Go to it lads.



BULLSHIT BAFFLES BRAINS

I left the A.G.M. very pessimistic about the Town's future. Year after year the accounts show an operating loss. The accumulated losses for the last five years are £5.6m up to May 1990. Player sales have raised £2.3m and the sale of Kenilworth Road has covered the rest of the debt. But even now a substantial bank overdraft remains. There are no assets left to sell - only 1st Division footballers The bank seems to have as much of a hold over the club as it did in the dark days of the mid-70's. The banks tolerance of Town's overdraft is not helped by the recession. So what are the future financial prospects for the Town? The first objective has to be the reduction of wage costs. This is not easy in the short-term because all players are on contracts normally 3 years. Thus, players that are surplus to requirements can only be unloaded when their contracts expire. In the mean time we lose the likes of Tim Breaker and Iain Dowie to placate the bank. Matters have not been helped by termination payments totalling £250,000 to get shot of John Smith, Grim Harford & Henry Mancini. Personally, that's probably the best million we've ever spent.

The board were very confident that 1990/91 would show a healthy profit - easy to achieve if you sell your crown jewels you might say. However, the stated aim of Peter Nelkin was that the club would operate at break-even levels in 1991/92, WITHOUT FORCED PLAYER SALES!

Cynics might argue that the directors should stump up some more cash and I wouldn't disagree in the short-run. The problem with directors loans is that when the director leaves he can demand his monies repaid and this has the effect of pulling the rug from under the club's feet. Evans took away £1 million and more - it would have been better for the club if he had never been allowed to put that much money in, under the so obviously generous terms that he granted himself.

Looking forward, the new stand being built where the Plod Centre was, will be financed by a grant from the Football Trust and the remainder of the cost will be paid to the contractor from ticket sales for those new seats — so the Town get 700 or so extra seats without spending anything. As far as the relocation to a new ground, we are told that plans are at an advanced stage and all being well an announcement is possible in April.

In conclusion, don't expect Town to join any super league within the next few years. First division status is the most we can honestly look forward to keeping. Our young stars will prove themselves and then be sold because Town cannot compete with the big clubs when it come to salaries and signing-on fees. Fut remember, there are over 70 other league sides trying to get into the first division and if we can stay above Derby and Sunderland, next season will be our 10th with the elite. That's nine more than looked likely at Maine Road in May 83 and two more that looked certain at Derby in May 90.

THE CLASS OF 68

Our Littlewoods Cup triumph over Arsenal on the 24th April 1988 is a day that will be long remembered by us all. Exactly 20 years to the day before that Wembley victory there was also cause for celebration as Luton clinched the 4th Division championship. To those fans who had suffered the soul destroying drop from the top flight it was almost as good as winning the cup and for the younger generation like myself it was the first taste of success.

We had made a reasonable start to that 1967-68 season, always handily placed in the table. By February we were top of the league and stayed there for the rest of the season. The crowds flocked back to Kenilworth Road. Every player from Tony Read in goal to little Ray Whittaker on the wing, was hailed by the Oak Road Enders, but two stood out in particular. Skipper Terry Branston was the rock in defence and an inspirational leader (a bit like Fozzie minus his head band) whilst the spectacular shooting of Bruce Rioch made the hair stand up on the back of your neck.

So on that Wednesday evening in late April there were long queues all around the ground well before kick-off. Promotion had already been assured by a single Rioch goal at Halifix on the previous Saturday. Now everyone was ready to salute the champions. Convinced that opponents Crewe were only there to make up the numbers even though they were themselves promotion contenders.

The final "head count" was an amazing 18904 and the atmosphere electric, but the crowd was silenced in the third minute when Crewe had the ball in the net. However, we used to get the odd decision in our favour in those days and the goal was ruled out. From that moment on it was all one way traffic towards the Hatters favourite Oak Road End.

