## FOREWORD

SEASON 1949-50 will be remembered chiefly by Luton Town fans as one of disappointment, relieved only by the fighting rally made in the closing stages.

For weeks the shadow of a return to the Third Division hung darkly over the Club, and it was only after a tremendous struggle that such a fate was avoided.

Not until the 41st League match was it certain that the Town would remain in the Second Division, but they finished with a successful run, in which 15 points were earned from the last 12 matches, only one of which was lost.

A continuance of that form would mean a useful start to the new season.

Lack of scoring power was the main trouble last campaign, for there was little wrong with the defence. The forwards averaged less than a goal a match, a failing which was reflected in a drop in the average attendance from 17,765 to 16,032, despite the fact that a new ground record was made when 'Spurs were the visitors.

Further disappointment was contained in the early dismissal from the F.A. Cup, for there is nothing like a Cup run to maintain interest in the second half of the season.

What will 1950-51 bring? Better things, we hope, and, if this is to be, then there must be better results from the forwards.

Admittedly, the Club did not have the best of luck in that they were deprived by injuries of the services of Arnison and Kiernan for a long period.

The defence, two members of which, Bud Aherne and Bernard Streten, achieved International honours, will be substantially the same. Big query about the coming season would seem to be whether a match-winning blend can be achieved in attack.

If it is, then Luton Town's star should be in the ascendancy once more.

I have faith in the future of League football in Luton, and I would appeal to supporters to give these youthful players and, indeed, all the Club's players, every possible encouragement.

The voice of the barracker is heard too often at Kenilworth Road, and this can have nothing but an adverse effect on the play of the men at whom the barracking is directed.

(Team Manager)

Has one of the most famous names in football, for he was Scotland's outside-left in home Internationals on nine occasions between 1933 and 1938. He also went on tour with the Scottish party to Canada and the United States. Curious point about his career is that he never played in Scottish League football, for he came South at the age of 18 to join Hull City. Moved on to Derby County and gained a Cup-winners' medal with them in 1946. Two of his contemporaries in that team, Raich Carter and Peter Doherty, are also managers of Second Division clubs, Hull City and Doncaster Rovers respectively. Dally first came to Luton in 1946 as player-coach, was made player-manager in 1947 and team manager at the end of the 1947-48 season.

(Secretary)

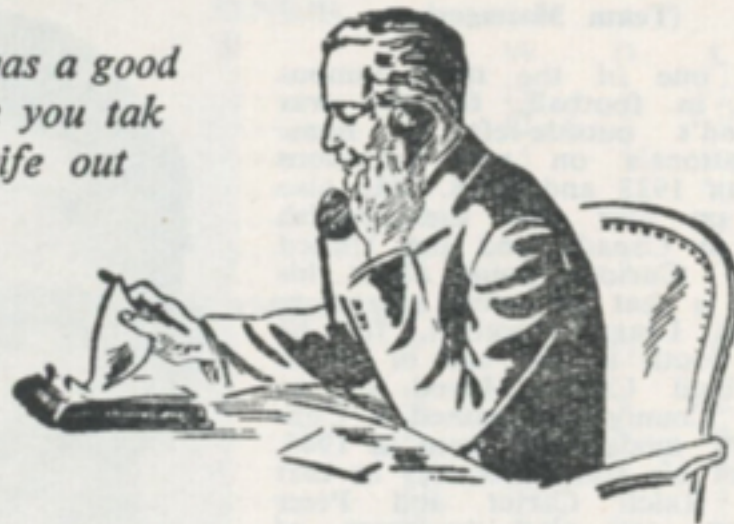

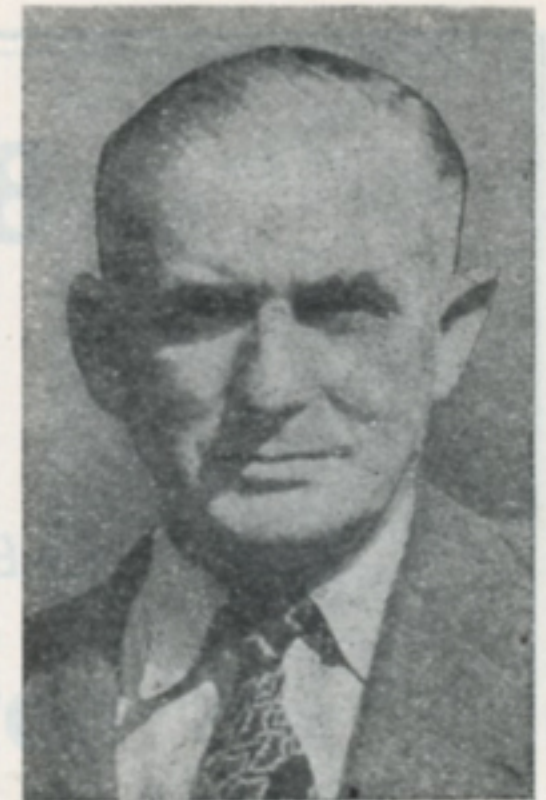

## HUBERT DAY (Chief Scout)

Began his connection with the Town Club in the early days of the Colts' team in the South Midlands League, and was so successful in building up a successful side here that he was invited to join the full-time staff three years ago. He did so, and, since then, has had a considerable amount to do with the getting together of the band of promising youngsters which is on the Town's books to-day. His most successful piece of business, of course, was the signing of Bob Brennan from Belfast Distillery for a modest £2 000. The Town pocketed a profit of £18,000 when Brennan joined Birmingham City. Has other notable captures to his credit, and has built up the reputation of being a shrewd judge of a player.



