With the club now out of receivership, our thoughts can go back to the business of winning Football matches.

The initial results have been mixed; improved home form has coincided with considerably poorer form away from home, and thus the Town are currently unable to rise beyond a mid table position.

However, progress has been made to the third round of the F.A. Cup for the first time

since the 96/97 season and perhaps a good Cup run could provide impetus for the rest of the season and

hopefully lead to a challenge for a play off position.

We have seen gradual improvement in attendances at Kenilworth Road this season. This has been aided by a number of initiatives from the Club but we should really be aiming for a minimum gate of 6,000 rising to 7,000 when the larger clubs visit. Good home attendances are a must if we are to avoid the situation we have seen in recent years in which players have to be sold in order to meet Club losses. It is essential to keep an established squad of players together for a promotion challenge to be a realistic aim.

May I take the opportunity, through the Newsletter of welcoming rather belatedly Rod Fountain as Director of Business Development at Kenilworth Road. Rod has the unenviable task of improving the business performance of the Club by attracting supporters, Club sponsors and commercial contacts.

It is also good to welcome fans' favourite Tony Thorpe back into the ranks. Tony will hopefully be able to reproduce the goal scoring form shown in his two previous spells with the Club and persuade Lennie Lawrence to make it a permanent move this time.

The asking price (rumoured in the Bristol press to be around £150,000 plus sell on clauses) has already been agreed between the two clubs.

I am delighted to inform you that Cliff Bassett has agreed to participate in one of our guest speaker evenings in the New Year. We have fixed a provisional date of January 27th –please check in the matchday programmes and local press for further details.

Cliff, as you will be aware, brought the majority shareholding in the club to finally bring us out of receivership. His desire and efforts to safeguard the future of Luton Town were much appreciated by the Supporters' Club. However, Cliff has made it clear that he needs other investors to bring in working capital, both for the benefit of the club and also to reduce his own considerable financial interest. The guest evening will prove an ideal opportunity to ascertain his views on the future of LTFC.

The new stadium application is awaited with anticipation. The proposal will again be for the junction 10 site, although the previous application was unsuccessful, primarily because of the potential traffic impact on the M1motorway.

However, the report did indicate that the existing infrastructure c o u l d support an i n i t i a l capacity of 12,000.

In order to minimise the risk of a new application being referred for a further Public Enquiry the capacity will have to be set at the 12 000 level, with potential for expansion at a later date built into the plans.

If the application were to be referred for another Enquiry this would delay the building of the stadium by years. Such a delay could well put the future of the club in jeopardy, primarily because of the costs involved in these enquires as David Kohler discovered to his detriment, but also because of the continuing difficulties of operating a

business in the existing stadium where facilities fall far short of the standards demanded by the modern game.

It is therefore imperative that a new application clears all the hurdles at the first attempt.



TALK OF THE TOWN

The day I conned a top referee

THERE WAS a brief item in the sports pages recently about a referee called Dermot Gallagher abandoning a match because the floodlights were not up to standard.

I expect you've heard of Dermot - he has been a FIFA ref for five years, and has already received the top honour available to any man in black in this country, taking charge of the 1996 FA Cup final.

I remember him for other reasons, notably the day I wound him up something rotten, soon after he got onto the Football League list of linesmen, a decade or so ago.

It was a time when new technology was sweeping through newspapers, as computerised printing replaced the old labourintensive hot metal processes.

Even the dear old Luton News had to be dragged through the change, and when it finally got rid of its old-fashiond machinery to use the new methods, the company had to hire the requisite facilities. Reporters and sports editors tapped away on computer keyboards instead of typewriters, with their efforts then being transferred to disks which were transported to Bicester. There a more advanced printing company had the then very latest gear. Their operators took our disks, turned their contents into type on glossy paper, and those galleys of type were cut up with scalpels and pasted onto boards to become newspaper pages.

Young Dermot Gallagher was one of those keyboard operators, and he and I soon became firm friends through a shared passion for football. I had to go to Bicester two or three days a week, to oversee the production of the LN sports pages.

Dermot, being sport mad, made a point of grabbing my output, particularly the double-page spread of words and pictures on Luton Town matches.

We shared his joy when he graduated from the Southern League to become a linesman on the Football League, and the delight was all the greater the day Dermot received a list of appointments and discovered he was running the line at St. Andrew's - Birmingham City v Luton Town. It was in the old First Division, now the Premiership, in April 1986.

We won 2-0, with Mick Harford getting both ouir goals, against one of his former clubs.

