COMMENT

This is how it all started $2\frac{1}{2}$ years ago when Neil and I decided that enough was enough. Luton Town were the most hated team in the football league (where is that football league now?) and apart from the bigoted views of the press we had no outlet to vent our anger and put our - the fans - ideas forward.

The Luton supporters were the only first division club without a fanzine at that time and everyone outside the club assumed that the away fans ban, the plastic pitch and other directors decisions were popular with the supporters of the club. We were surprised to find that many of you agreed with our views opposing the the board, in the mail we received after issue 1 hit the streets in February 1990.

The first edition was a very hit and miss affair. 20 pages was really poor value but we were grateful for all the encouragement we received from all over the country. It was great to see so many people in exile still interested in the "Town" and boosting the away following when the Hatters played in their area.

This enthusiasm, boosted by the fact that Roy Wegerle agreed to an interview with us, led us to believe we could and should carry on with our message; even though we knew that another point of view would soon be arriving in the form of "rival" fanzines. Our belief that fans had been conned in previous seasons at other peoples expense, the prospective move from Kenilworth Road and interim adjustments to the stadium in light of the Taylor report were all dealt with in issue 2.

Mr Pleat was appointed with us having to hastily change our name now the messiah had returned to the Town after wandering in the Wilderness. Our high profile manager brought in new faces whilst selling a couple of players for big money and whittling the squad down where possible. The style of play was usual for a Pleat side but at times without certain key players seemed lack lustre.

Looking back we've reported good and bad, light hearted and serious and have tried to keep fresh, notably with the inclusion from issue 3 onwards of the excellent Kev and Robbie to whom we are eternally grateful. The input of many other contributors, sellers and production staff have been invaluable in making sure we hit the deadlines. THE TAYLOR REPORT

So, Lord Justice Taylor - the thinking mans Colin Moynihan has decreed that football stadiums should become all seater by 1994. Well, I must admit that it sounds as though everything will be fine when we kick off the 1994/95 season. But, hold on a minute lets take stock of the situation, it is very easy to lose track of the issue in question, that is never to encounter the incidents which caused the tragic loss of life witnessed at Hillsborough last April. I feel that everyone has got it out of proportion, as the Taylor report suggests that fans in general and 'hooligans' in particular, were the main cause of the tragedy, when in fact it is due to a sequense of events usually never encountered at League fixtures.

It was decided to use Hillsborough to host this semi-final an F.A. showpiece, as it had been used quite successfully the previous season. Demand for tickets was abnormally high and the allocation of tickets did not even cover the season ticket holders, let alone the fans who normally pay on the gate. The late arrival of some fans, due to traffic problems, only served to make matters worse, as did the decision not to delay the kick off. The opening of the gates and subsequent non-segregation of the fans all added up to the blackest Saturday in footballing memory.

It is easy to point the finger but nothing will bring back the 95 who died. But as stressed this is an abnormal ocurrence only happening on a few dates during the year. Most weekends you have the same set of supporters turning up for home games knowing where they want to stand and arriving in good time for them to gain access to the terraces. What seems to be the problem here then?

The unfair penalising of the fans by installing seats at all grounds does not appear to be a rational way of dealing with the problem. The Taylor report seems to blame the standing terraces indeed he referred to them as places of tribal warfare. This seems a very narrow view of the situation, as most terraces are used by the ordinary working man there to enjoy a cheap game of football, in a great atmosphere. How will people sit and still have the same sense of enjoyment?

What will happen is that the all seater stadiums will price the ordinary working man away from the game, just when the attendances were picking up again. The casual football fan will think twice about the cost of a seat as opposed to a good night out on the town!

Clubs may be forced to shut down part of their grounds, and only open the main stand, for instance, this could then lead to violence erupting between rival fans in the same enclosure. With no revenue from lack of enthusiasm and high prices, added to the cost of installation, clubs will be forced to fold and football will be the loser.

So what should happen? The following, is only an idea, and is meant to provoke thought and discussion!

If stadiums are forced to be all seater, then money should be made available to install seats in 1st and 2nd division clubs. The lower league clubs would be crippled and find they will not attract spectators, which after all is the clubs lifeblood.

Clubs know who season ticket holders and membership card holders are, and so should ensure ticket allocation for loyal supporters and followers. (There are a few critics here who say that Luton membership is 30,000, but the league gates are only 10,000, on this equation what price Man. United's membership allowance?)

