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Progress in the FA Cup is supposed to be fraught with difficulties for all except the best teams, and it appears that this seasons competition is following that pattern, with Manchester United and Bolton Wanderers being the exceptions. However, our beloved Hatters are also making it look less difficult than in some previous years, and for this we must be grateful. Glory beckons, and the lads look confident enough to take it. However, the competition so far has been fraught with difficulties for those of us who want cheer the team on, to such an extent that you could almost feel like giving up.

The 3rd round gave us postponement and a midweek game, promptly followed by the ticket farce that was the 4th round (of which more elsewhere) and an accompanying change of date. The 5th round offered no shortage of tickets, but offered also the sort of scenes we haven't witnessed since March 1985. The sixth round has only just been drawn, but already promises to be another case of not enough tickets, with West Ham said to be offering a paltry 3800. Frankly, it just isn't good enough, and it looks like the FA have given up on their own rules about ticket allocations. Given what has gone before, we can probably expect a Semi final at Stockport against Man Utd and a Wembley appearance against Bolton with us getting 5000 tickets while they get 60000.

Going back to the fifth round, events at Cardiff seemed to take everyone by surprise, including the South Wales Police who expected trouble, but not of that ferocity. It is scenes like those that cause many people to stay away from football matches, but have been largely combated by other clubs such as Millwall, who do not choose to bury their heads in the sand like Cardiff City. To quote their chairman, Rick Wright, "Anyone who comes here to cause trouble can expect to be severely dealt with". Oh yeah? What about the bloke who walked, yes walked, to the centre circle to accost Preecey after he had scored? Severely dealt with? He wasn't even stopped.

At least the police are taking things seriously, and an incident room has been set up in Cardiff to investigate the events. If you have evidence, get in touch with PC Peter Palmer at Luton nick. Remember, if you decide you don't want to get involved, you are helping the nutters get away with it. As investigations continue, and we get more information in the coming weeks, we will give an update on these matters in our next issue.

The Takeover Trail

At the time of issue 19 being put together, it looked likely that Luton Town was going to be under control of new owners within a matter of weeks. Even though at that time the takeover had been under way for something like six or seven weeks, and there appeared to be a growing number of obstacles to it's completion, it was still possible to be optimistic. Sadly any optimism was misplaced and in spite of any public pronouncements it still appears that David Kohler never really wanted to sell, and he was saved from that by Cliff Bassett putting his money in. This is not to suggest that this is why Mr Bassett made his investment, his motives are, as far as we can tell, simply those of a dedicated and wealthy supporter who wants to help keep the team together. Regardless of this it was the Bassett money that secured Kohler's future.

As far as the failure of the bid is concerned it seems that both sides are quite content to blame the other for the failure. The consortium suggesting that Kohler continually moved the goalposts, and Kohler suggesting that the consortium failed to act promptly and push the deal through. It is likely that the truth contains elements of both, but now that it has fallen through it is not really important why.

David Kohler now, as ever, says that he does not wish to sell the club, and given that his position has been consolidated by Cliff Bassett's money and his acquisition of Peter Nelkin's shares, it is certain that he will be more difficult to shift, and it will take

considerably more money.

So with the takeover having failed, where does the club go? The major consolation is that Bassett's money is available to the club under the condition that players are not sold to balance the books. The first evidence of this was that at the same time as the takeover being officially killed off, a number of staff were made redundant at Kenilworth Road. Whilst we at Mad would not wish unemployment on anyone, it is in the administration area that cost savings must be made, and if these actions keep a player at Luton, they can't be all bad. At the same time it is important that those who remain are experts at their jobs, rather than simply enthusiasts, as they will be more cost effective in the long run.

Given that it was so important for money to be put into the club, we have to wonder when the club will finally be breaking even financially. Crowds are not that far short of the break even figure, and the cup run and TV money will more than make up for any shortfall, so why should any extra money be needed?

As for the future, the club still needs a new ground and we still wait for some sort of announcement, other than warnings about homelessness from the council. What we want is a football ground ideally to hold about 20,000, and presumably either a wealthy investor or some creative accountancy to finance it. What we do not need is something that is as much an ego trip as a useful project, and anything that is new to the UK and new to football which will be viewed with deep suspicion by the rest of football. Our club has already suffered from being the subject of two experiments in recent years, and we do not need any more. It is also worth remembering that when it comes to applying for planning permission, the amount of opposition will be affected by the amount of greenery that disappears under the planned concrete.