In the previous week I had been warning Dermot at every opportunity that David Pleat was a real Tartar dealing with referees, and as for young linesmen, he had them two at a time for breakfast.

"Don't fancy you job, mate," was the line I drilled into him time and time again. "One little mistake, and he will tear you to pieces in his press conference. You'll probably be struck off the list."

Quite untrue, of course, but Dermot was not to know that. Nor did he know about a spot of collusion between me, the LN photographer Mark Richards, and Dermot's mates in the print shop.

For the record, Dermot did his job expertly. But, when he reported for work he was a little disgruntled to discover that the match report spread had already been allocated to another operator. He fumed quietly, but got on with his job. He pretended it was of no interest to him, but of course we knew differently.

Sure enough, some hours later, Dermot couldn't resist taking a stroll around the rows of pages just in case he happened to spot what had been written about the Birmingham v Luton match. Theere was the spread, in all its glory, in its appointed place. But

Dermot nearly collapsed when he saw it. Dominating the centre of the two pages was a huge picture of D. Gallagher, standing with flag raised to signal offside.

Beneath that was the report and the heading, in huge type, screamed something like: "Pleat rages at rookie linesman."

Dermot shook visibly, trembled briefly, and then saw the caption to the photograph. It recorded: "Linesman Gallagher - not even good enough to wave away the trains at New Street Station, says Pleat."

Dermot had by now turned pale, and almost fainted when he read the story. There was hardly a word about the match, but several hundred describing how furious David Pleat ripped into the awful linesman who had spoiled what might have been a good game.

It was a real diatribe - I had enjoyed myself immensely larding it on, fabricating quotes and hinting that there might be a Football League enquiry.

Poor old Dermot walked around in shock for several days. "I can't believe any manager could say things like that," he said. "It's not true. I had a good game. Why is he picking on me?"

You have probably guessed the rest: the genuine report, with not a mention of Dermot, had been put together in a quiet corner, well out of Dermot's way, carefully hidden from the man who was dreading the publication of that week's Luton News. We kept an eye on him in case he became suicidal, until the tension could be sustained no longer, and we let him into the secret.

If he had taken his linesman's flags to work, I have no doubt where he would have shoved them, not necessarily pointed ends first. But after brief anger came blessed relief that it was all a big con.

Dermot and I are still good friends, although we don't meet too often, and I had almost forgotten that wonderful week when I had a linesman on the run and almost ready to do violence to David Pleat

Except that we went to Northampton in August for a pre-season game, and the man in charge was my old mate Dermot.

I went to the officials' dressing room after the game, and was well pleased when he opened the door and beamed with pleasure at seeing me again. He introduced me to his young linesmen, told them what an ace old boy I was, and then warned them - watch out if he's around when you're running the line at a Luton match!

And that fake page that caused Dermot so much heart-ache is now, he told me, a treasured part of his football scrapbook - the newspaper report that never was gives him a chuckle every time he reads it. Like most referees, he really is a good old boy.

Mind you, there was one ref who nearly put me in prison many years ago. That wasn't funny at the time either, but I can laugh about it now. Watch this space for future revelations of how a young football-mad journalist got the only red card - and a cruel punishment - to end his not very illustrious playing career.

NEW KIDS ON THE BLOCK

Part One - A Look at Luton's New Signings





1. Efetobore Sodje

With no money available for transfers in the summer, Lennie was restricted to free transfers and 'Bosman' signings, and the first of those brought in was Efetobore Sodje. Sodje, 27, is a flamboyant and stylish central defender and is one of the great personalities around in football at the moment. Born in Greenwich, but of Nigerian parentage, he is best known in the game for the bandanna which he wears for every match. Having had a trial with Luton under David Pleat in 1994, 'Efe' spent a productive three seasons with Stevenage Borough before joining Macclesfield Town for £30,000 and helping them to gain successive promotions in their rise from the Conference to the Second division. However, following Macclesfield's relegation last season, he refused terms with the Silkmen, and joined Luton on a one-year contract in the summer having played three trial games with the club in preseason. So far, he is finding it difficult to establish a regular place in the side which has led to speculation about his future, but with Cambridge, Rushden & Diamonds and Stevenage all interested, he recently pledged his future to the Hatters, saying he is willing to stay and fight for a first team place.




