

Post Mortem

Its too late now to worry about where we find ourselves this season, but the real concern is how to address the situation so that we do not make the same mistakes again. Lets face it, under normal circumstances the fans would be baying for the blood of the manager of any team that has dropped down a division. It is true to say that the manager influences the team he resides over, and his decisions off the field contribute to factors on the field of play. Yet we here at Luton know the score don't we lads.

I'm afraid we cannot apportion blame at the door of Mr Pleat solely, nor indeed at the feet of the beleaguered board. No siree. The writing has been on the wall for the previous 3 seasons, we pointed out the facts until we were fed up to the back teeth. Did people listen? No, it seems not, successive Chairmen have sold our back teeth and our prized golden crowns, thus ensuring pitifully wasted seasons at Kenilworth Road.

It seems that the more attention that the star players received the easier it was for the clubs to prize them away from us due to our inability to haggle for more money or persuade players to re-sign for increased personal terms. No hang on a minute, that's how we got in this pretty mess in the first place. Remember the Littlewoods Cup winning side? It was the successive re-signing of players with big money that forced the big men at the top to quit early. They realized that the club was bleeding after trying to keep a nucleus of players together and that the only way out was to quit the sinking ship.

The new owners fell into the trap of not realizing these historical facts and were thus saddled with the burden of trying to make ends meet. The 1990-91 season proved there was no money coming in, thus no money became available for players. We struggled for the third season on the trot due to poor away form and injuries to key players, yet we knew in our hearts the only way to get better was for our young team to go down and ply their trade in the second division.

We saved ourselves in the final home game against Derby but I think we all realized that radical changes both on and off the field had to take place. We wrote the very same in our freebie leaflet for that Derby game. The changes took place off the field with David Pleat returning to the hotseat and we expected changes on it as well.

Sadly it took us 5 games to score and the 6th game resulted in a win against Southampton. Our defence or lack of it, proved to be our downfall and even the signings of Harford, Peake and Kamara failed to produce results especially with defeats away to Man Utd, Villa and the Yidos, prior to our dramatic Christmas turnaround. Jackson and Black had already departed and we had amassed a total of 12 points by December the 20th. (And one point to note was the excellent Nogan goal v Sheff Wed.)

It should have been the resurgence of form that the lads needed after a break away in foreign climes but successive deafeats at the hands of Liverpool (which we should have won) at home to the Hammers (which we were appalling without Big Mick) and Sheff Weds, (where we let another away lead, slip us by) set the score for a "will we won't we" finale, where we still didn't manage two wins on the bounce.

So what is the underlying reasons for our demise:-

- 1) Appalling away form who on earth can remember another side that failed to register an away victory and had such disgraceful refereeing decisions at crucial times in many games?
- 2) Not having a settled side much of the season The inclusion of key players came too late to have any effect to halt our disasterous

start to the season. By the time we clicked we had numerous injury problems which caused new members to be included and change our pattern of play. (And we used 32 players last season)

- 3) Giving away goals in the last fifteen minutes of a game. -It is true to say that we did score late on against Oldham at home and Norwich at home but these are totally outweighed by the late, late strikes we had inflicted on us. The game is 90 minutes long as we all know, but it must have been something mental with the guys on the pitch.
- 4) Goalkeepers What was going on? Day, Sutton, Sommner, Petterson and Chamberlain all were in contention at one stage and only 1 loaned keeper managed the defence admirably.
- 5) Too much youngblood Key games saw the inclusion of strange faces who might have had the raw talent to swing the game but sadly failed. Campbell, Rees, Linton, Williams, Farrell, Holsgrove, all failed to impress in key matches.
- 6) Goalscoring Takeout Micks 13 and Pembridges 5 and were left with 20 goals (including 1 o/g). Micks goals came from 29 appearances - do we need some help here?..

What can we learn. Well whatever improvements on the field, in terms of playing staff and commitment, we will always need a slice of luck. In terms of injury, refereeing decisions and even the bounce of the ball and bookings etc.... The staff do need the backing of management and similar commitment from the board to have a single minded vision on where we need to be in the very near future. We know where we want the team to be; its up to the rest to show us that they know where they're going.

