

MAD AS A HATTER!

THE LUTON TOWN FANZINE

Well, here we are again, at the start of a new season. Writing this three games into that season, with three wins, and nine goals scored (and, admittedly, six conceded), I would say this is a good start. Even the pessimists would struggle to disagree, and whilst they may argue that we are conceding too many goals, we are doing what counts and scoring more than the opposition. These are probably the same pessimists who were saying in late July that we would struggle because of our lack of signings. Let's hope that in nine months time they are eating their words.

We find ourselves starting the new season with a new board of directors, and indeed a new company running our club. Gone are the holding companies put together by Kohler and Watson Challis, instead the business is now Kenilworth Road Football Club trading as Luton Town. And a 10% shareholder in the new company is Trust in Luton, who played a pivotal role in bringing the Gurney era (mini-era?) to a swift end. The Trust shareholding means that we now have an elected representative on the board, and he is their by right, rather than by the favour of the major shareholder as was previously the case. This is good news for supporters, but we have a duty to understand his role. It is not to broadcast to the world every word that is uttered in board meetings, or to give us the lowdown on players contracts. He is there to represent our views and feelings to the board, and to report back on those matters. It has to be remembered that the boardroom is the place for discussion of detailed financial matters, and much of this must remain confidential. Our representative must respect this if they are to keep the respect of other board members. At the same time, our expectations must respect this.

It is already clear that there is no significant money to spend on players, and so we must work within a tighter budget than has been the case in the recent past. However, there is also no imperative to sell at this stage, which is why Steve Howard remains with us. This is encouraging, as it shows that the budgeted approach being taken by the new board does not rely on windfall sales to make up the shortfall created by paying excessive wages for the division we find ourselves in. This fiscal care is the way ahead for many clubs if the spectre of administration is to be avoided.

The one item of big news we await is the application for planning permission for a new stadium. So, no change there. We've been promised an application "by Christmas" almost every year since this fanzine was first published, apart from a couple of years when we were waiting for a decision on the KohlerDome. We haven't had that promise yet this year, but it seems to be there by implication. And still, we wait!

Incoming...??

Worried about the lack of transfer activity pre-season? Worried about us only bringing in four players? Not to worry. We did try to bring in more, and below are the deals that nearly went through but collapsed at the last minute. Starting with our old favourite....

Tony Thorpe – This piece of gossip could have been made up by people on the various Luton messageboards or it could possibly have had an element of truth about it. Either way, the impending move collapsed somewhere along the line and the charitable Thorpe is now in the first team squad at QPHa, and even managed to get into the starting line up against W**f**d (the two scums of football meeting). When asked why the move collapsed, Mike Newell replied, 'Because he's a big, fat ugly immobile donkey – and he's too expensive.'

Warren Feeney – Apparently, Feeney turned down Luton to join his ex-national boss Sammy McIlroy at Stockport, although it's hard to see how anyone would turn down the footballing superforce of Bedfordshire for dreary struggling Stockport. Scott was supposed to sign for the Town just in time for the Charlton friendly, but it appears Newell had an eye problem as he travelled up to Blackpool to meet Scott and he mistook Matthew Blinkhorn for Scott Taylor and signed him on a three month loan. He should have recognised him really – they played together in the reserves at Blackpool. Stevo would probably have liked Scotty as both of them had been signed by Sheffield Wednesday over the summer. However, despite Newell's mistake, it could turn out that Blinkhorn will do better than Taylor would have done, as Taylor does seem to be a bit like a Thorpe rather than a Howard.

However, Newell decided not to pursue his interest in Mutu because he had found another Eastern European player by then, whom he had witnessed scoring four goals against footballing superpowers Arlesey Town. Juventus also decided to pull out of their deal and rumour has it that they are planning an ambitious swoop for Ahmet Brkovic. Let's hope for Luton's sake that we can hold onto him.

Steven Gerrard – The tabloids report how Steven turned down Moneybags Chelsea to stay loyal to his home club. Rubbish. Once again Luton got the better of Chelsea but were turned down by the Scouse Sensation just as he was about to put pen to paper on his new contract. The only problem was Enoch Showunmi. Enoch revealed this season how his favourite player was Steven Gerrard, and the feeling is mutual. Therefore, Steven decided that he didn't want to sign for Luton because he might upset Enoch when they were in the same team by not passing to him, and he couldn't bear the thought of Enoch thinking badly of him.

