SUMMER PEACE WAS DISTURBED BUT ALL IS SMOOTH AGAIN

WHAT would otherwise have been a peaceful summer of quiet preparation for the new season was somewhat disturbed by the stormy weeks during which the constitution of the Luton Town F.C. Board was in dispute and doubt.

Upshot was the regrettable resignation of the former Chairman, Mr. Charles Jeyes, after 27 years with the club and, although he still maintains the office of President, he will not take an active part in running the affairs of the club.

Now, with the situation more stable and a new Chairman in Mr. P. G. Mitchell and a new Director in a former Town captain, Mr. T. Hodgson, appointed, the clouds have rolled away, and the last weeks have been devoted towards getting everything smoothly into gear again.

THE PRIME OBJECTIVE

Fears that the upset might cause repercussion on the field will almost certainly be groundless and it is now up to the Board to pursue the ambitious progressive policy to which they are committed.

We have the word of the new Chairman that promotion to the First Division, which was within reach during the last two seasons, remains the prime objective of the club, and he for one will not rest until it is achieved.

"If we fail, it will not be for the want of trying," said Mr. Mitchell in taking over his new post and he also said that both he and his fellow-Directors want to be judged on the results they achieve and not by optimistic statements.

Nothing could be fairer than that, and the Luton football public, with the assurance that progress is to be the watchword, will back the Board to the hilt.

So, with the trouble behind them, the Board can afford to look forward to the new season with a certain amount of optimism.

NO SPECTACULAR BUYING

This summer, there has been no spectacular buying by the Town, partly because the club's finances scarcely allow the spending of big money and partly because the fixed idea is that the material needed to land the elusive prize is already on the books.

Certainly, the Town have some most efficient youngsters who will be making a brave bid for regular first-team places this season, and the combination of youth and tried experience should enable the Town to secure an excellent

blend.

Loyal supporters still believe that the injury to Jesse Pye last December is the sole reason why First Division football is not to be seen at Kenilworth Road this season. The forward line was seldom as dangerous without him and the loss was tragic in the extreme.

Pye is confident that he can make a complete come-back. Whether he will be available for the early matches remains to be seen but, whether he is or not, the accent this season

must be on attack.

Too much reliance was placed last season on the soundness of the defence, while the forwards were too often goal-shy. If the true offensive spirit is shown from the beginning, then promotion can be gained and no one should forget that the fans want to see goals.

GOALS DRAW THE FANS

The way to put the attendances up above the recent average is for the forwards to be among the goals consistently and this is a lesson that should have been assimilated from the events of the closing weeks of last season.

Half the battle towards a successful promotion bid would be a good start, which has been denied the team during the past two seasons, principally because of injuries.

Early last season, the Town were deprived of some of their most experienced players during the vital weeks when

two matches a week were being played.

That they overcame that handicap to such an extent was a tribute to the quality of their play and, once again, they earned the reputation in Second Division circles of

being a team that always tries to play good football as opposed to much of the kick-and-rush stuff that is all too often seen in the present-day brand of the game.

Honours came the way of the players again, with Sid Owen gaining England caps on the Continental tour and being a member of the World Cup team, in addition to playing for the Football League.

"UNFASHIONABLE" NO LONGER

Also making appearances on the International scene for Eire were Bud Aherne, Seamus Dunne and George Cummins, and the Town have been lifted well away from the ruck of those clubs which are branded as "unfashionable."

Much excitement last season was contained in that long drawn-out Cup battle with the holders, Blackpool, who ousted the Town only after four grimly-fought matches, in

three of which the Town held the upper hand.

That performance was another pointer to the quality the team possesses and, if the right blend is secured from the start, we may yet be hanging out the flag of welcome to famous First Division teams this time next year.

NEW BEDS F.A. CHAIRMAN

Mr. Will Pease, of Luton, has been elected Chairman of the Bedfordshire Football Association in place of Mr. F. A. Stanton, who died during July. TOWN SIGN ANOTHER SOUTH AFRICAN

On amateur forms, the Town have secured the signature of Norman Arnison, brother of Billy Arnison, their former centre-forward, who gave up English football after a knee injury, and returned to his home. Norman, a well-built inside or centre-forward, has played in good-class football in South Africa.

He has been training with the full-time professionals since they reported on July 21, and it is expected that he will be signed as a professional in the near future.

DOWNIE JOINS HULL CITY

Only once during the close season did the Town figure in the transfer market, and that was when they transferred their inside-forward, Johnny Downie, to Hull City. Downie, , a £10,000 signing from Manchester United, had been with Luton only 12 months.

INTO THE SOUTHERN LEAGUE

Three of the players not retained by the Town at the end of last season have been signed by clubs in the Southern

League.

