

Message from the Supporters Club Chairperson


Dear Supporter,







ALL-SEATER STADIUMS NOT THE PANACEA

FOR FOOTBALL'S PROBLEMS

The fundamental purpose of a successful supporters club must be to represent the views of its members and this fact is central to the comments behind the Taylor Report. The main theme which runs through the whole report is that there should be greater consultation between clubs and its supporters to ascertain what they want in terms of facilities, especially in improving safety and comfort in grounds. However, it is rather ironic that the major recommendation for all-seater stadiums has been reached without any consultation with fans or any evidence to suggest that this is what most football supporters want, in particular terrace fans, or that this in itself would improve football grounds in terms of safety or comfort. Indeed, the overwhelming evidence put forward by the Sir Norman Chester Centre for Football Research at Leicester University in reports on the Coventry City all-seater experience (1984) and the views of members of the Football Supporters Association (Nov 1989) is that a large proportion of fans do not and would not support this proposal. The whole tenet of the Taylor Report is therefore at odds with its principle recommendation and the need for more consultation with ordinary fans.

I believe the solution of all-seater stadiums is a simplistic approach to a much more complex problem. It suggests that all or most football matches have problems regarding packed and potentially dangerous terrace conditions when this is patently not the case. The answers which may be right for Arsenal, Liverpool or Man. Utd. are not the same for the majority of other League Clubs and need to be reached having sought the views of the individual clubs supporters, not dictated by outside bodies or authorities who do not have the same level of knowledge or love for their club as the average supporter.

The main argument put forward for introducing all-seater stadia is to improve spectator "safety and comfort". I would argue that whilst welcoming the overall thrust of the Taylor Report and the need for modern stadiums (which has major implications on existing Town and Country Planning Policies) and better facilities, there is no evidence in the report to suggest that terracing itself is unsafe or dangerous. The problems on that tragic day at Sheffield were caused by problems of crowd control, penning and perimeter fencing.

Most supporters of 2nd, 3rd and 4th Division Clubs and indeed some 1st Division Clubs, would wonder why extra seats are needed when many are empty for the majority of games at present? The costs of providing seats must inevitably be passed onto the fan thus pricing out many loyal supporters, those with children and families being the most likely to suffer. However, these are the fans who will provide the next generation of football supporters.

Furthermore, it is assumed that all those who stand would want to sit. However, I believe this to be incorrect and to support this view I would put forward the recent decisions by 3 League Clubs (Q.P.R., Leeds Utd. and Coventry) to remove seats and return to terracing in parts of their grounds.

In the case of Q.P.R. pressure from their own fans to do so was a major contributory factor as was the decision by Coventry City, due to the clubs dwindling support. Leeds Utd. removed seats behind one goal not only having regard to the views of their fans but also at the request of the police. because supporters continued to stand and made no use of their seats. Tottenham Hotspur supporters also complained long and hard about the Shelf being turned into executive boxes but at least these supporters still had the choice to stand!

It is surprising that the Government whose party's philosophy embodies freedom of choice in nearly all aspects of life should deny law-abiding terrace supporters the opportunity to stand at football matches when for the majority of League Clubs the cost and need for extra seating above that which already exists is completely unjustified. In fact, I believe market forces would have meant that extra seats would have already been provided if a need had been identified.



Unfortunately, if all-seater stadiums do become a reality I believe there will be a significant reduction in football attendance figures. However, for the few Clubs who do support large crowds, less people will be able to attend both because of reduced capacity and increased cost. It is my view that the game will thus suffer such irrevocable damage that it will no longer be able to claim the title of being "The National Sport" and thus marginalising its importance in British social culture.

In Luton's case it is held amongst a number of supporters that the lack of atmosphere at home matches is not only because of the away fan ban (which the LTSC Committee believes should be relaxed as outlined in Issue No. 2 of "Hatters News") but also because only one side of the ground is given over to terracing. It has been argued that the Oak Road terracing should have been kept and terracing reintroduced into the Main Stand Enclosure, with seats being put in the Kenilworth Road end, so as to keep two sides standing and

improve vocal support. It is known that Luton supporters have stopped attending home matches because of the lack of atmosphere, which was part of their enjoyment in watching matches, and the layout of the ground is an important contributory

Luton Town have also announced that implementing an all-seater stadium would reduce capacity to approximately 9,000 thus denying entrance to an average of nearly 1000 supporters who presently attend, and more for the attractive matches. What other business would turn away potential customers. Furthermore, for Cup games up to a guarter of the allocation may have to be given to the away team thus reducing the capacity for Luton supporters further to 6,750 (3,000 down on their present average League gate). Whilst the Supporters Club believe the football club can still look optimistically toward a new ground in the future this won't be available by 1994 and we believe supporters who cannot attend Cup and League games in the intervening period will not continue to support the club, especially for less attractive matches, thus reducing revenue, crowds and vocal support in the interim period.