John Moore, of all people scored the first goal after a free kick had been saved by Mailey and Rioch added the second with one of his typical dead ball strikes.

Urged on by the jubilant crowd, Crewe were simply swept aside. Slough got number three after a terrific goal mouth scramble although I still think he finally

punched it home - literally! The best goal of the night was scored by that man Rioch. He burst between two defenders on the edge of the area to hit a left foot volley - the ball a blur as it hit the back of the net. So that was that, fournil up at half time, the championship was won and the celebrations began. I honestly believe that Luton would have beaten any team in the land on that first half performance.

We eased off a bit in the second period - the team that is, not the supporters. The job had been done and Crewe were merely toyed with for the rest of the match. No further goals were added but the excitement reached fever pitch as that final whistle approached. For a young schoolboy such as I it was a magical moment, a wonderful night.

The players did a lap of honour chairing Branston to receive the wild acclaim of those fans who had waited so long for something to celebrate. Even Frenchie, usually so surly, managed a laugh that night!

So I wonder what 24th April 2008 holds in store? Sod all if Nelkin and his mates stay around much longer. All we'll have is memories of better days - still at least they can't sell those.

ALL CHANGE

Look around the old ground today - look at it very carefully noting all the regular features that your eye usually skips over, taking it for granted. Look at it very carefully from the pitch level to the height of the Kenilworth stand for you will never see it this way again. Now I'm a sentimentalist (shed a tear with me if you remember the Maple boys) but no-one can argue with progress if it is to benefit the majority. So it will be no great surprise that we come back next season to find its all change at Kenilworth Road.

First things first. The plastic era is over. No longer can we all claim to have played on a 1st Division pitch in front of a partizan crowd of 30-odd. Our chance to be spotted by a scout when playing a blinder against a team of 11 year olds have been dashed. The plastic and the revenue that our excursions enjoyed will be lost to the "real

thing". No not coke you plonker - grass.

This replacement will not be easy as the natural (or unnatural) camber of the pitch - remember how it used to be with the Oak Road end being lower than the Kenilworth? - will have to be worked in with drainage and perhaps some form of undersoil heating. It'll be back to bogged down centre circles and penalty areas in winter to be quickly replaced with iced over divots and touch lines in February ending in sanded pitches with very little grass towards the final home games in April.

We can look forward to changes on the terraces with firstly the erection of a small stand adjacent to the main stand. This addition should see the ground looking more compact, nay complete, than before. Then secondly a spruce up for the rest of the ground and grandstand,

facilities, catering and the like.

There might be a necessity to replace the netting above the executive boxes as with the hammering it has taken this season (from Dreyer and co who seem to be going for the most lost balls of the season award) it looks to be on its last legs.

Lastly on the terrace front we have to hope that the Oak Road will see a controlled re-introduction of away fans. Lets face it the police had no trouble dealing with the well behaved West Ham fans back in January. There has got to be some merit in that and also to bring back some atmosphere, revenue and common sense to our old stadium. I say common-sense for where it there any in putting visiting supporters with home fans as presently seen?

I suppose we'll see changes in the playing staff and I do hope that it's not a steady flow away from Kenilworth Road as is the norm. So it might be the last time we see some of our famous faces. Think about that as you are about to shout abuse at one of your favourites. You'd never forgive yourself if your last word to the individual before

his departure, was derogatory.

We'll probably see a new kit (hands up who really believed that the logo and kit could go another season without changing) which will entail us forking out another £27 to look like our heroes.

I hope we see a change in luck and fortune that may be enhanced by the change in refereeing. If this past year has been anything to go by it seems as though the laws and the interpretation of them,

changes weekly.

Lastly - what about us fans - what changes will we go through? 3 months of boredom certainly dulls the braincells and it becomes harder to motivate yourself for the start of each season. Never the less most - if not all - will be back again - itching for the middle of August and the high expectations we have for the side. Wishing for 3pm on the first Saturday of the season the roar of the crowd the rush of excitement and hope that bristles through you - the agony, the extacy, the highs and lows, the joy and the pain.