Overall, the future of the club does not appear to be entirely secure, and if the recent past is anything to go by, it will be some time before it is. Whichever way you look at it, and regardless of your position on David Kohler, there is a long way to go before we can be entirely happy with things. At least the team are doing their part.

Dear Sir/Madam,

With reference to the forthcoming F.A. Cup fourth round tie between Newcastle United and Luton Town.

As an avid Luton supporter I was delighted when the draw for the fourth round of the cup was made and we drew your club. This is, by far, our biggest F.A. Cup game we've had since reaching the semi-final in 1988. It was, therefore, very distressing to be told that we had only been allocated 750 terraced tickets and no seating tickets for the match. These tickets were made available to season ticket holders only and were sold in 48 hours after our game with Southend United in the third round.

As a general rule, I thought every club was under obligation to provide the opposing team with a certain percentage of the tickets available for an F.A. Cup tie. This has obviously not happened, therefore depriving genuine supporters of a good small club, the opportunity of seeing their biggest game for years.

My mind immediately springs back to the league fixture last season between the two clubs. After lifting the away fans ban (and rightly so) the club gave Newcastle 2200 tickets for the game and the opportunity for the fans of Newcastle to buy tickets for the only part of the ground which non members and guests can get in. The total amount of Newcastle fans there that evening was in excess of 2500. That is 20% of the ground capacity and 25% of the attendance that night. Before that game I was chatting to some Geordies who were persistently moaning about the lack of tickets we had supplied them for the game and that Luton should be thrown out of the league. I told them that we had been thrown out of the League Cup for refusing to let in away fans and I agreed that it was correct, but when I told them that Newcastle had been given 20% of the tickets for the game they agreed that it was a fair amount. They continued, however, to boast how Newcastle F.C. were committed to away fans being at their games and that a fair percentage of tickets were always given to the opposing team. I now hear that you allocated 100 tickets to Southampton for the league on Saturday and the same amount to Norwich for a forthcoming league game. This is more of an insult than a gesture and is effectively an "away fans ban".

I can understand that your ground is undergoing development and that you must look after your own loyal fans first, but I find it difficult to understand how you can so blatantly overlook the rules regarding ticket allocation. I have been told that you are taking advantage of a rule within the Taylor report, maybe you could confirm this?

The recent cup tie between Manchester United and Portsmouth is a good example to make my point. Portsmouth were given an allocation of 7000 for the game at Old Trafford despite the fact that Manchester United could have sold the tickets twice over themselves. Portsmouth have, in return, allocated Manchester United 6000 tickets for the replay, denying some of their fans a chance to see the game.

Luton Town have said that they hope to beam the game on Saturdy live by satellite at Kenilworth road. I hope you will be making the gesture of offering financial help towards the cost of this exercise so that the disappointed fans can see the game.

I will be writing to the Secretary of Luton Town asking him to consider your ticket allocation in the (unlikely!) event of a replay. I will ask him to take into consideration the fact that you have given us 2.34% of your ground capacity (32000 I believe) and ask him to offer you the same percentage, thus giving 304.2 of your fans the opportunity to see the game (I feel sorry for the person who gets 0.2 of a seat!!!) I fear, however, that he would not consider my views and would probably give you as many tickets as you liked.

May I finally wish your team best wishes for the rest of the season (except in the F.A. Cup of course!) and I look forward to seeing the game on Saturday unlike many of my friends who will not be able to make the journey despite being season ticket holders and going to all away games. I also look forward to your reply.

Dear Mr Tyler,

Further to your letter dated 24th January 1994 on the subject of ticket allocation for the Newcastle United FA Cup 4th Round Tie on Saturday next 29th January.

As you are probably aware, the Gallowgate end of the stadium at Newcastle is being redeveloped and in the absence of adequate segregation in existing seating areas and until the new Gallowgate Stand has been built, the Northumbria Police would not agree to an allocation of seats for visiting fans in existing seated areas of the ground. This position will not be resolved until next season when the Gallowgate End of the stadium is completed.

In view of their difficulties, the Football Association have given Newcastle United dispensation for this season to offer visiting clubs an allocation of standing tickets in two areas of the Gallowgate End of the stadium that can be segregated. These separate areas allow an allocation of either 750 or 3142 standing.

Following consultation and information received from the local Police, it was our understanding that the average travelling support is considerably lower than 3,142 although perhaps a little higher than 750.

Taking into account that our average home support excluding visitors is around 5,500 to 6,000 this season, the Club felt it could not possibly accept an allocation of 3,142 knowing that a large proportion of these would be returned and in view of the segregation problems, would remain unsold.