Finally, to return to the Taylor Report it is argued that seating will improve spectator behaviour. Why is it then that many of Chelsea's less well behaved supporters sit at home and away matches and how does this explain Leeds Utd. fans reaction in Paris during the 1975 European Cup Final? For Luton

fans the over-riding image of the Millwall Cup match is of seats being used in a less than friendly way toward police, showing how well some people may still behave with this "safer" method of crowd

In conclusion, it is important that the views of all Luton supporters, especially terrace fans, to the all-seater idea are put forward and we hope that other Supporters Clubs and the F.S.A. will do likewise to gauge supporters reaction and to bring about a more constructive and acceptable solution for all those concerned. In addition, the Football League and the Football Association together with the P.F.A. should try to persuade U.E.F.A. and F.I.F.A. to vary requirements for English Clubs. should they be competing in European or World Cup matches, or am I being too optimistic?

Lord Justice Taylor believes in more consultation with fans rather than confrontation. It is therefore important that as many fans as possible make their opinions known. Surely thousands of fans can influence the Government and the authorities that control the game if their opinion is just and based on logic. At present safety certificates issued to clubs by local authorities will be heavily influenced by the Taylor Report in complying with his edicts, witness the effects on

Wimbledon Tennis Club, which will probably take no account of the individual clubs situation or the fact that no consul tation has taken place as the Government promised in introducing the Taylor Report into Parliament. Just think that most young football supporters would have been taken to their first ever match by parents or friends and stood on the terrace (basically because it is extremely difficult to keep a child in a seat and content for up to 2 hours), and they have then gone on to support the game for the rest of their life.

It is therefore important that terrace fans are active and vocal as to their views since you will be the ones to lose if all-seater stadiums come about!

You owe it to yourself and to future generations of football supporters, to change this decision.



Further deserved recognition for your official Supporters Club came about recently when Chairperson Pam Gray, Press Officer Tom Hunt and the writer were invited to appear on B.B.C. Televisions key news and current affairs programme, Newsnight.

For those who did not see the programme which went out on Monday, the 29th January our role was to take part in a twenty minute discussion concerning the findings and recommendations contained in Lord Justice Taylors report.

At first it was slightly daunting to find oneself in the company of such important figures in the Football World as Bill Fox, Gordon Taylor, Denis Howell M.P., David Evans M.P. and Rogan Taylor; but afterwards we felt that we did at least make a reasonable contribution to the debate. However, in memory of the fans who died at Hillsborough, I left my scarf at Anfield along with the others. It was the least I felt I could do.

AS THE ONLY journalist in the Luton Town Press box to make the round trip on soccer's big-dipper from First Division to Fourth Division and back again as a reporter, I more than share the fans fears for Luton Town in their present position.

I joined Eric Pugh, the former Luton news sports editor, who at the time wrote as "Chiltern", at the start of the big slide when we dropped back into the Second Division in 1960 at the end of five magic seasons in the top flight.

Luton born and bred, I was a regular fan on the Kenilworth Road terraces prior to that.

Having lived for football and Luton Town it was the answer to a dream when I actually got paid to attend matches and was able to attend every home game instead of bashing away in the office producing the old Saturday Telegraph 'Green-Un' on Saturday afternoons.

But the dream quickly turned into a nightmare as the rapid plunge towards the league's bargain basement got underway.

Football and footballers have changed since then. In those days the players were not so remote from the fans. They all lived in the town, most of them around the Kenilworth Road area, and they used to walk around the streets instead of speeding away in expensive cars.

People like the late, great, Gordon Turner, Eire international George Cummins, Allan Brown and goalkeepers Bernard Streten and Ron Baynham, were my heroes.

Fourth Division

We had been to Wembley, losing to Nottingham Forest, only a year previous. Although that was one of the only Wembley finals I never saw in any shape or form.

Having wangled my way to all the previous rounds, including the two semi-final matches, I was one of the regular fans who didn't get a smell of a ticket. How much fairer the ticket allocation was handled on our more recent trips to Wembley!