The Towns directors say they are very pleased indeed that they managed to get 6 camels, because at one time it was believed they'd only receive 3!


They also said the camel shit will come in very handy for spreading on to the new surface to be laid at Kenilworth Road at the end of the season.



TOWN IN RELOCATION SHOCKER



AUSSIE POOLS

With the season almost over another unsuccessful campaign with Littlewoods ends and we turn our attention to the other side of the world. Australia to be exact, to see if exotic sides such as Frankston and Caulfield City can produce that all important three points for a draw and mega-bucks on the pools.

But how many of us actually know who these sides are and what sort of standards they are playing? Not many I'd say.

Now it is well known that the Aussies play a fair few sports, pretty impressively against us Poms in recent years it seems. Rugby League is the game for the folks from Sydney and Brisbane whilst Aussie (no) rules attracts the thugs from Melbourne, Adelaide and Perth. These of course are their winter sports and believe me they do get winters down-under. They are also well attended by spectators with, I might add, very little violence (thought what takes place on the field of play is another thing!!!).

So here's an interesting fact. Australia's second most participated sport (netball is the first) is football or soccer as it is known. The national league consists of roughly a dozen sides mainly from Sydney and Melbourne most of these sides are of ethnic origin i.e. Sydney Olypmic (Greek) Melbourne croatia (Yugoslav), Sunshine George Cross (Maltese) and get a great deal of money from their respective communities. However they play to crowds of anything between 1,500 to 8,000.

The standard of these games can vary as much as attendances. A good game could be compared to perhaps a top 4th Division one whereas a poor game may not reach the heights of a Beazer homes match. There are a few ex-football league players doing battle in these games, the majority past their best but doing O.K. in the sunshine!

These games are usually officiated by a referee and two linesmen who come up to the crap standards we are used to here on a Sunday morning. Some things never change.

Anyway to put it into its true context would you consider doing the pools and having big money resting on Shillington versus Leighton Town or Luton O.B. versus Harlington. I think not.

When you check your coupons in the months to come you'll probably realize that you've got no chance as South Yarra put seven past the St. Kilda keeper. But then again Caulfield City and Frankston draw two all with an 89th minute goal from Joe Mangle giving you 22 points. You're guids in! Remember where you read it first. (Any chance of a tenner mate?)



I am writing to you about the Luton v West Ham FA Cup tie. I had a ticket, provided by a club member, for the Kenilworth Road terrace. When I approached the turnstiles a policeman refused me entry as the club member had already gone inside the ground. I went to the ticket office but they would not help. I was told that it was a condition that the member had to be with me, but this was the first I had heard of it and I was not amused at having paid for a valid ticket - four days previously - and having travelled from London.

I tried reasoning - I asked if another member could vouch for me. I pointed out that they could check that my ticket had been bought by the person I said had got it. At 2.55 I left the ticket office after being told I would not get into the ground.

I would like to inform you I did get into the ground with the co-operation of two of your members. Inside the ground I again met and talked to home supporters disillusioned with the ticket/membership scheme. The atmosphere with many other West Ham supporters in the home section was good humoured.

I feel great sympathy for Luton supporters. They have been used as a political band wagon by David Evans, an opportunist totally out of touch with real supporters. The result - the ridiculous plastic, no atmosphere, a computerized ticket system that doesn't work. (My tickets have never worked, at the league cup semi final my terrace ticket got me into your main stand) a reputation as a miserable unfriendly club that most neutrals want relegated. Is this club really a model for the future of football? I don't think so and you should be grateful for the few supporters you still have - vou don't deserve them. If we are ever drawn against you in the cup again I shall become a member to get a ticket for this reason I cannot sign this letter. THE WAYNE TURNER INTERVIEW

WAYNE, TELL US HOW IT ALL STARTED. WHERE WERE YOU BORN AND WHEN? Born 9.3.61 in Luton

DID YOU HAVE ANY AMBITIONS AS A LAD AND DID YOU HAVE A CAREER IN MIND?