Stuart Douglas – It would have been great to sign Stuart Douglas back – but only as cover for Enoch on the bench and only if he was paid expenses. This was the stumbling block in the deal to bring the quick striker back to Kenilworth Road. However, despite missing out on Drogba and Gerrard, I'm sure that Town fans are pleased with Mike Newell for signing Beresford, Seremet, Vine and Blinkhorn. Marlon and Rowan played well against Oldham, so lets hope that they will continue to play well for the Town for the whole season. By the end of the season we will hopefully be saying, 'Who needed Mutu and Drogba anyway?'

MK - To go or not to go?

Relegation of what was the former Wimbledon club brings Luton up against the team many call Franchise FC. This could so easily have been Luton; had it not have been for the sterling efforts of supporters back in the 1980's. For those of us over the age of 35, memories of those dark days are still fresh in the mind. Had the same kind of determination been around in 1984 as when the current owner of MK Dons finally took the club from their South west London roots, then what kind of football would we have been watching today in Luton? Would supporters of Luton Town have had the instincts to do what the founders of AFC Wimbledon have done in forming their own club? I think not! (*This was actually a distinct possibility in the autumn of 1983 - Ed.*) At the time as supporters of a First Division club we could look forward to watching the top clubs in the country and I suspect that once the furore had died down and coaches had been ferrying fans back and forth memories of Kenilworth Road would soon have been forgotten. How many Sunderland and Middlesbrough fans are nostalgic for Roker Park or Ayresome Park?

Looking back, Luton supporters at the time were the first to take on millionaire directors and win, not only that but to force them out of their club. It should not be forgotten that this was done at a cost, as there was a considerable drop in support with some fans never coming back to the club. It could also be argued that the roots of the problems the club has suffered in the past twenty years go back to that time. The selling of the ground, the lack of financial stability, and near closures all stem from that period. But at least we still have a Football League club to support - more than can be said for supporters of AFC Wimbledon, despite going through the whole of last season without losing a game in their league.

Anyone who went on the famous march from Popes Meadow to Kenilworth Road on 7th May 1984, signed a petition or joined the boycott of home matches at that time - along with anyone too young to remember all those events - should think twice about going to Milton Keynes on November 20th. If the reasons set out in the previous paragraphs have not convinced you then just give your minds to the following: Your own conscience - did you not say to yourself or mates at the time that you would never set foot in MK to watch a football match? Secondly, as I said earlier, had the move been successful would you have carried on watching football, and what sort of football would there have been in Luton? Just think, we would never have seen the greatest moment in the club's history, the winning of the Littlewoods Cup. Thirdly, a great many Luton supporters come from the MK conurbation. There is evidence that MK Dons already have a hard core support of around 2000. What if they gain success and emulate the old Wimbledon club and we lose support?

More what ifs: Suppose Luton Town do not get planning permission for Junction 10? Take this scenario further, the club discovers it needs to do more costly

work on the present ground and some of the financial backers pull out? And then there is a proposal to ground share at Denbigh Hall? A really way out scenario, but still possible is that MK Dons have some success, grow their fan base to 5000 and another Developer or Entrepreneur decides to bring an ailing football team to a new town. Given the eccentricities of the footballing authorities in this country which allowed Wimbledon to move to MK in the first, who could rule out the possibility of them sanctioning a move of Luton Town to another new town without a league team like... Telford. Would you support Telford Hatters?

My final point is this, MK Dons have thus far prospered through the backing of wealthy people and the support of away fans. Last season Sunderland, Norwich City and West Bromwich Albion all visited them. As we know, away support at this level is around 500 at best, so it will be interesting to see how they cope. So do you really want to spend £20 sitting on scaffolding in the open air in a venue you vowed you would never set foot in, watching a team that may one day pose a major threat to our own team? Please think about going there on November 20th.

PRE-SEASON

The build up started with a low key triallists night out at St Albans. Quite well supported by Haters fans, which seemed to catch the home side out a bit. A quick trip to Scotland followed for a match at the impressive new Falkirk Stand. This was not a good performance by the Town side, and Falkirk were the better team, deserving their 2-1 win.

Another home, this time against Premiership opposition in the shape of Charlton saw a more even match with Town deserving their 1-1 draw. Charlton were useful, but did not do well in the comparisons with Ajax. No doubt they would blame the heat for their performance.

Finally, in my absence, a team of fringe players represented Town in the Beds Senior Cup Final at Arlesey, were Ahmet Brkovic was the star of the show with a hat-trick, as he staked his claim for Steve Howard's place in our starting line-up. If judged on goals alone he might have got that place. Fortunately, it isn't!

