INTRODUCTORY

SINCE last year considerable changes have taken place within the Club, the personnel of the directorate, and the team. Mr. Ernest Gibbs has been succeeded in the Chairmanship by Councillor Charles Jeyes, and Mr. Philip Wright and Mr. Hugh Woods have succeeded to the seats formerly held by Councillor H. R. Hansell and Mr. Willet Ball.

Mr. Ernest G. Gibbs definitely refused to retain the chairmanship of the Luton Town directorate last April, and the directors chose Councillor Charles Jeyes as his successor. Mr. Gibbs, who was elected in 1929, had been vice-chairman to Alderman Harry Arnold for many years, and had been associated with the Club almost as long as the latter. After the war, Alderman Arnold could not give so much time to the club as formerly, and Mr. Gibbs undertook most of the duties that are now on the shoulders of the manager.

Councillor Jeyes will not shirk the job, which has been described as the most unpleasant in the country. He has been a very keen member of the Board for six years, and those who follow his public service closely, know that he is forthright in his actions as he is outspoken in his opinions, for he does not hesitate to speak his mind when occasion arises. When he was asked to stand for the directorate he bought the biggest block of shares purchased by any individual for some

years, and he has always endeavoured to secure the interest of his friends in the club. In local and country administrations he takes a prominent part, and in Methodist circles he holds many offices. He is a very keen bowler, and is Chairman of Luton Town Bowling Club. Every supporter of the club will wish him success, and his cheery nature will enable him to disarm those who criticise and complain most.

Mr. Philip Wright, who succeeds Councillor Hansell, who resigned owing to pressure of public business, began his association with the Board in a practical way, for he unloaded a nice little parcel of shares within a week or ten days of being elected.

Tribute was paid by the Chairman to the service of Mr. Willet Ball following his resignation from the directorate. The directors may have seemed tardy in filling the vacancy, but their choice will give full satisfaction, for it means the return to the Board of Mr. E. Hugh Woods. Especially will the large following from Dunstable be gratified, and Mr. Woods can rightly be included among them, for he has been a regular and generous supporter for quite thirty years, including his previous time on the Board, which was from 1908 to the end of the war.

Mr. Woods is as keen on the game as ever, in spite of other public work, and the directors are to be congratulated on having enlisted the co-operation of a really fine sport.

Concurrently with the changes has been the acquisition of the ground by the Club, and this has been a move that has given great satisfaction to the sup-

porters. For the first time in its long and chequered history, the Club owns the ground, and it is believed that this will have a salutary effect on the morale of the supporters.

Though the achievements of the teams in League and London Combination programmes were not up to the average since the War, the first team eclipsed all previous records in the F.A. Cup Competition by reaching the sixth round of the Competition Proper in spite of being drawn away from home in four of the six rounds. Undoubtedly the success in this Competition had an adverse effect on their play in League matches.

The end of the season saw only ten of the players retained, and this necessitated the engagement of more new players than in any season during the last five years. The directors have taken the line that experienced men should be acquired, and have proceeded cautiously in their commitments. Practically all the new players have seen service with First Division clubs, and particular attention has been paid to the attack, so the season opens with hopes higher than for many years. This has involved the club in heavy expenses, but it should earn the reward in better gates and should increase the body of loyal supporters.

There is every reason to regard the new adventure with enthusiasm, and with goodwill and co-operation all round this should be a memorable season.

Makes a welcome return to the Board after a lapse of twenty years. Member of County Council, been Mayor of Dunstable, and supporter of every good cause possible. An enthusiast in all forms of sport, and particularly of football.

MR. PHILIP WRIGHT.

Was pressed into office at a difficult time, but has been a good supporter for many years, and carries some of the enthusiasm of the ordinary follower into the Board room.

OFFICIALS OF THE CLUB

Mr. Harold Wightman (Secretary-Manager).

Had an honourable career as a player, and during a period of nearly twenty years wore the colours of Chesterfield at the beginning and at the end, and in between those of Notts Forest and Derby County. With last-named club was captain for several seasons, including their promotion years. Also had a term with Notts County as coach and assistant manager before coming to Luton two seasons ago. Though disappointed in his hopes of raising a promotion side, his encouragement and example had much to do with the record run in the Cup Competition.

Horace Pakes (Trainer).

Lutonian who made the Club a hobby for a quarter of a century before he became the first team trainer. Starts his seventh season in that capacity and feels younger than when he first took over the job. Is as popular with the players as with the supporters, and as eager as anyone connected with the club officially or otherwise for the return to the Second Division—for it was in those far-off days that he began his long term of voluntary service.



Arthur Pembleton (Assistant Trainer).

Born at Palterton, Chesterfield, and played for Notts County, Millwall Athletic and Norwich City before securing the appointment at Luton last season but one. Has made a study of the more skilled phases allied to the duties of trainer, and is a fully qualified masseur. Is a mentor to young players, and has done much to develop some of the younger members. Should have a longer and more successful career as a trainer than as a player.

Bert Day (Groundsman).

Comes next to Horace Pakes in length of service, and as a whole-time man exceeds even the trainer, for he undertook the difficult job of training the grass crop fifteen years ago. Players come and players go, but Bert goes on for ever, it seems. Is still hoping for the day when he will find the Club able to undertake all the many improvements that are required to get the best harvest from his labours.

AS with all similar organisations, when the new Luton Football Supporters Club began, there was a fair amount of enthusiasm, a dose of suspicion, and a lot of criticism. Without setting the Thames on fire, the Club did a little useful work, and then had its inevitable bad spell, and so for some months was in almost a moribund condition.

With the end of last season, however, there came something of a revival, and during this close season, following the acquisition of the ground by the Town F.C., strenuous attempts are being made to make the Club a live force. Though no wealthy patronage has been secured, the figure of £300 has been obtained in less than two years for the Town F.C., and it is hoped to do better this season.

The Town F.C. have made arrangements for the provision of a hut on the ground, and this will be accessible to all supporters. It is hoped that all followers of the Town will join the Club, and so ensure that the directors will be constantly in touch with the opinions as well as the needs of the crowd.

New membership cards are now available for the forthcoming season, and it would be by no means out

of proportion with the attendances if we can enlist a thousand members by September 1st. The membership fee is only 1/-, and there is no need here to stress the fact the Town Club are in urgent need of funds. It is further desired to make progress with the scheme for the provision of a stand on the lane side, but the first consideration must be the maintenance of the Club, and big schemes must wait until funds are sufficient to permit of the larger efforts.


A "Stop-Watch" Competition has been running during the close season, and three valuable prizes are offered. And to those who have not yet had cards we make an appeal to obtain a card from the Secretary, or subscribe generously to those already issued. prominently in his window in order that all our members and those interested in football could patronize those traders who are trying to do their best to raise the standard of football in Luton.


The minimum subscription is 10/6, and the Hon. Secretary will be only too pleased to receive from traders their applications for membership.
