

### **Grounds for Concern**

I wrote most of this article for possible publication by the Luton News for the start of the season (they pay better than Mad). I like to think that they didn't print it because is was so politically contentious, although it's more likely they thought it was rubbish or it got lost in a drawer somewhere.

To be honest the kick off to the new season wasn't as miserable as I'd feared it would be. True, the atmosphere in the newly seated Kenilworth Road end is morgue like (we are now outsung not only by the away fans but also by the dozen or so away fan baiters in the Maple) and the football is invariably crap but, whether because of the usual misplaced early term optimism or that deep down we don't really resent this sitting down lark too much, the gloom I'd predicted would fall over the supporters hasn't taken hold as yet. Given time though, and given cold weather, the sound of "Jingle Bells" coming from Oak Road and attendances dropping; the future may begin to look bleak. Good news about the planned stadium is needed soon.

Sinister undertones of the council's attitude toward the club were reported in the letters page of the Luton News early this year when the leader of the council, Cllr Roy Davis, reportedly told a meeting of Slip End and Caddington residents "I want to get rid of them [the football club] too". I wrote a scathing letter to Cllr Davis about his comments, requesting he make the official council position known. I also wrote to our two MPs, John Carlisle and Graham Bright, and also to Town chairman David Kohler. From Cllr Davis I received a letter saying that his comments had been misconstrued, that he had been a fan of the great Town team of the 50s (with the names of his favourite players as proof) and that the council were behind the junction 10 plan. John Carlisle said that he too was in favour of the club moving to the junction 10 site (currently owned by Luton Hoo). Graham Bright, whose constituency covers the junction 10 site along with true blue Slip End and Caddington, tactfully declined to answer my letter. David Kohler on the other hand invited myself and a few like minded supporters to visit him and see how very real the plans are - but in the strictest confidence.

We saw how the stadium would look, how it would be paid for, and the revolutionary designs incorporated therein. We were impressed, even excited by the prospect. But that was in May.

Since then at least two of the revolutionary designs we saw have made their debuts at the World Cup. Plans for building, being slightly held up in May, are now a few months further behind. Meanwhile Luton townsfolk have seen

the pictures of BC Place in a full colour picture on the front page of the Herald &Post with the headline "THIS FOR LUTON". But why should Town supporters get excited about that when the same front page headline was used on the paper a year or so back with a colour picture of the Ferraris stadium in Italy?

Luton fans more than most have seen ambitious plans come to nothing and the scenario of the club running for years and years on dwindling gates and haggling with the council over rent, and lease extensions, at Kenilworth Road must seem more likely than our sitting in our brand spanking new all seater covered stadium in three years time.

One ray of hope that might make the idea more believable is if you re-evaluate the position of David Kohler as chairman of Luton Town FC. Ask yourself why he is still here even though he is unpopular with the fans and the local press, he has had death threats and openly admits that he doesn't have the money to put things right. Could it be that he sees the new stadium, for which he needs the club in order to get planning permission, as his goldmine? In our meeting he used the line about "giving the club a home for life" as if he was playing Santa Claus. That being so the stadium would be much more than a football ground with he, and his backers, all taking a healthy slice of the profits. Certainly it would seem that if the stadium is built then LTFC's position would have to be seriously looked into. Would it be owner, or merely a day visitor at the weekend? (A number of clubs have found the latter to be almost unworkable).

At the moment that would seem a nice problem to have to worry about (and the bonus is - we could still distrust DAK). In the meantime the supporters have still heard no news. I could spread rumours, but what's the point? Until David Kohler tells the press something concrete (something for which he can be held accountable) then we're stuck here at a Kenilworth Road that is fast losing it's charm and with council troublemakers breathing down our necks to move on.

## SHOOT DOWN THE SHOOT OUT

Now that the game's ultimate match has joined the increasing number of cup ties being decided by the pure chance of a penalty shoot out, it is time the authorities woke up to the fact that there is a fairer method. My reference to the 'ultimate match' is, of course Brazil v Italy, not Fulham v Luton Town!

When I say a 'fairer method' I mean a way that maintains the excitement, yet lets the game be decided in open play. It is called the 'withdrawal method' (not to be confused with another activity which reaches a climax). Basically, it involves players coming off (again, no confusion, please).

There are many variations that could be applied. I would favour extra time itself being played with less players. Extra time would consist of 10 minutes each way with 7 players on each side. If, at the end of the 20 minutes the teams were still level, there would be 5 minutes each way with 4 players on each side. If still level, then play would continue till the next goal. The team which scores it would be the winner.

Anybody with a knowledge of the game will realise that the potential for goalscoring will be greatly increased with fewer players on a full sized pitch. There is the added benefit that the scorers 'goals' will count whereas penalty shoot out goals do not. But more than anything else, more elements of the game will be retained - the pass, the tackle, the header, the corner, the throw in, the free kick, not to mention the diabolical foul, the professional foul, the hospital ball and, of course, the cock up (yet again, think soccer!).

