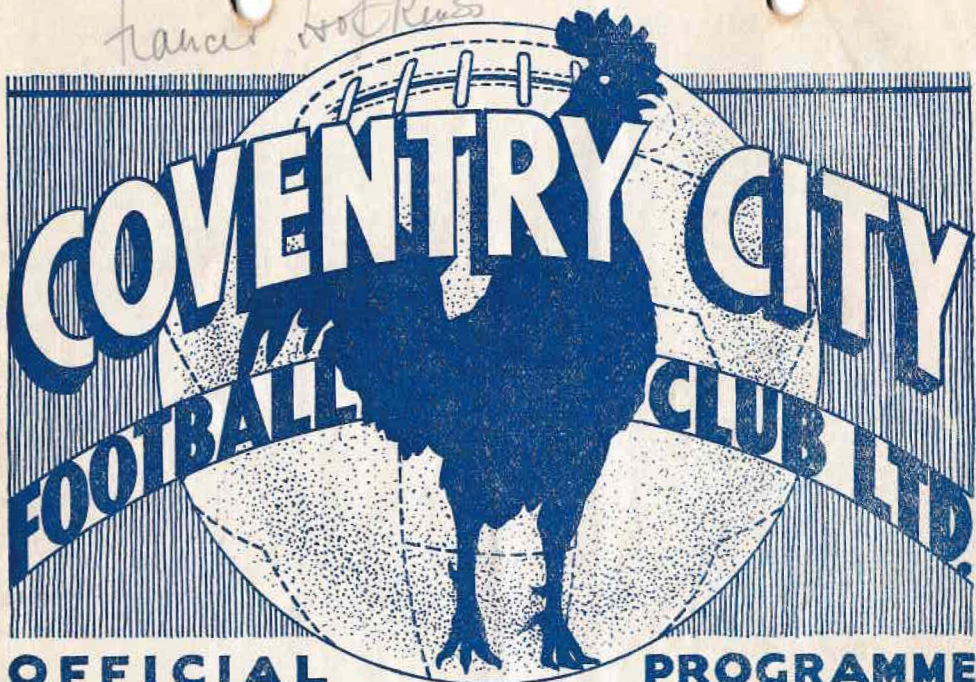

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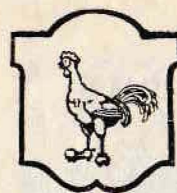

FROM THE BOARD ROOM.

Those who had fears as to the
wisdom of our Secretary-Manager
in completely reorganising our
forward line for the game at New-
castle last Saturday, must have
been reassured when the result
came through. Mr. Storer does not
come to these decisions impul-
sively, but only after very careful
thought and in most cases from
actual playing trials. It was this
shrewdness on his part, and a
thorough knowledge of his players
and also of opposing players, that
helped very materially to win
promotion two seasons ago, and
has been a factor in our success
this season. Those who are apt to
criticise our actions should by now
have sufficient confidence to real-
ise that there is a reason for them.

We are league leaders, we are
the only undefeated team in the
four leagues, and we have gained
more points than any English
league team in the country. None
but a real good side could have
accomplished this, and every loyal

supporter should be proud of our
players' achievements this season.
We shall have our bad games, as
every team does, but there can
never be any question as to the
spirit of determination which
exists amongst our players, the
spirit which has been such a big
factor in the tremendous progress
the club has made in recent years.

This season's achievements are
not limited to our first eleven.
A draw against Queen's Park
Rangers last Saturday, and a
victory over Bournemouth on
Thursday has again taken our
reserves to the top of the London
Combination table. Out of ten
games now played, one only has
been lost, and goals are being
scored with pleasing regularity.
Twenty-five goals have already
been scored, only two teams, West
Ham United and the Arsenal,
having found the net on more
occasions. Our efficient reserves
may prove a valuable asset before
the season closes.

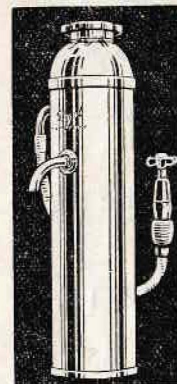

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TO-DAY'S VISITORS.

Luton Town, our visitors to-day, are finding the going, like the grounds, somewhat hard in the Second Division; and they arrive with three victories and six defeats to their name so far.

