Summer signing Tahith Chong was definitely a late bloomer to the game after admitting football hadn't always been for him as a youngster.

The winger, who was one of the players to break Luton's club record transfer fee this summer, was born in the Dutch Caribbean island of Curacao, as despite growing up seeing his father play, never really showed much interest in the game himself.

His passion quickly ig-nited, Chong then moved to Fevenoord, before heading overseas to join the academy at Manchester United in 2016, going on to spend six years at Old Trafford.
