

WHEN I was asked to write a review on the different football kits in the Blue Square Premier I was slightly worried as I'm no Gok

However, I do own a few England shirts so I decided I at least knew something about what makes a good, and comfortable, kit.

Therefore, I decided to give it my best shot and have chosen some of the best and worst kits around...

One of the better kits in the Blue Square is Oxford United's lovely yellow and navy blue number. The shirt is simple but with enough detail on the sleeves to make it interesting. well more so than their football at least. The shorts are a good length, with enough room so that the players can be comfortable.

Next up is the Kettering Town ensemble. Again the shirt is simple, but effective with black and white on the shoulder, contrasting with the all over deep red colour.

Mansfield Town's kit is similar to Oxford's in colour, except the fact that it is brighter. I like the lovely bright blue detail running down the sleeves and the sides of the shirt - their supporters need something to cheer them up watching that dross after all...

The blue and white stripey design on Chester City's kit is nice and interesting, without being too loud. Of course it might all be in vain if they finally fold - maybe it's down to below par shirt sales?

Super Luton Town's home kit is a Dutch orange and white, while their away kit is tidy navy blue and white number. Looks great with airline giant easyJet as their sponsors!

One of the kits I picked that could be described as one of the worst is that of near neighbours Stevenage Borough.

For a start, while researching I couldn't actually find a decent picture of the kit. The picture on the website showed the kits just about visible in a cardboard box. What I could make out was that the shirt was white with black and red detailing on the shoulders, nice!

Cambridge's 'amber' offering - or in other words an uninteresting shade of orange - is also a fashion faux pas. The black slash down the side is obviously supposed to make the shirt more interesting, but I'm not too sure...

Wrexham's away kit is white and quite retro, but that's probably bang up to date if you live in Wales!

Come on Mr Money, this team needs some flair to get the terraces rocking again. Does anyone know if Jean-Louis-Valois has a vounger brother?!

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
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

THE great performance in the cup win against Rotherham made a welcome change after pretty dire showings against Kettering and Chester, and while, probably like a lot of Town fans, I'd prefer to have chalked up an extra few league wins than earned a trip to Southampton with a cup win, here's hoping such a comprehensive second round win will prove the catalyst for an improvement in the BSP.

Money-man's hand has been forced in terms of team selections by cup tied players, new loan signings and injuries in recent weeks, and it'll be interesting to see what side he'll put out today assuming he has new fresh injuries after the Cambridge game and with no cup tied players. Something of a welcome selection headache for Money given some of the improved performances in the FA Cup.

The ever-reliable Tyler would return to my side if he's recovered from his injury problem, if not Kev Pilkington would get the nod as a more than capable replacement. Blackett and White look like they may be starting to form a solid partnership in the middle, and although George Pilkington hasn't always looked entirely comfortable at right-back, he still gives the Town a solid

base when playing there. Murray would make up the back four, the same back four that kept clean sheets against Chester and Rotherham.

Newton has terrorised teams in recent weeks and always looks dangerous so he'd get the nod on the right. Nicholls' more advanced role against Rotherham was interesting and seemed to strangely work, so perhaps he could push on a touch from the middle, ably supported by Keane.

Emanuel would sit on the left of midfield but track back to help Murray out when needed, but Emanuel could be replaced with the lively looking loanee Cain if ineffective going forward.

Dickie Dosh seems to have plenty of options up front and it's difficult to know who to pick. Gallen's strong performance against Rotherham would earn him a place in my side, if anything he holds the ball up superbly, and it would be interesting to see if he links up well with promising aquisition Barnes-Homer, seeing as the Barnes-Homer/Craddock partnership looked as though it might need some work against Chester.

National honours

Mal Donaghy

MAL Donaghy was a promising Gaelic footballer when at school in Northern Ireland and had represented County Antrim. Gradually the other code took over and he eventually joined Larne as a part-timer while taking on clerical officer role at the Post Office in Belfast.

It was while playing for the U21 team against Eire in Dublin that he caught the eye of Luton manager David Pleat. The Larne manager wanted more than the £20,000 on offer so Pleat waited for his counterpart to go on holiday and went back to the Larne board who thought that the player was out of contract. Luton therefore picked up, for a song, a player who graced their defence for 10 years!

Donaghy played his early football for Luton at left-back but moved over to central

defence as the Hatters walked away with the Division Two championship in 1982. His speed, agility, quickness in the tackle and powers of recovery made him the ideal foil for a succession of stopper centrehalves at Luton. In particular he enjoyed the perfect partnership with Steve Foster as the Hatters enjoyed the most successful period in their history.

In his first nine seasons at Kenilworth Road, Donaghy was ever present in six of them and missed only six games in total in the other three. He put down this remarkable injury-free record to playing alongside any number of 'big, ugly centre-halves.' Ironically, Donaghy was injured playing in the Mercantile Credit showpiece tournament at Wembley only a week before the Hatters biggest game in their annals. However,

he made a remarkable recovery from a serious ankle injury and starred as Luton beat Arsenal in the 1988 Littlewoods Cup final.

It seemed that Donaghy, who by now had won 58 caps for Northern Ireland after making his debut in 1980, seemed set to finish his career at Kenilworth Road but a surprise £650,000 bid from Alex Ferguson early in the following season took him to Manchester United, the club he had supported as a boy.

In four seasons at Old Trafford, Donaghy sampled life at the top including forays into Europe but, as Gary Pallister established himself with the Reds, the 35-year-old found himself forced into the background but enjoyed two further seasons in the Premiership with Chelsea before retiring.




So a trip to London, on a Sunday as well coz neighbours Fulham have bagged the Saturday slot, in early January to sit in a freezing shed – well
