FOREWORD

THE high hopes which were entertained at this stage last year that the Town would give us the excitement of taking part in the promotion struggle were not realised, and following the wave of optimism on which the season began, results were rather disappointing.

At Easter, the shadow of relegation seemed to be crossing the threshold, but a great finish in which 11 points were gained from eight matches, enabled the Town to reach 13th place in the League table.

This successful run was a triumph for team spirit, and if that form can be reproduced in the matches in August and September, then the foundations may well be laid for an excellent seasor.

Main problem for the Town is whether the attack can score goals consistently, and this may well make the difference between a season of triumph and one of mere mediocrity.

On paper, the defence looks strong enough for anything, and strength in this department is regarded as a safe insurance by many clubs in these days.

However, matches can only be won by scoring goals, and that the Town realise this is proved by their unremitting search for forwards during the summer months.

The Town figured sensationally as sellers during the past season with the result that Hughes, Gager and Billington left the club in exchange for big fees.

More recently, Soo and Connelly have found new quarters, and, remembering the entertainment these five players provided for the Kenilworth-road habituees, we wish them all possible success.

Even more fervently do we hope that the present Luton players will enjoy that luck without which the best of teams can struggle in vain. Chiltern

THE CHAIRMAN'S MESSAGE

"WE hope that this may be Luton's season for promotion, but if it is not, I can promise that the ultimate aim will not be relaxed."

This sentence appeared in my message in the "Luton News Football Handbook" for last season, and despite the criticisms which have been levelled at the Board at different times, those words remain true to-day.

My aim, which is backed by my fellow-members of the Board, is to take the club into the First Division, and all the moves we make have this end in view.

The search to strengthen the weak spots in the team has gone on relentlessly during the summer months, and if it has not been attended with all the success we had hoped, that does not mean that the search is over.

We shall not rest until Luton has a top-class team, and we believe that we have a sound nucleus in the players already on the books, and who saved us in the closing matches last season.

Apart from the immediate future, the Directors have been looking to the more distant days when more accommodation than Kenilworth-road can ever hope to provide will be necessary.

The acquisition of a new ground in Dunstable-road is a guide to future developments, though it may be many years before League football is played there.

However, the initial outlay could easily be repaid several times by the development of local youngsters which will now be given a greater impetus.

When such things become possible; we intend to improve and enlarge the accommodation at Kenilworth-road and, in the meantime, I would ask for the fullest measure of support during the coming season.







DAVID LINDSAY (Full-back)





NORMAN DAY (Right-half)



MELVILLE DANIEL (Inside-forward)



JOHN SANDER-SON (Groundsman)


Had his playing career cut short by a knee injury, much to the disappointment of the Board who regarded