To make matters worse, I had to work on the Green-Un on Cup Final day and couldn't even see the game on the box. In those days there was always a re-run of the final on the Sunday. But I missed that one too because I was down outside the town hall for the big reception to welcome the team home.

So when we returned to the Second Division I, like many fans, still viewed the world through rosy spectacles. We will not stay in the lower division long, we thought.

We were sadly right. But it was not a return trip we were destined for, but the long depressing slump which ended in the Fourth Division six seasons later.

That was when the roller-coaster really made us feel

What we had not realised at the time was that all our old favourites, many of whom still live in and around the town, had reached their peak as a team and gone over the hill

If we are to draw any consolation from the wholesale departure of our Littlewoods Cup heroes, then perhaps it is that such a mistake will not be made this time.

Jimmy Ryan has shown that he is not frightened to put his faith in the younger players he has nurtured along in the Reserves. And if the big manager in the sky fails to help us with a bit of the luck he regularly bestows on Charlton Athletic, we know we would go down with the basis of a team that is pushing towards maturity rather than going downhill.

As we all know, it was one of my old favourites, Allan Brown, who brought the heady days back to Kenilworth Road when he took Luton to the Fourth Division Championship in 1968. And we were on our way back to

For me the only thing that has changed is that I now have my old pal, Brian Swain, leading the team in the Press Box and on the Luton news sports desk.

I hope and pray that on the last day of the season there will be another change and we will be supping a few beers to Jimmy Ryan and his men and to an extension of our tenancy in the First Division.

*** * * * * * * * * * * * * * * *** THE HILLSBOROUGH HORROR

I believe that I probably have a closer interest in Lord Justice Taylor's final report than most people in this area, as I was standing on the Leppings Lane terrace, at Hillsborough, on the 15th of April 1989. It seems strange to recall that at 2.45 on that afternoon the most important thing in my life was for Liverpool to avoid defeat! Within 30 minutes, as the full horror of events permeated the ground, my priorities were put firmly in perspective.


As a result of the sight of bodies being laid on a football pitch, I find that I do have some sympathy with Taylor's most controversial recommendation, that all grounds should become all-seater. At it's most simple level the contention that if Hillsborough had been all-seater, then the disaster would not have happened, is indisputable.

However, the wider question of whether all-seater stadia are safer remains to be considered. I am old enough to remember the damage caused by hooligans at the 1975 European Cup Final in Paris, and we all recall the infamous Luton v Millwall incident. On both of those occasions (and you can probably think of others) the seats became weapons of violence, readily available. Football should also consider the question of escape routes. In the event of fire, rows of immovable plastic seats would seriously hinder an evacuation.

In my opinion, the question of "to seat or not to seat" transcends tradition and prefernece, and should not be seen as merely another "anti-hooligan" device. Clearly, the safety of the fans must be given the absolute priority, football simply must get it right, this time.

LUTON TOWN FOOTBALL CLUB'S ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING REPORT

The Ninety Third A.G.M. of the Luton Town Football & Athletic Co. Ltd. was held at 12 noon on Thursday 22/2/90 and the Supporters Club Committee members Pam Gray, John Chapman, Nick Cooper and Tom Hunt attended as did Brian Swain of the Luton News and Bill Tomlins in the official roles of reporter and football club Secretary/ General Manager.

The shareholders approved a proposal that the audited accounts be accepted only after questions were answered by Mr Roger Smith (Football Club Chairman) relating to administration cost, Wages and Valuation of fixed assets.

Mr Smith also replied to a question involving the repayment of Dirctors Loans and interest on some as there was an implied criticism that such loans should be interest free or, at least, at a lower rate than that charged by the High Street Banks.

Mr C.J. Hudson, Mr R.J. Pinney and Mr H. Richardson were elected to the board and Mr Brian Cole and Mr D.G. Watson-Challis, who retired by rotation, were also re-elected.

The retiring auditors "Ernst & Young" were re-elected to serve another year.

After the formal matters had been concluded the board were questioned regarding the planned relocation of the club, the impact of the Lord Justice Taylor Report on football in this country, the refinancing of the club with the possible return of former Chairman "Denis Mortimer".

Little new information was forthcoming and it appears that the board have confidence that the Luton Council WILL still assist in the plans for a Multi-purpose Leisure Complex in Stopsley (Butterfield Green). The confidence was not shared however by shareholders present.

As far as the Taylor Report was concerned Mr David Evans stated that he could not try and persuade parliament that the All-Seater plan be scraped as football had "Burned its Boats" by defeating the National Membership Scheme although Mr Tomlins pointed out that the implementation of the Taylor Report could bring about trouble outside the grounds.

