



## WHAT ABOUT LAST SEASON THEN?

Of course the end of last season was absolutely brilliant, staying up against all odds and the excellent atmosphere amongst the fans for the last few games. But anyone who saw the matches against Arsenal, Crystal Palace and more especially at Derby is entitled to ask what Luton were doing at the foot of the table anyway.

I remember 'travelling to Derby that Saturday with complete faith that the Town would get a result - and if we did go down it would be decided by Sheffield Wednesday and Nottingham Forest. On the day Luton played so well that, apart from the loss of concentration at the end of the first half, they looked as good as any team I'd seen in the league all season.

The fact is that if Luton had played with such spirit and determination all season, we'd have been looking at a top six place.



certainly at the start of the season, and especially around Christmas time, Luton looked a very poor side indeed. There seemed to be no quality left in the team since the departure of Ricky Hill, Brian Stein and Mark Stein. The backbone of the team was shattered as well.

Steve Foster, the best Luton captain I've ever seen, was sold. Mick Harford was always injured and when he finally got fit, he was sold. Mal Donaghy came back at Christmas from Man U, but could hardly have recognised the club he had once been such a major part of.

Ray Harfords biggest sin was that he tried to create a good squad out of young players too quickly, seemingly ignoring the experience of his older players. It took Danny Wilson a very long time to fill the skippers role after Foster's departure - and the rest of the team

locked a very pale reflection of the 1988 cup winning aquad. Instead of experience we were left with bunch of talented, but unconfident youngsters. Kingsley Black, who looked like the excited sixth former in the Little-woods Cup winning squad took the role of the Towns old campaigners. Experience beyond his years, as Brian Swain would say. And we bought Lars Elstrup....

Luton went out of the FA Cup at Brighton after Ray Harford was given the shove, and it was time for local hero Jimmy Ryan to try his hand. His first game in charge at Anfield saw Liverpool having to come back in a 2-2 draw.



Since Ryan took over as manager he's had his good times and his bad. Away from home the town were still being beaten convincingly by the likes of Charlton (2-0). Man Utd (4-1) and Nottingham Forest (3-0). But at Kenilworth Road at least Luton are (at time of going to press) unbeaten in the 1990's (good statistic that, eh readers?).

Anyway, the last three games - the fact that we could stay up mathematically (but not feasibly) seemed to bring out the best from the players and the fans. Against Palace, Luton were 30 seconds from relegation before Iain Dowie scored his winner - and the scenes on the terraces were like the Oxford semi-final in 1988 (or when Wayne Turner scored against Watford in the FA cup in 85). So to Derby, which was a day I doubt I'll forget, winning 3-2 and eventually staying up.

This season I hope we will see the form that kept Luton up last season right from day one, and perhaps Peter Nelkin will achieve his ambition to 'win things'. As Bill Shankly once should have said "The fight for the Championship and the fight against relegation are exactly 'the same, except if you want a relegation struggle - you needn't start playing til after Christmas" (but he didn't).



Nobody knows more about football than "Mr Town" Brian Swain. He makes the Herald and the Citizen coverage look amauterish and our effort look like a school mag. In the last 90 years, Brian has not missed! Luton match - rumoour has it he was born even in Kenliworth Road!

His disappointments whilst at Kenilworth Road could be put down to a number of things an injury before the 1988 Littlewoods Cup final, a rush of blood in 1989 which made him give away that penalty and the way he got himself a new hairstyle for the 1985 semifinal v Everton and the Nottingham Forest cup final.

So, the Luton strips changing again - this time its just to change Bedford into Vauxhall for the advert. That means the team badge won't be changing or the stupid button down collars. No readers, this is not scraping the barrel, this is a worthy article about the changing strips of Luton Town - and the effect these changes have on the replica buying public. Including fantastic illustrations.

Since the brilliant orange, white and black shirts (which Jimmy Ryan wore) we've had some good and bad and some ugly strips. Anyway, that first kit must of been out in about 1973 and I'm told (by unreliable sources) that Eric Morcombe designed it. Also, it WAS white and BLACK strips because we've got the photos. This was undoutable the best Luton Town kit and for this reason we made a couple and wore them at Derby last season. You might even be one of the people who shouted "bloody hell, look at that" at the sight of our replica 'Johnny Astons'.