By creating such a situation, it would have been grossly unfair on the Newcastle Club, hence our decision to only accept the 750 allocation of standing tickets.

In accepting this option, we have upset a number of supporters, but regrettably once we had made the commitment on 750, it could not then be changed as Newcastle by then had started to sell from the block of 3.142.

Of the 750 tickets received, there were allocated to JEANW Executive Box, Century Club and Club 83 Members. No tickets for officials were taken from the allocation as the directors receive a seperate allocation for the Newcastle Directors Box.

I can only apologise to you that we have on this occasion not been able to provide you with any tickets but the above explanation outlines our reasoning for the decision taken.

As per issue 19, we recommend strongly the TOM HOSKINS, Queens Bridge Drive, almost two minutes walk from the station, with a good selection of Hoskins and guest beers. Otherwise its the old favourites like the NORFOLK HOTEL, London Road or the RIVERWAY, Arkwright Walk. But on the whole the Tom Hoskins is by far the most sociable of the three.

15.03.94 BOLTON WANDERERS

If this match is still on this date with FA Cup commitments making inroads into the league programme, then most of you won't have huge amounts of drinking time, by the time you've travelled. If you do however, try the CLIFTON ARMS, Newport Street, opposite the railway station, a free house, or the WAGGON & HORSES, Manchester Road, which is near to the football ground.

26.03.94 BARNSLEY

A chance to see if Gerry Taggart has calmed down since his brief appearance at Kenilworth Road, and an opportunity for one of the editorial team to celebrate an imminent birthday, no doubt by buying an enormous round of drinks. (probably a good time to start campaigning against ageism, as well). About the only place worth drinking is the OLD WHITE BEAR, 150 Pontefract Road (the A628), three quarters of a mile from the town centre, and "handy for the football ground". It is a free house with several guest beers.

30.04.94 MILLWALL

For those who count such things, a new ground, and an interesting experience for those who don't. Millwall fans complain that the atmosphere isn't the same, which might be disappointing for them, but is a relief for us. Drinking is best done, as ever, in central London, our favourite being the WHEATSHEAF, Stoney Street, just down the road from London Bridge station. The nearest station for the New Den is, incidentally, South Bermondsey.

04.04.94 GRIMSBY TOWN

Easter Monday at the seaside, but the idea loses some of its gloss when the name of Grimsby is added. Drink at WILLYS, High Cliff Road, a pub with its own brewery, or the NOTTINGHAM HOUSE, Seaview Street, a Tetleys house.

23.04.94 WOLVERHAMPTON WANDERERS

Doesn't April seem a long time away? By then this game could be taking place on a Sunday to accommodate TV coverage of a team bidding for promotion or the play offs, and on current form it could, just could, be either team! This will also be an interesting ground to visit, now that the redevelopment is completed. But be warned, the stewards at Molineux can be a bit funny, earlier in the season a Palace supporter was ejected for "shouting loudly". Pre match beverages should be taken at the very highly recommended GREAT WESTERN, on Sun Street, adjacent to the old Low Level station, with Holdens beers. Also try the POSADA, Lichfield Street, a Holt, Plant & Deakin pub in the town centre.

Getting it right

For the past two and a half years I have been one of David Pleats most severe critics. Never a huge fan of the man during his first spell, I always felt that it was a mistake for him to return, to try and restore past glories. On the principle of lightning never striking twice in the same place, he would not be able to repeat what he had achieved previously. Like many others, the all too regular appearances on radio and television commentaries did little to endear him to me. His signings policy seemed (and still seems) to be "if they've played for me before...."

Now whilst it may be a bit premature to say I was completely wrong, I have to admit that the man does seem to be getting things right just lately, in a quite spectacular fashion. All of a sudden the younger players have found their best form and confidence all at the same time. The likes of Becksy, Telfer and Oakes have been outstanding, and the old heads of Harper and Peake look as though the ageing process has passed them by (Harper, incidentally, looks as though the shaver has passed him by as well). Up front Dixon is showing the sort of form that makes Chelsea wonder why they let him go for a paltry half million quid.

However, the point is that no matter how well the players are playing, and justifying the mans faith in them, it is the tactics that have made the difference. The 4-5-1 formation which so many of us are suspicious of, is now working and, what's more, looks a damn sight more attacking than playing 2 or 3 up front. If confirmation was needed that the man has got it right, it came in the Sky TV programme 'The Boot Room' shown the day after the Newcastle game. The first half of the programme had been recorded only hours before that game, and consisted of DP telling Andy Gray how Newcastle would be beaten. It was quite uncanny how accurate it was, and it left me in no doubt that our victory in that game was largely due to the tactical advantage inspired by David Pleat. Of course the players carry out the instructions of the manager, and it is to their credit that they did so so well.