The only section of the team that had not been changed since the opening game till last Saturday was half back, where Jack Finlayson, Jack Nelson and William Fellowes had been together. The association was eventually broken by injury to schoolmaster Finlayson.

Starting with 11 players who were with the club when they won the Southern Third Championship Luton's first team alteration was to bring Joe Payne again into the side. The famous goalgetter immediately obliged with one from centre forward, and when he was

moved to inside right a fortnight ago he collected a couple; but he has not yet really got going in his former winning ways, and has had five blank afternoons. Last season his return was 55 goals in 39 games. Yet he started with Luton as a half back.

New to the club this season are Ted Griffiths, Fred Hogg and William Redfern. Griffiths, the outside right, was signed last May from Stourbridge; Hogg, the inside left, from West Auckland last December; and Redfern from Newry Town last month up to when he had been getting a big haul of goals.

Luton have not yet determined whether he will fit into the scheme of things best as inside right or centre forward.

ITEMS OF INTEREST.

Somehow form has gone all tradition in many instances this against season. Portsmouth have for years been able to rely on their defence in almost every emergency, but this time their goals against column is the heaviest laden in the First Division. Funny, too, that Norwich have scored most goals in the Second Division, but they have conceded most, including a six at Chesterfield.

Rumours of departures from Preston North End have arisen because with a signing made last week there are seven Scottish forwards on the books. It is impossible for them all to be in the side at the same time as forwards, of course, but not all seven are of recognised regular first team grade, and the news from Preston is that they are not seeking customers.

There is still room for a young man to make a spectacular rise in football. Frank Nash showed it by signing as a professional and going straight into the Middlesbrough first team. He did not fall on the 'Boro as a bolt from the blue, however, because he was with them last season as an amateur, and they knew what he could do.

George Hunt, from Tottenham, as centre-forward for the Arsenal follows in the footsteps of other famous players in Dave Halliday from Sunderland, Ernest Coleman from Grimsby Town, Jimmy Dunne from Sheffield United and Ted Drake from Southampton.

Many compliments have been paid Harry Wright in the short time he has been a Derby County player. Many nice things have also been said of late about Arthur Tutin, of Stoke City. Each must be particularly interested to hear of the other's progress as they both stepped straight into First Division football on transfer from Aldershot.

Six goals against has been the dread figure worrying an unusual number of first-class goalkeepers already this season. That must not be taken as evidence of the presence of an unusual number of poor custodians. For instance, Alex McLaren, of Leicester City, is in the forefront of his profession yet in his career he has had six against him in each of four trips into Lancashire; and on two occasions he has had to pick the ball out eight times.

Exceptionally big attendances are a cause of worry at London football matches. Highbury was not big enough on Saturday to take something over 70,000 people who wished to see Manchester City on duty. Last Monday Chelsea announced that they had sold all tickets for to-day's match with Arsenal.

Something of the old maxim of "setting a thief to catch a thief" must have been in the minds of West Ham on visiting Sheffield for they had in the team four men born within walking distance of the Wednesday ground, and two more from the Midlands.

Alan Todd in 1931 started as a goalkeeper with Leith Athletic and a year later he climbed into the Cowdenbeath team. A year later again he satisfied Port Vale so well in a trial that he was taken on, and remained for four seasons. Last June he was transferred to Forest and in September he reached Second Division football to have a big hand in the Nottingham club's fourth victory.

Swansea Town soon reached a position where they had no centre forward fit. Manager Harris promoted to the vacancy a player who had never been in the first team and who was developing as a half-back though signed as full back. David Emanuel, a local, was picked up six months after his brother Tom, another full back. He was a scorer on his debut as leader.

Plymouth Argyle and Tottenham Hotspur each claim to possess the smallest attack in the Second Division. The presence of Jim Hunter at outside right with Plymouth for the first time this season, the third in the position in successive games, puts on half-an-inch compared with Tom Duggan, the regular, but Hunter in only 5ft. 7ins.

Never yet in eight seasons have Southampton managed to get through without Albert Roberts in defence. It is a tribute in these days of almost continuous transfer deals to find a defender signed in May, 1930, still with his only League club. In one season he was absent from only three games yet up to to-day his total was but 131.

