display at the Players' Entrance foyer. He also scored three of those goals in Wembley finals.



AT ST JAMES' PARK MALCOLM MACDONALD

1971-1976 257 (+1 void) appearances, 138 goals



For many years now, Malcolm Macdonald has hardly missed a match at Gallowgate, often in the Media Suite or Guest Lounge. Supermac had many a stirring day in the FA Cup for both United and his former club, visitors Luton Town. In the 1970/71 competition, he netted a fabulous hattrick for the Hatters in a 4-3 defeat to Nottingham Forest, a side against whom he was to be the hero for United in the guarter-final of 1973/74.

RARE & CURIOUS CUP RELICS

o many football supporters the mystic and magic of the FA Cup is still very much alive and kicking. Despite recent disappointments, Newcastle United have a long and proud history in the competition - 13 finals and plenty of cup thrills, glory, as well as shocks. Souvenirs from the tournament are plentiful and we have highlighted several player medals, shirts as well as special programmes and tickets before. There are many other mementoes in the club archive, though, several rare and curious.

United's treble of victories between 1951 and 1955 caused a great stir on Tyneside as could be expected - then in an era before European competition and the League Cup, when only the league title and FA Cup were

up for grabs. At that time, seemingly everything in the city had an FA Cup flavour to it: sweets, magazines, clothes and even groceries. One item which has amazingly survived the 61 years is a wrapper from a locally-produced large loaf of bread!


In excellent condition and pictured, it's been folded and kept neatly since it went on sale back in 1955 to celebrate United's Wembley success over Manchester City. Produced

by Lees Bakeries, based at Melbourne Street then later on the Coast Road, it is decorated with the football regalia of the era - top hats, rosettes and rattles

Emblazoned is the banner, "Pride O'the North... Congratulations Newcastle United Winners of the FA Challenge Cup".

Some 45 years before, during the Edwardian era, it was condiment manufacturer Coleman's that was associated with the FA Cup, producing an appealing series of Vesta cases to hold matches, decorated in blue

manufacturer, founded in 1814 and based near Carrow Road in Norwich, is still very much on the go and back then sold a series of mementoes branded with their Coleman's Mustard marking cup victories during the 1900s and 1920s.

Included was United's victory over Barnsley in 1910, the Magpies' first FA Cup success, at the fourth attempt. They won 2-0 in a replayed final at Goodison Park with centreforward Albert Shepherd scoring both goals, including the very first penalty kick. Other similar items have been seen for FA Cup wins by Manchester United and Wolverhampton Wanderers, the latter in another final against the Magpies.

More in living memory, Newcastle reached two finals at

SETTING THE SCENE

Despite an impressive 2-2 draw at Arsenal a week earlier, the programme reports that a tinge of disappointment emerged, but that was outweighed by the satisfaction enjoyed from the result. The disappointment surrounded the fact that a two-goal lead slipped away after goals by Malcolm Macdonald and "Jinky" Jimmy Smith had seemingly put the Magpies out

of sight. However, the overall result was a credit to the team and a source of confidence ahead of this cup encounter against Luton Town.


SO, WHAT'S THE STORY?

Were the Magpies set for another assault on the FA Cup after they had seemingly laid the underdog ghost of recent past to rest when they successfully negotiated a tricky home tie against AFC Bournemouth in the previous round? As for league matters, the foundations for another crack at European qualification had been laid as the point secured at Highbury seven days earlier cemented a top-six place in the First Division. The Hatters arrived on Tyneside with two players in their ranks with a point to prove to Magpies boss Joe Harvey. Former United winger Gordon Hindson and loanee striker Viv Busby - the latter seemingly discarded as a consequence of the FA Cup disaster at Hereford United would both have preferred to be wearing black and white stripes that afternoon, which added

extra spice to the tie.

However, it was a player

who slipped under the radar slightly who won the day for the Hatters, as they added their name to the growing list of so-called minnows who had seen off the Magpies in cup competition. John Aston had put in a man-of-the-match performance for Manchester United when they lifted the European Cup at Wembley in 1968. Playing as a winger, he had followed in his father's footsteps in playing for the Red Devils and no wonder that night tops his footballing CV! Aston struck both goals for the Hatters in a convincing 2-0 victory that stunned the Magpies into a state of shock. That defeat immediately affected their league form and they were held to consecutive draws in their next two games against Coventry City and Wolverhampton Wanderers, home and away respectively, before returning to winning ways after a Macdonald strike sealed victory at Norwich City.

SETTING THE SCENE

The two clubs had met in the league at Kenilworth Road seven days earlier when a most welcome goal for Mick Harford settled matters in favour of the Magpies. That victory had stopped the Hatters in their tracks as they had been in fine form, winning five in their run of eight games undefeated. United now had the upper hand as they had also won 2-1 at St. James' Park back in August. However, with Harford cup-tied, Ray Clarke was given another Opportunity to lead the frontline as he had done successfully in the Magpies' victory over Sheffield Wednesday in the last round.