Mr Smith advised shareholders that further meetings had been arranged with Mr D. Mortimer and if he or other persons joined the board some Directors might leave as this was, he commented, normal business procedure.

Jim Ryan expressed his delight at the form shown by the team since he took over at the helm with the exception of the Charlton Athletic match recently.

The meeting was closed and the Shareholders were invited to joint the board for a drink and informal chat.

Mal Donaghy's testimonial night at Kenilworth Road was a lovely wallow in nostalgia for some of us. You have to pinch yourself sometimes to remember just how long ago it was that men like Brian Horton and David Moss were delighting Kenilworth Road with com-Pleat football.

But did you notice a couple of Harry Haslam's best signings — men who had double tragedy in common?

To break one leg is bad enough for a footballer. To have it happen twice must be truly awful. So how nice to discover that for Paul Price and Lil Fuccillo there is still life after league football, and that both are still playing despite being well into their thirties.

Fair-haired Price, son of a Welshman, was brought up in Welwyn Garden City, and came to Kenilworth Road as a boy. He skippered the youth and reserve teams and was destined for great things, until he broke a leg in a reserve game in March 1974. Harry Haslam's team was on its way to promotion, and Price battled back to fitness within nine months. But the joy of recovery was short-lived — he broke the same leg again, in training.

It was to be another year — by which time the Town had been relegated back to the Second Division — before Price made his first team debut at York in February 1976. We won 3-2 on a day when Bedford boy Lil Fuccillo also made his first league appearance, and celebrated with a goal.

Fuccillo's tragedy came 18 months later. One of the worst fouls I have seen in the last 800 Town games saw him carried off at Brighton with a broken leg, in December 1978. He, too, battled back to fitness ... until he broke it again in training the following August. Almost inevitably the midfielder scored on his first game back, in a 4-2 home win over Preston.

Perhaps the Town were hasty in letting both players go. Price went to Spurs — what is it about them and our full-backs? — for £250,000 in the summer of 1981, and went on to win 27 caps for Wales. A brief spell in the USA was followed by a run as skipper of Swansea City and today Price is still in football, playing for Wivenhoe in the Vauxhall League.

And it is probably appropriate that Fuccillo, who made his league debut on the same day as Price, should also now be playing for the Essex club. He left the Town for the States, and later had spells with Southend, Peterborough, Cambridge and Kettering.

I hope they both continue to enjoy their football for a long time to come.

I do not pretend to be able to answer every query, and I have had some strange and obscure ones, but I will attempt to find the answer to every



THE COMMITTEE'S STATEMENT ON THE RELOCATION DEBATE

The Supporters Club has remained silent whilst negotiations take place between the football club and the council on the relocation of the Football Club. However, it has amused and annoyed the Committee to see how when any site is mentioned there is immediately an outcry from local residents against the scheme, despite any details of what is exactly proposed having been put forward. Likewise, when suggestions are made about the club improving its existing facilities at Kenilworth Road, local opposition is mobilised.

It does make us wonder whether if the football club had been founded 100 years later than it was, whether a football ground would have ever been found on which to play. It is the committee's view, however, that the club and town require modern leisure facilities with associated car parking which cannot be achieved in its present location. This would be something which should and could also include other entertainment and cultural facilities, such as a theatre, concert hall, skating rink etc. which for years Luton has lacked, and which every survey carried out suggests is what the people of Luton also want. Ideally, this facility should be located as far away as possible from any existing housing and with good road links, in order to reduce its impact on neighbouring properties. In this regard, we suggest that the politicians and Council members and officers look at all the sites where development is potentially viable and agree that the best choice would be that which is the furthest away from existing large scale housing. It may be that this site cannot be developed until the Thames-Stevenage link road is built, in order to satisfactorily deal with traffic problems, however, the site could be ear marked for development and a detailed planning application made at a later date. In the meantime the Club should be allowed to continue to play at Kenilworth Road. Luton has 20,000 members who would support this stance, against possibly 2,000+ objectors, who will inevitably sign any petition against an entertainment and leisure complex anywhere near their houses without even knowing details of exactly where it is, what is proposed and the potential alternative uses if it is not developed as a leisure and entertainment complex. To believe that large areas of open areas within Luton can remain without development in the future runs directly against Government and local Planning Policies, and is unrealistic, since these policies encourage the protection of the countryside from development by developing land within existi
