Mike Newell The Saturday Interview

Lessons learned at the knee of Bob Paisley and videos of Bill Shankly have driven the flying start to the League One season at Kenilworth Road

Newell invokes the boot room ethos at Luton

Amid the cacophony about Wayne Rooney and the drooling over Arsenal's unbeaten run, another fine achievement has gone all but unnoticed. With 28 points from a possible 30, Luton began their League One season in a fashion that made Rooney seem a slow starter. As the club's manager Mike Newell speaks about how he studied videos of Bill Shankly and Bob Paisley as a youngster and dissected training and matches during his playing career, his success sounds no accident.

Though plenty of footballers drift into management, Newell has long been planning a life in the dugout. Even at nine he listened intently to Shankly's words. "I always wanted to be a manager," says the former Everton and Blackburn striker. "A player first, then a manager." A link a few months ago to the Blackburn job showed he has caught certain eyes.

Luton's form is all the more impressive given that they spent last season, Newell's first there, in administration. The game at second-placed Tranmere offered a stern test. If it is stretching the point to suggest Newell is trying to turn the club into the new Liverpool, he was hugely influenced by his six years at Anfield as a schoolboy when Paisley was in charge.

"I was there from 12 years old, training on Tuesday and Thursday nights and all week during school holidays," he says. "I stayed at school and took my A-levels because I was never a cert to be a player, and I got released at 18. But I was going and listening and watching then. That was how I believed football should be played, how training should be and how players, coaches and managers should be.

"I got all the videos of the club history and I could listen to Shankly and Paisley for ages because they never complicated the game. I watched those videos over and over again. I could listen to Shankly talk about anything, he was just so enthusiastic. Paisley was more dour but I still listened. He was really cute and clever. He kept everything simple.

"He would sit in the directors' box. He just let them play and, if he saw something, he would pop down to the dugout, let them know what he'd seen and then go back up. He never flinched or moved a muscle."

Newell, 39, favours a detached approach on the touchline. In his previous job at Hartlepool, where he secured promotion to the Second Division after taking over in mid-season with the team top, he was criticised by fans for not being animated enough. "As a player, if you're getting earache from the bench every two minutes you switch off," he says. "Pick the side and let them play."

Where he is happy to hear voices is on television, as he takes what leading managers have to offer. "It must drive my missus mad because sometimes I'm shouting at the telly," he says. "I listen to every word the top managers say and when they contradict themselves I shout at the telly. There are a lot of managers I just can't listen to because I think they're talking rubbish. People I like listening to, like Arsene Wenger and Alex Ferguson, don't complicate the game or suggest they've got some rocket science."

A keen eye and ear for management were plain during Newell's playing days, which peaked at Blackburn with a Premiership title. "At one stage I used to drive home from games or training and all I would think about was

what I would do differently from the manager or what I liked."

No one left a bigger impression than Kenny Dalglish, Newell's manager at Blackburn and someone schooled in the Liverpool way. Newell, like Dalglish then, addresses his players as a group only on match days and does not lead training, preferring to watch or join in. Coaching is left to Brian Stein, the former Luton and England striker

"If the players have been listening to me day after day boring them, then when they do have to listen to me on a Saturday they switch off," he says. "I will speak to individuals during the week but not the squad generally.

"I don't want to be a coach or master tactician. I have very old-fashioned beliefs about being a manager. The people who are looked up to - like Shankly, Paisley, Brian Clough, Ferguson, Wenger - are managers. I don't think they see themselves as coaches and tacticians."

So would Luton be worse off without Newell? "I heard it so many times [at Blackburn] that Ray Harford is a great coach and takes all the training, so why not give him the job? I heard it as well [at Everton] with Howard Kendall and Colin Harvey, that Colin Harvey's a great coach and Everton's success is because they moved him from youth-team coach. They gave Colin Harvey the job when Kendall went to Spain when Kenny packed it in, [Blackburn] gave Ray Harford the job. It didn't work.

"I see my job as first selecting the side and also taking the shit that goes with it. The problems, players knocking on your door, the phone going, the physio ringing. That's what management is all about - taking responsibility."

Newell has had difficult moments. He clashed with Hartlepool's owners and says he was not upset to lose that job after less than a season despite promotion. Weeks after he arrived at Luton the club went into administration.