What was the away kit - well, I dunno, so on to the next kit which was the first to carry the LT design we all knew and loved ( and the Sun still uses to illustrate its LTFC stories). This kit too was a corker, two thin blue strips with a fat white one in the middle and the new logo on the white strip. The away strip was a white shirt with a thin orange line - and eventually seemed to become the home kit. Why we couldn't have stuck with the orange tops I really don't know, but there you go.

Sadly, in the late seventies, Luton stopped using Admiral kits and started using Adidas gear. The first kit (the Bob Hatton) wasn't too bad. The strips down the left became adidas strips and the badge moved to the right. I got this kit for my birthday one year (including shorts and socks), that was in June and next season they went and changed it.





The new kit had orange arms on a white shirt (the Steve White). I don't really know why, but I always hated that kit (and Steve White). As far as the replica went, the orange away top was good, but the badges always peeled off in the wash. The next season they changed it again because the strips on the arms changed colour. Fans may well remember that the goal nets had Trimoco written in them, and that it looked crap). Still, that shirt took Luton into Division One so god bless it.

Next came the best Luton shirt for ages. It was that V neck with orange blue and white trim. Apart from giving you (well, me anyway) sore nipples, the replica top was dead good. Especially when the blue ones came out (after their debut at Tottenham when we won 3-1), although the orange shirts never came out (shame).

When Luton announced they were bringing back the old "as used in 1959" badge, I was a happy lad. When I

found out that orange was out, I was outraged. The strip immortalised in 1988 was flippin lousy in my opinion and I ruined mine before the Oxford semi-final by writing "Going to Wembley" all over it ( I thought I'd get on the telly didn't I?). And you couldn't get the away kits either.


So, somebody is bound to say that this fanzine is a rip off for a quid - there's always one.

To proove that you're getting VFM we've counted together all the pages of the official Luton Town programme which costs 20p more than our fanzine and we've matched against our own mag.



So, Lutons looking up is it? How come then that every week in the local press we get somebody moaning about drunks in the night and dogshit parks and Luton being such a dump.



## Now watch the Jown climb up the table

Luton Town 4, Chelsea 0

IT'S GOING TO be a happy New Year for Luton. Last night they thrashed Second Division leaders Chelsea out of sight and left the snow-covered Kenilworth Road pitch with the ecstatic cheers of their fans ringing in their ears.

It was their finest performance of the season and underlined that the form in the last two matches, which had threatened a towsing for somebody, could still take them back to the verge of the promotion issue before 1977 is very old.

Chelsea boss McCreadie said: "This match should not have been played and the referee knew my feelings before the game. Six of my players have bad grazes." Luton manager Harry Haslam said: "Chelsea may complain about the conditions, but we beat them fair and square."

It was Lutin who had the pedigree look. Inspired from midfield by Chambers and the deft Alan West, they never faultered once they had roared into the lead in

71 seconds. Chambers, a bargain £25,000 buy from Arsenal three years ago, sent full-back Paul Price clear on the right. A low cross found Husband unmarked at the far post and he skidded the ball back across goal.

As Chelsea's stranded defenders watched, Fuccillo swept home. Chelsea, with only Butch Wilkins able to match Luton's skilful play, slipped further behind in the 13th minute, - and reserve keeper John Phillips must take the blame. Phillips, playing his first game in two months, in place of the injured Peter Bonetti, didn't even move as Chambers looped a left foot volley high into the net from 18 yards.

Moments later Phillips was almost beaten again - this time as Fuccillo grazed the bar with a vicious shot. Luton were not to be denied and left Chelsea for dead with another quality strike in the 57th minute.

West, a strolling master in the arctic conditions, found Husband with a neat through ball. Husband, transferlisted all season turned unchallenged to drive a right

foot shot beyond Phillips.

Chelsea fans were drifting away as Luton rounded off a superb performance. Phillips dropped a Ryan shot and then could only upend Price as the ball ran loose.

The excitement of this dazzling Christmas Town display was even reflected in the gate figure, which dropped 3,000 to 14,000 after a hasty re-count.

Manager Harry Haslam said: "Before we started I went into the dressing room and told the lads: 'I know it's Xmas, but I don't want fairies."


