

EDITORIAL

It doesn't seem like it, but this is the sixth time since we decided to start this fanzine that an end of season editorial has been needed. And for the first time, it can be written in the safe knowledge that we will be in the same division next season, and confident (well, fairly confident) that we will be challenging at the upper end of it. Last summer, many of us expressed a desire that we should see some mid table obscurity this season, and that is what we have got. I, for one, will not be complaining that we missed out, as a couple of good results then would have seen us doing an Ipswich next season.

We certainly seem to have the raw materials for a stronger campaign next season, with Marshall, Taylor and Matthews all looking good signings. David Pleat still has money to spend and we have some good youngsters coming through, particularly in McLaren and Woodsford. With careful spending by Pleat we will have a strong squad to look forward to. Feelings we had about John Hartson a year ago now apply to Kelvin, in that he is a player we must hang on to.

The future also looks brighter with some movement on the subject of a new stadium. This is covered in depth on the following pages, and we would hope that by the start of next season this will have moved on, and the question of land ownership will be resolved. Mad as a Hatter! is in favour of the Kohlerdome proposal, because it shows some ambition, and because it would be foolish to oppose the only option on the table for keeping the club in Luton. The alternative is to say we will wait and see what else is proposed, but we have already been waiting for far too many years. However, we do not like the name and hope and pray the Kohlerdome is only a working title.

By the time you read this there may be some solid news of a testimonial match for David Preece, and if there is we would encourage everybody to support this event. Preecey has been a great servant to the club and deserves the reward for his ten years service.

A couple of weeks ago, at a supporters club meeting, director Chris Green outlined some ideas for improving the clubs financial position, and it's promotion to the people of Luton. Chris is full of ideas and enthusiasm, which we welcome, but so as not to jump the gun, his response to many questions was "Watch this space". For this reason we dedicate any blank spaces in this issue to Chris Green.

This issue is the sixth this season and is another bumper issue of 60 pages, and all at only 50p. If the level of contributions is maintained we will have to do more issues next season. We don't mind, so we just say to all of you, keep up the good work. Have a good summer, and we'll see you next season.

THIS WAY TO THE FUTURE?

On 8th April, at long last, a planning application for a new stadium for Luton Town was lodged with Luton Borough Council. As we all know by now, this is, at this stage at least, called the Kohlerdome. The proposal is for a 20,000 seat covered stadium, with a removable pitch, which could be used for a variety of events. By the time you read this, it will already have been before the council's planning committee for an initial decision, prior to going before the full council. Even assuming that there are no problems with planning permission, it is likely to be a year before detailed plans are completed, and another two years before construction is finished. So we can look forward to another two or three years at Kenilworth Road.

It is fair to say that the plans are revolutionary, bringing the first indoor stadium in Europe, and the first truly multi purpose stadium of this size to Luton. The involvement of Whitbread in the plans is for reasons that are clear to see, with a Hotel, pub and restaurants included. These are the mainstays of Whitbread's business, and they would obviously want to be involved in what would be a flagship development. Also included in the plan are facilities for the University of Luton, which is of increasing importance to the town. The amount of car parking allows for use for a park and ride facility, which will help keep traffic out of the centre of the town.

The pitch system is a completely new concept to all of us, but it has to be said that from the presentations seen so far it has been well thought out, and will have another couple of years to be developed, before it is brought into use. Co-operation from companies involved in the pitch moving system can be expected as they too will want to be associated with its anticipated success.

Much has been made of the fact that Kohler does not own the site, but given the reluctance of Luton Hoo to do business with him so far, the planning application can be seen as an attempt to force their hand. It is quite acceptable to make planning applications on land you do not own, as this will affect the prospects of a sale, and can affect the value of the land. It is said that Luton Hoo are looking to raise £10 million from the sale of the land, which seems an utterly ludicrous figure, without planning permission. It seems to me to be rather high even then, but that is for the experts to sort out.

Support for the scheme has been sought, and successfully received, from fans at the last two home matches, and although some of us may have reservations, it is important that something gets moving on finding the club a new home. Milton Keynes is still on the agenda and, with a rumoured offer of 80 acres of

land at no cost from that area, cannot be ignored. It is imperative that the clubs remains in Luton, and we all know that redevelopment of Kenilworth Road is not far short of impossible. By the time you read this we will have a new council in Luton, after the local elections, and we must start to pressurise the members of the council to support the scheme if it is to be successful. The local MPs seems to think that keeping their mouths shut is the best policy, although given their precarious positions under boundary changes, this may not be so clever. It is clear though that most of the opposition to the plan comes from the Tories, so perhaps they think they are protecting their own interests, even if it does seem strange to see them failing to support a private enterprise.