SO, WHAT'S THE STORY?

Arthur Appleton's popular programme column
"Kick-Off" offered a comprehensive preview of the day's cup tie. As a scene-setter, Appleton had proved to be one of the best with a number of anecdotes providing a mine of informative football gossip His brief was simple, Luton were not doing badly away from home this season, but a league double by

United already will weigh more heavily against them than us.

In the opening hour the Magpies proved too hot to handle. A young Chris Waddle was tormenting the Hatters defence while Clarke heralded his chance of leading the line in fine style in the fifth minute when he headed United into the lead. In the 60th minute, skipper Mick Martin extended United's

advantage as they looked to kill the tie at the earliest opportunity.

It was as if the players knew United were already in the hat for the Fifth Round as they seemingly took their foot off the gas. For the next half an hour Luton proved just what a good side they were by peppering 'keeper Kevin Carr with shot after shot. And once they pulled a goal back from a terrific Godfrey Ingram crossshot, only an outstretched arm of the United custodian then the width of a goal post denied them what would have been a deserved replay. However, Waddle may contest that, after his thunderous 20-yard strike rattled the crossbar.

Fate was certainly on the side of United in that last third of the tie, with the Hatters showing their predatory attacking instincts aided by the pace of forwards Brian Stein and Ricky Hill, which proved a difficult threat to control.

Currently fourth in the Carling Premiership table and having been dubbed as "the Entertainers" by Sky Sports pundits, it was a foregone conclusion that the Magpies would easily overcome First Division Luton in this FA Cup Fourth Round tie - wasn't it? Well, this is Newcastle United we are talking about, and in the cup an upset can happen, of course - and on this occasion, after a replay, it did!

The tie at St. James' Park saw the Hatters take a 35th-minute lead when Tony Thorpe struck to silence the boisterous crowd. In the opening exchanges Luton more than held their own against a lethargic United - something that Kevin Keegan had warned about in his programme notes! The Magpies' boss expected David Pleat's side to come to Gallowgate and play with fire, spirit and commitment - they did not disappoint. And if not for a rather suspect offside flag from the linesman, they could have doubled their advantage before the break.

It took a 65th-minute spotkick by Peter Beardsley to bring United back on level terms.



which many neutrals thought harsh on the spirited Hatters who had more than matched their Premiership hosts. So it was a trip south for the Magpies and a potential banana skin of a replay at the compact Kenilworth Road.

On a cold February night in Bedfordshire the omens were not good! As the United players did their pre-match pitch inspection, the long faces and turning of heads sent out negative vibes to the noisy early arrivals inside the stadium who had travelled from Tyneside. A crowd of 12,503 witnessed a rather inept display by the

Magpies which left Keegan both seething and embarrassed. After an early onslaught, the Hatters deservedly took the lead when John Hartson struck on 16 minutes. The TV cameras were there to capture it all as events unfolded before the watching millions. Luton, as they say, were at it! Wave after wave of attacks led to Keegan changing his tactics in an attempt to get back into the game - and it almost paid off. However, a Scott Oakes strike put matters beyond doubt, and it was a gracious United boss who stood up to the post-match grilling from the press as Luton gained the upper hand against Newcastle in the cup.

However, Rod Haider levelled for the Greens in the second half, taking the tie to a replay at Vicarage Road, Watford. where United secured a Fourth Round place by virtue of a 4-0 victory.



The Club will not tolerate any form of racist, sexist or homophobic abuse or any persistent foul and abusive language. Such behaviour is a breach of the stadium Ground Regulations which may result in ejection from the stadium and a ban from attending matches.

It may also constitute a criminal offence, which may result in arrest, prosecution and a Football Banning Order.

Any supporter who experiences any such behaviour is urged to report the matter, at the time it is occurring, to a nearby steward or police officer.

An alternative way of reporting is by a service that allows supporters to text the stadium Security Match Control anonymously.

To use this texting service, simply text the word HELP followed by the stand, row and seat of the offending supporter, then the nature of the offensive behaviour to 60070*.

This service allows stadium security staff to monitor and deal with the offensive behaviour as it is happening.

Five minutes after the break, though, it was Newcastle who drew first blood. After a Seasiders attack broke down, the Magpies countered with pace. George Robledo threaded the ball through for Milburn, who managed to beat the offside trap before slotting past onrushing goalkeeper George Farm

Milburn's second - which arrived with virtually United's next attack - was worthy of winning any cup final just by itself. Ernie Taylor played the ball along the floor, and the Magpies' No. 9 picked out the top corner from 25 yards with a rocket of a shot.

Blackpool - and Matthews in particular - kept plugging away. desperate for a route back into the game. It was not forthcoming, though, as Newcastle held firm to lift the trophy for the third time.