## RALPH HANN (Trainer)

When there was a vacancy for a trainer at Kenilworth Road following the retirement of Arthur Pembleton, Dally Duncan immediately thought of his former Derby County team-mate, Ralph Hann, who was then trainer to Crystal Palace. Ralph accepted the offer of a move to Luton, and in the three seasons he has been here he has made a complete success of the job. Skilled in the treatment of injuries, a subject he has studied deeply, Ralph has the complete confidence of the players, which is a big thing in any club. For 14 seasons he was with Derby as a wing-half. Was born at Whitburn, and signed for Newcastle United as a professional, after he had been on Sunderland's list of amateurs, but had received few chances.

**TOM MACKEY**  
(Trainer)

No one on the Kenilworth Road staff can compare with Tom so far as length of service to the Club is concerned, for he has been here since 1932 and was a member of the team that raised the Town into the Second Division. He reached Luton via Hartlepool United and Sheffield Wednesday, with whom he played at centre-half. It was for this position that the Town secured him, but he was converted into a dour, rugged full-back, who gave of his best for the whole 90 minutes of each match. Tom's biggest triumphs were in those memorable Cup-ties of the 1930's, but one of his most pleasant recollections is of the match in which, after moving to outside-right because of injury, he scored twice against Burnley. Has been on the training staff since 1938.



**JOHN SANDERSON**  
(Groundsman)

Was one of the Town's first big captures after the war, for they paid a sizeable fee to Wolves for his transfer, and he played some sparkling games at full-back. Quickly became a prime favourite at Kenilworth Road, but then a knee injury laid him aside for quite a time. Several times he came into the team to play gallantly under severe handicap and there were hopes that an operation would put the trouble right. However, this did not prove to be the case, and he was forced to give up the game when at the peak of his career. However, he did not wish to sever his connection with football, and the Town appointed him groundsman, a move they have never regretted.

His chance this season will depend on R.A.F. duties, for he was called up during the summer. The Town are hoping that he will be stationed near enough to Luton to make some appearances for them. His father is Tim Kelly, former Irish amateur international, Fulham and Vauxhall Motors' inside-forward, who is now coaching under the Football Association scheme.

(Left-half)

Qualifies for the title of the club's utility man, for he has played in every position in the forward line and had long spells at centre-forward and inside-left last season. Wherever he plays, this Scot from Elgin gives of his best, but there is no doubt that his best displays for the club came after he had moved into the middle line. His usefulness here was first discovered at West Ham last season when an injury to Doug Gardiner caused a re-shuffle and Shanks turned in a performance that made a deep impression. Eventually he superseded Gardiner as the regular left-half. Came to Luton originally as an outside-right after having a trial period with Chelsea.



DOUGLAS GARDINER  
(Left-half)

Is the Town's longest serving player, for it was way back in 1938 that he first came to Kenilworth Road as a Scottish junior who had played for Auchinleck Talbot. The war, during which he spent three and a half years as a prisoner-of-war, delayed the recognition of his worth by the award of a first-team place, but since normal football was resumed he has been one of the Town's stalwarts and, for the greater part of three seasons, has been the club captain. Was in the League team on 33 occasions last season, and towards the end when the Town were struggling to stave off the relegation bogey he figured at outside-left. Was appointed coach to the younger players last season and had charge of the London Mid-week League team. It may be that the greater part of his future work for the club will lie along these lines.

Was then an inside-forward of promise and did well in the Colts' team in that position. Was even more successful though when moved into the middle line during last season, and the Town think they have in him the makings of a first-class wing-half. Will doubtless be allowed to continue in this position this season, and if he develops along the same lines he should be ready for further promotion before very long. ## **ALEX GLOVER** (Outside-right)

The Town paid Bradford £8,000 for the transfer of this clever Scottish winger at the end of September last year. Made 32 appearances in the League side and impressed as one of the best ball players on the books, though his effectiveness was cut down to a certain extent by a liking for attempting too much. If he could only combine directness with his undoubted cleverness, he would be one of the best wingers in the country, and the Town are hoping that he will achieve this this season. First caught the limelight whilst playing with Partick Thistle, and it cost Bradford a considerable fee to induce the Scottish club to part with him. He had 18 months at Park Avenue, and played splendid games against the Town on several occasions.