Anyway, I'd better stop saying nice things about DP now, before I totally destroy my own reputation as a cynic. But before I finish I have to say that the week in question was bound to have some influence one way or another on my opinion as DP was on TV so

have stolen from the jaws of the death? They obviously have never heard Brian Clough's adage on the length of time required to score a goal or they'd stay and watch the impending goal feast. No, they have strange secret plans for those three minutes at which we ordinary mortals can but guess - after all it's only just time to boil an egg! The only cure for these sufferers is to wish them well as they pass on their way. Cheerily shout after them: "enjoy your three minutes, mate!"

Is it fear of being silly? What makes a person pay good money to sit and watch a match that will only occupy them from three till about quarter to five, only to decide, as the end approaches, that perhaps they'd have been better off somewhere else? This can only be explained by the sudden realisation that their friends and family are right after all, and they really are half-left to spend their time watching 22 men kick a ball around. They come to their senses, gaze around and think: "what am I doing here?" and off they go, hoping no-one they know spots them on the way out and they can escape before they are branded as a 'football fan'. They live in perpetual fear of being approached with the words "what did you think of the game on Saturday then?" The cure? There is none but you could always try turning their TVs off three minutes before the end of a film just for a laugh.

Or is it just losing 6-0? This perhaps at once the more understandable and yet most contemptible of possible psychological disorders. The only cure is to yell at them as they go: "fair weather supporters!" There is no hope for anyone who is so easily disillusioned. Lost to them is the poignancy of the final whistle at the end of another stupefying defeat, all the more worse if it is a home defeat, the collective dejection as you gaze at the floor, look out once more on the pitch and then turn with an incredulous shake of the head, knowing full well you'll be back next week for more.

So there we have it, but this treatise would not be complete without a confession. Yes I, even I, once left a match early. It was a Saturday early in the 80/81 season and we were losing, in an utterly dreadful game, 1-0 to Wrexham. I had taken a non footballing friend along to introduce him to the delights of the game and, as 89 minutes had passed felt so sorry for him that I suggested going - at this suggestion he moved so quick that you

could have mistaken him for David Moss. And I expect you can guess what happened next - yes, that is right, no sooner had my feet passed the exit gate than did a huge roar ensue, as we (Frank Bunn of all people) equalised in injury time. Served me right - I have never left early again - and do you know what? I never will.

- 9. Grimsby v Sunderland was abandoned after 6 minutes, beating (?) Luton v Darlington in 1967/68 which lasted a whole 7 minutes, and becoming the earliest ever abandonment in the process.
- 10. Town wore their away strip at home to Sheffield Wednesday on 1/3/86, to avoid a colour clash with the piles of snow around the pitch.
- 11. There was a hold up in play after a shot by Malcolm Macdonald hit a post causing the goal to collapse.
- 12. Oxford City were drawn at home, but after a postponement switched the game to Luton due to their lack of floodlights. They then bought a set with their share of the gate money.
- 13. The last seven Town players to represent Northern Ireland were Phil Gray, Iain Dowie, Kingsley Black, Danny Wilson, Mal Donaghy, Billy Bingham and Bud Aherne. We actually had in mind Paul Gray, who appeared for the under-21s, and would have accepted that if it had made any difference.
- 14. Warren Neil of QPR scored a brace of own goals for the Town in November 86 and February 88.
- 15. Billy Jennings, in April 1982, was the last ex-Watford player to play for Luton.



- 15. Billy Jennings, in April 1982, was the last ex-Watford player to play for Luton.



Effort: A, Attainment: 9/10

Scott Oakes: Always producing glimpses of what he is capable of, he has been incredibly frustrating. However, since Christmas, Scott has been outstanding. Working much harder, he has the pace factor (all important) and now actually goes round defences. Can't end without remarking on his superb stunning run and finish a month back against Derby. Because of the hunger strike, and subsequent campaign, some prisoners have now been given release dates. The Professional Footballers' Association made a donation to the campaign.

The "crimes" these prisoners were convicted for were either committed in the struggle to bring down apartheid, or in defence of their communities from armed attacks. We are now continuing the campaign for an amnesty for all of them.

The prison conditions they face are very harsh. However, they are allowed to receive gifts, including football equipment and videos. Football is the number one sport for black South Africans. We are therefore asking football supporters in Britain for donations to a fund to buy football and other sports equipment and videos for these prisoners.


May the best team win the replay, as long as it's us!