Not to the tastes of our esteemed editor and CAMRA member I am sure but it can be so difficult to get served these days even when there are only two customers waiting; so I like a place where the queuing is short: Bedfordshire Yeoman take note.

On now to the football and we look dangerous. With nine goals in three games and numerous chances to add to this tally in Yorkshire, I am not too concerned about our firepower. Steve Howard has clearly lost weight and is looking lively so as long as we can get the service to him: I am sure his head will continue to prove deadly. Howard equalised in the fifth minute of this game with a classic centre forward's jump and finish after the Tykes had taken an early lead. Rowan Vine looked okay but still needs time to settle in. Here he missed two good chances before scoring a harder one where he turned two players and held off challenges to slot home low to the keeper's left. Ahmet Brkovic is God's gift to late runners into the box on this evidence so goal scoring does not look to be an issue at present.

The problem is we look vulnerable too. Our defending was frankly shambolic on Saturday with Alan Nielson's experience not making up for his lack of pace and Curtis Davies' pace not making up for his lack of experience. Chris Coyne stands out as an individual but I don't believe he marshals those around him at all. I hope that Russ Perrett and Dave Bayliss will one day breathe again but I am not holding my breath in anticipation! This game could have finished 8-7 but still with Luton Town on top so the result was probably just. However, Mike Newell was right to criticise the team for putting themselves under needless pressure and I cannot see us lasting the season with someone as young as Davies in the back four.

A similar situation exists in the midfield where Stephen O'Leary gave away possession about six times in the first half and was fortunate we didn't concede from most of his mistakes. He was subbed in the first half due to injury (injured before being pushed you might say) and replaced by the much-maligned Brkovic who impressed enough to secure his starting place, and capped his performance with a tremendous midfielder's goal. A curling free kick by the reliable Steve Robinson found the new arrival unmarked at the near post to head home with his first touch after coming on. Arriving just before half-time it would have killed the game if it wasn't for the Hatters wayward defending in the latter stages of the second period. Paul Underwood is still involved too little for my liking but he sent up one of Vine's misses with a perfect inside pass following a Robinson tackle, so there is definitely potential there. Kevin Nicholls avoided a booking for

once and contributed most to our effort in the centre. Paul Hughes and the promising Michael Leary are still in the running for Nicholls' place on this performance though.

It was entertaining stuff in the second half with Barnsley always pressing and both goalkeepers making excellent saves. Luton had the audacity to go four up when Robinson showed energy and composure to run half the field, following an interception, and score without fuss. Unfortunately, the Town seemed to think that was the end of it whilst the home side disagreed. Barnsley will take something from this game as they didn't give up but this is the most encouraging start I can remember from Luton and looking around the division I see few threats to our championship charge this year. Remember, a pessimist is never disappointed but an optimist enjoys life more. Nine points - count them.

Come on Luton!



TRUST UPDATE

One of the most frustrating aspects of being involved with Trust in Luton is when you're helping out on the membership stand, and Luton fans – your fellow supporters, your brethren, your kindred spirits – say, "No thanks, I'm not interested."

How can a Hatter conceivably not be interested in Trust in Luton? It is a fact that had TiL not formed and mobilised so quickly in July 2003, Luton Town FC would possibly, nay probably, not be in business today. Thankfully, with hard work from the interim committee, the club is still here, with a new board - a board on which TiL has an elected representative, and who have gifted TiL a 10% shareholding in the club.

The acquisition of shares in Hatters Holdings, Luton Town FC's major creditor, and the subsequent legal wranglings with the Melodious Corporation has left TiL with costly bills to settle. The new committee has set the fundraising target for 2004-05 at a minimum of £20,000. We're hoping that at least a third of that will come from membership fees.

If you've not joined the Trust – or indeed if you've not been "interested" in it before – please do consider it. If you're already a member, thank you for your support so far. If you have any questions about TiL and its work over the past year and in the future, don't hesitate to ask.

TO GO OR NOT TO GO, THAT IS THE QUESTION.

"Go where?" you ask but I am not sure of the answer. Is it the National Hockey Stadium? Is it the ground of Wimbledon FC? Is it the temporary home of the fledgling MK Dons? Is it treasonable even to mention 'Franchise FC'?