Derek Williams, a goalkeeper, and Edgar Bennett, an outside-right, have joined Chelmsford City, and Bob Adamson, whom the Town put on their transfer list at a modest figure, has thrown in his lot with Gravesend.



DALLY DUNCAN (team manager). Gained fame for himself as a great player, and has now built up a reputation for being a shrewd, proficient manager by his part in making the Town the power they have been in the Second Division these last three seasons. Promotion to Division I remains as his first ambition, and he hopes that it will be achieved in this, his eighth season as team manager. Came to Luton in 1946 from Derby County as player - coach, was appointed player-manager on the departure of George Martin, and finally brought his playing career to an end during the 1947-48 Held down the outsideleft position in Scotland's team for a long spell and toured America and Canada with them. His career was crowned when he earned a Cup-winner's medal with Derby County.





PHIL COLEY (secretary). Now back to full health after having been worried by appendix trouble for a long time, and he at last found the time to have an operation during the close season between two of the drawn - out series of meetings of shareholders. Came to the Town eight years ago without previous experience of the running of a League club, but soon settled into the way of things and the secretarial side of things, with its manifold problems, is accomplished in a highly-efficient manner. Takes a keen interest in local football, in which he has served in an administrative capacity. Like many others on the Town's staff, he comes from the north-east of England, but has been in Luton for many years.



TIM KELLY (assistant team manager and coach). Has now had two full seasons in this full-time capacity and has had the satisfaction of seeing all the club's teams reap a highly-satisfactory measure of success during this period. Previously, he served the Town in a part-time capacity as coach while retaining his employment with Vauxhall Motors, for whom he played after he ended his professional career with Fulham. Before he joined the paid ranks, he earned Irish amateur International caps. A most proficient and successful coach, he is still on the Football Association's panel. Spends a lot of time with the younger players on the Town's books, pinpointing their faults and trying to remedy them.





HARRY WRIGHT (trainer). A comparative newcomer to the staff, for he joined only last January after the departure of Ralph Hann to Derby County. Came to the Town from Walsall, and was recommended by Dally Duncan. whose team-mate he was at Derby County. With them, Harry had a longish spell during his playing career as a goalkeeper, his other clubs being Charlton Athletic, Aldershot and Colchester United. He was the Colchester goalkeeper during their phenomenal Cup run before they gained election to the Football League. A qualified F.A. coach, he had a season in Norway and then went as trainer-coach to Guildford City, after which he held a similar position with St. Albans City.



TOM MACKEY (trainer), Needs no introduction to anybody, for he has been at Kenilworth-road for over 20 years and was rewarded for his long and faithful service with a benefit cheque during last season. It was in 1932 that the Town secured him as a centre-half from Sheffield Wednesday, and after a spell there he settled down as a most reliable, strong right-back. In this position he earned a promotion medal when the Town reached the Second Division in 1937, but a year later he hung up his boots to join the training staff. Despite the advance of time he is still fit enough to take an active part in the preseason hectic spell of training. Comes from Cassop, and his first professional club was Hartlepools United. Has another string to his bow these days, for he keeps an inn at Silsoe.





JOHN SANDERSON (groundsman). Often enough the weather makes his a heart-breaking job, and it takes a deal of heavy, hard work to keep the pitch in reasonable trim throughout the winter. For him, it is an all-around-the-year task, for the close season is an important time, and he performs the annual "miracle" of bringing the badlyworn pitch around to perfection in the short time that is available to him. When a knee injury cut short his playing career with the Town, John looked around for a means of keeping in touch with football, and found it when he was offered this job. Quickly he learned what was required, and this softened the blow that the ending of his active career must have been to him. A fullback, he was with Wolves, to whom the Town paid a considerable fee soon after the war.

BERNARD STRETEN (goalkeeper). Played as brilliantly and as confidently as ever last season, when he missed only five League matches and appeared in all the Cup-ties. His tally of League appearances for the Town now amounts to 237-a post-war record for the Club-and so consistent was he last season that many people thought he was rather unlucky not to be among the four goalkeepers who went on England's European tour. One of the comparatively few players to be capped as an amateur and to gain full honours as well, Streten has spent all his professional career with the Town and, in the first place, he joined them as an amateur from Shrewsbury Town, then in the Midland League. At that time he was a regular in the R.A.F.





RON BAYNHAM (goalkeeper). The "man in possession" during the latter part of the season before last, and he began in the first team last August, when he was one of those dropped after the sensational 4-4 draw with Oldham Athletic. Came back again and was just reestablishing himself when injury laid him aside, and the opportunity did not come his way again. A fine, safe goalkeeper whose services several other League clubs would welcome, and among those who were angling for his transfer last season were Arsenal. Thinking of the future, the Town refused to part with him, and he will again be a challenger for a senior team place this season. Birmingham-born, he came to the fore with Worcester City in the Southern League.