I was dedicated to being a footballer, but if I wasn't I would have been a painter/decorator which I am today.

HOW DID YOU START OUT IN FOOTBALL?

The first proper team I played for was the 3rd Chiltern Cubs team as centre forward aged 9. I played against Kerry Dixon and we were the top scorers in the league (what happened to me?)

WHEN WAS IT THAT LUTON CAME INTO THE SCENE AND HOW DID IT FEEL TO BE PART OF THE YOUTH TEAM SET UP?

Luton spotted me playing from 12-16 for a very successful Luton schools team. We won 4 trophy's in that time and 7 of the players signed app's for professional clubs. I signed for Luton.

DAVID PLEAT WAS MANAGER AT THAT TIME OF COURSE AND WAS RENOWNED FOR HIS YOUTH POLICY. DID HE HELP YOU AND OTHER LADS IN ANY WAY AT THIS EARLY STAGE?

David Pleat always encouraged us all to play football and we worked on our technique all the time.

YOU WERE PART OF THE YOUTH TEAM THAT WON THE EASTERN JUNIOR CUPFINAL IN 1978. HOW DID THAT FEEL?

We had a great youth team at that time and to win the cup capped a great season for me. I also won the young player of the year award.

YOUR FULL LEAGUE DEBUT WAS AT HOME TO CAMBRIDGE UNITED ON AUGUST 18TH 1979 WHEN YOU SLOTTED IN A LEFT BACK. WHAT DO YOU REMEMBER ABOUT THAT DAY IN A 1-1 DRAW?

My actual league debut was against Wrexham away, replacing Alan West in midfield. We lost 2-0 but I really enjoyed it, playing in front of a large crowd. It was the last game of the 78/79 season. Playing against Cambridge was my home debut, the start of next season. There was two things I remember. One was I was playing left back which was strange to me and I had to stop a quick black winger called Christie (I've never met a slow one) and the noise of the crowd was great except I couldn't shout to Ricky Hill or Kirk Stephens because they couldn't hear me. To was a weird feeling at the time. Now it makes me laugh.

YOU STRUGGLED TO GET INTO THE SIDE FOR 2 SEASONS. DID THIS HIT YOUR CONFIDENCE AND DID YOU FEEL THAT A MOVE WAS NECESSARY?

I knocked on David Pleats door all the time asking to be in the team if not he should sell me. Thankfully he wouldn't, but he sent me on loan to Lincoln which changed my whole life. Going to the third division gave me a chance of regular 1st team football which I loved, but also I realized the 1st division was the place to be a player for as long as possible

EVENTUALLY THE BREAKS CAME IN THE PROMOTION WINNING SEASON OF 1981/2 AND INDEED YOUR FIRST SENIOR LEAGUE GOAL AGAINST CAMBRIDGE. WHAT DO YOU REMEMBER ABOUT THAT AND THAT GLORIOUS SEASON?

I had 4 great months at Lincoln playing 20 games and only losing

1. I came back full of confidence and got back in the Luton team















at left back. I played most games until the end but I missed out on a championship medal by 1 game. My goal against Cambridge was special because it was my 1st also it was on the T.V. I cringe now when I watch it when I look at that hideous beard I was wearing. Though it was a great season for the club for me it finished in disappointment. The night we were down the town hall showing the fans the cup, Lincoln were playing their last league game against Fulham which they had to win to go up. They drew 1-1, so I lost out on a medal with Luton and promotion with Lincoln all on the same night

THAT FIRST SEASON BACK IN DIVISION 1 WAS UNFORGETTABLE. YOU PLAYED 29 LEAGUE APPEARANCES WITH 1 GOAL TO YOUR CREDIT. THE EVENTFUL YEAR HAD MANY HIGHS AND LOWS, TALK US THROUGH SOME
That season in division 1 all I remember was goals, goals and goals. We scored about 60 and conceded about 80, and seemed to be on T.V.

