

In line with the Taylor report proposals Luton have come up with the scheme to make the Kenilworth Road stadium all seater over a period of 5 seasons. It is presumed that this will make Luton Town F.C. one of the most progressive and safety conscious teams in the league, giving impressive viewing to all who wish to watch the town. The Oak Road seating area is envisaged to house the controlled introduction of away fans the advantages being not only atmosphere but one of containing the away element and not have them scattered about the ground as at present. The Kenilworth Road end will gradually be converted to seating, working from the back of the stand to the front over a period of seasons.

Pretty big plans you may agree, but have we the fans and paying customers had a say in what will go ahead? Have we been asked if this is what we want and do we have any major gripes about this idea? Clubs around the country have taken the Taylor report to heart and at least have had the courtesy to listen to proposals fans can come up with. Indeed West Ham, to name one, have commissioned a census amongst fans in order to test opinion on a range of topics from all seater stadium to ground sharing.

It is obvious that our progressive thinking management have made this little pearler up on their own and have decided that public opinion will have to be vetoed by commercial common sense. I must admit that we, the fans, have pushed them into it a little as we still only turn out in ten thousands to watch our team play whilst they obviously think that this is not enough. So can we blame them for taking it out of our hands?

I was one of the lucky ones though, some of the poor bastards on that national coach were going on as far as Aberdeen. I would not wish that coach trip from Luton to Stirling on my worst enemy, (except for David Evans that is. I'm sending him a ticket). Walking from the bus station to the town centre, I spotted a bloke across the street with a Luton town shirt on. My spirits lifted immediately, I knew then that there would be at least two Luton fans at the game. After sorting out a B&B and getting my head down for a few hours, I sussed out where the ground was and decided I was in need of some nosh and liquid refreshment. I arrived at the ground at 6.45 and made for the supporters club bar. The sight that greeted me was amazing, a full bar, with at least three-quarters of the occupants being Luton fans, it was great to see. It is amazing how since Jimmy Ryan took over as manager that the Luton style has returned, (football that is pleasing to the eye, and it is once again a pleasure to watch Luton). While I am on this subject, let us nail once and for all the myth that Ray Harford was sacked for not smiling at the fans. He was sacked because in the last 9 months or so of his reign at Luton, he changed the style from skilful football, to boring,

negative, dull, scared, defensive rubbish. I am proud to say that in the Kenilworth Road end I was the first to start the "Harford Out" chants, because watching Luton had become about as exciting as watching paint dry. Anyway back to Stirling, facts you may not know about stirling:-

The early exchanges were equal until Luton took the lead with a powerful shot from Ian Dowie from just inside the area. Kingsley Black was starting to get more into the game and was starting to make some strong runs down the left flank. After one of his mazy runs he ran along the 18 yard box, veered into the area and was taken down. The ref had no hesitation in giving a penalty. Lars Elstrup stepped up and despatched the penalty with due aplomb. After some of the penalty misses from Danny Wilson and Roy Wegerle last season it was nice to see a penalty scored with such confidence. HT 2-0 to the Town. During the game myself, Dave Green and Paul (saucepan salesman, real ale drinker and bit of a gambler) don't know his surname; got talking to a Scottish fellow who told us he was a Stoke City scout and was looking at Mick Kennedy for Alan Ball. top Luton scorer this season. Luton then sat back and relaxed and paid for it, conceding a goal a piece to Stirling's Vinnie Moore and Joe Reid. The defence got caught flat trying to play offside a couple of times with Beaumont and McDonough doing superb imitations of Steve Foster and Ashley Grimes with there arm stuck up in the air appealing vainly to the linesman, like two little school kids asking the teacher if they can go too the toilet. Not that I'm knocking Ashley or Fozzie. Ashley could peel oranges with his left foot and Fozzie was a superb leader but if offside was not given, they were hardly going to get back, neither of them being in the Linford Christie mould when it came to speed. Dear Sir

With regard to the Southampton v Luton football match which I attended on Saturday 1st September 1990, I write to express my disatisfaction at the treatment shown to me by one of your police officers.

At approximately 4.10 pm a police officer ejected me from the ground claiming that I had on at least three occasions made finger signs at the referee. I disagreed with the accusation but I was escorted from the visiting supporters end to what I ca. only assume to be a police incident room, where I was searched and asked for identification etc. I co-operated fully when asked.

I am not a hooligan and have travelled to away games with Luton for over ten years on a regular basis. I do not spend hard earned cash to cause aggrivation at a soccer match.

I was standing in the nearest corner of the visiting supporters end to the home seated fans and can only assume that the officer involved thought (wrongly) that I was stirring something. I have stood at that end of the ground before and realising what a poor view the middle part gives, I stood in the afore-mentioned area to WATCH football. I felt totally humiliated by the actions taken against myself.

I feel that the police, now that football hooliganism has died down, have to justify their presence at a match by either arresting or ejecting certain people for no apparent reason.

Would you please tell me if it is an offence to watch my football team and encourage them on to victory? My outlook after Saturday's events are making me wonder if it is worthwhile. Why was my name, address and other personal details taken? Surely if I had caused any trouble what-soever why was I not charged and arrested? I would appreciate an answer.

Considering Luton had only a small following there were no attempts from any other supporters to oppose my ejection, though on talking to other people who witnessed the incident, all agreed that I had been thrown out for no apparent reason. Had a team such as Leeds United or Arsenal been the visitors I believe you could have had a full scale battle on your hands, for the simple fact that those sides are so well supported that ordinary working people would not accept your officers actions. But there again I believe your officer would not eject those people as they know the consequences. A Luton fan seems a soft touch to a Leeds supporter and they know it. It was not worth myself arguing the point as I know which side the law is on, so thus I agreed to comply with what your employees had to say, to save myself from being arrested.

My wholeday out at Southampton was ruined by the events I have described and so were four other persons was had travelled with me to the game. Thank you.

Is it now an offence to attend a football match? If so, please advise me, and I will stay away in future.

There are over a quarter of a million people who do attend soccer games week in, week out. Perhaps you could advise them as well if they are criminals for standing on a football terrace whether it be Southampton or Scunthorpe United.

I will not be writing to the Southampton F.C. but will, however, send a copy of this letter to the Southampton fanzine in order that true supporters 'get the message'. The Luton fanzine will also be receiving a copy. Let the people judge for themselves.

Thank you for the time you have taken to read my letter, I look forward to your reply.

Sunday has a whole host of footballing goals with Dutch, Italian and British sides scoring heavily whilst Tuesday night weighs in with the goals from the Spanish leagues.

Wednesday nights bow in with Dutch, German and Belgian league games but the best is saved. TV will also show most, if not all of the international games, including

friendlies live. Again 3 weeks ago with the European Cups 2nd legs Tuesday and Wednesday were devoted entirely to Dutch, Belgian and German teams. This sort of coverage is unprecedented as we in Britain have, until this season, received highlights only of our own teams progress and interest peters out until the final if our teams are vanquished.

So if this is the sort of service received abroad, why not over here? If not foreign games then why not more round ups of the 3rd and 4th divisions. Afterall the TV authorities pay these clubs indirectly through their franchise. Why can't they promote them as well as the "Big 5" we get so bored with viewing.

After moving to Holland I worried that I'd miss seeing English football. Why worry - I see more football now than ever in England.