Troublemakers, when identified, will have membership cards withdrawn, thus banning them from home games let alone away matches. There needs to be stricter control over ticket allocation, a lot of fans go to away games without tickets with the knowledge that there will always be touts outside the ground. So if you get rid of the touts, will the fans without tickets stop going?


This all adds up to price increases, due to the higher administrative costs, but would it be better than the cost of sitting, which will reduce capacities and possibly double or treble the admission fee to claw back revenue.

Drastic on Plastic



HOMELESSNESS - A REPORT

I don't know, these days it seems that if you're a single parent with no income, a few badly dressed brats and no conception of anything real, that the council will find a home for you. I'm sure that you'll agree that this is the norm for the most part, in Luton.

Well how can the Borough Council differentiate when the aforementioned paragraph precisely fits the description of the Chairman and his offspring of LTFC?

The days of football at Kenilworth Road are numbered, as you know, due to the club selling off the land to the Council under the premise that all would be done to find a suitable home within a 6 year period. With 2 years nearly up, it seems as though we are as far away as one can possibly get from establishing just where the new ground will be situated.

It is not the intention of this writer to restate the sites that have been well talked about, but to look at some of the decision making that goes on to establish where, in 6 years time, Luton will be playing 1st Division football.

Indeed, at the present rate of advancement, will Luton be playing football at all?

Most of the decisions come from a working party which, given the course of time, comes up with various suggestions by sticking a pin into a map of OLD Luton. The reason I say an old map is that the one they use has absolutely no built up areas on it, as it dates from 1892. So when they landed on Sundon Springs they conveniently forgot about the residential areas, lack of routes and transportational difficulties.

Similarly, the Butterfield Green site has too many of the above disadvantages to consider it a starter. It must be pointed out that even when a feasible site is found too many people put on their NIMBY (not in my back yard) hats. They say that a football club in their area will cause traffic chaos and pollution, shove rowdy hoards of people into the area and generally downgrade the scene.

I hear no such complaints when they build large shopping and office complexes where the effects will be exactly the same. Too many people have short memories, don't they?

Indeed, what about getting a supermarket chain to go in with the Council and LTFC to construct a site with amenities, ample parking space and the like, so that the area can be dual purpose. An area such as this will possibly find that shops might have to close on a Saturday or the other way of looking at it is that they may increase their revenue through the influx of 10,000+people on a Saturday.

You've got to admit that Kenilworth Road is absolutely abysmal for parking even on a reserve fixture, and most shops in the area are still concerned about large crowds even though the element of danger through violence has been, for the most part, eradicated.

We come back to the main problem as to where to site? People are now looking further afield meaning Lutonians have to travel out of Luton, to follow a team reported to be Luton Town. This option though safe as far as undeveloped sites goes, brings us back to transportation and traffic routes. Each site will have to be viewed under its own merits before a decision is made.

Are the council doing all they can to help Luton Town? I hear you ask, or are they hoping to be saved by private development which means that they can wash their hands of this tiresome problem? It was, after all, objections from rent paying members about football crowds that Luton brought in their membership scheme. An attempt to hide the real reason that the council did not care and LTFC were not prepared to foot the Police bills that kept coming in. No the council want to get their moneys worth out of Luton and have probably sold the land to private developers for housing purposes already, without having to spend anything extra to get rid of the club. It would be better for the council if the club did not reside within the borough of Luton anyway.

Is this what the are banking on with their stalling?


ZAP! He now spends up to 50 hours a week on the wild astro adventureland.

In line with the Taylor report proposals Luton have come up with the scheme to make the Kenilworth Road stadium all seater over a period of 5 seasons. It is presumed that this will make Luton Town F.C. one of the most progressive and safety conscious teams in the league, giving impressive viewing to all who wish to watch the town. The Oak Road seating area is envisaged to house the controlled introduction of away fans the advantages being not only atmosphere but one of containing the away element and not have them scattered about the ground as at present. The Kenilworth Road end will gradually be converted to seating, working from the back of the stand to the front over a period of seasons.

Pretty big plans you may agree, but have we the fans and paying customers had a say in what will go ahead? Have we been asked if this is what we want and do we have any major gripes about this idea? Clubs around the country have taken the Taylor report to heart and at least have had the courtesy to listen to proposals fans can come up with. Indeed West Ham, to name one, have commissioned a census amongst fans in order to test opinion on a range of topics from all seater stadium to ground

sharing.

It is obvious that our progressive thinking management have made this little pearler up on their own and have decided that public opinion will have to be vetoed by commercial common sense. I must admit that we, the fans, have pushed them into it a little as we still only turn out in ten thousands to watch our team play whilst they obviously think that this is not enough.