It was with great anticipation that I met David Pleat on the Monday prior to the teams departure for Sweden. After a well worked training session we headed back to Kenilworth Road where I unleashed



David Pleat my questions upon the great

Due to Davids enthusiasm for the topics and my own zealousness we spent longer than imagined. David was obviously very busy with preparations for departure uppermost, yet he was very polite with an upstart like myself intruding into his schedule. This issue will deal with the current situation we find ourselves

in, and we will attack the history of David in the next issue.

D.P. LETS START WITH LAST SEASON AND YOUR RETURN; WHY RETURN AFTER A VERY SUCCESSFUL FIRST SPELL?

PLEAT: It was suggested to me that the club needed guidance at the very highest level. It seems that there were people who were weeded out of this club who should never have left. I'm sure the people who were running this club were not aware or conscious about how the club should be run. For instance they were getting caught in the transfer market; waiting for deadlines, then not being able to use the money as the banks had it; this can be seen in the Dowie case. I don't think there was a rapport with the management at all - the club did need someone to steer it.

For these reasons there was a change needed and I felt that this was the right move for me. Sadly in putting the club right a little bit financially we've suffered a relegation. I haven't yet been able to change things as I would have liked and certain things haven't been solved yet.

D.P. THE REVENUE FROM PLAYER SALES HAS KEPT THE CLUB FROM GOING UNDER

PLEAT: Yes, we're always close to going under. The banks will always squeeze the little clubs as they see that the "Lutons" of this world can never stay long in the premier league. They haven't the resources, crowds etc and cannot therefore purchase top players to survive. That's what they see. So they want the return on their investment. We are currently a good grade B team and we want to be at the top of that grade. People may resent this statement but its true; we've got to be the best of our type.

D.P. HOW DID WE GO A WHOLE SEASON WITHOUT AN AWAY WIN?

PLEAT: It's a shame really. You can sum the season up in the last 45 minutes at Notts County. We had certain frailties last season (i.e no pace upfront therefore we could not take the pressure off ourselves when the opposition threatened us) which meant a 1 goal away lead would slip from our grasp. A group of circumstances meant that we did not win an away game. A horrible statistic, the sooner we win away the better.

D.P. AND THE NOTTS COUNTY GAME?

PLEAT: Well, Pembridge, Harford, Kamara all played under difficulties; they couldn't last the pace. There was almost an inevitability that someone said "you need to take a break from this, the competition is too fierce for you. You need to go and build the club again and bring the young players through". We've currently got Hughes Salton, Campbell and more that will do well.

D.P. HOW DEMORALIZING WAS LAST SEASON TO YOU PERSONALLY?

PLEAT: It was very disappointing. To have stayed up would have been an achievement. To go down when people said that I spent money on players but Jimmy didn't, is false.

D.P. SO WAS THE TRADING AN ACHIEVEMENT OF LAST SEASON?

PLEAT: I could say that I made 4 million last year but spent only £1.25 million on 4 players. Fair enough Jim only bought Holdsworth but I believe the board wanted me to start trading. The other trades saw me move out what I would call fringe players; that I'm sure the Luton public will realize in the long run would not be acceptable for an attractive team. I'm sure you know who I mean.

Now there are less people to get out. Basically there are 26 professionals, the squad is young and keen and ready to go with possibly 1 or 2 find, and I do need a goalkeepr. We've really trimmed down.

D.P. HOW DO YOU GO ABOUT LIFTING THE PLAYERS?

PLEAT: The players are O.K. Believe it or not they know the problems and as long as they are playing and winning games and as long as their wages are there they will raise themselves. They're good professionals. In a league where they can cope, their strength will encourage them and the supporters. The public will then come to watch a winning team.



D.P. I'VE HEARD IT SAID THAT YOU NEED £2M TO GET A TEAM INTO THE PREMIER DIVISION?

PLEAT: Not necessarily. A lot depends on the existing staff.

Newcastle and Derby seem to be having a go with the money side of things, yet if a team does knit together it has every opportunity of success. Its not as though one club at this level is that much better than any other. We will have to draw on all the positive aspects and performances of last season and apply it this season.