"It was turmoil when I came here. The bloke running the club, John Gurney, the supporters wanted out. They wouldn't buy season tickets until he'd gone. It could have been a three-week job if they'd got him out and brought back Joe Kinnear and Mick Harford [who had been controversially sacked]. There was talk of that because the season hadn't started. People were a bit wary of me and I think the reason I got a chance was because I was an ex-player here and I brought back Mick Harford, which was always my intention."

Mid-table last season despite a transfer embargo, Luton have prospered with the help of astute signings and fewer injuries. Newell hopes to end up with a Premiership job.

"I think it's more possible to work my way up as a manager than it was as a player," he says. "As a manager I don't have any restrictions in terms of physical ability." Luton's form suggests the years he spent preparing are paying off!



Nico gets Player of the Month

Influential midfielder Kevin Nicholls has been named as the Travel Extras Player of the Month for third consecutive month. After a close vote last month the Town's captain was a comfortable winner this time around, edging out the central defensive pair of Chris Coyne and Curtis Davies

Nicholls, claimed a third of the vote, with last month's runner up, Australian centre-half Coyne (22%), again pushing him for the award. He finished just ahead of his defensive colleague, Davies, who picked up 16% of the nominations. Well done Kev!

Duo make lon 50

Curtis Davis and Steve Howard have been voted in the top 50 as the best players outside the Premiership.

The poll, which was constructed by Football Magazine FourFourTwo, shows Davis and Howard amongst the top 25 players outside the Premiership, ahead of players such as Nick Barmby of Hull City, Sam Parkin of Swindon Town and Paul Ince of Wolves (who came in at 30th position).

Steve came into the poll in 21st place while Curis stormed in at 16th! Not bed eh! Congratulations lads.

Midfielders here for another year

It has been confirmed that midfielders Kevin Nicholls and Ahmet Brkovic have signed new deals at Kenilworth Road. Both players have signed new one-year contracts to seal their immediate futures at the club.

Nicholls, who has been influential this season, has made 141 appearances for the Hatters since making the move from Wigan in August 2001. The current club captain has gone on to score 22 goals for the Hatters.

Brkovic has also been in inspirational form scoring 12 goals this season from midfield, including the vital winner against Hull City back in February.

Newell told the website: "We are obviously delighted to have tied both Kevin Nicholls and Ahmet Brkovic for another year and it's a reward for their hard work and efforts this season,"



Player Interview

EARLY YEARS: Football has always been part of life for Curtis. 'Football is all I ever used to do with my mates on the estate when I was little, just kicking the ball about and that, it's what everyone wants to do. I started off playing Sunday League from about 11, and District and County - once you got into County level it started to get a bit more serious and you started looking into clubs and that.' Has Curtis always played in defence though? 'I have played everywhere to be truthful, I started off up front like every kid - every kid wants to be a striker and be scoring the goals! But obviously as you get older different aspects of your game start to show through and eventually I just got pushed back in a game for my Sunday League team when I was about 14, it was just as cover and I did well so I ended up staying there!'

WIMBLEPON: Curtis got a trial at Wimbledon by his PE teacher from school! 'I was at Wimbledon - when it was Wimbledon for a year, but then I got injured and didn't really get in so I eventually got released.'

LUTON TOWN: Curtis decided to write a letter to Luton Town in the hope something would come of it. 'The day after I sent the letter, Dean Rastrick phoned me up and I got a trial at Luton before I signed YTS. I was really lucky- Luton were keen so I came straight down to see them.' In all Curtis sent about 20 letters to clubs in and around London and of those, only 3 of them got back to Curtis! 'Only Luton, Colchester and Southend got back to me with response to say come training, the others all said sorry but I'm happy here at the end of the day!' All in all, I think you will all agree that coming to Luton was the best decision Curtis could have made! With some solid performances in defence this season, Curtis shares his thoughts of the season so far. 'We've gotta be confident, we have been at the top for about 20 of the games this season so it's not luck! At first people might have thought on yeah, they're on a roll, they won six games at the beginning of the season then as soon as we drew and lost at Boston, they all thought yeah, the wheel has come off now, that's it. But we are up there for a reason because we are that good and hopefully we can stay there till the end of the season and hopefully win it rather than just getting promoted - although just getting promoted would be good, it's promotion we want!' After time at the top, Luton then dropped down to second behind Hull. 'I didn't want to look at the table when Hull went above us, we had been there so long so I didn't look again until we went back to top so I've been looking again recently, as long as we stay there, we will be alright!'