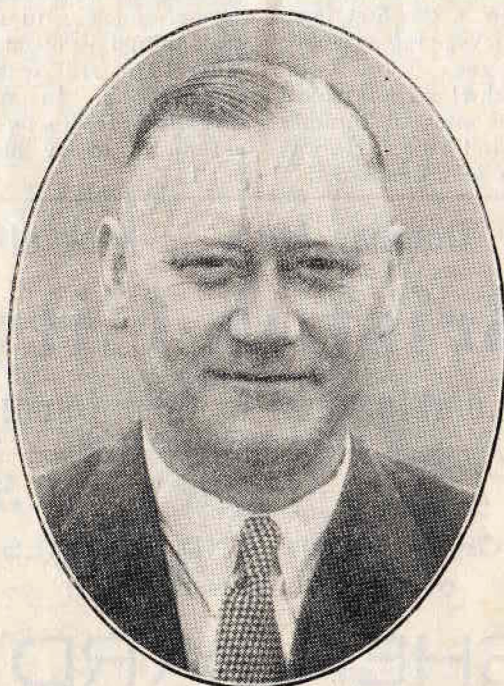

TOPICAL NOTES

There is some controversy at the present time in certain quarters as to whether the F.A. Cup Final should continue to be staged at the Wembley Stadium or be removed to the White City Stadium. It is probably true that more than 50 per cent of the football public who desire year by year to be present at the F.A. Cup Final, are unable to do so, as the Wembley Stadium only holds about 90,000 people. The management of the White City Stadium have provided accommodation for 160,000 people of whom 50 per cent are seated, while their parking arrangements provide accommodation for 6,000 motor-cars and coaches—a number nearly double those at Wembley last year. A special feature of the car parking arrangements at the White City is the great number of entrances and exits, while train facilities are extremely good, there being three stations practically adjoining, and three additional ones within a mile. Whether sentiment will give way eventually to the practical consideration of the tens of thousands of football enthusiasts who are disappointed yearly remains to be seen.

Supporters of Blackburn Rovers formed a high opinion of Bobby Mortimer in January last, when he scored two goals in each of Accrington Stanley's two Cup games with the Ewood Park side. They fell in love with him last Saturday, when he led the Rovers with skill and success against Southampton and had the satisfaction of crowning his fine work by scoring twice in his first game for them 24 hours after transfer from Peel Park.

For the first time in an Association International match the players in the England and Ireland match at Belfast, on October 23rd, are to wear numbers. The English Authorities have been in favour of this innovation for some time, and there is little doubt that a very large number of spectators will appreciate the system which assists materially to identify players. There is at present no rule under which the F.A. may order teams to be numbered, and last season, when England invited Scotland to number the players in the International match at Glasgow, the Scots declined without giving a reason.

The following appeared in a well-known sports article this week, and is worthy of space in our programme—"Coventry City apparently have taken the cue from Charlton in shutting their own goal and trusting to getting the ball into the other net. All praise to them. They have not been beaten in their last 11 games—2 last season and 9 this—and it is such records that lead to championship successes."

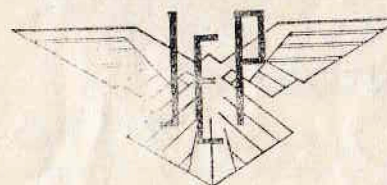
Another leader who is finding the big difference between the scope afforded in the Second Division compared with that in which he made his name is Albert Thompson, the second choice for Swansea, who are having an exceedingly rough time in the matter of injuries. Thompson, it may be remembered, averaged a goal a game in his 24 outings with York City. Before that he was a reserve in the ranks of Bradford.

