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

### Duo ready for the Olympics?


WITH a miserable season of football coming to a close, two of our playing squad have turned their attentions to fulfilling their dream of competing at the Olympics.

I'd like to see Micky Harford do it although I dare say he might be better off winning a few more games first before facing the crowd.


Glory Horns!

**GARRY PARKER:** After coming up through the ranks at Kenilworth Road, Parker signed pro forms in May, 1983, but the cultured midfielder could only manage 42 league appearances in three years, such was the Hatters' depth of talent at the time.

**Unable to get** past the likes of **Ricky Hill and David Preece**,

**Garry reluctantly** stepped down in 1986 to join his old pal Brian Horton, by then manager at Hull.

The £40.000 paid by the Tigers turned out to be a steal as Garry went on to win **England Under-21** caps while at **Boothferry Park** before a big money move took him to Brian Clough's **Nottingham Forest** in 1988.

comedy Keeping Up Appearances between 1990 and 1995.


Of couse it's most famous for its shoe industry and the movie Kinky Boots was filmed there - and you thought they got their nickname after years of playing absolute Cobblers.