We scored about 60 and conceded about 80, and seemed to be on T.V. every week. The 2 most vivid games were Brighton at home when we won 5-0. I scored with an over head kick and the very next game v Liverpool away when we drew 3-3 after using 3 goalkeepers.

YOU WERE SUBSTITUTED IN THE MAN CITY MATCH FOR THE EVENTUAL MATCH WINNER RADDY ANTIC. WHAT DO YOU REMEMBER ABOUT THE LAST 4 MINUTES OF THE GAME AND THE AFTER MATCH CELEBRATION?

The Man City game was of course special. I remember sitting on the bench when Raddy replaced me (what a bad substitution) and being far more nervous than when I was playing. David Pleat was exhausted with tension and actually fainted for a short time.



Then the whistle went, we had won, unbelievable!! I ran on the pitch to celebrate when we were attacked by the City fans. We fought our way off the pitch and up to the dressing rooms where the celebrations started. We stopped at a hotel on the way home, then when we got back to Luton me and Walshy went to a night club, opened a bottle of champagne and enjoyed every pat on the back, which weeks and months before had been knives in our backs. (Especially mine) It was sweet.

THE FOLLOWING SEASON SAW GROWTH IN NOT ONLY YOURSELF BUT ALSO IN THE TEAM. WHAT WAS IT LIKE PLAYING WITH THE LIKES OF BASHER, HORTON, HILL, STEIN, MOSS AND THE "NEW BLOOD" LIKE FOSTER AND HARFORD? The next season was the same as the last proving myself again, except this time I was playing more in midfield and had the players you mentioned playing along side me.

84/85 WILL ALWAYS BE REMEMBERED FOR THE GREAT CUP RUN WITH YOUR STRIKE AGAINST WATFORD AS ONE OF THE SWEETEST MOMENTS. WAS THE SEMI-FINAL AT VILLA PARK YOUR GREATEST OR WORST DAY IN FOOTBALL? 84/85 was the season Brian Horton left allowing me to play in my favourite centre of midfield position. Scoring the goal against Watford and playing in the semi-final was brilliant, but again it finished sadly. After playing most of the season in the league side David Pleat brought Peter Nicholas and that was that.

DID LUTON AND YOURSELF PART COMPANY AMICABLY?
I was fed up playing out of position and when they brought Peter I new I had to go.

WHERE DID YOU GO TO AND HOW DO YOU FIND THE RECENT SEASONS AT BARNET? I signed for Coventry and was made captain and played 16 games leading the team at some great grounds, but then I got 2 bad tackles to my knee and ankle ligaments and with two injuries combined I was out for 8 months and that was that. I was sold to Brentford. Again at Brentford I was plagued by injury and I moved on to Barnet. My 1st season was a total success. We won the league cup and got runner up player of the year and also goal of the season. I missed the whole of last season because of 2 prolapsed discs in my back which I had removed. This season has been up and down. We've had a good F A Cup run and again were challenging for the league, but I've just had a small op on my knee to repair a torn cartalidge.

THE "CONFERENCE" IS TOUGH AND IT IS A CREDIT TO YOUR STRENGTH THAT YOU ARE STILL PLAYING. WHO DO YOU FEEL IS UP AND COMING IN THIS ENVIRONMENT?

There are some good players in our league and our team like, Andrew Clarke, Mick Bodley, Gary Poole and many more.

HAS THERE BEEN ANY ONE INFLUENCE IN YOUR CAREER?

The one influence on my career when I was very young was my mum and dad then as I got older it was David Pleat, Danny Bergafa and David Coates all from Luton F.C.

