

## 1978

"NINETY-NINE percent of the support is marvellous, part of my treasured memories of Luton I'll keep forever. Perhaps one day I'll be back at Kenilworth Road, who knows?"

Nineteen Seventy-Eight.

It was a big step for Chairman Denis Mortimer to take, but things happened very quickly at Luton F.C. at that time. A month before, Harry Haslam had requested a new contract to see him at Luton for a while, and a happy conclusion had been apparently met. But someone forgot to draw up the new contract, and three weeks passed. Mr. Haslam then got a little bit scared. He thought that the directors didn't want him at the club any more. So he went shopping, and landed talks with Millwall and Sheffield United; the latter getting their man.

So the young Pleat who had been until a month previous Luton's Youth Team coach stepped into Haslam's boots. Denis Mortimer took him on not purely on performance, but acting on a "Hunch". Not bad eh? A funny feeling in Mr.D.Mortimer's stomach was more likely to be an ulcer, but he'd created probably Luton's finest management spells ( with exception, of course, to the 'glory-glory day's' of boss and funny man Raymond Harford ).

Pleat wanted his team to play a particular style that, if it can be re-created will stop my moaning of the Town's gate fee. Luton Town 1981-82 were quite probably the most exciting team in Britain that season. There was a pressure on Pleat before that season. His team had come close to promotion, and the fans longed for it. "I've done three tears as a manager and we are still not where we want to be, in the 1st division." All that was about to change. That season was of course

the record breaking 2nd Division Championship year that saw so many consistently entertaining Luton games. I'm a gonna review that one some time. The style was quick, neat passing, creating chances, putting pressure on the opposition and closing them down very quickly and hard when not in possession. I saw a video not so long ago of that season and it's a real pleasure to see Luton play that way. Pleat's style had a simply devastating impact on the second division teams.....

A different story in the first. They still scored so many goals, but had just about the worst defence in the league. You had something to cheer alright, but the pattern was that the other set of supporters usually cheered one more time than we did. So even though Luton was still a pleasure to watch with games full of incident, they were looking like going straight back down from where they came.

Pleat admits now that he was a nervous wreck the weeks prior to the titanic struggle the team faced at Manchester City. So was I come to think of it. One team had to go down, and Raddy Antic made sure it wasn't going to be Luton. So Pleat danced onto the pitch which was caught live on television, at the end of the match not really knowing how many people were watching.

The seasons after 1983 until Pleat left were still a bit of a struggle, but such a crunch tie at the end of the season wasn't to be seen for a few years. 1985 was a year in which Luton really made an impact on the F.A. Cup reaching a semi-final against Everton. That cup run will also be remembered for the riots surrounding the 5th round tie against Millwall; and like everyone who actually experienced it Pleat had strong views. After this tie he said, "What should have been the happiest night of our lives was wrecked by violence and mob lawlessness that erupted inside & outside the ground." He carried on,

"If this is what football is really about, we should all pack up. But my greatest hope is that supporters can get back to the simple pleasures of football, and enjoying the spectacle. Go to the match, show your feelings and support the game as well as your team." It was such simple but logical ideals that was a great credit to Pleat and this influence such an asset to this club. His simple and direct thinking showed in the simple yet lovely way his team played.

Pleat seemed to get 100% from all his players, and seemed very concerned that the supporters of his team would get value for money. Finishing his notes for the '85 season he hoped that his team could beat Leicester "with style and flair". Luton won 4-0.

1986 was a comfortable yet still exciting season for the L.T. finishing 9th in the first division, and the 5th round of the F.A. cup (Everton doing the job again after a replay). Pleat had made Luton into an established first division outfit, a challenge for any team that was to be a winner of a major trophy. A final word that season was "I hope that everyone that loves this club will be here come August to cheer us onto another successful campaign.

He left for Tottenham shortly after.

"It has been a difficult week with Luton Town tugging heartstrings one way and heart and head knowing that the Spurs offer needed great consideration. David Evans did everything to make me stay. I doubt if there is a finer chairman in the football league. Deep down, I thought for some time that Spurs were the only other club that I would like to manage. Quite simply I rated it as the best management job in football." So off David went, taking over for Peter Shreeve at White Hart Lane. The challenge of a flagging giant (finishing lower than Luton in 1986), large ground, support and everything else that seems to go with a North London Club (except Q.P.R.) was very strong.