2. Julian Watts

The second deal done in the summer was the signing of Julian Watts from Bristol City, initially on loan, but eventually on a one-year contract until the end of the season. Watts, also a centre half was given a trial game in the final first team friendly of the pre-season program, and he impressed, helping the Hatters to a 3-1 victory over first division QPR. At the time, with the Receivers still in place, Lennie was looking over several trialists, but, on the eve of the new season, was only given permission to bring in one new player. Eventually, with Sodje and Gary Doherty unavailable for the first game, he plumped for Watts as opposed to other hopefuls including Guy Ipoua and Ray McKinnon, and since then he has been ever-present, looking like an inspired signing. The 28 year old, six foot three defender has had league experience with Rotherham United, Sheffield Wednesday and Leicester City before moving to Bristol City, but only started a handful of games at Ashton Gate, finding himself out of favour with Scandinavian boss Benny Lennartsson. His experience at the back will be extremely valuable in our young side this season, and Julian could prove to be one of Lennie Lawrence's best signings.



3. Adam Locke

Two weeks into the new season, the signing of Adam Locke, again from Bristol City was also completed. Another player suffering as a result of the large first team squad at Ashton Gate, Locke came to Luton for a trial in pre-season, and despite suffering a neck injury, did enough to prompt Lennie Lawrence to give him a contract. Locke, a 29 year old, has had experience at Crystal Palace, Southend United and Colchester United, and he can operate in the centre of midfield or at right wing back. He has been used in both positions so far this season, but has looked most at home in midfield, where his incisive passing skills have complimented Matthew Spring's attacking game. He has been on a succession of short term contracts at Kenilworth Road so far, and his current deal expires in December, although it is hoped that he will extend this until the end of the season.



4. Tony Thorpe

Tony Thorpe, a player who needs no introduction to Luton supporters, has recently been resigned on a three month loan with view to a permanent deal. The 25 year old, who scored 60 goals in his first spell with the club, and another 4 when returning on loan at the end of last season, is another who has been frozen out at Bristol City in the new regime under Tony Pulis. As one of the most popular players in the club's recent history, his signing has been a huge boost, and his partnership with Liam George should be one of the most formidable in the second division.

As we go to print the club have just taken on Paul Read (Forward) on a non-contractual basis from Wycombe Wanderers. He was formerly with Arsenal and had spent a short time in Swedish football to try a rekindle his thirst for the professional game before joining Wycombe.

The unfortunate injuries to Billy Arnison, the South African centreforward and the sale of Bobby Brennan, the star of the previous year followed by the board into action and they duly laid out a record £12,000 fee for George Stobbart from Newcastle United. He was immediately, and rather unfairly, cast in the role of saviour, and for a while, he appeared to be exactly that. In front of a record Luton crowd of 27,319 Stobbart scored in a 1-1 draw with Spurs, the eventually champions, and he nearly brought the house down. Fans were hanging onto every vantage point available, however precarious and they danced and danced like monkeys up a tree when Stobbart scored. It wasn't a scintillating game, but it was great stuff and it certainly silenced the cocky Londoners with their neat push-and-run style.

In the next home fixture, against Blackburn on "November the 5th", the Town, in keeping with bonfire night tradition, fizzed and sparkled to their best performance of the season. Accustomed to a near famine as far as goals were concerned, the Kenilworth Road faithful, down by nearly 50 per cent because of the torrential rain, were both shaken and delighted by a sudden goal rush in the closing minutes of the first half. Stobbart, playing at inside forward, thrilled one of the lowest crowds since the war, with a quite breathtaking virtuoso performance that he would never again be able to repeat. After 34 minutes with neither discernably superior, Stobbart suddenly struck with a decisively taken goal. Two minutes later he scored again, and within the space of six minutes he had a brilliant hat-trick to his name. minutes before half-time the jumping-jack went off again and George Stobbart had written his name into the history books with four goals in nine minutes. No more dramatic triumph had been

achieved by an individual Luton player since the days of Joe Payne. Even Billington had never scored goals with such rapidity.

When the half-time whistle went for the interval, the crowd simply rose and cheered the muddy figure of Stobbart all the way to the dressing room. There had, admittedly, been fine displays on both wings, particularly Glover, who was facing the future England International, Eckersley, but nevertheless, it was Stobbart who had fired the rockets and who had so lit up the damp crowd, and he fully deserved his ovation. The only problem was, that after a performance like that he was in danger of becoming a legend in his own half-time.

The game finished 5-2 with Blackburn Rovers scoring all three second half goals - two for them, and one for us. But whatever happened no one could deny Stobbart his greatest moment of glory.