Curtis is happy with the way he has played this season. 'I'm glad to be part of the team, at the beginning of the season I was signed by the Gaffer and I don't think he was expecting me to do as well as I have. I had confidence in myself that I could get in the team, it was just whether the Gaffer wanted me in it! Once I got in the team, it was more a case of me staying in the team rather than just thinking I have always got a place. Luckily I have cemented my place now I hope and I'm just enjoying it!' Curtis is still frustrated at being the only player to have not scored a goal yet this season. 'It's a mental thing now, had I scored earlier in the season, I don't think it would have been a problem and probably would have scored a few but Sol is getting to me and getting in my head about it! The keepers seem to have great games when I want to score but I will get one soon I hope!'

Playing against Ajax stands out as one of Curtis' best moments in his career so far. 'Playing against big players, playing against Ajax, even though it was just a friendly, it's just an experience to play against a full strength team like that. I played against Charlton, that was good and I played at Loftus Road last year against QPR, it was only my second or third start for Luton and it was such a big game. The way the game turned out - it was a good moment.' There have also been some bad memories Curtis would rather forget like Hartlepool last season. 'I gave away a penalty in the 90th minute in the 4-3 thriller so I want that bit to be wiped away from my memory! Other than that, so far, I have no other bad memories other than when we played Brentford and I slipped before they scored their first goal that led to them winning. I wasn't happy, I know I can't help slipping but I couldn't help getting frustrated with myself and obviously I could say I let the lads down, but hopefully it won't cost us going up, I learnt from it and just have to try and put things right and learn from mistakes.'

INTERESTS: Outside of football, Curtis keeps busy by playing on his Playstation 2. 'I spend alot of time playing ISS on PS2, I like my music, R&B, hip hop and all that. I avoid golf but when I get time I do enjoy playing basketball with my friends.' Only football matches that interest Curtis will convince him to watch them on TV! 'I only watch big games, like Man Utd and Arsenal or teams that affect us in the league. I follow Man Utd and also Orient as it was my local club when I was growing up, but I'm mainly a Man Utd fan - yes, I'm another one of those who supports them but isn't

Unbeaten for half a season...

Luton's first promotion saw them go the whole of the second half of the 1913/14 season unbeaten.

Luton had the more difficult Christmas faced with the long trip to Newport County with a weakened team, they dropped two points. Croydon had a much easier trip to Brentford continuing their unbeaten run with a 1-0 win, followed by a 2-0 win over Abertillery to set them up amazingly twenty four hours later for a top of the table clash with Luton that ended in a 1-1 draw.

Poor weather saw Luton's first game of the year being called off, which turned out to be a relief for trainer Billy Lawson who had been trying to get several first team regulars back to full fitness. Croydon Common extended their run with a 3-0 win at Barry. Luton started the New Year without regular Goalkeeper Percy Mitchell, while the experienced James Wilkie was preferred over the teenage prodigy Sid Hoar in the home game against Caerphilly; an easy 4-0 win. A week later in the return game, Mitchell returned along side his former Sheffield United team mate James Robinson, but it was the inclusion of young and old with Arthur Durrant coming in on the left with young Sid Hoar playing only his second ever game, Luton played their finest football of the season winning 9-0. Playing on an almost grassless pitch covered in Coal dust, both sides came off the field they looking as if they had spent a shift down a pit. The win established a line-up, which more or less stayed together for the remainder of the season. Luton's next game proved to be more of a stiffer test against Brentford. A 3-1 win emphasised the difference in class in the league that season. Luton were beginning

to hit top form with a comfortable win over Aberdare Athletic, 5-1 away. Three consecutive home wins were recorded over Barry, Llanelli and Ton Pentre; the winning continued away at Swansea, Town. While Luton were on this winning streak Croydon Common's unbeaten run continued with only a single point dropped to Luton's Christmas Day victors, Newport County. At this stage of the season for Luton any dropped point could cost the Championship; and on the 28th March in a run of the mill game against Mid Rhondda a 1-1 draw was forced out of the game.