Speaking of opposition, the local residents in the Stockwood Park area seem to have been caught slightly off guard, and have claimed that the site should remain as parkland, which it isn't, and should not have any retail development, which it won't. They have also used the old chestnut about drunken football hooligans to gain support for their views. Opposition also is coming from the villages of Slip End and Caddington, and the Farley Hill area of Luton. At a protest meeting a while back, it was claimed that 98% of Slip End residents were opposed to the development, and were worried about traffic, and the villages two pubs being full on Saturdays. Presumably the 2% in favour were the landlords of the pubs! Quite why Caddington should be against is questionable, as it is no nearer to the site than Ludlow Avenue is to Kenilworth Road, where the Ludlow Avenue residents want the club to stay.

The matter of the airport flight path has little validity, as this is defined by distance from the runway, and as far as traffic problems are concerned the site is the best possible for distribution of traffic away from the stadium, and by routes that would take most away from residential areas.

The financing of the stadium development is a matter that is yet to be resolved, but David Kohler clearly feels that this would not be a problem, and we have to assume he is right about this. Talk of public funding seems to be a misreading of his comments, which actually revolved around obtaining finance from the National Lottery (presumably the Millenium Fund) and the Football Trust. These would obviously not cover anything like the whole cost of the project, but would make a dent in the amount to be raised, which has been mentioned as £30 million. What has been made clear is that the football club itself would not be used to raise this money, so 'stock clearance' sales of players for the next couple of years should not be needed.

One of the main concerns to some supporters is that David Kohler may make a lot of money out of this project if it succeeds, and it is to his credit that he

does not deny this. He has put his own money into getting the plans this far, and for most of us, if he can get the new stadium without putting the club in jeopardy along the way, and then give the club a secure future, then we can accept him making money from it. And if he does become a multi millionaire, we can then have a go at him for not putting enough of his own money into the club! The one legacy that most, if not all, supporters do not want is to be stuck with the name "Kohlerdome", so lets hope that in the fullness of time this turns out to be no more than a working title.

What happens to the club if and when the project is completed? What David Kohler has said is that the club would have free use of the stadium for all time, and would be able to retain all of their gate monies, as well as receiving a percentage of the profits on other events held there. This would give the club a valuable extra source of income in the future.

From the supporters point of view, of course, there are other concerns. We want our club to have a modern stadium that will hold a decent sized crowd, with everybody getting a decent view of the proceedings. We want this without the prices we pay going through the roof (pun intended), and most of all we want a successful team to go with all this. We can play our part in making sure that the stadium comes about, and must hope that we get the rest to go with it.

THE OTHER SIDE OF THE COIN

While all the publicity has surrounded the Kohlerdome, the occasional mention has been made of a company called Wyncote. You may well ask who the hell they are and what their part is in the story. Well, Wyncote Developments plc are a Sussex based firm, who in 1994 were chosen by the trustees of Luton Hoo to develop the Junction 10 site. Their original plans were said to have included as many as eight large retail units, although this is no longer the case. As we understand it the latest version of the plans Wyncote have for the site allows for a large supermarket and petrol station as the major part of their development, although this has not been finalised. If they achieved this they would make 40 acres of land, and some finance (amount subject to negotiation), available to Luton Town FC for the building of a new stadium. However, Wyncote do not envisage a planning application being made for at least 3 months, and have made it clear that they want a full process of public consultation, and would be happy if this included a public inquiry. We understand that their planning application would include the new football stadium, which would be designed to a capacity of between 15,000 and 20,000. This would at least mean that it would not be necessary to go through the planning process again, but would appear to mean that the club would be getting a stadium that it has had little chance to influence in terms of design or capacity. It is also unclear how much finance would be made available, and in this scenario it is possible that the club would be in a position of having to finance the major part of a development which would bring it little return outside of gate money, and thus jeopardise the future of the club. On the other hand, it could be that the finance offered would be enough to build the complete stadium, giving the club a new home for nothing, as in David Kohler's plan, but this seems a tad unlikely as Luton Hoo will not have entered into this arrangement if it did not involve them making a lot of money. But while plans are only vague outlines, we will have to wait and see.