The Football Supporters Federation have a policy of encouraging individual supporters clubs not to run coaches to away games at The Stadium (its official title) in Milton Keynes and hence endorse a semi-official boycott of Pete Winkelman's reluctant plaything. The reasoning is that to support such an enterprise financially with ticket money and merchandise would be to assist its survival. The FSF were against Wimbledon's relocation (as were the Football League apparently) and would like to see the original football club go bankrupt, whilst backing the new AFC Wimbledon side by urging supporters to go and watch them in place of your team's scheduled fixture in Milton Keynes.

This raises a number of questions. On the side of the boycott, one has to ask if the reduction in cash flow from, let's say, 50% of the expected travelling support will be anywhere near enough to make a difference? Surely, the multi-million pound debt of Franchise FC is too large to be affected by a few thousand quid every other week? Is it too late anyway? The powers-that-be should have blocked it but it has happened so maybe we should accept the situation and move on. If they go bust then people will lose jobs which is not a situation that any decent worker should wish for. However, there is a principle at stake too. Regardless of the financial impact of ones decision to attend or otherwise: should one not make the decision based on ones personal view? I believe too many people snub General Election polling because they agree with the policies of a smaller party but think it pointless voting because only two parties can ever win. If all these people reversed their opinion and turned out: would the effect be significant or not? Should it matter if it is significant or not?

On the side of attending, fans of Luton Town or any other club will say that their prime motivation is to support their team and the peripheral issues are not important: they will follow their side wherever they play. The argument is that, if supporters do not travel to Milton Keynes, the team's performance may suffer and points could be lost. Why should the away team be penalised by a lack of support when the contentious situation is not of their making? What if it is the last game of the season and a win is desperately needed...

You may notice that I live in Milton Keynes and therefore have a feeling for the local population's views on this subject. Many people who could not be bothered to attend games in London (where most of their antecedents are from) are looking forward to having a team on their doorstep whatever level of football it is. Many more think that one of the two major non-league teams in our 'new city' should have been invested in instead of stealing one from somewhere else. Local support would be much larger for Newport Town or Bletchley Town/Milton Keynes City if they had been brought up through the pyramid in the normal way. This would have given Pete Winkelman a better reputation than he currently enjoys too; maybe a standing similar to Max Griggs. Then there are the amateur players, such as myself, who took part in the many seven-a-side leagues that played on The Stadium's artificial turf throughout the year. Some of these games have moved and some have been lost but the facility is definitely no longer one for the wider community but simply one for the minority of recent live football converts. Any fan that used to follow their team around the country from Milton Keynes will still be doing so and won't have switched allegiances at the drop of a bobble-hat.

Personally, I will not be going. I will be sticking to my principles and taking the view that there is something greater at stake here than the result of one fixture for Luton Town. There is no guarantee that a strong away following will achieve a good away performance on the pitch; and there is no guarantee that the result of one match will affect the team's season one way or another. I shall be taking part in a pub crawl through Milton Keynes that day and may even stand outside the ground at kick-off but I won't be giving my money to people with no sense of the history and traditions of football. I will not be going to AFC Wimbledon either because frankly, my dear, I don't give a damn. Good luck to them but I could not get enthusiastic about such a match.

What I won't be doing is criticising anybody that does go. I can understand both sides of the argument and if my fellow Luton supporters wish to see their team in action on that day then that is their choice. I would hate to see such an issue cause a schism in any supporters group at any club in the country; I just hope we never have to make such decisions about other relocated clubs in the future. If football be the food of love, play on.

STAT ATTACK

Sat 21st Aug - Torquay (Home)

Torquay have won just once from 14 visits to Luton, and that came on their second trip with a 2-1 win in 1929. Luton had won the first encounter 5-0, and went on to record a 6-1 win in 31/32, 10-2 in 33/34 and more recently 5-1 in 2001/02. Andy Rennie hit a hat trick in the 5-0 win and went one better with 4 in the 10-2 victory. Tommy Tait hit a hat trick in the 6-1 win, and a feat that Carl Griffiths repeated in 2001! With only a solitary draw, 1-1 in 69/70, Luton have taken maximum points from 12 matches, and have scored 46 goals in the process, conceding just 13! The last encounter saw a certain Jean-Louis Valois make a very impressive debut which was capped off by a long range thunderbolt of a goal!

