At nearly every away match, the regular following, invariably led by Frank Shephard and his wife and Ken Emmerton, contains a large number of members of the youth section.

We have high hopes this year of achieving what we narrowly missed doing in the season before last and gaining promotion.

Happily, this was avoided with something to spare at the end and there were indications of better things on oppenents' grounds towards the end of the campaign.

In planning for the future, the Manager had something of a clearout, leaving himself with rather less than a complete team.

When the season was over, I had to get the broom out to give the place a clean sweep, — this I did. I let eight players go free, changed our trainer, this was to give me breathing space to find the men I wanted.

The first signing I had in mind was a big stopper type centre-half this I have found in Terry Branston, from Northampton, only 28 years old, plenty of experience, from the First, Second and Third Divisions, good in the air, strong on the ground, — what more could a Manager ask for?

Near the end of the last season, Alan Slough had to have a cartilage removed, a replacement had to be found. Billy McDerment, a very industrious type, always looking for work, wanting to be in the game, has played centre-haif, centre-forward, wing half and full-back, what an asset to any club a player like this can be when clubs like ours have to exist on a small staff.

Having many contacts in the game is a big advantage, this is how I signed Tommy Hare from Southampton. He was recommended to me by a friend of mine who has a good knowledge of the game. This started the ball rolling, I made no fewer than six more contacts to find out, if they could fault the boy, but none could so Tommy Hare was then signed.

Playing in the reserves last season, we came up against Millwall Res. I was so impressed with Mick Brown that I jotted him down in my little black book for future reference. I was amazed when I knew he was to be freed, he was a must, for I knew he can play in any forward position.

A big centre-forward is still on the cards. I feel in the Fourth Division there is a lot of kick and rush football unless you have a big one up the middle to challenge. Defences, their life is made too easy, also when teams are away from home, they operate defensive tacticts which I feel are ruining the game, but are very hard to break down and being a forward in my playing career, it was hard enough to score without bringing any more players back to defend.

A goalkeeper is coming down for a trial period, with a good playing record. I feel we must have two 'keepers with experience if we want to get back to a higher Division, this, I can tell you is what we are all striving hard to do — to put Luton back in the First Division — where we belong.





WHAT DO YOU KNOW?

The poor old referee is always the one who catches it in the neck from clubs, managers, players . . . and fans. But just how knowledgable ARE the fans?

To test your knowledge on the laws of Soccer, we have compiled a few — just a few — of the tricky questions referees are expected to solve in a split-second during the game.

Here we go then. The answers are on pages 64 and 66. But no cheating . . . !

- No. I. Can a player score three consecutive goals without another man touching the ball? If so under what circumstances?
 - No. 2. How do you work out goal averages?
- No. 3. A forward shoots for goal and the 'keeper confident he has the ball covered safely, comes out to gather the ball. Suddenly, a dog runs on the field and impedes the goalie . . . and, as the referee is blowing his whistle, the ball goes into the net. Is is a goal?
- No. 4. How many occasions are there during a match when a player CAN-NOT be offside?
- No. 5. A high centre comes across the goal. The centre forward is small, but not lacking in ideas. The centre forward had not fouled an opponent, and the opponent was within three yards. Should the referee allow the goal?
- No. 6. A forward hammers the ball goalwards. But the goal-keeper leaps up and, as everyone anticipates a goal, pulls down the bar . . . leaving the ball to zoom overhead and into the crowd. What's the referee's verdict?
- No. 7. This time a centre-forward whips in a scorcher which hits the underside of the bar then DOES go into the net. But then it is discovered that the ball has burst. Does the shot count as a goal?
- No. 8. How many articles does a referee take on the field with him?

£100,000 A YEAR

Approximately £1,000,000 is raised each year by the 250 members of the National Federation of Football Supporters' Clubs. Individual donations to parent clubs vary from close on £50,000 to less than £50 by some of the county league supporters' clubs.

But £50 to a little village side is almost as important as £50,000 to the bigger clubs. Without it they would be in serious trouble.

Finance is the keynote of all supporters' club activities. Since the game began, football clubs have been struggling to ward off bankruptcy. Except on very rare occasions, they succees — with the help of a few keen fans who will go to any length to keep their team alive.

At the turn of the century comeone decided it would be a good idea to form a club to cater for the needs of the soccer fans. I have no record of when the first supporters' club came into existence but Watford S.C., formed in 1911, must be one of the oldest still in existence today.

The National Federation of Football Supporters' Clubs was founded in 1927 by the Supporters' clubs of Bournemouth, Brentford, Brighton, Charlton, Northampton and Plymouth. Ideas were pooled and, for the first time, supporters were given a lead on how to organise their activities to the best advantage of their parent clubs.

