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
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When Becks met..

>> You've said that Luton Town is your club and that you supported Luton even when you were playing for other clubs. Why do you feel you have such a bond with Luton?

My team is West Ham. but yeah, I was at Luton for six years. I have a love for the club and I was treated so well by the fans and had such amazing success when I was here, that I'll always support the club even when I'm not playing any more.

Was Mick one of the biggest reasons you came back to Luton?

There are not many people in football like Mick. He is honest and he treats you like a man. I won't lie to you, I wanted to play regular football. I wasn't getting that at Preston and I wanted to be part of the challenge we've got now at Luton.

>> Did you realise how important you coming back to Luton was to the fans?

I know that the fans have always been supportive of me. I don't mind saying that I had a lump in my throat at the Port Vale game. My kids were mascots and my family was there. I want to do

However, much as I love it, I think I'll choose something else to wear on my nights out in Leeds. I hear he's not a very popular man up



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
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




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What do your boots

By now settled in midfield, Vidar caught the eye last season when his steadying influence helped Rosenborg to a 1-1 draw at Chelsea in a Champions League tie.

With more than 50 caps for Norway under his belt, Vidar signed on for Lillestrom over the summer.