Last time: 22nd September 2001 Won 5-1 (Steve Howard, Carl Griffiths (3), Jean-Louis Valois)

Wed 25th Aug - Boston (Away) League Cup 1

Luton have never played Boston in a competitive match, but they have a good record in single match away games in the first round. Prior to the introduction of a 2-legged first round, and since it's reverted back to a single match Luton have only lost once, against Reading in 2001. There's certainly no forgetting the last time the Hatters were drawn away in the first round of the League Cup... September 10th 2002 ring any bells?!?!

Previously the Hatters have recorded wins at Port Vale, a replay at Charlton, and at Gillingham prior to the introduction to a 2-legged round.

Last time: 10th September 2002 W*tf*rd Won 2-1 (Matt Spring, Steve Howard)

Sat 28th Aug - Blackpool (Away)

Blackpool away on the August Bank Holiday weekend... thank you fixture computer!! It's not been a happy hunting ground though with just 4 wins from 19 trips! Add a further 4 draws and you'll soon work out that there's been 11 defeats. Luton have managed less than a goal a game on average whereas the hosts have knocked in 34. The first win came in 1898, 3-2, and was followed with a 2-1 victory in August 1957. Thankfully the wait wasn't as long for the next one, but it was still 14 years later in 1971, and 32 years passed before it happened again last season.

Last time: 13th December 2003 Won 1-0 (Steve Robinson)

Mon 30th Aug - Bournemouth (Home)

It's 12 wins from 24 for the Hatters from this fixture, although it's been 3 of each outcome in the last 9 matches. The first encounter saw Luton stroll home with a 6-2 win in December 1923, but Bournemouth gained revenge a year later with a 2-1 victory. The 1920's continued with 4 more wins for Luton and a high scoring 3-3 draw. There was a gap of 27 years between 1-0 wins in the Octobers of 1936 and 1963, and the same length of time separated a 0-0 draw in October

1969 with a 2-0 victory for the Hatters in 1996. Bournemouth have recorded victories 2-1 in 97/98 and 99/2000, with Luton winning 1-0 in August 2000 courtesy of a penalty converted by Matt Spring.

Last time: 20th April 2003 Drew 1-1 (Steve Howard)

Sat 4th Sept - Sheffield Wednesday (Away)

Luton have only won twice from 25 visits and 9 draws means there's been 14 defeats. Only 25 goals scored, with 53 conceded means an average of 3 goals per game. The first win, in 1970, came after 8 defeats and 3 draws. An emphatic victory it was though, courtesy of a Malcolm MacDonald hat trick and a brace from Don Givens the Hatters ran out 5-1 winners. It was 17 years, and 9 games later before maximum points were achieved again, this time it was a 2-1 win. Last time: 22nd November 2003 Drew 0-0

Sat 11th Sept - Chesterfield (Home)

17 matches and 10 home wins, with just 3 defeats. Chesterfield's biggest win, 3-0, came on Boxing Day 1899, which was also their first league visit to Luton. It was 66 years before the feat was repeated, this time just a 2-1 victory. Luton had thumped their visitors 5-0 in December 1938, and have hit 3 goals past them on 4 occasions. All 4 draws have been 1-1, and Luton have only failed to score on 2 occasions.

Last time: 29th November 2003 Won 1-0 (Steve Howard)

Sat 18th Sept - Stockport County (Away)

The other Hatters won the first 4 encounters, but then failed to win in the last 4! Luton's biggest defeat came in December 1965 when they lost 4-1, and they failed to score in the next two matches. 1-1 draws followed in 69/70 and then 96/97 before the first victory in October 2002, by 3 goals to 2. Matthew Spring scored twice with Andrew Fotiadis bagging the other. Last season Luton put themselves on top of the table after just 2 games with a 2-1 win at Edgeley Park, Alan Neilson was one of the scorers with his only senior goal to date.

Last time: 16th Aug 2003 Won 2-1 (Alan Nielson, Steve Howard)

Sat 25th Sept - Peterborough United (Home)

Again only 8 games played and the statistics are fairly even. Posh won the first encounter back in March 1964, with a 3-2 scoreline. Two draws followed in 63/64 and, after a long gap between fixtures, in May 1993. Luton won the next 3 fixtures, Kerry Dixon scored both goals in a 2-0 win in 93/94 and Paul Showler repeated the feat in a 3-0 win in 96/97. Boxing Day in the year 2000 saw Matt Spring, Peter Holmes and Emmerson Boyce all hit the target in another 3-0 win. Luton then lost on the opening day of the 2002/03 season, by 3 goals to 2, before a draw last season.

Last time: 25th October 2003 Drew 1-1 (Adrian Forbes)