At the time, Luton supporters hated Pleat and Spurs. They had "raped" Luton of their manager, physio and promising defender, Mitchell Thomas. The games against Spurs became a grudge game. The Christmas of 1986, Luton went to White Hart Lane with a large following, all of whom were spitting fire. Pleat & co. of (ex)Luton bore the brunt of the anger, and the Spurs support must have wondered what the fuss was about. Good game, Luton weren't going to let Spurs win and Mick Harford came nearest to scoring in a pulsating 0-0.




David Evans, never short of a word to say stated "Tottenham are a degenerating giant that has had its day. Luton are a team for the future. I think David will live to regret his decision.

Looking at it maybe he did. He didn't last long at Spurs, allegations about his private life stole the limelight and Pleat had a disappointing time at Leicester City. Then again, to know football outside of Luton must have been a priceless experience, which is exactly what today's young Luton team need.

A more popular successor to Ryan couldn't have been appointed as far as I am concerned. I believe that with Pleats experience and talent Luton needn't be the team that is constantly 'doing a Charlton'. I think we should look forward and give the team all the support they need in this, I see as a particularly difficult season for Luton. I think that Luton need experience on the field, and hopefully a couple more will guide the young team. Pleat has proved to be a very good buyer of both young and older Town players such as Stein, Hatton, Moss, Price, Donaghy, Foster and Harford.

We shall see what happens....

## the write to reply

For your average Luton Town fan the politics of the club seem to generate more interest than anything that the team can come up with from week to week. More interest and more entertainment. Indeed, if Luton fans don't take up an up-tothe-minute account of Town affairs then it is often bemusing to find out who's been sold this week. If we relied on the Luton News and the Herald to deliver the latest news we'd be lost. An example of the latest news is the Heralds Thursday night assurance that David Pleat didn't want to let Kingsley Black leave Luton followed by the news on Friday that Brian Clough had snapped him up for £1.5 million.

In David Pleat's first term as manager he had his weekly slot in the Luton News which helped keep the fans up to date with events at Kenilworth Road. It was perhaps the last real link between club and supporters and was stopped when David Pleat left. Of course, David Pleat and all subsequent managers have their slot in the match programmes which they might argue serves the same as any local press column.

I would strongly disagree with this on quite a number of counts. Firstly the match day programme is an integrally biased publication on glossy paper with glossy viewpoints on dismally bad games. The manager may, from time to time, have to admit that the team has been "unlucky" in recent games but for anybody to criticise the team - even if they're playing really terribly badly would, in the programme, be sacrilege. Local newspapers are biased of course, but not to the extent of glossing over everything that is rotten. If David Pleat decided to continue with his Luton News bit he'd be unlikely to get away with the weekly

congratulations for the boys doing a mans job etc etc.

Secondly, the views of the manager, if only to be found in the matchday programme are only reaching those fans who go week in week out to Kenilworth Road and are prepared to shell out £1.50 to buy a programme. There are a few thousand membership card holders who apparently don't do either. You might argue that fans who can't sing "Loyal supporters" with any conviction don't deserve the privilege anyway. Perhaps not, but maybe they stopped coming to Kenilworth Road because they feel they've been alienated by the club they once

felt very much part of. WHAT THIS SO-CALLED FANZINE FORGETS TO

> "Gray did an excellent job, but he needs someone to play alongside him," said Pleat.

The third point is the unhappy state of affairs between club and supporters which have included the sacking of Jim Ryan, the selling of players we might have done well to keep. The fans don't trust the board and the board have principles which do nothing to encourage the fans that better days are just around the corner. The net result of this is the lack of information coming from Kenilworth Road to it's public which leaves Brian Swain to speculate on events there and the Luton public at large to easily disregard their home team. A home team that doesn't like being here, a home team that the average man on the street can't go and see without being checked out first, a home team that has few loyal supporters, a home team who can't even see eye to eye with the supporters it does have. DON'T WORRY, IT THE LATER ....

