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### ROUND THE MAP

In one respect at least I am in agreement with the London newspapers in their comments on last Saturday's Cup-ties—London Clubs did not have a good day! To be perfectly truthful, as is my custom, I am of opinion that we mere provincial babes were a little fortunate to get through the first round with more than a draw. Equally convinced am I that we did not deserve to lose. To suggest that Orient had eighty minutes of the play, as was stated by one journalist, is darned rot—as the late lamented Euclid never bothered to say! We certainly did not exactly shine in the first half, except in defence, but that was accounted for by the fact that the home side had a strong wind in their favour and were on their own ground which appeared to me to possess the qualities of Stick-phast minus its lily-white appearance.

The homesters were evidently accustomed to the ground conditions and were fully capable of co-opting the wind as twelfth man. He served them exceedingly well and on more than one occasion put the wind well up me! But we had Robb, two backs and Middleton on our side, plus a bit of luck, and half-time came with no score.

I will not claim that in the second half we accommodated ourselves to conditions quite as well as the Orient had done in the first forty-five minutes, but we most certainly had more of the second round than our opponents, and the goal which came our way was no fluke, but the result of persistent pressure and a promptness generally in seizing upon opportunity. I have said "generally" because there was one outstanding opportunity for a shot which was forfeited for a pass! I am sorry to have to say that, but my horrible passion for speaking the truth is unconquerable!

Just another "grouse"—it may not do any harm! There was a period in that second half during which our fellows caused me to go all hot and bothered by indulging in a spell of "short stuff." I did not give tongue to what was in my mind because I was in respectable company, and I will not relate those thoughts now because I doubt not that you, dear reader, must be included in the same choice category. Glory be!—the short stuff was of but short duration, and there was nothing short about Proud's pass, which Fishlock dealt with in so short a time as to leave the home spectators short of sufficient breath even to applaud.

Enough of what *has* been, let us have a look at what is to be. There are to be four clashes between North and South in the second round of the Cup and we happen to be mixed up in one of them. From a monetary point of view we look like being unfortunate because Accrington Stanley, situated midway between Blackburn and Burnley, and possessing a population of only about 43,000, have not been enjoying too much prosperity during recent years. Their record gate is £580 and that was in the season 1923-4 when they were visited by Charlton Athletic. Their second highest gate of £543 was when our old friends Portsmouth removed them from the Cup. Their best League gate this season is £235.

Accrington, as it was then called, was one of the original members of the Football League which was formed in 1888-9, but the growth of professionalism and development of football in the larger centres rendered the cost of maintaining a League Club so high that at the end of their fourth season they were forced to drop out.

Accrington Stanley then came into being, and after a few seasons in a junior organization became members of the Lancashire Combination, in which their reserve side now figures.

of the Third Division, Stanley succeeded in securing election and although a few seasons ago they finished at the bottom they sought and secured re-election. Their record against Southern Clubs in the F.A. Competition is of interest. In 1923-4 they succumbed to Charlton Athletic at home and the following season were beaten 5-2 by Portsmouth, also at home. In 1926-7, however, they went to Exeter and gave the City a 2-0 licking, but met their Waterloo at Chelsea in the third round with a score of 7-2. The following season they again reached the third round and after failing to beat Bournemouth at home lost the replay by 2-0. Three seasons ago Stanley reached the third round once again but were dismissed by Bristol Rovers with a score of 4-1 and in 1930-1 were defeated 1-0 at home by Torquay.

According to our friend Robb, the Stanley ground—Peel Park—is not exactly a paradise, so far as goalies are concerned. Robb says—and I would not disbelieve him for the world, although some might—he says that if play happens to be at one end of the field for any length of time the keeper at the other end has a most lonely and uninteresting time, as he cannot see what is going on because of a mountain midway between him and the fun. It is indeed true that Peel Park is of a shape peculiar to itself, although it is claimed that the surface is one of the best and driest in Lancashire. There is, however, a distinct slope with one side higher than the other, and the home side must have a definite advantage over visitors. Accrington are not invulnerable, however, for they have been beaten in League games this season on their own ground by both Chester and Hull City.

Allen, the goalkeeper, was with Coventry last season, and Armstrong and Price, the two backs, have figured with Bournemouth and Bristol Rovers. The right half, Chris Dodds, since his return from Sheffield Wednesday, has not come up to expectations, and is standing down in to-day's League match in favour of a reserve. Viner, the centre-half and captain, is the tallest man in the team, and having played for Guildford is not a stranger to us. McCulloch, left half, was previously in the reserve side of Blackburn Rovers and is considered to be one of Accrington's best. Of the forwards, Eddleston, the outside right, was for four seasons with Swindon Town. Walton, his partner, is a local product. Fitton, the centre, had a brief period with Southend, who secured him from Oldham Athletic. Maycock, who was preferred to Fitton in the first round, is another who has seen service with Guildford. Johnson, inside left, was with Halifax Town last season, and Wright, the outside left, joined Accrington from Crewe Alexandra two seasons ago.

**WHEN A GOAL MAY BE SCORED  
DIRECT FROM A FREE KICK.**

By ARNOLD JOSEPHS.

When a free kick is awarded anywhere within shooting distance of the goal, the first question that is asked is "Can a goal be scored direct?" There is always a doubt.

Whether or not a referee should enlighten a player who is not quite sure, I shall leave for another time, but there would be little hesitation if the Laws were well known.

True, there are many offences for which a free kick may be given and I agree that it is difficult to remember in each particular case whether or not a goal may be scored direct. It puzzled me at one time and I found that the easiest way to remember was as follows:

What would be the award if the offence occurred within the penalty? I know there were many who at one time thought a free kick could not be given in the penalty area, but what about the free kick for goalie carrying, the free kick given against a defender for dangerous play, the free kick given against a defender for playing the ball twice after a goal kick or other free kick, the free kick given when a defender has been sent off, and last of all the free kick given against a defender for playing the ball before it touches the ground during what is called a "dropped ball."

Read these again, for here you have a complete list, and the fact that only a free kick may be awarded should immediately tell you a goal may not be scored from the kick.

Now, think of all the other offences that are left.

Should they be committed by a defender outside the penalty area, a free kick would be given; if within the penalty area, a penalty would be given, and this fact alone should remind us that in both cases a goal may be scored direct from the kick.

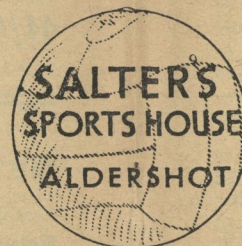

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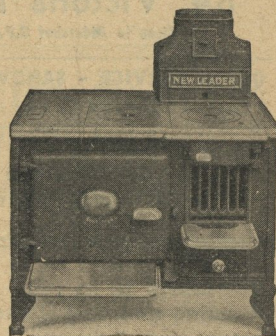