After the last war supporters began to play a more prominent part in the game. Before Hitler interrupted our enjoyment, efforts were confined mainly to social activities, running trips to away games and, perhaps a weekly "penny on the ball" raffle. Little money was raised.

Today the accent is on raising cash. Profits are derived mainly from lotteries and pools, bingo and the sale of liquor in clubrooms, through profits on diaries, handbooks, ties, dances etc., all help to swell the coffers.

In the early 'fifties the Federation assisted the government to draw up the Small Lotteries and Gaming Act. 1956, which enables clubs to run attractive competitions within the law. Then in 1963, when local competitions began to fade, we launched a big national weekly competition, which at its peak boasted 220,000 members. But fancies change and the Federation is anxious to keep abreast of all developments. So now we have subsidiary organisations raising funds for clubs. Last year they raised approximately £40,000 for football.

Nearly every ground in the country has some monument to the efforts of a supporters' club. Floodlights, grandstands, terracing, fencing, loudspeaker systems, refreshment kiosks, car parks, social clubs—these are just a few permanent reminders of the value of a good supporting body.

Programmes, too, are sometimes published by supporters' clubs especially in non-league circles. Little profit is made — indeed, very often a considerable loss is sustained — but it is a burden many football clubs are happy to lose. Even here, the Federation can help, for it is in contact with a programme agency, which purchases left-over programmes and sometimes a loss is avoided. Now we have compiled a list of clubs willing to exchange programmes.

One of the more pleasing aspects of supporters' club activities is the growth of the social club. Quite apart from the enormous revenue derived from this source through sales of drink and refreshments, gaming machines and prize competitions, these clubs play an important part in community life and bring greater unity to a club.

The fact that supporters' clubs are raising such large sums of money gives rise to many bitter arguments. Big supporters' clubs have sometimes been tempted to dictate the policy of the football club. "Our money keeps them going so why shouldn't we have some say in how it is spent?" is their cry. To the layman, this may sound a logical request — but when this attitude creeps into football, it is disastrous for all concerned.

It is a sound old maxim that you can work under only one boss. The football club must take full charge of its own affairs; likewise the supporters' club.

ANSWERS

No. I. The three-goal trick. A centre-forward puts the ball through his own goal whilst helping out his own defence; from the resultant kick-off, he boots the ball into his opponents' penalty area, races after the ball — and, before anyone else can play the ball, is brought down. scoring No. 2 from the penalty spot. Then, before his opponent can kick-off, it's half-time. Immediately the second half begins, he kicks off and scores goal No. 3 in the same way as he scored the second! Improbable? — Yes, Impossible — No.

No. 2. Goal average: Divide the "goals against" into the "goals for."

- No. 3. The dog and the goalie: The dog must be ruled as 'interfering with play' so it's no goal. The decision is a "drop ball" at the spot where the ball was when the whistle blew.
- No. 4. There are seven occasions during which a player cannot be offside. First, when he is in his own half of the field; second, if when the ball is last played there are two or more opponents nearer to their own goal-line than he is; third, when the ball was last touched, or was played by an opponent; fourth, when he receives the ball direct from a goal-kick; fifth, at a corner kick; sixth, at a throwin; seventh, at a dropped ball.

No. 5. The centre-forward who jumped and used his teammate as a "ladder". The goal should be disallowed, and the offender could be cautioned for ungentlemanly conduct, with the play being restarted with an indirect free-kick.

No. 6. When the goalie pulled the bar down . . . The referee must be the sole judge — of whether or nor the ball would have gone into the net, had the bar not been pulled down. If it would, it's a goal.

Decision No. 8, made by the International Board at the meeting on June 17th 1967 reads as follows —

"In a match played under the rules of a competition, if the crossbar becomes displaced or broken, play shall be stopped and the match abandoned unless the cross-bar has been repaired and replaced in position or a new one provided without such being a danger to the players. A rope is not considered to be a satisfactory substitute for a cross-bar.

In a friendly match, by mutual consent, play may be resumed without the cross-bar, provided it has been removed and no longer constitutes a danger to the players. In these circumstances, a rope may be used. If a rope is not used and the ball crosses the goal-line at a point which, in the opinion of the referee, is below where the cross-bar should have been, he shall award a goal".

No. 7. When the ball bursts . . . Again the referee must decide if the ball burst when hit by the boot, or after it had hit the underside of the bar and gone into the net.

If the boot did the damage, it's no goal; if the ball burst after hitting the bar, it's a goal. If it's no goal, the referee restarts the game with a dropped ball where HE says the ball ceased to conform with Law 2. — that is, it ceased to be 27 — 28 ins in circumference and 14 - 16 ozs in weight, but in the case of a penalty, the kick must be retaken.