EXILED HATTERS FAN?

If you are an exile, you'll want to keep up to date with what's going on at Kenilworth Road, and Hatters Matters will enable you to do just that. Hatters Matters is a monthly newsletter designed specifically for the exiled fan, and provides all the news that you won't find on teletext.

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What do the councillors think of the Kohlerdome proposal? This is the question which will effectively seal its fate. We asked all of the outgoing councillors prior to the local elections, and although they did not all respond to our questions, we feel that some of their comments may make interesting reading. Apart from the questionnaires, the Labour and Liberal Democrat groups both made it clear that relocation at Junction 10 is their official policy, and it is also the official policy of Luton Borough Council, and has been since 1991.

We asked the councillors a number of questions, starting off with a general one on the importance of the club to the town's community. Most felt that the club is very important, with some notice being taken of the fact that more people take an interest than attend matches. However, Betty Dodd (Con, Challney) told us "some people are very anti, particularly now soccer violence by players and fans has reared it's ugly head". Ah, Luton Town linked with Cantona, at last.

Next we asked how important it is that the club remains in the town, and on this there was almost (but not quite) unanimity, with "very important" being the most popular answer. The point was also made that the club's mere existence helps promote the town's identity.

Looks a promising start, doesn't it? For the third question we wanted to know if they thought the Junction 10 site was suitable and preferable for a new stadium, and again the majority felt that it is, of those who thought not, one wanted to see it sited on Luton Hoo land nearer the airport, while Kathleen Scott (Con, Limbury) asked if "Mr Kohler would like someone to put in a planning application for his back garden?", clearly pertaining to the fact that he does not own the land. It is worth mentioning that Conservative party opinion was mixed, and not totally opposed as we are sometimes led to believe.

We then asked if the council should consult the views and preferences of the public over different stadium proposals. The council have a duty to carry out consultation of sorts on the planning application anyway, but the answers summed up a wish to see some consultation, but not all were convinced this was a job for the council, and consultation should certainly not stretch to a referendum.

Question 5 asked if they would be in favour of David Kohler's plan for J10, and if they liked the idea of an indoor stadium on the outskirts of town. A surprising number were in favour, or at least liked the idea, albeit with

some reservations concerning traffic and other planning matters. And those members of the planning committee who responded made it abundantly clear that they could not prejudge the issue. But, going against the trend, let's hear it for Michael Garrett (Con, Leagrave) who thinks that the present site (Kenilworth Road) should be redeveloped as an indoor stadium (!)

Mr Garrett also thinks the council should be flexible about the clubs lease on the ground, which runs out in May next year. This was in response to question 6, in which we asked how strict the council should be in terms of the clubs lease on Kenilworth Road. It was this very question which provided the strangest array of answers, with some agreeing the council should be flexible, providing the club is moving within the town, some felt that if this happened it should be at a commercial rent, while Mick Guha (Lab, Biscot) feels that the contract was entered into freely by both sides, and should be honoured. And then there was David Taylor (Lab, Dallow) who informed us that the council have a policy to rehouse the homeless! A perverse answer, but we know what he means.

Asked what should happen if the club is not relocated in Luton, and whether the club should stay at Kenilworth Road or move to Milton Keynes, most said yes, stay at KR, but many also said that the move must happen. None wanted the club to go to MK.


Finally, we asked for any other comments, giving the councillors the chance to express their feelings, and we can only pick out a few highlights here. Several expressed their support for the club, and one expressed a wish that the finished article would not be called the Kohlerdome. There was clear support for the idea of a multi purpose venue and it's benefits for the town, and an understanding of the worries of local residents. Jenny Davies (LibDem, Stopsley) worried about the football authorities accepting the closed roof, and summed up saying "Don't trust them!". the same sentiments were expressed by Betty Dodd, but were directed at David Kohler. Kathy Scott felt that Luton "is not a footballing town" and admitted that she may not have given the answers we wanted. Full marks for honesty. Joyce Felmingham (LibDem, Crawley) suggested that the new stadium could attract events such as "show jumping, Crufts dog show", which is where we end, thinking, for some inexplicable reason, that these would be better of at Vicarage Road!

We would like to thank all those who took the time and trouble to reply, especially as we only gave them a very short space of time, and it was in the middle of campaigning for the local elections.

