kicked out by Hatters, but they turned out to be quite good, actually

AFTER visiting his home town club for training and coaching sessions from the age of 11 and scoring goals for fun in the Hatters youth team, Kerry Dixon was devastated to learn that he was not about to be offered apprentice forms at Kenilworth Road.

Reserve team manager at the time, David Pleat, thought that the tall striker had an attitude problem and so the disillusioned youngster joined Chesham, then managed by ex-Luton full-back Brendan McNally, and took on a toolmakers' apprenticeship with Cardale Engineering.

After banging in the goals for the Chesham first team as a 16-year-old, Dixon was given a second chance to join the professional ranks by Tottenham, but was eventually rejected for the same reason as he had been at Luton.

Determined to prove everyone wrong, Dixon

became a prolific scorer for Dunstable which led to a £20,000 move to Reading.

Dixon was not about to let this chance slip and, after scoring a goal every other game for the Royals, won a dream £175,000 transfer to Chelsea in 1983. He netted 147 league goals in nine years at Stamford Bridge and also picked up eight England caps along the way.

Another big money move, this time to

Southampton, did not work out and things then turned full circle with a free transfer to David Pleat's Luton in 1993 where he netted 19 times and appeared for the Hatters in an FA Cup semi-final against one of his old sides, Chelsea.





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
