Luton Town 0 Sunderland 5 06/05/07

The Town had already been relegated from the **Championship while** Sunderland needed a win to clinch the title.

In front of a capacity crowd, with seemingly half from the north-east, the Hatters rolled over and allowed their opponents to run riot.

An embarrassing afternoon as the Town slumped to their seventh successive home defeat - a new record.



Although hit by injuries, the Hatters put in a truly woeful performance against league leaders Watford who were four up at the interval.



However, he is unbeaten so far, and the team seems to be playing a lot better.

What's more, he's been giving everybody a fair crack of the whip, which certainly paid off in the case of Steve Basham!

It's encouraging to see that he's willing to give everybody a chance rather than simply carry on with what had been happening before - and, so far, it's working!

The players are now having to compete for places and that's a situation we haven't had for a very long time.

We've got used to the first team simply being slotted into place every week, which isn't a

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necessarily a good blueprint for a winning squad.

The gates we've been having are very good for this league too, which shows that support is still there for Luton Town. even though we are at the lowest point in our history.

By the by, I don't feel at the moment that I can write a column without at least a passing piece of praise for striker Kevin Gallen, who has been a stalwart for the team over the last few games in particular.

He may only be a little bloke and he may have lost some of the pace that he once had, but he reads the game as well

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as any player out there and that gives him that extra yard or so that can often be the difference between a goal and a wasted opportunity, or between victory and defeat.

A few words for Jake Howells as well, who has done exceptionally well over the last year or so to establish himself as a member of the first-team squad.

He has come on in leaps and bounds in terms of composure and experience, and has lost the naivety that characterised his early appearances as a Luton Town player.

The Hatters won promotion to the old Division One in 1955 and the following autumn Baynham was capped in the 5-1 thrashing of Denmark in Copenhagen.

Two more caps came as England beat Northern Ireland 3-0 and Spain 4-1 at Wemblev before he was overlooked in favour of Reg Matthews of Third Division Coventry City.

Asked whether he considered winning an England cap or appearing in the 1959 cup final was the biggest achievement,

he replied. "Both were tremendous highlights. but I rated Wembley for the cup final, even though it bought me the biggest disappoint-ment of my career."

National honours

The cup final was the pinnacle of Baynham's playing career and within 12 months the 1959 squad were part of the gradual decline of the club as it drifted down to Division Four.

Ron stayed on at Kenilworth Road until 1965 before working as a painter and decorator, as well as at Luton Airport for some years, and is now happily enjoying his retirement.



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

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
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