An example of the distrust between club and supporter came in David Kohler's piece in the Liverpool programme in which he states "A group of so called Luton Town fans, decided between themselves that, in their opinion, Peter Nelkin should resign in the best interest of the Football Club". Yes, he's not wrong their but he goes on "They undertook a vendetta against Peter Nelkin and his family using various tactics such as letters, abusive phonecalls and death threats...". Bleedin'eck! Hold on a minute, shouldn't their be a bit somewhere in

there explaining that it was the actions of the mindless minority who did the nasty business? Surely every Luton fan who called for Peter Nelkin's resignation can be blamed for the subsequent phonecalls and death threats - and everybody who kept the local press full of letters to three weeks following the sacking of Jim Ryan are apparently being tarred with the same brush as the death threat people. THE TROUBLE WITH LTFC PART ONE - ATTITUDE PROBLEMS AND MEMBERSHIP CARD SCHEMES

The only way that we ever really will compete is if and when the attitude of the board changes. The present scenario of having to sell players to keep the club (if not the team) buoyant. What the club needs is more money. To get more money they have to attract more fans (especially fans with fat wallets). To attract more fans you need to display bright, skillful and entertaining football. To ensure good football you need good players. To get good players you need more money... So it goes on and on in ever decreasing circles until one day we end up at the foot of Division Four with Richard Briers as chairman.


Someone then has to take some risks and open their wallet. David Evans did it in 1984 and, for a short time, we had a team that could match any other team in the division. Ray Harford took it as his duty to kill off that squad after David Evans took it as his to make Luton Town the first Thatcherite football club (and, in turn about as popular as Thatcher with the rest of football). Plastic pitches and Membership card schemes must have done quite a bit to dissuade potential investors in putting their money behind the club. Everybody loves the underdog - but not necessarily the underdog that plays on a plastic pitch and doesn't let visiting fans into it's ground. Now that is all in the past - but the scars remain and it might be too late to redeem ourselves.

Although the membership scheme has been loosened the club is still not allowing in people that we used to call the "casual supporter". This too could go a long way in killing off the club. The "casual supporter" isn't the fan who, luck most of us unlucky sods, inherited Luton Town as their team. They're the fans who like football in general and decide on a Saturday afternoon that they should go to their local club to see a match. Slowly, but surely, they become loyal supporters

of that club. So it happens that a football fan with no set allegiances becomes an LTFC supporter and in turn brings along his friends and family too. Now, what chance is there of that now? Answer - None. Fans who would have been prepared to go to Luton Town but couldn't get in have found out that it isn't that expensive to hop on the train to Highbury or White Hart Lane instead. Coming back from Arsenal this season it was sickening to see Arsenal shirts outnumbering Luton shirts by about two to one at Luton station. Most probably loyal Arsenal supporters who might have been Luton supporters if they had been made welcome.

Now that away fans are being let back into the ground, isn't it about time the club made room for more Luton fans? Much is made of the fact that the membership card scheme numbers about 20-odd thousand (many of whom only come out of the woodwork when we get to Wembley). However, every membership card has printed on it that the card does not guarantee admission - so why must numbers be kept down? Is it imperative that the club knows the names, ages and addresses of all it's supporters? And if it is then why are the club so cagey in accepting new members? The guest ticket scheme that made life a bit more bearable in the no-away fan years (if you could stand the third-degree interrogation) has been tightened so that any guests must sit down if they want to go at all. What would be the damage in taking the details of guests and issuing them with a membership card so that they'd be free to come back next time? Would it mean that away fans would take advantage of such a ruling? Well, a few might, but I reckon they'd rather be up the other end of the ground anyway - and even if large numbers do make it onto the Kenilworth Road terrace - we all know that that doesn't mean that there's going to be a riot.

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
BLACKPOOL v. LUTON

Onto a more bizarre match. The first home game of 1973-74 found the Hatters 6-0 up against Carlisle within 26 minutes! (both Luton & Carlisle were promoted at the season's end). Luton went into autopilot after that start, and won 6-1.

I could go on for ever "waxing lyrically" about such performances. They are just a few memories from decades of following Luton Town, and I would be interested to read other contributors memoirs from days past.

Out of sight and, for all intent and purpose, out of mind it's nice to see that Watford are finding it as hard in the second division as we are in the first. It isn't much comfort but it still remains a comforting thought. So what is this perverse rivalry between two clubs who haven't played each other for years? How comes we've had the upper hand over the Hornets for so long? Do Watford fans still have the same "hatred" of Luton Town?


# GET YOUR KITS OUT FOR THE LADS


there. Maybe the answer might be in the next weeks match against Liverpool.




FIG 3. BOATER AT DECIDEDLY RAKISH ANGLE,