END OF SEASON REPORTS

Juergen Sommer: Safe, commanding and crowd adoring are the types of things you look for in good goalkeepers. Sadly our Juergen looks severely lacking in each of the above departments, Also lacks much in confidence, and this has shown throughout the season. Shot stopping has never been in doubt, but many believe that the other Juergen - Klinsmann - could dive around between the posts and do a job. May well be Kelvin's understudy next season, if Kelvin isn't sold. Best games: Bristol Rovers (A), Grimsby (A). Worst: The rest, particularly Southend.

Julian James: Perhaps the most improved player this season, Jules is ever dependable. His tackles are superbly timed, his attitude is tremendous and is solid. Makes up in effort for what he lacks in pace. Also scores important goals from time to time. Never looks like producing the cock-up that he did with ease a couple of years ago. Possible future captain.

Best game: Tranmere (H). Worst: Not seen one.

Trevor Peake: Another outstanding season for us, obviously the older he gets, the better he plays. Comes out on top in all aerial duels, and reads the game like Mystic Meg. Trev still reckons he has another season left for us - I won't stop him. Surely a cold Tuesday night up at Burnley deserves more than a little quiff on top, though I can't really imagine Spider in Ricky Hill dreadlocks.

Best game: Bolton (H). Worst: Charlton (H).

Gary Waddock: More ginger than a Crunchie bar, Gary's performances have been pleasing this season. Has fitted in well with the pattern of the team. He only seems to have two weaknesses; 1. Obviously he'll never score for us — Peakey

Best games: Bristol Rovers (A), Barnsley (H). Worst: Sheff Utd (H) (Sent Off!).

Paul Telfer: Rather a mixed season for Luton this season, Paul's richer vein of form has come towards the end of the season, with a few goals to boot. Very patchy after Christmas, and was dropped for the Grimsby trip for the !st time in his career (really?). Only our lack of a decent right sided player who can work a bit kept Telfer back in the side. More recent form, particularly v Wolves, has seen the Telf of old. Tackling, running back and looking more menacing. Less bookings than of old.

Best games: Watford (A), Wolves (H), Swindon (H). Worst: Southampton (A).

David Preece: Still continues to influence the way we play, and has always looked so composed on the ball, even when surrounded by hordes of opposition. A much deserved testimonial will obviously follow next season — perhaps Hessenthaler and his scummy mates could make up the opposition — what a party night! Imagine the tabloid headlines, "PREECE TESTIMONIAL ABANDONED BEFORE BALL KICKED". On a more serious note, Preece has only had one bad game this season, the home match with Reading where his superb passing movements and crosses — to their keeper Boom Shaka-Laka — meant we lost with ease. Best game: Swindon (H). Worst: Bristol Rovers (H), Reading (H).

Dwight Marshall: Top scorer for the Town this season, Dwight knows that with more composed finishing he could have had more goals than Shearer, Fowler and Collymore put together. Still, for a fee of £150,000, nobody is going to moan, and it is nice to see somebody pacy up front for us. Had a little spell around February when he couldn't stop scoring at home, since then, he can't stop missing. Needs a left foot. The big question is why he doesn't stay up for corners

when we are defending. Obviously Pleat reckons 5'5" is able to outjump most defenders. That's the Pleat philosophy for you folks.

John Taylor: When I first heard that Pleaty was interested in signing him, I cast my mind back to a couple of seasons ago, when his equaliser for Bristol Rovers cost us 3 points. Visually, a tall lanky player who would look only ordinary in most sides, such as Cambridge United. Whether through time on the training ground or indeed drugs in large doses, John has proved to be an excellent signing for us so far — well done, David Pleat. His overall effort has been there, he holds the play up superbly and nicked a couple of goals too. In other words better than Kerry Dixon. Could prove interesting with Marshall next season. Best games: Wolves (H), Bolton (A).



THE KOHLERDOME; NAME THAT STAND IN ONE!

Seeing that in a few years time we should have one of the most innovative stadia in Europe, I can't help but think that the Kohlerdome should have interesting and historical names to its various facilities and to the stands in the stadium, so allow me to enlighten you with some of my ideas for naming parts of the complex. If you're going to have an indoor stadium you can't consider calling the stands boring names like the North, East, West and South stands, can you?