In the last month of the season the task was for Luton to win every game and hope Croydon Common would start losing. Both teams started the month well. Croydon beat Pontypridd 2-1 while Luton won 5-0 at home to Swansea Town. Then in the next game Croydon crashed to their first defeat of the season losing 3-1 at Abertillery. A point spirited the two sides as Luton beat a strong Stoke side

With two further games to be played over

the three remaining days of the Easter

holiday, Luton had their destiny in their own hands being a point behind Croydon Common. Luton had the hardest of the remaining games away to Brentford who had been chasing the top two all season, and Croydon having to take on an Aberdare Athletic side who were second from bottom. Croydon easily shook off their defeat with a 6-0 win. Luton faced Brentford and were held to a 0-0 draw, contemporary reports suggested Luton were lucky to gain a point. In an amazing fluke of the fixture list Croydon's next match was home to Brentford who proved their worth in holding them to a 0-0 draw. Luton had to visit fourth placed Stoke, making one change, George Dodd

coming into the side in place of Edgar

Stevens. Goals from Simms and Brewis

gave Luton a 2-1 win. The last game of

the season saw both Luton and Croydon

clash at Kenilworth Road. The out come

of the match was of no consequence, as

Croydon would have had to have lost

26-0 to lose their championship.

Luton had already beaten Croydon Common in the FA Cup at home in November and were in good form. Both sets of supporters turned out for the game. Supporters of Croydon paid a 5/shilling excursion to come to Luton filling Kenilworth Road to its full capacity of around 7,000 for the first time in its eight and a half years existence. Luton took the game to Croydon right from the start putting their otherwise sound defence under a lot of pressure. Luton went in at half- time a goal up, thanks to Arthur Wileman who had already scored twenty six goals during the season. Wileman added a second during the second half, with Percy Page gaining a consolation goal for Croydon Common.

Was this the best Christmas ever?

After my last article in this newsletter. concerning some of the memorable Christmas matches in the Hatters history, one long standing supporter reminded me of a remarkable game that I had completely ignored. He was referring to that holiday period in 1974 when the Town under Harry Haslam, were playing in the old first division.

The club had gained promotion earlier in the year under the captaincy of Bobby Thompson, the former England international, ably assisted by players like Faulkner, Garner, Anderson, John Ryan, Husband, Aston and Jimmy Ryan. They finished second in that season behind Middlesborough, the runaway leaders, and duly stepped up to the top flight with an opening game against the all conquering Liverpool. It was a tough assignment and although the Town played very well they lost a close contest by 2 goals to one. Harry Haslam later admitted that this initial game probably took much of the Town's confidence and enthusiasm away from them and by mid December Luton were firmly at the foot of the table with only one win from 21 games.

At the juncture, the manager, somewhat belatedly perhaps. introduced several promising young players into the Town's line up. Firstly he brought in Buckley for Thompson and Paul Futcher replaced Alan Garner, and in their first home game on 21st December, Luton sneaked only their second win of the season against Derby County, Buckley was the archetype full back; tough as an ox, strong in the tackle with a powerful left footed shot. Paul Futcher, on the other hand, was a tall, blond centre back with the skill of a seasoned professional; his pure footballing ability and unhurried style of play was as cultured as anyone had seen since the days of Bob Morton.

After the euphoria of this game had died down, the next fixture, which this piece is really all about, was against the

league leaders on Boxing Day at Portman Road. Ipswich had been playing superbly and their home record of 10 wins and 1 draw did not auger well for poor old Luton.

It was a freezing cold day down in Suffolk with not a great deal of support from Luton's famous away day fans, but it was nevertheless, a day when Haslam proved that he could get his tactics dead right. Firstly, he introduced Paul Futcher's brother, Ron at centre forward. Although Ron and Paul were twins, they were also quite dissimilar, for Ron was tough, flery and uncompromising, which was probably what the Town needed against such a cultured side like Ipswich. But another aspect of Haslam's acute logistics that day was that the Town's defence of John Ryan, Faulkner, Futcher and Buckley played well upfield, almost on the half-way line, and denied Ipswich the creative space in midfield. It completely foxed Bobby Robson's high flyers and on the rare occasions that the opposing forwards did break through, the Luton rear-guard simply ran back and pushed the ball back to Home in the Luton goal. It was a ploy that denied Ipswich all but a couple of shots throughout the whole match.

The Hatters were no better, but in the last minute of the game, one chance arrived that made bitterly cold Boxing Day one of our warmest memories. Aston centred and Ron Futcher, the debutante, headed a superb goal to win

Among all the irate Suffolk supporters outside the ground, we crept quietly down to the station and boarded the train for London. It was only when we were well beyond the bounds of Ipswich that we went crazy with the sheer delight of one of the most remarkable and memorable Christmas games we have ever seen.