HOW LONG DO YOU FEEL YOU WILL BE ABLE TO PLAY?
I enjoy my football now more than ever so I'll keep playing as long as my body will allow. (If I did what it's telling me I would have packed up years ago)

HAVE YOU ANY WISH FOR THE FUTURE?
My only wish football ways is to stay in the game as long as possible whether as a player, coach or manager.

DO YOU SEE ANY OF THE OLD FACES STILL?

I still go out regularly with Paul Walsh, Rob Johnson and Frankie
Burn. Also I see a lot of the other lads just by chance.

WILD BILLS HICCUP

In the match programme for the visit of West Ham in the Z D Cup, I was stirred by an interesting column from Mr Bill Tomlins. (Is there anything interesting in the programme apart from the team sheet which is out of date and the statistics you ask?) Mr Tomlins was replying in a roundabout way, to criticism from Luton supporters over the amount of away fans attending the Arsenal game at Kenilworth Road on December the 8th. These grievances were probably due to the fact that the writer was standing in close proximity to some Arsenal fans and possibly felt uncomfortable by their presence.

Mr Tomlins argued the case that those people attending the game must have been guests of Luton Town members and therefore under the guesting policy (allowing a member to purchase 3 tickets prior to the game) these supporters were welcome as long as they abided by the rules.

He also stressed that people - and even Luton supporters - still have misconceptions that we have a ban on away supporters here at Luton. He added that this was incorrect due to the aforementioned guesting policy.

Overall Mr Tomlins handled the complaint well and smoothed a few ruffled feathers, but I would like to point out a few home truths about the scheme.

- 1) Luton have issued 25,000 membership cards. How many do you honestly believe to be in the hands of genuine Luton supporters and how many in the hands of supporters of other sides who just have a ticket for the visit of their side to Kenilworth Road?
- 2) How do we control the presence of these supporters when they are spread around the entire ground?
- 3) What happens to an away supporter that doesn't know anyone that can vouch for him?

What can the club do about this? The club you ask, why should the club be involved? Afterall Mr Tomlins states in his article that the guesting policy is in the hands of the members. Oh really?!!

The club has issued these membership cards willy nilly to anyone that has called or written to them. We <u>all</u> know of cases where individuals have gone to the club offices and just because the address they give is a local one - a membership card is duly issued to that address. Similarly it must be the case for written applications. How can one disprove that a London address does not house an exiled Luton supporter. I'm not saying its easy to administer but it wasn't the fans that wanted this scheme - even after the Millwall disgrace (anyway thats a different subject we could talk all day about). So I find it unacceptable that the club do not shoulder the responsibility of the general running of the scheme.

This expulsion, therefore, of opposing fans who do not have a ticket or someone to vouch for them causes 1) loss of revenue and a chance to reach capacity figures for "big" home matches 2) A demand for tickets to be made available by other means. I'm not defending any touting but the club must see that the ban does create an illicit demand which does need to be filled. There also is the safety aspect (taking us back to Millwall eh?) where if a club like Spurs or Chelsea have an unruly element unable to get inside how can 49 police officers spread around the ground handle a situation if it were to develop God forbid.

Once inside the ground the problem becomes increasingly difficult as we are asking the same policemen to deal with potential "incidents" all around the ground as there is no segregation.

Bill also complained that if we did not have the guesting policy then there would be no way in which the capacity could be reached. I find this difficult to defend as surely Lutons attempted "Away fans ban" has been breached - local people decline to turn up to these matches for fear of trouble by these away fans - the very point that the original writer was trying to make me thinks.

Still the article did end on some sort of positive note as Bill stated the obvious saying that if we had to separate guests from the members who purchased their tickets that would mean that the club was

operating a visitors scheme.

Well Mr Tomlins - all I can say is tell that to the other 91 Football League clubs who we are allowed to visit, and re-read the reports issued after the Bradford and Hillsborough disasters that state that the number of Police Officers required at a football event is slightly less than those currently in attendance for a "home only" crowd. Happy reading Bill.