- 1 The ramp from the car park leading to the stadium should be named after the '88 Littlewoods Cup win, along the lines of THE BRIAN STEIN WAY, or "2-1 DOWN, 3-2 UP, THAT'S HOW LUTON WON THE CUP" WAY, as it is reminiscent of Wembley Way.

Sure I'd miss the old ground with all its memories and associations. I can still remember the 27,000 crowd against Arsenal in a League Cup match from about '71, but a 10,000 capacity is ridiculous. As for groundsharing, or Milton Keynes, or indoor stadia, forget it. If Northampton and Huddersfield can have a new football stadium, why can't we?

The John Hegley poem really brought back memories for me. The 67/8 season when we won the 4th Division was the first season I attended regularly, went to all the home matches etc. I can still name that team, but usually only do it if I'm at a particularly boring party.

You mentioned Graham French and he was a marvellous player if a bit temperamental (incidentally, which was the "best goal ever scored"). Might be worth doing a piece on him. I've thought about him after all this Cantona stuff. Didn't he go to prison in the early 70s after some sort of incident involving a gun in a pub car park (I think it was the Unicorn in Lewsey Farm), he did play for us again after he came out, but he wasn't quite the same player.

How about starting some regular features like *When Saturday Comes* who used to do a series on great own goals. Most Exciting Match — my choice would be an FA Cup replay from around 1971 when we lost 4-3 to Forest, (in the first match, a 1-1 draw, a shot from Malcolm MacDonald had knocked down one of the crossbars) — or Great Comebacks, I think it was a home match against Carlisle, we were 2-0 down at half time and they scored again just after. I think the scorers were Slough, Busby and MacDonald.

About the Orange shirts offer, I remember thinking how awful it was when they were introduced. Why can't we go back to the plain white shirts and black shorts of the late 60s/early 70s. Is it possible to buy them anywhere?

Sad to hear about people wearing Man Utd/Spurs/Arsenal shirts in Luton. That's one of the things I really hate about football, when people support a team

hundreds of miles away from where they live, just because they're big/successful/glamourous/rich etc. Football teams are like parents, you don't get to choose them, it's just unlucky if you happen to come from Torquay or Gillingham. I really admire people who follow their local team week in, week out even though they know they'll never win the league or play in Europe (ie Rochdale, Doncaster, Northampton etc.). It's OK if you moved from there as a child, or your parents supported them, but otherwise no way.

About a proposed Premiership second division. I'm totally opposed to any system except promotion/relegation on the basis of playing ability and results. Any talk about using other criteria such as financial viability, state of ground, number of supporters is scandalous. If you're a crap team you should go down, even if you're a rich club with a great stadium and crowds of 40,000. As for the regionalization argument, I'm not convinced, I think that travel costs are less of a problem than players salaries.





This sounds really good news as a new stadium is long overdue, even if it has a dodgy sounding name. However, I have also seen items concerning the removal of the pitch between games using hovercraft. Is this true or am I imagining things?

Hattie replies: You are quite right about the new stadium news, including the hovercraft. I suppose there are two ways of viewing these latest developments. One is to be proud that LTFC are at the forefront of the latest technology and hopefully will have an excellent new stadium to see them into the new century, providing luxury so far unknown in UK football grounds (and hopefully a team to match).

The other way is to think back to the alienation suffered by the away supporter ban and plastic pitch of the recent past, and think "Oh God, here we go again". To be honest I can see both sides of the story so I won't get too excited until the new ground is underway.

On the positive side I do look forward to hovercraft moving the pitch around and I see several opportunities to expand on this idea. Maybe in a few years we'll be able to take our own pitch to notable opposition mud baths during the winter months to ensure a decent playing surface. The Baseball Ground at Derby and the Allotments at Watford spring immediately to mind as two likely venues. Also the current trend of watering the pitch to saturation point prior to home games could be replaced by popping the pitch down to the nearby river and giving it a quick dunk, thereby giving it a more even drenching than the current method appears to. The B & Q Depot at Gypsy Lane could be another place to visit for any maintenance work such as reseeding etc. I imagine extra revenue could even be earned from hiring it out every year for a couple of weeks to the Chelsea Flower Show, or other such events.

On the other hand, I see the potential humiliation of Grandstand announcing that the Luton match has been postponed owing to a hovercraft breakdown as a distinct possibility. Worse still, the possibility of the pitch separating into several sections during a game is almost unbearable, although some people sitting near me think that Scott Oakes has been playing on a different pitch to the rest of the team for a large part of this season. Who knows, perhaps in the future he could be put onto a hovercraft and moved into the game a bit more often.

