



If you can't pass . . .

... you can't play

In my column this week I want to talk about passing. Let's get one thing straight right from the beginning—if you can't pass you can't play. Although this week I want to teach you the techniques of passing, and I want you to practice and keep or practicing. I must stress that passing is not just something you do with your feet. The brain is more important. Think before you pass. Also get out there and practice with one or two of your mates, practice makes perfect. In the strip below is illustrated the five principles of good passing. Purpose the main point and the four things that stem from this; accuracy, weight, time and disguise. When you've got all five right then you will have improved your game tremendously. As a general rule it is always better to pass forward, however there are times when a square pass or even a pass backwards are needed, but more of that next edition.