The Welsh F.A. went so far before one of their matches as to ask the Town if they were prepared to release the player. On that basis, plus the fact that Jones is still in his early twenties, International recognition should not be far away. He was born in Mountain Ash, but has spent nearly all his life in Luton, and attracted notice when playing for Craig Athletic in Luton and South Beds League. Splendidly built for the job, he has two good feet and always endeavours to make use of the ball





SEAMUS DUNNE (right back). One of three Eire Internationals on the Town books, he has been capped in each of the last two seasons. Has always faced strong competition for the right - back position, but, even so, has made 50 Second Division appearances in the last two campaigns. Made his first team debut against West Ham on Boxing Day, 1951. and did so well that he remained in the first team for 14 consecutive matches. 

Because the Club have always been well covered for the full-back position he has not had so many chances as his ability deserved at times, but, if he can regain his earlier form, he should not lack opportunities.



During the past two or three seasons Byb has earned the tag of being one of the strongest and most consistent wing-halves in the Second Division, and there have been times when good judges have wendered why the England selectors have ignored his claims. Nearest he has been to honours so far is to play for an F.A. XI., and he was also in the Football Combination team that played in Holland last season. There were times last year when he was playing under the handicap of an injury, not serious enough to keep him out. but troublesome for all that. Yet he missed only two League games. Many times he was called upon to switch to centre-half as deputy for Owen, Bob is a local and a one-club man, for he has been with the Town since his teens.





TERRY KELLY (right-half). An attack of pneumonia scon after Christmas kept him out of football for some weeks, cost him his place in the Reserve team and deprived him of a Combination medal. SID OWEN (centre-half). For some years Town fans have felt that Owen is as good a player in this position as there is in the country, a fact which the England selectors acknowledged, somewhat belatedly, this summer, when he went on the Continental tour and played against Yugo-slavia and Hungary and was also a member of the World Cup team. In April he played for the Football League against the Scottish League, and 12 months previously he had been in the League side in Copenhagen. Has had seven seasons at Luton since Birmingham let him go for a moderate fee, and it was a shrewd move that converted him from a left-half to his present position, in which he has played many brilliant, dominating games for the Town, whom he captains.





LESLIE HALL (centre-half). Because of Owen's consistency, plus the fact that Morton has shown a real aptitude for the position, Hall's first team chances in the last few seasons have been somewhat limited, but, whenever he has been in, he has never let the side down. To his steadying influence much of the success of the Reserves, who were Combination (Division II) :hampions and Division I runnersup in consecutive years, can be traced, and he has been a grand servant to the Club, which he first joined in 1942. Nearly a local for he hails from St. Albans, Hall has never taken up the game on a fulltime basis, but has retained his job in St. Albans and does his training there in the evenings. 

One of the six players on the books who have received maximum benefits from the Town and is third in line in the matter of League appearances with 207 to his credit in nearly six seasons. Was in tip-top form last season until an injury at the end of February laid him aside, and he did not play again. Muscle trouble. probably aggravated by playing on heavy grounds, was the reason for his long lay-off, and treatment continued well into the close season. However, Watkins hopes that there will be no recurrence and that he will be able to add substantially to his quota of appearances this season. A clever ball player who had a most successful spell at inside forward during the season before last. Watkins arrived at Luton from Glasgow Rangers.





WALLY SHANKS (left-half). A fine, whole-hearted player who. because of the good form of Watkins, had spells out of the first team last season, but came in repeatedly on either flank to give splendid displays, and injury cost him other chances, too. Did not make his customary number of Cup-tie appearances, for he was on twelfth-man duty with the team throughout the series of matches with Blackpool, but when Watkins was injured he had his most regular spell and appeared in the last 11 League games. In all, he was in the first team 25 times and brought his total number of League outings for the Town to 157. Has had over seven seasons with the Club, which he joined originally on trial after a short spell with Chelsea, and it was Joe Payne who recommended him.

Fast and direct, Davies is a worker who never hesitates to go back to challenge and to help the defence. A two-footed player, he has deputised ably for Mitchell on the other wing. During the summer he has been prominent in cricket circles when playing for Luton Town and Bedfordshire, and is the fastest bowler in the county. Came to this country originally for a trial with Manchester City, but eventually threw in his lot with Clyde, from whom the Town secured him, and he is now beginning his fourth season here.