I'm sure you'll agree the possibilities are endless.

We're wonderful, and it's official!

In issue 26 we carried a report of discussions that our correspondent, Clifford Saunders, had with David Kohler and others at LTFC. A couple of times in this item, the police were mentioned, and our favourite bobby, PC 699 Peter Palmer who is the Football Liaison Officer at Luton, asked if he could make comments. Of corse, we are always willing to help the police with their inquiries, so we said OK.

The first point was on the subject of the membership scheme, and why something so costly, and unwanted was still in force to such an extent. The reply from Geoff Lovell (the LTFC safety officer) was that it was a condition of the reintroduction of away fans, but Cherry Newbery said that the club would rather it didn't remain. The response to this from PC Palmer, is that it was originally a condition, and the police are quite happy with it, but the club haven't asked for it to be relaxed, and if they did it could be discussed.

The second point was concerning the sale of tickets on the day to away fans and casual supporters. Cherry's reply was that the police say there can be no sales to away fans on the day. The police response to this is as far as casual fans are concerned, they have an agreement with the club that these can be sold, but will not allow it for some matches, for instance those where there could be trouble, and for certain "big" games. As far as away supporters are concerned the all ticket arrangement will stay.

Another which I raised was on the use of Oak Road for home support when there is very little away support, and a sell out for home fans, as happened at the Sheffield United game, and almost happened at the Portsmouth game. The club, asked about this some time ago, had indicated that the police would only allow away supporters into that part of the ground, and broadly speaking PC Palmer concurred with this. However, he added that the club have again not put forward any proposals to alter this arrangement, and that it was not a subject that was closed for discussion. There are, he said, implications for policing, stewarding and segregation, that would be difficult to address, but it could be discussed.

We would like to thank PC Palmer for his help with these points. In closing, he said that he felt that Luton supporters had been "wonderful" this season, very well behaved, in general, and that he felt that Kenilworth Road was becoming an increasingly pleasant place to watch football.

If any of our readers feel that there have been any problems with policing during this season, please drop us a line, and we'll take them up with PC Palmer and report back in the next issue, early next season.





TOWN TRAVELS

This is not a column that normally appears in the last issue of the season, as we don't normally know where the next games are going to be, but we have heard that the pre season tour this year is heading back to Devon, as it was about 3 years ago. As we understand it, friendlies have been lined up at Plymouth Argyle, Torquay United and Exeter City, with Tiverton Town pencilled in if cash strapped Exeter happen to go out of business. No dates are settled yet, but these games will be around the end of July and very early August, prior to a home friendly on August 7th, when we understand that Spurs will be the visitors.

For those travelling to Devon, we would advise watching the local press for full details, and indeed confirmation that these matches will take place. Assuming they do, the first point to make is that the nearest railway station to Tiverton is Tiverton Parkway which is some 6 miles from the town, so the rail travellers had better hope that Exeter last the distance.

Torquay's Plainmoor ground is quite a trek from both Torquay station and the slightly nearer Torre station, while Plymouth's Home Park is about a 15 minute walk, mostly uphill, from Plymouth station. As for pubs, this will be in the height of the holiday season, so you should have plenty of time to mooch around and find somewhere, so we'll not go into the subject in too great a depth here. In Plymouth the PENNYCOMEQUICK, is handily placed between the station and the ground, and whilst nothing special, serves reasonable beer. The more adventurous may want to try the popular harbourside Barbican area, and the BORINGDON ARMS, Turnchapel, is also said to be worth seeking out, and is a pub that does B&B as well.

In Torquay the pub selection is typically unimpressive for a seaside resort, but the WIG & PEN, 168 Union Street, and CROWN & SCEPTRE, 2 Petitor Road are probably worth seeking out, although they are not exactly in the town centre. Exeter is possibly the best for choice, and has it's own home brew pub in the FIZGIG & FIRKIN, on Lower North Street. The BROOK GREEN TAVERN is close to the football ground at 31 Well Street and also worth a try should be the NORTH BRIDGE INN, on St David's Hill, between St David's and Central stations. And if we do go to Tiverton, try the RACEHORSE, Wellbrook Street and the WHITE HORSE, Gold Street, although it is worth remembering that non league grounds usually have their own clubhouse, and often have some decent beer on sale.