## **WILLIAM HAVENGA** (Outside-right)

Joins a fellow South African at Kenilworth Road in Billy Arnison. Havenga left his native country to join Birmingham City during the 1948—49 season, and the Town paid a substantial fee for his transfer on May 11. Havenga is something of a utility man, for he can play on either extreme wing, and has also taken a turn at inside-left with Birmingham. At St. Andrew's he found his first team opportunities limited and was in the league team only once. However, he did well for the Reserves and the Town Reserves have cause to remember him, for he had two very good games against them last season. He is the sort of winger who gets on with the job without any unnecessary frills, and he likes to cut in to have a crack at goal. Aged 23, he stands 5ft. 7in. and weighs nearly 11 stone.

Another 18-years-old player who is doing his National Service in the R.A.F., Cullen was recommended to the Town by Doug Gardiner, who had seen him play in Scottish junior football. An extremely clever manipulator of the ball, he has the makings of a star when he learns to cut out some of the over-elaboration which characterised much of his play last season. For one so young, he is a brilliant ball player, and if his talent can be directed along the right lines, then the Town have picked up a winner here. He makes up in cleverness for what he lacks in speed, and he can crack a ball hard when the opportunity arises.



**GEORGE STOBART**  
(Inside-forward)

It is difficult to nail down Stobart to one particular position, for although he made his debut at inside-left, he sampled centre-forward, inside-right and outside-right in quick succession. Achieved his biggest success for the Town from inside-right when he scored four goals in eight minutes against Blackburn on a waterlogged ground last November. However, his work at centre-forward in the later stages of last season had much to do with the Town avoiding relegation, for although he did not score the number of goals he deserved, he worked tremendously hard. He is the Town's most expensive player, for a fee of about £12,000 changed hands when he left Newcastle last October. Before going to the United he had a spell with Middlesbrough.

(Inside-left)

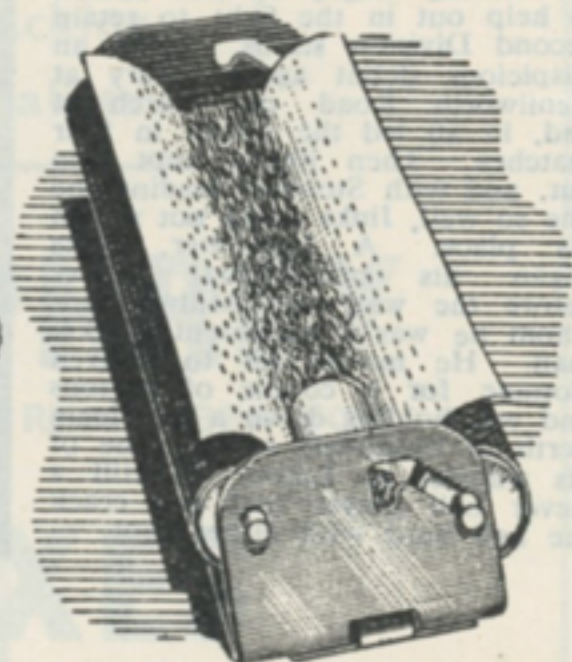

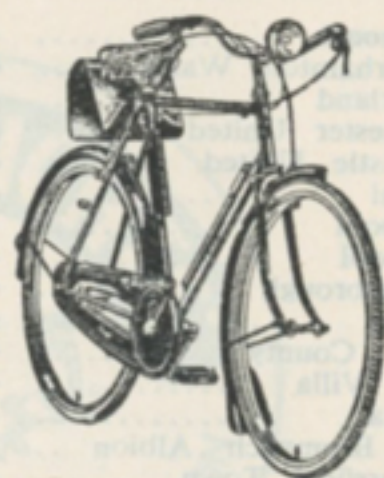

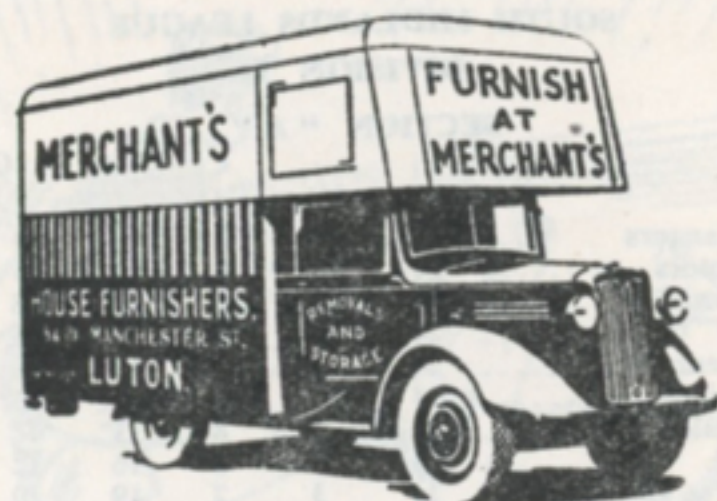