Might very we'll have made more than eight appearances in the League team but for an injury in the home match with Birmingham, when he dislocated his shoulder, and that kept him out of the game for a longish spell. A member of the young Reserves' forward line. from which much is expected in the future. Cullen is a very clever manipulator of the ball who sometimes tends to hold up things by over-elaboration. Was not always on the target with his shooting last season, when he had a period during which little would go right in his finishing, but, even so, he was the leading scorer with 16 League goals, and also scored 11 in friendly matches. Of the latter, seven were obtained during the Eire tour, when he scored three times in each of the games with Blackburn Rovers. Was one of the players who was asked to try to solve the problem left by the injury to Jesse Pye but did not settle down in the middle, for he is more suited to the open spaces at inside forward, and the experiment is unlikely to be repeated. Undoubtedly a matchwinner. Turner, who was born at Doncaster and whose father played for the Rovers and Hull City, is a convert from right-half.





Because he has been something of a wanderer so far as positions on the field are concerned, it is difficult to pin Scott down to one, but inside-right is the one he prefers Yet, most of his first team outings have been either at outside-right or centre-forward in each of which he had a run last season. There were hopes that his dash and persistence would enable him to take over in the middle when Pye was injured, but he himself was injured during the Christmas programme and, afterwards, found his opportunities somewhat limited. Hails from the north-east and was signed by the Town for quite a substantial fee from Spennymoor. Before that, he had a spell with Newcastle United.





JESSE PYE (centre-forward). All Luton hopes that he will be able to make a quick come-back in the first team after his enforced lay-off since last December with a fractured ankle sustained at Oldham. 

BERT MITCHELL (outside-left). Had a most unlucky season, for, just before the start of it, he suffered the loss of his wife, who nad been ill for some time, and he missed the opening games. Then he had a spell of ill-health himself and, naturally, in the circumstances, he took some time to settle down to his normal game. Yet he appeared in 30 Second Division games and, for the third season in succession, reached double figures in goals. During one stage he found the net in five consecutive matches, and is the most prolific scoring winger the Town have had for some time. A deadly hitter of the ball, he has yet to miss from the penalty spot since joining the Town from Northampton three years ago. Before that he was with Kettering, Clackburn Rovers and Stoke City.





JIM ADAM (outside-left). Did not have to wait long for his introduction to League football, for he went in as Mitchell's deputy in the first match of last season. Was one of several on whom the exe fell after that disappointing performance against Oldham, and had to wait until March for his next chance. His third came at Leeds when the Town re-cast their forward line, and his display in that match was his best of the three. A Scot, he arrived at Luton via Spennymoor, and it needed a lot of persuasion to induce him to join Luton. A couple of Scotttish clubs and several English managers were keen to sign him, but the Town's perseverance paid in the end and the North-Eastern League club collected a four-figure fee.



ARTHUR TAYLOR (outsideeft). Had a mixed sort of fourth eason with the Club, for he had irst team chances early on of which he did not make quite the ise expected and, afterwards, had to be content with service in the Reserve and "A" teams. He was one of those who gained a runnersup medal but, on the whole, did not make the progress expected. In the previous season he made a sensational debut in the senior side by scoring with his first kick of the ball in the Cup-tie with Blackburn Rovers and scored twice in the first 17 minutes. When he was signed originally from Glentoran, the Irish League club, for quite a substantial fee, he was an inside-forward, but was converted fairly quickly into a winger, where he showed go-ahead notions and some powerful shooting.





NEVILLE BROWN (outside-left). The Town will have to wait a little while to discover what progress this winger has made, for he has been with the Army in the Middle East for the last 12 months, and, of course, made only a handful of appearances in the "A" team last season. Is expected to be demobilised in a matter of weeks, and then the Town are hoping that he will show that he has developed the high promise he displayed when they signed him from Histon Institute, for whom he was playing in the Spartan League. During his time as an amateur he was a member of Cambridgeshire's team in the Southern Counties Amateur Championship, and he has the build and the natural ability to make the grade as a professional.



ALWYN McGUFFIE (wing-half). In the normal course, amateurs do not apppear in this picture gallery. but young McGuffie has earned inclusion by his sterling displays for the Reserves during their successful season. For one so young he shows remarkable ability, for he is a natural ball player whose distribution of the ball is so accurate that it would do justice to a player with far more experience than he has. At 164 he was holding down a regular place in the Combination team, and the Town would have liked to sign him as a professional immediately after his seventeenth birthday. This offer McGuffie declined, however, but he re-signed as an amateur. and his progress will be closely watched. A Scot from Glasgow. he was brought here by Charlie Watkins, and he is apprenticed at a local works.





BOB READHEAD (in charge of "A" team). Much of the smoothness with which the "A" team has been run since they first joined the Metropolitan League has been due to the unremitting work of Bob Readhead, who has been associated with the Club on a parttime basis for 24 years. There are times when difficulties crop up, especially in the constitution of the team when the injured list is lengthy, but, consistently, the Town "A" gain a highly-respectable position in the League table. despite the fact that the vast majority of their matches have to be played on opponents' grounds. A popular figure in Metropolitar League circles. Bob has been a member of the Management Committee since 1950 and was reelected for the coming year.