NEW KIDS ON THE BLOCK Part Two - A Look at Luton's Youth Team



Over the last few years, we have experienced the highs and lows of supporting Luton Town, from the Littlewoods Cup win in 1988, to relegations in 1992 and 1996. Players and managers have come and gone, but one thing which has remained constant and has been, for me, a major highlight of supporting The Hatters, is the success of the Town's youth system. In today's world of football, teams can be made up entirely of foreigners, and you are lucky to witness one home grown player in a match between two Premiership sides. There is, therefore, a certain amount of pleasure to be derived from watching young players progress through the ranks into the first team, and this is one of the benefits of supporting a small club such as our own Luton Town.

In recent years, the success of the Luton youth policy can be rivalled by none, with the Kenilworth Road conveyor-belt having produced players such as John Hartson, Matthew Upson, Paul Telfer, Mark Pembridge, Kingsley Black, Kelvin Davis, Chris Willmott and Ceri Hughes, all of whom have gone on to bigger things. As a testimony to this success, the Town's youngsters have won the South East Counties League for the last three seasons and also reached the semi-final of the FA Youth Cup in 1996/97. Of the current first team squad, 19 of our 26 professionals have come through the youth team, and in many cases this season, the average age of our starting eleven has been less than 21, sometimes without one bought player in the line-up. Matthew Spring, Matthew Taylor, Liam George and Gary Doherty, all of whom have only recently graduated from the youth team, have starred in the Hatters' impressive start to the season and will surely be playing in a higher division (hopefully with us) as soon as they become the 'finished product'.

So, what of the current youth team? Well, it would be fair to say that results have not gone as well as in previous years, with the lads currently occupying fifth position of nine in the newly formed Football League Youth Alliance South Central Conference, but it is clear that Town's side is brimming with new talent, which I am sure will be turning out for the first team within a couple of years. The restructuring of youth football as a result of the introduction of the FA Premier Academy system has seen Luton pitted against teams such as Wolves, West Brom and Walsall in a league considered far tougher than that we have competed in for the previous decade.

The whole structure of the youth game has been revamped, with the competition now allowing players up to 19 years of age, as opposed to the previous 18, and the former two year YTS contracts being replaced with three year scholarships. This has meant four first-year professionals – goalkeeper Daniel Tate, defender James Ayres, midfielder Moses Jerry and striker Tresor Kandol – are still eligible to take part, whereas in previous years they would have been too old. However, the Luton ethos of giving young players a chance at an early age has seen Tate and Kandol, as well as second year trainees Matthew Taylor and Scott Ward regularly make the first team squad, which has left the youth team frequented by first year scholars and schoolboys.

In the Summer, we took on eight new youngsters on scholarship forms – Graham Wraight, Dean Mortara, John Carroll, Ezra Mentore, Lee Mansell, Steven Dogbe, Rene James-Barriteau and Duane Clarke – all of whom have shown promise in their first season and look set to have a good future in the game. The team is built on a solid defence with the idea of playing football from the back, and every player is taught to play the game the way it should be played – quick, sharp passing and movement. However, the main problem for most of the year has been scoring goals, as the team has played with only one recognised striker for most of the season. Of these players, most Luton supporters will be aware of Taylor, who has been a revelation in the left wing back position this season, and also of the goalscoring exploits of Kandol, whose prolific form at reserve and youth team levels over the last two seasons has earned him regular appearances on the substitutes bench this season. Tate and Ward have also appeared as substitute goalkeeper on several occasions this season, although they have never started a first team match.

Of the others, Ayres, Jerry and Stirling have already received professional contracts and are now regulars for the Town's second string. Stirling in particular has caught the eye this season, and might not be too far away from a first team call-up; he is a fine all round athlete at six foot three and with tremendous pace, and he possesses an excellent long throw which has been used to good effect all season. Ryan Moran and Alex Minton may be the next recipients of professional terms, as their current YTS deals run out this Summer. Moran, a versatile player who can operate anywhere along the back four, or in midfield, has stood out this season in his preferred centre back position, while Minton, a clever midfield playmaker has suffered with injury for most of this campaign.


One factor about following the youth team which continues to disappoint me is the crowd, usually numbering only about 20 genuine spectators. So if the Town are away or you're at a loose end on a Saturday morning, why not take a trip to Luton Rugby Club and watch the boys in action? You are guaranteed a good game of football, and who knows, you might just be watching a future England international. One thing is for sure: Luton will continue to produce large quantities of high quality youngsters, and, as they follow in the footsteps of the likes of Spring, George and Doherty, the exciting, attacking football we are witnessing at Kenilworth Road today will continue long into the new Millennium.


PLAYER STATS (NATIONWIDE LEAGUE)






NATIONWIDE LEAGUE STATISTICS EXTRA - HOW AND WHEN THE GOALS HAVE GONE IN