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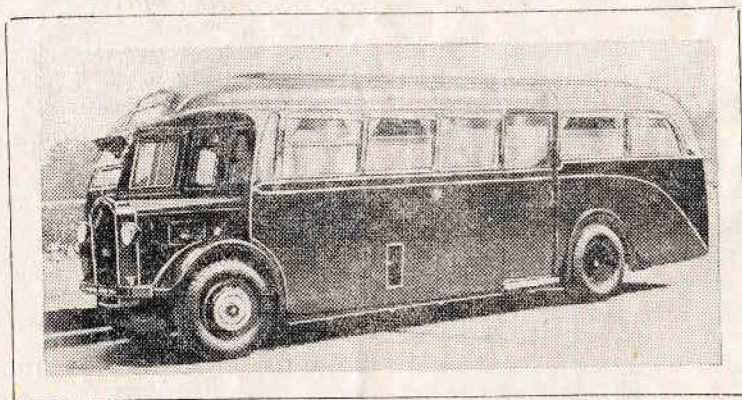
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FOOTBALL JOTTINGS

Some time ago Aston Villa tried to convert Jim Allen to a full back. Much more success attended the move of converting Tom Griffiths, the Welsh International centre-half, to that role. Now in the place of Griffiths at right back they have made another successful conversion of a pivot. He is Ernest Callaghan.

Mr. W. Pickford, President of the Football Association, is reported this week to have said in a public speech, "I am sorry to see that the fair shoulder charge, as practised in my day, is being penalised; but I suppose referees have great difficulty in differentiating between an honest shoulder charge and a vicious one." He also expressed a wish to see the sliding tackle abolished.

Since little George Bargh joined Bury from Sheffield Wednesday the "Shakers" have won every match in which the ex-Preston forward has scored. Early last season he was getting goals freely; then he came to full stop. Last Saturday he was a scorer for the first time this campaign and, hey presto, Bury recorded their first away victory.

Fulham have called on eleven forwards and of the nine who have played in more than one senior game only Ronnie Rooke and Jackie Arnold have confined their activities to one position—centre forward and outside left respectively. They have each been absent from four matches. Six of the 11 have been tried at inside left.

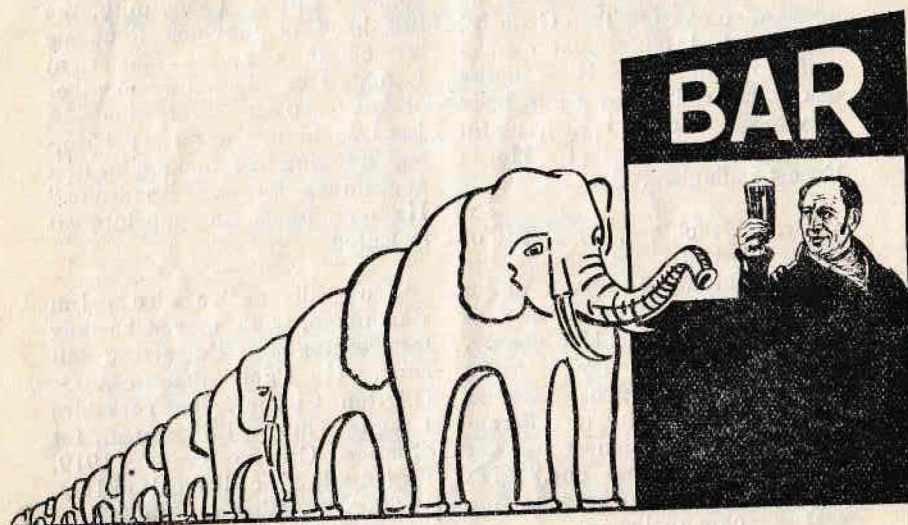
Luton Town had two school-masters in the side that fell at home to Bury. Tom Smith, the full back of previous Rochdale service, is a sports master at Letchworth. The other member of the scholastic profession was Joe Loughran, the former Birmingham wing half, making his first appearance for the "Hatters." He now holds an appointment in Luton.

You will remember Jim Barrington, who played so long for Nottingham Forest at full back. He signed this week for Ollerton Colliery, the Yorkshire League club. Jim signed for Bradford City in August, 1919, for Hamilton Academicals in July, 1922, for Wigan Borough in August, 1925, and for the Forest in August, 1929.

Barnsley have not yet had a goal from outside left. Johnny Lang, the new arrival from Aberdeen, was the third to occupy the position and though he did not score himself in his first game in England he "made" the two goals that enabled the Oakwell team to save a point.

As a centre-forward with Torquay United George Stabb had considerable promise. It decreased after service with Notts County and Port Vale, with both of whom he developed into a handiman. It has gone up again because Bradford have made him a wing half. George has finally settled the Park Avenue problem concerning the right flank of the middle line.