D.P. WHO DO YOU SEE AS THE MAIN STAY OF THE TEAM

PLEAT: We've still the backbone of the team in Harford, Kamara and Peake. If we're strong down the middle we can build around that. They are all examples to the rest of the team. There's no greater strength than experience and those that remain like Preece Dreyer and Chamberlain will have their part to play and have to show their qualities.

D.P. IS THERE A QUESTION MARK OVER KAMARA?

PLEAT: None at all, other than 1 or 2 northern clubs expressing >>>

an interest from time to time over a classy player.

D.P. AND WHAT OF OUR YOUNGER TALENT?

PLEAT: Well we have got younger, and 1 or 2 players will emerge through the ranks. These players need to work on being mentally stronger next season. Players like Oakes, Telfer, Linton, etc. Most teams that win things are experienced and over 46 games there is nothing to beat experience and strength. We need to establish ourselves early and then I think we can do really well.

D.P. YOU COULD BE THE FIRST MANAGER TO TAKE US TO THE HIGHEST STANDARD OF FOOTBALL TWICE, YET ALSO LEAVE US TWICE.

PLEAT: Ah, the way things are at the moment, there is a job to be done. I did have a couple of job offers to work abroad in the summer. Yet there's so much that needs to be done at the club the challenge here seemed greater. There are a few important decisions to be made here, to avoid the continual syndrome of selling the best young players. As stated, I don't mind selling the older players who have done a job, but to continually sell the best youngsters is a receipe for disaster.

D.P. I AGREE BUT SELLING WILL UNDOUBTEDLY OCCUR IF WE HAVE A GOOD START TO THE SEAS ON. YOUNGSTERS WILL FALL PREY TO THE LURE OF MONEY.

PLEAT: Yes but its my job to keep them here and to make sure that we've got a group of players who produce good, attractive football. If players are playing in a way that they enjoy and is successful it will encourage them to stay and also attract new players.

D.P. THESE SOARING PRICES HAVE A 2 EDGED EFFECT ON LUTON DON'T THEY?

PLEAT: Yes we obviously can negotiate high fees for our players but we have to purchase either players out of contract like the lad Claridge; the non-league player like Brookes who can be bought for a nominal sum, or an older player at the peak of his career for about £100,000. The middle boy, the 21-25 year old outstanding player we're not in for.

D.P. THAT'S WHERE THE SCHOOL OF EXCELLENCE REALLY PLAYS ITS PART. I KNOW YOU'RE KEEN ON THAT.

PLEAT: Yes. We've got to be more eagle eyed to catch good, young players. We've got some here today.

D.P. SO WITH THE DEPARTURE OF RON HOWARD HOW DOES THAT WORK?

PLEAT: Well, we've arranged the system slightly differently. We've got more people scouting out in the field yet the people that have brought good players to the club over the years are still out there doing just that. Now Paul Lowe collates all the information and feeds it on.

D.P. WAS THERE A CONSCIOUS DECISION TO CHANGE THE RESERVE GAMES TO THE MONDAY AFTERNOON?

PLEAT: This is simple. The switch gives me 3 benefits
(1) It gives greater time for injuries incurred to clear up before

a Wednesday night fixture (of which we have a few) This extra time could be vital.

(11) The pitch has more games this season. If it is necessary to switch the venue to protect the pitch I can do so with less aggrivation than for a night game.

(111) We come into line with other clubs.

SO WHAT DO YOU SAY TO PEOPLE WHO WANT TO WATCH OUR YOUNGER

PLEAT: Come and support our youth team on a Saturday morning down here, there's talent there.

D.P. DO WE HAVE THE RESOURCES BEHIND THE SCENES?

PLEAT: Not at the moment, no. We haven't the resources to resist the chaos in football. It does need to be changed as I say. I don't believe we're excessive but it does need a new policy or strategy where everyone knows what we're aiming for, credibilty and to get attention for all the right sort of reasons.

D.P. THE MEDIA STILL LOVED US LAST SEASON

Yes for a team going down we did attract a lot of press.

THE SAME COULD BE SAID OF SWINDON LAST YEAR - AND LOOK WHERE THEY FINISHED UP IN A PHYSICAL DIVISION

PLEAT: Yes and that's why some of their quality players left. They caught the eye and moved on. Teams such as West Ham, Derby and Portsmouth will be strong this year. We've got to be there too.