Yes, I firmly believe the withdrawal method is much better than the lottery of a penalty shoot out. And a recent visit to Craven Cottage has only reinforced my views. I have a sneaking feeling that Messrs Telfer, Oakes and Marshall would agree with me.

standard, like Roger Milford, could then be offered the door or trained up to a decent standard.

Hatters on the Information Superhighway - an article of football and computers

I expect that most readers of this fanzine have already turned over the page having seen the word "computers" in the heading. While we've all been following the rise and fall of our favourite team a quiet revolution has taken place. The soothsayers say that it will affect the way we work and communicate. If you haven't worked out what I am talking about it's the Internet. This is a computer network where millions of people around the world can send messages to each other from their computers. Without going into the technicalities, each person has a unique "address" in much the same way as they have a phone number. You can send messages round the world at a fraction of the cost of the phone call and at much faster speed than the post. It is also possible to access large libraries of images and sound.

Enough of this technical bullshit. "What has this got to do with football?" I hear you ask. Because it is so cheap (sometimes free) people set up discussion groups in order to exchange ideas and information. It is therefore natural that the world's number one sport should be well represented. A discussion group (known as a Newsgroup) exists for football related issues (called rec.sport.soccer). This tends to attract the more moronic type of football supporter so if you want to tell the world how much you hate Watford this could be for you. Much better are the mailing lists. There is a general mailing list for football (listserv SOCCER-L) which was originally set up to promote the World Cup, so it's membership is mainly American though there is a strong Irish contingent.

I've always said that the Luton supporters have a bit more grey matter than the average football fan. This is reflected in the Luton Town mailing list. Join this list by sending mail to subscribe\_ltfc@robots.ox.ac.uk with SUBSCRIBE in the message. You will then receive news, reports and opinions from fellow followers of the Town the world over.

Interested? Wondering how to get connected? The best way is to ask your employer to get onto The Internet. This may not be

possible of course. You can get a connection via a phone line to a home PC for as little as ten pounds per month (plus phone charges) which is probably less than the cost of the seat you are sitting in at the moment.

In this short article I hope I've proved to you that computers and the people who work with them aren't all spotty and boring. Once you get connected you can contact me at balljestc.nato.int to find out more. Please address me by my first name.


I then witnessed an event of historic importance to Town followers. Fred Barber SAVED A PENALTY. Memories of April '88 came


#### May

## Crime and Punishment

As we started the season without the talents of Mitchell "Spider" Thomas and John "Elbows" Hartson, and have lately been missing the enthusiasm of Ceri Hughes, it is probably time to take a look at the standards of punishment to be expected this season. With a possible increase in the use of both yellow and red cards, we often find ourselves confused as to what suspension a player will receive, and when it will start.

Armed with this sort of knowledge, it is then a case of knowing when to use it, as bad timing could win the sort of abuse normally reserved for referees.

Among the interesting points to arise is that after being showing a card, the referee must give a written report, in duplicate, to the FA within 2 days (not including Sundays) of any caution, and referee and both linesmen must do so in the case of a sending off. Until this report is submitted the referee is not obliged to tell the player why he has been booked/sent off. On receiving this report the player then has to pay an 'administration fee' of £6.00 for the privilege of knowing why he has been 'carded'.

As for when the suspension starts, the correct wording is as follows:

"Any period of suspension arising from the accumulation of penalty points shall commence on the 14th day following the date of his last offence. The suspension shall cover all domestic league and cup matches and friendly matches until such time as his club's recognised senior team has completed the number of matches appropriate to the punishment in approved competition during the period covered by its opening match in the Football Association Premier League and ending in the final match in which the club is playing in a domestic competition organised by the Football Association or the Football Association Premier League."

There, nothing like seventy-six words without punctuation to clarify an issue.

Why, incidentally, 14 days? (the same for a sending off). This period is actually to allow for claims of mistaken identity to be investigated.

What, then, are penalty points awarded for? Amazingly, most cautions are for ungentlemanly conduct: a foul only becomes bookable when it constitutes ungentlemanly conduct. A list then of crime and punishment:



It may be noted that players cannot be dismissed our booked away from the pitch (ie in the tunnel or in the changing room), but this sort of behaviour can be reported, and punishments are often similar to those given for field offences.

If a player is dismissed for the second time in a season, then an extra one match ban is imposed in addition to the original suspension. For a third dismissal, 2 extra matches are added and so on. Clubs cannot re-arrange games to allow a player to complete his suspension in time for a specific match.

In addition to the above, clubs can be punished for the behaviour of their players if the accumulation of penalty points by all their players is considered to be excessive. The club may be fined, and fines "shall be disbursed to agreed Football Charities". This is marvellously imprecise, and rumours that the Sir Bert Millichip Fund for Homeless Claret, or the Graham Kelly Nutritional Research Society are big beneficiaries are unsubstantiated.

Of course, with increasing cases of violence on the field of play attracting the attention of the constabulary, the penalties are increasingly likely to be harsher on the individual player. But then with so many players regarding suspension as no more than a minor inconvenience, maybe they need a bit more hanging over their heads.
